PARKLAND RCMP SEIZE DRUGS, WEAPONS, FRAUDULENT CARDS AND STOLEN ID

On Wednesday, Feb. 1, 2023, the Parkland RCMP Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) received information that a male wanted on numerous Criminal Code warrants was in the community of Spruce Grove. With the assistance of Parkland RCMP Drug Section, the Crime Reduction Unit was successfully able to locate and apprehend 22-year-old Keegan Patrick Dunn Power, of no fixed address.

Police obtained and executed a search warrant for the vehicle that Keegan Power was found operating. The following items were seized: 53 grams of Meth-

amphetamine;

3.5 grams of Fen-

tanyl;

43 individual banking, membership and student cards where names cannot be determined;

74 individual bank card, credit cards, Alberta Health Care cards, drivers licenses and benefits cards;



since we first started coming, and now the community is getting to know him too. Little children sometimes ask about his cane, and I tell them the cane is his eyes."







Investigation is ongoing into the stolen and/or fraudulent personal items and expected to take some time before further charges can be laid. There are dozens of related theft investigations and police will be attempting to contact victims in attempt to return personal items. Police remind everyone to keep government issued documents (birth certificates and SIN cards) stored in a safe place to mitigate the risk of identity theft.

Keegan Power has been remanded into custody. His next appearance in court is set for Feb. 15, 2023, at Stony Plain Provincial Court.



· Keep the computer in a common area so you can monitor activities.


Recognize that online communication is a very important social aspect in your child's life. Do not automatically remove their online privileges if you find out about a cyberbullying experience.

ALTERNATIVES TO ENGAGEMENT RINGS

Engagement rings are often sizable investments. Money magazine reports the average engagement ring costs around \$5,800. •Knot rings: These rings do not have a center stone. Rather, they're designed to be a tied knot or infinity symbol. These rings can be particularly sentimental as they represent true, unbroken love.

•Opal: Gemstones, like flowers, have been assigned certain meanings. Tying the engagement ring to one of them can infuse more symbolism into the relationship. Opal, for example, represents love, passion, creativity, spontaneity, and inspiration. Those traits seem tailor-made for surprise proposals.

•Sapphire: While sapphire stones often are blue, they can also be yellow, green, pink, and white. Sapphires are the third hardest mineral. A white sapphire can be the perfect diamond replacement.

•Garnet or ruby: Red is the definitive color of love. A Valentine's Day proposal can be made even more special by presenting an engagement ring with a red gemstone.

•Moissanite: The jewelry source Brilliant Earth says moissanite is a gemstone first discovered in 1893 by Henri Moissan in a meteorite that fell to earth. It is remarkably similar to a diamond in appearance and strength. Moissanite also has heightened brilliance, with a refractive index higher than that of a diamond.

Couples have many beautiful alternatives to diamonds that they can explore when shopping for engagement rings.



CHOOSING WEDDING COLOR PALETTES

It's no surprise Canadians are turning to their food banks as this is their only means to feed their families.


