This year at Grand Trunk High School, students have the opportunity to enroll in the Forensic Studies Elective Program. In the first semester, high school students from grades ten to twelve are able to take Forensic Studies 25 for three credits. Students can then take Forensic Studies 35 in the second semester to earn three thirty-level credits towards their high school diploma. Junior high students will have the opportunity to experience the field of forensic science through a CTF course in the second semester.

In the Forensic Science

elective, students learned a variety of different skills and acquired a deep base of knowledge about evidence collection and analysis, as well as the ethical complexities that confront experts using forensics evidence to administer justice. Using hands-on activities,

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



lab demonstrations, and experiential learning, students encountered the roles and responsibilities associated with forensics.

Students also explore career possibilities in the field of forensic science. As part of their career exploration, students were provided with a presentation from Ken Bruns, a retired Forensic Investigator and Detective from the Edmonton Police Service. He covered several different topics, including careers in forensics, the science used in investigations, and the types of equipment forensics investigators use. The presentation also included several demonstrations of actual techniques and materials used by forensic investigators. Students were able to see how fingerprint powder is used to lift prints off of various surfaces, and how to administer different chemical tests at crime scenes.

For the culminating activity in the Forensic Studies 25 course, students participated in investigating a mock crime scene using all of the skills they had developed throughout the semester to solve a fictional murder. Students analyzed fingerprints, footprints, blood spatter evidence, witness statements, DNA, toxicology, and practiced evidence collection.

PARKLAND RCMP WARN OF RECENT AMAZON PHONE SCAMS



Parkland RCMP would like to notify the public of a recent surge in scams involving individuals claiming to work for Amazon.com. Parkland RCMP has received multiple files within the last week involving the following scenario: A person claiming to be an employee of Amazon calls the victim. The "Amazon employee" states they are attempting to verify a new account in the

customer's name. Upon being advised that it is a fraudulent account, the "Amazon employee" will offer a refund. They instruct the victim to download an app in order to conduct the refund, and complete a form which includes the victim's bank account number. The money then appears to be "refunded" to the account in excess of the stated amount. The "Amazon employee" then instructs the recipient on how to return the money, either via bitcoin deposits or allowing remote access to their accounts through the previously downloaded app. The "refund" subsequently disappears, along with additional funds.

Police are reminding the public not to provide banking information over the phone. If uncertain about any banking activity, call your bank directly.





•Sapphire: While sapphire stones


often are blue, they can also be yellow, green, pink, and white. Sapphires are the third hardest mineral. A white sapphire can be the perfect diamond replacement.

special by presenting an engagement ring with a red gemstone.



Couples have many beautiful alternatives to diamonds that they can explore when shopping for engagement rings.










IF MY CHILD IS WITNESSING BULLYING:




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
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

PARKLAND RCMP ARREST MALE FOLLOWING FIREARM COMPLAINT

On January 27th, 2023, at approximately 11:15 p.m., Parkland RCMP received a complaint regarding a male riding a bicycle and checking vehicle door handles in a Spruce Grove neighborhood. Police immediately attended the area and began patrols.

A short time later, Parkland RCMP received a second complaint regarding an individual that allegedly pointed a firearm at the complainant before fleeing on a bicycle. Police contained the neighbourhood. With the assistance of RCMP Police Dog Services and Edmonton Police Service Air One (helicopter), the suspect was successfully arrested and a loaded .22 caliber rifle with sawed-off stock and barrel was recovered.

19-year-old Kaleb Derek Timm, a resident of Onoway, was charged with the following:

- Pointing a Firearm;
- Assault with weapon;
- Unauthorized possession of firearm;
- Possession of a loaded firearm;
- Possession of a firearm with tampered serial number;
- Common Nui-sance.

Kaleb Derek Timm was held for a Judicial Interim Release Hearing and was subsequently released on conditions by a Justice of the Peace. He is set to appear next at Stony Plain Provincial Court on Feb. 15, 2023.

Parkland RCMP would like to emphasize that although these types of firearms offences are uncommon in Spruce Grove, this incident should act as a reminder of the importance of reporting crimes to police. Attempting to intervene by yourself could put you in harm's way.

PARKLAND RCMP SEIZE DRUGS, WEAPONS, FRAUDULENT CARDS AND STOLEN ID

On Wednesday, Feb. 1, 2023, the Parkland RCMP Reduction Crime Unit (CRU) received information that a male wanted on numerous Criminal Code warrants was in the community of Spruce Grove. With the assistance of Parkland RCMP Drug Section, the Crime Reduction Unit was successfully able to locate and apprehend 22-year-old Keegan Patrick Dunn Power, of no fixed address.

Police obtained and executed a search warrant for the vehicle that Keegan Power was found operating. The following items were seized:

- •53 grams of Methamphetamine;
- •3.5 grams of Fentanyl;
- •43 individual banking, membership and student cards where names cannot be determined;
- •74 individual bank card,

credit cards, Alberta Health Care cards, drivers licenses and benefits cards;

- •Approximately 50 sets of keys, including vehicle, home and mailbox keys of unknown origin;
- •Personal banking records;
- •Multiple books of blank personal cheque books as well as individual blank cheques and WCB cheques;
- •A large quantity of business records with client information:
- •Counterfeit American currency;
- •A variety of ammunition;
- •A prohibited electrical stun baton with handcuffs, masks and break and enter tools;
- •Gate and alarm codes for several commercial businesses:
- •Personal Canadian income tax returns;
- •An electronic bank card / credit card reader;
- •Blank Alberta Health Care cards and additional evi-

dence of credit card fraud.

In addition to his original warrants, Keegan Power is charged with the following offences as a result of the search warrant:

- •Possession for the purposes of trafficking (Methamphetamine);
- •Possession of property obtained by crime under \$5000
- •Drive while prohibited;
- •Failing to comply with a Release Order condition x 4·
- •Failing to comply with a Probation Order x 2.

Investigation is ongoing into the stolen and/or fraudulent personal items and expected to take some time before further charges can be laid. There are dozens of related theft investigations and police will be attempting to contact victims in attempt to return personal items. Police remind everyone to keep government issued documents (birth certificates and SIN

cards) stored in a safe place to mitigate the risk of identity theft.

Keegan Power has been remanded into custody. His next appearance in court is set for Feb. 15, 2023, at Stony Plain Provincial Court.

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


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
