# Parkland RCMP Solve Armed Robbery In Under Four Hours

The suspect then fled in a vehicle. Staff were able to provide the licence plate and description of the vehicle to police. Through investigation, police learned that the licence plate had been stolen off of a similar vehicle in Stony Plain, Alta., but this was not the suspect vehicle.

A short time later, Parkland RCMP received reports of a vehicle matching the suspect description driving on sidewalks and trails in Spruce Grove, Alta. The Parkland RCMP Drug and Crime Reduction Units were deployed to assist, and they were able to track the vehicle to a rural property north of Spruce Grove.

A male exited the vehicle and fled into the treeline,

but was quickly arrested. The male was identified as 36-year-old Edward Allan Maurice Vredegoor, a resident of Stony Plain. His clothing at the time of arrest was a match to the security footage of the robbery suspect. The machete was located in the vehicle, which was determined to have been stolen from Spruce Grove earlier the same day. The arrest occurred shortly before 9 p.m.

Parkland RCMP held Edward Allen Maurice Vredegoor for a bail hearing. He was subsequently released and is set to appear at the Stony Plain Provincial Courthouse on Oct. 26, 2022. He is charged with the following:

- Robbery
- Assault with a weapon
- Possession of a

weapon for a dangerous purpose

- Uttering threats
- Theft under \$5000 x3
- Flight from peace officer
- Dangerous operation of a motor vehicle
- Possession of property obtained by crime for the purpose of trafficking x2
- Disguised with intent to commit an offence
- Theft of a motor vehicle

Parkland RCMP would like to thank and encourage the public to continue to report suspicious behaviour. It is with the public's assistance that police were able to identify and locate the suspect vehicle so quickly.





# SAFELY AVOID POTENTIAL WINTER HAZARDS

Winter can be a beautiful time of year, particularly when freshly fallen snow blankets the landscape. However, winter is also a time fraught with potential peril. The same winter weather that makes landscapes so pristine can make roads, walkways and even being outside dangerous.

The U.S. Department of Transportation says weather-related vehicle crashes killed 6,253 people last year and injure more than 480,000 per year. These accidents most often occur when roadways are wet, snowy or icy. Yet, winter driving is not the only seasonal hazard. Here are some common winter activities and how to avoid getting hurt when engaging in them.

Driving

Exercise extra caution when driving on road-ways during the winter, as they may contain ice or snow. All it takes is a small coating of precipitation on roadways to make driving treacher-

ous. Wet-looking roadways may be wet, or they may be covered by ice, and it's difficult to tell the difference with the naked eye. Always slow down and assume you are driving on ice. Make every effort to improve visibility. This includes checking windshield washer fluid levels and ensuring windshield blades are in good working order.

Snow removal

Shoveling or removing snow by various methods can be stren-


uous work, taking even those who feel they are in good shape by surprise. A 2011 study conducted by researchers at the Center for Injury Research and Policy of The Research Institute Nationwide Children's Hospital found that an average of 11,500 snow-shoveling-related injuries and medical emergencies were treated in U.S. emergency departments each year from 1990 to 2006.

Lower back injuries, falls, injuries to the arms and hands and cardiac-related injuries account for many of the incidents sustained while removing snow. There's also the risk of injury from collisions with pedestrians and snow plows. Plows and bobcat-type devices can cause serious injury. Exercise caution when operating such machines.

Roof snow removal Removing snow from a roof can be a dangerous prospect. Always use the appropriate equipment, which includes telescoping poles, rather than climbing on slippery roofs. This may be a job best left for a professional, who will have fall-arrest systems and nonslip safety boots.

Dressing for conditions Venturing outdoors for winter fun may be enticing, but never put your health at risk for the sake of fun. The Mayo Clinic says hypothermia is a medical emergency that occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can produce heat, causing a dangerously low body temperature. Wear appropriate clothing to hypothermia, prevent which may not produce any initial symptoms. If shivering stops or confusion and slurred speech set in, severe hypothermia is in effect and a person should be moved indoors and gently warmed. Mild hypothermia is also possible indoors, typically when the elderly spend several hours in poorly heated

homes.

Winter may be beautiful, but it also can be hazardous. Taking precautions and using common sense help avoid dangerous situations.



# **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

Submitted by Yellowhead County

Public Hearing - A Public Hearing was held for Bylaw 17.22 that would return a property in Niton Junction to districting matching more closely to what it was prior to the adoption of Land Use Bylaw 09.21. The proposed amending bylaw would change the current Urban Neighbourhood District zoning to Urban Neighbourhood District, Commercial District and Rural District.

Treaty Flag - Council voted to take steps to display Treaty and Métis flags alongside the current

national, provincial, and municipal flags at the Yellowhead County office in Edson. Yellowhead County will contact representatives of these nations for consent and inclusion prior to putting up these flags at the County office.

Wild Boar Update – Council received an update on the wild boar situation in the county. Administration has received two reports of sightings of boars in the county under the provincial reporting system. The update also included new wild boar monitoring that uses water testing and eDNA sampling.

ASB Bursary Awarded - A

\$500 Agricultural Services Bursary was awarded to Taylor Eaton on the recommendation of the Yellowhead County Agricultural Services Board. Taylor met all the requirements for the bursary and showed a history of community and agricultural participation in Yellowhead County.

Letter of Support for Seniors Grant – Council approved letters of support to both the Robb Recreation Association and the Evansburg Seniors Citizens Society expressing support for their New Horizons for Seniors Program Grant. This is a federal government grant program that provides

grants to senior and senior-serving organizations.

Hamlet & Inter-municipal ASPs Updates - Council passed amendments to six hamlet Area Structure Plans (ASPs) and the Hinton-Yellowhead County Intermunicipal Development Plan. These changes included updating the references to the land use districts in the plans so they match the existing districts in Land Use Bylaw 09.21 (updated in 2021). Public Hearings were held on October 11, 2022, prior to Council voting to adopt these updates.




