PARKLAND RCMP RESPOND TO COLLISION BETWEEN SCHOOL BUS AND SEMI-TRUCK

Submitted by Parkland RCMP

Parkland RCMP continue to investigate a collision between a school bus and a semi-truck that occurred at 8:15 a.m. on Nov. 4, 2022, in Spruce Grove.

All involved parties suffered injuries. Parkland RCMP have since received an update that the three involved children have injuries more significant than immediately apparent on scene. All are currently stable.

Parkland RCMP continue to investigate, but preliminary findings show that the school bus was travelling northbound on Golden Spike Road, when it was struck by the semi-truck.

MLA SMITH ARTICLE

This past week, Albertans were introduced to Premier Danielle Smith's new cabinet – a diverse team of Albertans dedicated to addressing the issues in our healthcare system, delivering real relief from inflation, cutting taxes, putting more money in Albertans' pockets, creating jobs, and attracting investment.

Premier Smith's new cabinet includes MLAs from every region of the province, from rural and remote areas, small and mid-sized communities, and large urban centres.

While this team is ready to get to work, Premier Smith has been clear that every United Conservative MLA, whether they're in cabinet or not, will play a meaningful role in her government. Private members will chair the government's revamped cabinet policy committees and every MLA will have a seat at the policy-making table.

One of Premier Smith's top priorities is ensuring Alberta's freedoms and interests are protected from a federal government that has, in the past, made unilateral decisions that have landlocked our resources, undermined our economic prosperity, and made life less affordable for families and businesses. VIGILANCE KEY AS WILDFIRE SEASON ENDS

Albertans should continue to exercise caution, as the threat of wildfire lingers in some parts of the province.

Albertans' shared sense of responsibility for our forests has decreased the percentage of human caused wildfires in 2022, but there is still work to do.

While Oct.31 marked the end of the legislated wildfire season in Alberta, it is essential that people remain alert and responsive to conditions. The recent warm, dry weather was enjoyed by many across the province, but prompts a reminder to everyone that wildfires can start and spread at any time of year.

In the 2022 wildfire season, 56 per cent of wildfires were caused by human activity, around 38 per cent were caused by lightning and roughly six per cent are still under investigation.

"Diligence this summer resulted in a more than 10 per cent decrease in human-caused wildfires and we recorded fewer wildfires than the previous year overall. Wildfire staff work tirelessly keeping our forests safe and it's great to see that their efforts have been supported by the public's responsible behaviour. We're not out of the woods yet, though – warm, dry fall conditions in some parts of the province mean that it's still important for folks to stay alert to risks. Preventing wildfire is the duty of all Albertans." Todd Loewen, Minister of Forestry,

When enjoying the province's beautiful forests outside of wildfire season, Albertans should remain cautious. Fall

may be in the air, but wildfires can still occur. Until there is sufficient moisture on the ground, the threat of wildfire remains. Alberta Wildfire has

AHS FLU IMMUNIZATION CLINICS IN DRAYTON, WINFIELD

Alberta Health Services (AHS) is holding a flu immunization clinic in Winfield for children under five years of age and their family and household members. Winfield Community Health Centre will host the clinic on Nov. 8 between 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. by

appointment only.

The site is located at 12 Avenue.

AHS is also holding flu immunization clinics in Drayton Valley for children under five years of age and their family and household members.

The Drayton Valley Community Health Centre (CHC) will offer the clinics on Nov. 16, Nov. 23 and Dec.

21, 2022 and Jan. 18, 2023.

The CHC is located at 4110 50 Avenue, with clinics open varying times on these dates by appointment only.

In addition to offering the vaccine to children under the age of five and their families, AHS flu clinics are also available to individuals who do not have a provincial health care number, and to individuals who live

in a community where there are no other immunizing healthcare providers.


All Albertans, six months of age and older, are eligible to be immunized at a variety of locations, free of charge. Those five years of age and older can get immunized at participating pharmacies and doctor's offices.

AHS encourages individuals to ask about getting a COVID booster at the same time.



- Retire snow tires earlier than you would all-season tires. Snow tires lose almost all of their effectiveness once they reach 6/32-inch deep tread.

Snow tires can make roads safer for drivers who live in locales with long, snowy winters. They also are ideal for drivers who desire more traction, cornering and stopping capacity on winter roadways.

Black Knot | Info & Pruning Guideline



Black Knot - What Is It?

Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has received numerous calls regarding black growths on residents' fruit trees.

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the *Prunus* genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning.

Black Knot - Pruning

1. Only prune between November and March.
2. Cleanly cut off at least 6 - 8 inches below the knot, better to prune back to a healthy collar, then leaving a stub.
3. For knots on branches or trunks that can't be removed, use a knife to cut away diseased tissue down to good wood and then ½ inch beyond the edge of the knot.
4. Cleaning your equipment properly is another good way to prevent the spread. Pruning shears should be dipped in a 1% bleach/water solution between cuts and once you are finished pruning ensure you run your tools under water for 10 minutes and dry thoroughly.
5. Treat pruned branches like hazardous waste, they can release spores for up to 4 months. Burn, bury, or wrap them in plastic and throw them in the trash. Do not compost.

OVERCAFFEINATED?

Many people don't realize that caffeine is a drug. It's a stimulant that's found in many types of pain and cold medicine as well as in foods and drinks, including coffee, tea, chocolate, some energy drinks and some painkillers.

What are the short-term effects?

The effects of caffeine usually start within five to 30 minutes and can last from eight to 12 hours.

Larger amounts of caffeine can:

- cause shaking
- make you have trouble sleeping
- make you very agitated
- cause a fast, irregular

heartbeat (might feel like your heart is racing)

- make you feel irritable, restless, and nervous

People who have panic attacks shouldn't use large amounts of caffeine. It can trigger nervousness and anxiety, and they might be more sensitive to its effects.

It's rare for adults to die from a caffeine overdose. However, children can die from as little as one gram of caffeine. A single cup of coffee contains between 40 and 180 mg.

Caffeine doesn't decrease your appetite so there's no point in using it to diet or decrease your hunger.

Caffeine doesn't help you sober up if you are drunk.

As your body gets used to

caffeine, it needs more and more of it to get the same effect. As the amount of caffeine goes up, so does the risk of side effects.

You can become mildly dependent on caffeine from regularly drinking 350 mg (about two to four cups of coffee) a day. If you suddenly stop drinking caffeine, you might have withdrawal symptoms such as:

- headaches
- problems sleeping
- feeling irritable, tired, and depressed
- lack of energy
- feeling down
- having trouble focusing or concentrating

Withdrawal symptoms begin 12 to 24 hours after you stop caffeine. Most symptoms go away within a few days.

What are the long-term effects of caffeine?

More than 300 mg of caffeine (about two to three cups of coffee) in a day may be linked to miscarriages and low-birth weight babies. Caffeine is passed through breastmilk, which might make your baby irritable or have trouble sleeping. If you're pregnant or breastfeeding you may want to limit or avoid all caffeine.

Some women who drink (more than three cups a day) may be at risk of bone fractures as they get older.

Regular use of more than 600 mg of caffeine might cause long-term effects including chronic insomnia, constant anxiety, depression, and stomach problems. It can also cause high blood pressure or make high blood pres-

sure worse.

Caffeine and young people

Because their bodies are smaller, caffeine may have a stronger effect on a child than on an adult. Children who drink pop or energy drinks with caffeine might feel anxious, be irritable, have trouble sleeping, or wet the bed.

Some teens and young adults who use a lot of caffeine may have health problems like an increased or abnormal heart rate or chest pain. If this happens, they may need to go to the hospital or need an ambulance.


