## STRUCTURE FIRE ONOWAY UFA GAS BAR

At Approximately 1802hrs Fire Rescue International - Onoway Regional Fire Services was paged to a Structure fire in the Town of Onoway. Within 2-minutes fire units were responding to the scene. The first unit arrived on the scene within 4-minutes after being dispatched to the local UFA gas station. Upon arrival, crews noted smoke showing from the store building and began to take steps to protect volatile exposures.

Shortly after arriving on the scene, crews secured a water source and engaged the fire in an offensive attack. The fire was brought under control within 24 minutes of arriving on the scene with loss. An overhaul was conducted on the structure thereafter. Thankfully, no one was injured as a result of the fire or the ensuing firefight.

## PARKLAND RCMP WARN OF RECENT AMAZON PHONE SCAMS

Parkland RCMP would like to notify the public of a recent surge in scams involving individuals claiming to work for Amazon. com. Parkland RCMP has received multiple files within the last week involving the following scenario:

A person claiming to be an employee of Amazon calls the victim. The "Amazon employee" states they are attempting to verify a new account in the customer's name. Upon being advised that it is a fraudulent account, the "Amazon employee" will offer a refund. They instruct the victim to download an app in order to conduct the refund, and complete a form which includes the victim's bank account number.

The money then appears to be "refunded" to the account in excess of the stated amount. The "Amazon employee" then instructs the recipient on how to return the money, either via bitcoin deposits or allowing remote access to their accounts through the previously downloaded app. The "refund" subsequently disappears, along with additional funds.

Police are reminding the public not to provide banking information over the phone. If uncertain about any banking activity, call your bank directly.

# CommunityVOICE Page 5 PARKLAND RCMP ARREST MALE Following FIREARM COMPLAINT

On January 27th, 2023, at approximately 11:15 p.m., Parkland RCMP received a complaint regarding a male riding a bicycle and checking vehicle door handles in a Spruce Grove neighborhood. Police immediately attended the area and began patrols.

A short time later, Parkland RCMP received a second complaint regarding an individual that allegedly pointed a firearm at the complainant before fleeing on a bicycle. Police contained the neighbourhood. With the assistance of **RCMP** Police Dog Services and Edmonton Police Service Air One (helicopter), the suspect was successfully arrested and a loaded .22 caliber rifle with sawed-off stock and barrel was recovered.

19-year-old Kaleb Derek Timm, a resident of Onoway, was charged with the following:

Pointing a Firearm;
Assault with a weapon;

- Unauthorized possession of firearm;

- Possession of a loaded firearm;

- Possession of a firearm with tampered serial number;

- Common Nui-sance.

Kaleb Derek Timm was held for a Judicial Interim Release Hearing and was subsequently released on conditions by a Justice of the Peace. He is set to appear next at Stony Plain Provincial Court on Feb. 15, 2023.

Parkland RCMP would like to emphasize that although these types of firearms offences are uncommon in Spruce Grove, this incident should act as a reminder of the importance of reporting crimes to police. Attempting to intervene by yourself could put you in harm's way.

Given the recent level of local attention to land use bylaws, urban planning, federal and provincial policies, jurisdictional overlaps, economic impacts, and the upcoming election season I thought I'd take the time to cover off a few items this week as a bit of an update, or an explanation of sorts. The key item I believe with all the "Goings On" over the last little while, is that it has become apparent to a larger number of people that for the system we have to work, and for the freedoms that we enjoy, it's a team effort. The system has a few kinks in it here and there, to be sure. It's not a bad one, however, we just need to use it.

I'll cover the basic configuration of our country to start with, and bear in mind, I only have a thousand of words or less to work with here, so it is going to be brief. Canada (the Federal Government) and the provinces were created equal. The responsibilities for the most part, are distinct. When it affects all, it's a federal thing, when it can stay within a provincial boundary, it's a provincial thing. There are times where there are overlaps, and it's a "both of us" kind of thing. It's a marriage of sorts; normally it works, and sometimes, as we have seen for a while now, a little refreshing of the vows, and confirmation of roles and responsibilities is required. The municipalities, counties, towns, villages, hamlets, medium and large cities, are the children of the provinces. They are given their authorization and autonomy to operate

under the Municipal Government Act. Villages and hamlets for the most part fall under the counties in which they are located.

Each level of government has its own representation, and they are given authority to make decisions by you, the voter. If you do vote, fantastic! If you don't, shame...shame... shame. For the system to function as it was designed, the higher level of participation by the voters, the better it is, and the better the chance that you get folks to better reflect the will of the people. Historically, voter apathy is terrible, but over the last few years, many folks have begun to pay attention to what is going on in all three levels of government. This is to everyone's benefit, because I believe there is not only better representation, but also some shared vision within the levels of government. I believe when folks get involved before a candidate is selected at the provincial and federal levels and are involved with the parties of their choice, better policy is produced. With municipal government and school boards, people typically run as themselves, and these people have a major impact on our daily lives; I believe many of us, myself included, haven't given this level of government the amount of attention it deserves.

My inbox, phonelines, and social media pages exploded recently over what a county in Alberta was considering for amendments to their current land use bylaw. In addition, there were also some recent statements made regarding "Smart Cities" or "15 Min. Cities" or whichever catch phrase was being used to articulate a change in the concepts of urban planning. I had to reach out to several municipal representatives that I've come to know and trust over the last few years to find out what the heck was going on, because some of the items seemed way too far out of the left field, almost like they were being snuck in through the back door of town and county councils.

So for the record, and for those that have been hounding me for an "Answer On where I stand" on these ideas of putting in place cities or towns that restrict the movement of its inhabitants, where people would only be allotted a given number of passes in a year to move from one zone to the next....do you really have to ask? I mean come on, really? I'm the same gent who has been on the firearms file for the last 3 years, who stuck my neck out more than once on the Covid restrictions, drove my own gravel truck in the local Edmonton convoy, I was accused in the papers for inciting dissidence by telling officers to remember their oaths before they acted on orders given under the Emergency Act, only a day later to see horses knocking a lady to the ground who used a walker. I spoke openly against the vaccine passports and never got one myself. I was attacked consistently by the Opposition for not disclosing my vaccine status, and when I did, it was to their chagrin that I had a vaccine injury. I fly airplanes, ride motorcycles, shoot old revolvers off horseback, and have been doing my best to stand up for people's personal rights

and freedoms publicly at my own "political expense" for the last 3 years.

So no, I would never support a system by which people needed passes to move freely in their own country, province, or city. What I am in favor of however, when it comes to urban planning, is making sure that there are plenty of green spaces and services within a reasonable distance from where people live.

I've had the ability to travel for work in Canada, the USA, and in Germany. I've seen some old cities, and their contrast to the new ones. I've seen architectural and styling cues that were better than others, and I must admit, I'd take a small town over a big city any day of the week. However, some of the best big cities I have ever seen have that feel of a small town, or a community designed right in it, where there are always green spaces and parks within easy reach. These places feel better on the soul, so if that type of planning was being considered for our new towns and cities, I am all for it.

On the land use bylaws: wow! I believe that there were some big lessons learned for everyone involved. Here are a few I've gathered up over the last week:


1.Hire a good consultant

2.Ensure that there is a staged progress evaluation, and clearly communicate the scope of work

3.Always, and I mean always, have a squad check prior to release for final approvals

4.Review the work that you are going to be signing off on




## 7 WEDDING TRICKS TO MAKE THE BIG DAY EASIER

## CATER WEDDING MENUS TO GUESTS' DIETARY NEEDS

Gone are the days when wedding reception menus were limited to the one-size-fits-all offerings of meat, chicken or fish. Thanks to modern diets, couples hoping to accommodate guests may need to provide a wide array of food choices.

It is impossible to pinpoint an exact number, as there are no definitive surveys classifying all dietary preferences, but there are believed to be around 7.9 million people in the United States who follow a vegetarian-based diet. Of those people, around one million are strictly vegan, according to data in The Economist. In addition, NYU Langone Health says onethird of Americans are trying to avoid gluten. Buffet-style dinner service often provides couples with multiple choices, and it's much more likely they can come up with a combination that caters to any food allergies or dietary restrictions guests may have.

• Opt for food stations. In lieu of one long buffet table, a modern approach is to have staffed food stations. Foods as well as their ingredients can be clearly stated on food table placards so guests can make appropriate choices.

• Offer alternatives for dessert. Wedding cake can be a challenge to someone with a

gluten sensitivity or an egg or a nut allergy. While not every guest indulges in dessert, make it a point to offer an alternative to cake. Perhaps a groom's cake can be revamped into gluten-free cookie bars or a nutfree trifle.

Couples who know in advance which types of dietary restrictions their guests have can work with caterers to devise a menu that suits everyone.

## ALBERTA RCMP TRAFFIC UNIT STOPS SPEEDING SEMI TRUCK AND THE DRIVER BLOWS "CAUTION" FOLLOWING MANDATORY ALCOHOL SCREENING TEST

A semi-truck with an unloaded flat deck tractor trailer was observed traveling at a high rate of speed. The Alberta RCMP Traffic officer obtained a laser speed reading of 130 kms/hr in the posted maximum 100 km/hr zone.

The semi-truck was stopped and the driver was required to provide a mandatory alcohol screening

breath sample into an Approved Screening Device. The sample came back as a "CAUTION". This indicates to the officer that the driver, a 43-year-old class one driver from Edmonton, Alta., had a blood alcohol concentration between 60 and 99 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood.

Any driver who provides a breath sample that leads the officer to have reasonable and probably grounds that the drivers blood alcohol concentration is between 50 and 100 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millitres of blood, will receive a three day Immediate Roadside Sanction and the vehicle will be seized for three days as well. This driving suspension comes with a \$360 fine. In addition to the Immediate Roadside Sanction and vehicle seizure. the driver was also issued a \$175 speeding ticket.

The Immediate Roadside Sanctions (IRS) Program holds commercial drivers, operating in a commercial vehicle, at a higher standard due to the complexity and size of commercial vehicles. Commercial drivers must have a zero (0.00) blood alcohol concentration or blood drug concentration when driving a commercial vehicle. As a result of providing a "CAUTION" reading, this driver was dealt with as a standard IRS CAU-TION.

5.Change everything, or delete the items that do not apply

6.Sell as many memberships as you can to folks, and get them out to vote


7.Listen to and talk with as many people as possible to understand that that if elected, you will work for them, and must represent them.




