

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Enoch RCMP Investigate Arson Incident Involving Firearm

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One of the suspects was identified as 34-year-old Bryan Tyler Lee Sharphead, a resident of Enoch Cree Nation. When the suspects attempted to flee the area, their vehicle became stuck in the ditch nearby. This vehicle has been seized by po-

A witness approached the vehicle believing that the occupants needed assistance. The suspects exited the vehicle and allegedly pointed a firearm

toward them and rounds were discharged. The suspects then fled the area on foot, and were observed being let into a nearby residence.

The area was contained with the assistance of Enoch RCMP, Parkland RCMP, Police Dog Services (PDS), and the Emergency Response Team (ERT). A warrant was obtained to enter the residence, and Bryan Sharphead was located inside. He was arrested and held for a Judicial Interim Release Hearing.

Three other males were also

located in the home. The second suspect has not yet been identified. The investigation is ongoing, and search warrants are being conducted on the residence and recovered vehi-

Bryan Sharphead remains in custody. His next appearance in court is set for Jan. 18, 2023. He is charged with 18 offences, including arson, firearms offences, and breach of his conditions.

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TEAM IMPROVES ACCESS TO ADDICTION, MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORTS

Local and area residents now have improved access to addiction and mental health services with the launch of a crisis response team in their community.

A team of Alberta Health Services (AHS) addiction and mental health clinicians - including mental health therapists, registered nurses and addiction counsellors - will be on-call during evenings and weekends to consult in-person with physicians and provide counselling to patients who arrive at the Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre emergency department needing specialized crisis support.

"Alberta's government is

building a comprehensive recovery-oriented system of addiction and mental healthcare," says Nicholas Milliken, Minister of Mental Health and Addiction. "We are working with Alberta Health Services to ensure individuals have timely access to treatment and recovery resources."

The service provides oncall counselling and support on Fridays from 4:30 p.m. to midnight, and from 8 a.m. to midnight on Saturdays, Sundays and statutory holidays. Prior to this initiative, patients would receive crisis support care but may have had to wait until regular business hours to be assessed by an addiction and mental health clinician.

"We know many individuals with addiction and mental health concerns present to our emergency after-hours," says Carla Prediger, Director, West Rural for Addiction and Mental Health in AHS Central Zone. "We are pleased to be able to optimize the expertise we have in place and ensure individuals are getting the timely care they need."

Community crisis response teams also operate in Wetaskiwin, Ponoka, Lacombe, Rimbey, Sundre, Olds, Innisfail and Rocky Mountain House.

Access Addiction & Mental Health is the access point for non-urgent addiction and mental health information and services. In Central Zone, call 1-888-594-0211.

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SECONDARY SUITE ADDRESSING NOW AVAILABLE IN LEDUC

Homeowners with unaddressed legal secondary suites on their property can now apply for a mailing address for their suite through the City of Leduc. Through this process, a permanent address will be assigned to secondary suites (e.g., in-law or granny suites) that are properly permitted and Code compliant.

Homeowners who develop a

secondary suite in the future will be provided a secondary address when they apply for their development permits.

Homeowners should be aware that applying for suite addressing is voluntary and may require an inspection. If a unit is found to not be Code compliant, property owners may be required to bring the suite into compliance at their own cost.

2023 BUDGET ADDRESSES GROWTH AND INNOVATION

Ongoing funding for infrastructure projects, investment in parks and recreation, and additional mental health support is included in the balanced City of Leduc 2023 Budget approved by City Council at a public meeting on Dec. 12.

The 2023–2026 Strategic Plan drives the budget process and in 2023 shifts the municipality's focus from maintain-

ing services to investment, growth, and innovation.

Community health and safety is a prominent theme – with the North Fire Hall included, providing much needed emergency services to the industrial areas of Leduc, funding for a community navigator to help connect residents to mental health and social supports, a School Resource Officer, and a position added to the RCMP Police and Crisis Team

to work in partnership with an AHS Mental Health Nurse.

As an active community, the need to maintain and invest in recreation services is a priority for residents. 2023 will see improvements to Lede Park, outdoor rinks, fitness and aquatic equipment. These investments continue to make Leduc an attractive destination for large sporting events that support the local economy, like the 2025 Alberta 55+

Summer Games, a bid the City recently won.

The City anticipates spending roughly \$112 million in 2023 to maintain and enhance service levels and move capital projects forward. To balance the budget, a modest increase of 4.19 per cent in tax revenue is required; of that, almost 3 per cent is related to rising inflation.



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AFFORDABILITY PAYMENT PORTAL OPENS JANUARY 18

Beginning January 18 at 9 a.m., eligible Alberta parents and seniors can apply to receive \$600 in affordability payments over six months.

Alberta's economy has recovered strongly, but many people are struggling to heat their homes and feed their families and the government wants to help. Along with significant broad-based supports to help all Albertans, Alberta's government is delivering targeted relief for families, seniors and the most vulnerable.

The secure online application portal will launch on January 18 at 9 a.m. Families with household in-

comes below \$180,000 are eligible to receive \$100 per month for six months for each dependent child under 18. Seniors 65 or older who have household incomes below \$180,000 and do not receive the Alberta Seniors Benefit can also apply for monthly payments.

Anyone who cannot easily go online can apply in person through any registry agent or Alberta Supports to receive support in 50 locations and over 100 languages during regular business hours.

Applications will be accepted any time between January 18 and June 30, 2023. Once the application process is completed, most Albertans will receive payments at the end of that month. The exact timing

will vary.

Applying online is fast and secure

The application portal for direct supports was designed with personal privacy and security in mind. To apply, eligible parents and seniors must have a confirmed or pending Verified Account, which allows Albertans to prove who they are online without paper documents or face-to-face visits.

Albertans will use the login information from their Verified Account to sign in and complete their online application. Applicants will be asked a series of questions to verify their eligibility, as well as banking information so that payments can be deposited directly into their bank account. Applicants without bank accounts can also select to receive their payments by mailed cheques.

In-person, online and callin supports are also available for those who have difficulty applying online or need extra assistance.

Vulnerable Albertans will receive payments automatically

Many Albertans who qualify for the inflation relief direct payments are automatically enrolled and do not need to apply through the portal or in person. Everyone who receives benefits through Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH), Income Support or the Alberta Seniors Benefit, or services through the Persons

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with Developmental Disabilities (PDD) program are already registered and will automatically receive their \$100 payments starting January 31. If you are a recipient of one of these programs and you also have

dependent children under age 18, you will need to apply to receive payments for your children through the portal.

Foster and kinship caregivers are also automatically registered and do not need to apply for children in their care. Along with \$600 in affordability payments, the Affordability Action Plan is also providing \$500 in total electricity rebates and hundreds of dollars in estimated fuel tax relief, as well as natural gas price protection and income tax changes to help with the rising cost

of living. To further support vulnerable Albertans, Alberta's government has provided an increase to core support programs and additional foodbank funding.

LEDUC TRANSIT RIDERSHIP INCREASE WITH ON-DEMAND SERVICE

Ridership grown by 252 per cent in first year

Since the launch of On-Demand Transit in August 2021, ridership on Leduc Transit has increased 252 per cent, according to a recent study released by RideCo. The on-demand service expanded local transit coverage to 100 per cent of the city and both Leduc and Nisku business parks, resulting in significantly en-

hanced service. This granted access to areas outside of the previous fixed-route network that covered 42 per cent.

"On-demand transit provides a more flexible service to our residents and suits our unique mobility needs," says City of Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "Residents and businesses jointly benefit by giving each better access to employment and local talent, and in return bolsters our economic opportunities and contributes

to our thriving and growing community."

The increase in ridership has also comes with efficiency as costs per passenger has decreased by 47 per cent from \$51.72 to \$27.60.

"We know how critical it is to connect people to and from the businesses in Nisku Business Park through effective, efficient transit service," says Leduc County Mayor Tanni Doblanko. "Through our partnership with the City of Leduc, Leduc Transit's on-demand

solution has done this in a way that not only increased coverage and frequency of service within the park, but also reduced our operating costs – saving taxpayers' money. We have seen a huge increase in ridership since moving to an on-demand model, and with 450 flex stops in the service area, we're confident riders can get where they need to go, when they need to be there."



According to Statistics Canada's latest labour force survey, our province created 41,200 full-time jobs in December, capping off a year of strong provincial job growth.

ALBERTA RCMP REMINDS THE PUBLIC OF THE DANGERS OF DISTRACTED DRIVING

The Alberta RCMP are always on the lookout for distracted drivers, working hard to reduce fatalities and serious injury collisions caused by distracted driving. Today, in Provincial Traffic Court in Airdrie, Alta., a 40-year-old male from Alberta, was sentenced for his 13th distracted driving conviction. For this 13th conviction, he received a \$2,000 fine and a \$300 victim surcharge. The individual also received three demerit points for the conviction.

Following a large public education campaign, distracted driving became illegal in Alberta on Sept. 1, 2011. That same day, this individual was issued a distracted driving ticket. In the 11 years that followed, he has now been convicted a total of 13 times for distracted driving here in the province, with fines totalling \$5,371.

Research has shown driver distraction is the primary cause of over 20% of all crashes, and that distracted drivers are three times more likely to be involved in a col-

lision than attentive drivers.

Alberta's distracted driving law applies to all vehicles as defined by the Traffic Safety Act and all roads in Alberta. It restricts drivers from doing any of the following, even while stopped in traffic or at red lights:

- Using hand-held mobile devices
- Texting or emailing
- Using electronic devices such as laptop computers, video games, cameras, video entertainment displays, and portable audio players

- Entering information on GPS units
- Reading printed materials
- Writing, printing, or sketching
- Personal grooming, such as brushing and flossing teeth, putting on makeup, curling hair, clipping nails, or shaving

Sadly, motor vehicle collisions caused by distracted driving are happening every day in Alberta. Please, leave the phone alone.

APPLICATIONS FOR THE NEW CANADA DENTAL BENEFIT ARE NOW OPEN!

Seeing a dental care professional is important not only for oral health, but for overall health. In Canada, a third of people do not have dental insurance, leaving many unable to visit an oral health professional to get the dental care they need.

That is why today, the Honourable Diane Lebouthillier. Minister of National Revenue, and the Honourable Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Health, are taking action to help those who need it most to access dental care by announcing that applications for the new interim Canada Dental Benefit are now open. The Canada Dental Benefit will give eligible families up-front, direct payments of up to \$650 a year per eligible child under 12 for two years (up to \$1,300) to support the costs of dental care services.

In order to access the benefit, applicants must meet all of the following criteria:

- They have a child or children under 12 as of December 1, 2022 and are currently receiving the Canada Child Benefit (CCB) for that child;
- They have an adjusted family net income of less than \$90,000;
- Their child does not have access to private dental insurance:
- They have filed their 2021 tax return; and
- They have had or will have out of pocket expenses for their child's dental care services incurred between October 1, 2022 and June 30, 2023, for which the costs are not fully covered or reimbursed by another dental program provided by any level of government.

The CRA is leveraging its experience in administering essential benefits to Canadians

to deliver a smooth, secure and user-friendly application process on behalf of the Government of Canada. Eligible parents can apply for the Canada Dental Benefit quickly and easily through their CRA My Account. Those who apply online and are signed up for direct deposit could receive their payment within 5 business days. Those who are unable to apply online can call our new dedicated phone line at 1-800-715-8836 to complete their application with an agent.

Parents and guardians will need to keep the receipts for the dental care services that their child received with the benefit for 6 years in case the CRA contacts them to validate eligibility. Applicants that are found to be ineligible for the benefit during the verification processes will be required to repay the benefit they received.

By delivering targeted fi-

nancial support to those who need it most, the new interim Canada Dental Benefit represents just one of the ways that the Government of Canada is working to make life more affordable for families in Canada.

Examples are based on the maximum core monthly benefit rates for single people with no children:

- \$1,685 to \$1,787 AISH
- \$745 to \$790 Income Support (expected to work)
- \$866 to \$919 Income Support (barriers to full employment)
- \$286 to \$303 Alberta Seniors Benefit

Indexation will increase the benefit payments per child by six per cent for families who access the Alberta Child and Family Benefit. The increased benefit payment for annual totals, based on whether a family has anywhere from one to four children, follows:

- o one child \$120
- o two children \$198
- o three children
- \$260
- o four children \$307

Benefit increases are based on the consumer price index for 2022 and benefit rates vary depending on Albertans' needs, household composition and other factors.

Alberta's government will invest about \$45 million in 2022-23 and \$173 million in 2023-24 to support indexation of the AISH, Income Support and Alberta Seniors benefit programs, and about \$7 million in 2022-2023 and \$35 million in 2023-2024 to

support the indexation of the Alberta Child and Family Benefit.

Alberta's government is delivering immediate costof-living and inflation relief while working to support long-term affordability.

The Affordability Action Plan will extend broad-based supports while targeting additional relief to families, seniors and our most vulnerable



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
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
