ALBERTA RCMP OFFICER INVOLVED SHOOTING IN EVANSBURG

On Feb. 25, 2023, at approximately 11:50 p.m., an Evansburg RCMP Officer located a vehicle that was stuck and which had been reported to have been stolen, on Range Road 102 A, north of Highway 16, in Yel-

lowhead County, Alta. The officer approached on foot and attempted to arrest the occupants, but the driver exited the vehicle and pointed a firearm at the officer. The officer discharged his firearm and the suspect retreated into his vehicle.

Officers from neighboring RCMP detachments

were called to assist and surrounded the suspect vehicle. Eventually the two occupants of the suspect vehicle surrendered to police and were taken into custody. One of the suspects sustained a minor injury during this incident,

KEEP YOUR CHILD'S ROUTINE IMMUNIZATIONS UP TO DATE

It's National Kids and Vaccine Day today, and Alberta Health Services (AHS) is reminding Albertans with children to make sure their kids are up to date with routine immunizations.

Alberta offers all children routine immunizations, free of charge. By following the routine immunization schedule, your child will be immunized against diseases at important times during their growth and development. This means your child will get the maximum possible protection.

Vaccine-preventable diseases, such as measles, are coming back in areas where not enough people are immunized. Globally, outbreaks of measles, mumps, pertussis (whooping cough) and other illnesses are being declared. Outbreaks of

these illnesses have been declared in Alberta as well, which can lead to our neighbours, family members and friends becoming sick.

Over the course of the pandemic, routine immunizations may have been missed or delayed. It is important for children to

while no police officers were injured.

The Alberta RCMP believes in processes that seek the facts and it's important that processes taken to assess the actions of all those involved, including the police, are fair, transparent, and defendable. This is why, as soon as we became aware of this incident, we immediately

notified the Director of Law Enforcement and initiated our internal review process. The Director deemed the incident to be "in scope" for ASIRT, however assigned the investigation to the RCMP, with AISRT oversight.

Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes and General Investigation Sections have taken over carriage of the investigation. An update will be provided when available.

Independent of ASIRT, the Alberta RCMP's internal review process has been implemented to gather a full account of what took place during this incident. RCMP training, policy, police response, and the duty status of the members involved will be subject to review. The Alberta RCMP is, of course, fully cooperating with ASIRT.

receive any immunizations they may have missed. AHS Public Health clinics are open and ready to help children and youth catch up on any immunizations they need.

AHS provides free, routine immunization for infants, children and youth who live in Alberta at your local AHS Public Health Office or AHS Community Health Centre. AHS also offers routine immunizations in schools. Each year, AHS Public Health reviews immunization records for students in grades one, six and nine, to see which immunizations each student needs. A consent form is then sent home with an information sheet for each vaccine recommended for the student. No immunizations will be given in school without consent from a parent or legal guardian. If vaccine doses are delayed from the routine recommended schedule, they don't have to be restarted, they are offered as soon as possible.

Visit immunizealberta.ca to learn more about routine immunizations or call 811 to book an appointment at an AHS immunization clinic. To find out which immunizations are right for your child, check with your family physician or Health Link at 811, public health nurse or visit myhealth.alberta.ca.

Immunization is safe and effective and protects our communities. The more people who are fully immunized in a community, the safer everyone is.

Alberta Health Services is the provincial health authority responsible for planning and delivering health supports and services for more than four million adults and children living in Alberta. 

Much consideration is given to wedding gowns. The cost


and silhouette of the dress may garner the bulk of that consideration, but brides might want to spend more time considering comfort.



according to the Mental Health Commission of Canada . Positive mental health means finding balance in all parts of one's life: social, physical, spiritual, emotional, financial, and mental. When this balance is upset or changed, it can

often be a challenge to find that healthy balance again.

Staff attained tools to help them recognize signs that a person may be experiencing a decline in their mental well-being or a mental health crisis. They also were guided in how to have conversations with others that encourage a person to: Talk about declines in their mental well-being.

Discuss professional and other supports that could help with recovery to improve mental well-being.

Reach out to these supports.

Assist in a mental health or substance use crisis

Use MHFA actions to

maintain one's own mental well-being.

Mental health is everyone's responsibility; the Division encourages all adults to take the time to get informed and become empowered through education.


