



Under sunny blue skies, students enjoyed fishing through holes in the ice as they renewed friendships with one another. There were numerous guests in

attendance as so many loving parents and grandparents and members of the community came out to support the students.

Although no fish were caught by any students, it was agreed that the day was a huge success. It was nice to be outside enjoying the beautiful weather and to just develop bonds of friendship as students chattered away eagerly among themselves. MECCS teacher Maxine Hildebrandt and her students expressed their gratitude to Wildwood teacher Lisl Gunderman for organizing such a fantastic event. Lisl's husband Darrell Hunter along with his son Keaten Hunter did a tremendous job erecting a portable outfitter's tent which served

BUDGET 2023

This week, Alberta's government presented Budget 2023: Securing Alberta's Future.

With a forecast surplus of \$2.4 billion, and an economy poised to lead the country in economic growth, Budget 2023 is an opportunity for the government to invest in Alberta's future.

Budget 2023 secures Alberta's future by growing the economy, creating good paying jobs, strengthening health care and education, and keeping Alberta communities safe – all while remaining committed to responsible fiscal management.

With its strong focus on investment attraction, job creation, economic growth, Budget 2023 sets the stage for Alberta to remain Canada's economic engine for decades. A \$176 million grant to the already-successful Alberta at Work initiative will help Albertans build their skills and find good jobs. It will also assist employers in their search for workers in existing and emerging sectors. Further investments in aviation and aerospace, agri-food manufacturing and \$24.5 million for the Alberta Technology and Innovation Strategy will enhance emerging and innovative technologies help attract even more venture capital investments to Alberta.

Alberta's government is also setting new records for spending in health care. This province has the best frontline health-care workers in the world and Budget 2023

provides the right supports to ensure Albertans get the care they need when and where they need it. An additional \$965 million in operating expense this year will help the Ministry of Health continue building a stronger health-care system, and ensure the government can do what's needed to improve wait times for ambulance services, emergency rooms, and surgeries. The budget also includes \$158 million this year to attract, recruit and train more doctors and nurses, with a focus on family physicians for rural areas.

To secure the future for children, Alberta's 2023 budget will make historic investments in education. An increase of nearly \$2 billion overall will help young people succeed and thrive in smaller classes. This increase will support the hiring of up to 3,000 education staff, including teachers, educational assistants, bus drivers and school support staff to give students the focused time and attention they need to succeed in their studies. The budget will also increase staffing supports in complex classrooms by up to 10 per cent, which will have a positive effect on the personal and social development of students.

Alberta's government believes safety and security is something all Albertans should experience – in their homes, at school, and in their communities. Budget 2023 keeps communities safe by increasing collaboration between first responders and community partners, and increasing access for vulnerable populations to recovery-oriented mental health and addiction supports. \$12.5 million – a joint investment between Mental Health and Addiction and Public Safety – will support the expansion of therapeutic living units within provincial correctional facilities to help inmates access recovery-oriented treatment.

First Nations policing will also get a boost of \$65 million over the next three years to address the unique needs of their communities and members. This will secure new policing positions and the creation of an additional First Nations police service in Alberta.

Alberta is also committing \$20 million over three years to combat human trafficking and ensure necessary resources are provided to survivors and victims.

While Alberta's economy has recovered strongly, many Albertans are still struggling to heat their homes and feed their families. That's why through Budget 2023, Alberta's will continue to benefit from programs such as the fuel tax relief, electricity rebates, natural gas rebates and monthly \$100 affordability payments for seniors, families and Albertans on certain benefit programs. This means more money in the pockets of Albertans and a helping hand to those in need. Additional relief measures through the budget will lower interest rates for post-secondary students, saving them about \$18 million each year.

Through Budget 2023, adop-

tive families will have access to more subsidies and tax breaks to make adoption more feasible. Workers in the social services sector will see their wages increased, and Albertans will now receive a larger tax credit when they donate to their favourite charities.

The ability to make significant investments into Alberta's future didn't come about by accident. Alberta's responsible fiscal management over the last three years made this possible - that's why the government is renewing that commitment. Budget 2023 includes a new fiscal framework that requires all future Alberta governments to balance their annual budgets and use any surpluses to first pay down debt and save for the future. Operating expenses will be tied to population growth and inflation, which will help control spending and prevent high resources revenue from being used to increase spending in an unsustainable way.

As part of this commitment, the Alberta's government is paying down more debt this year and saving for the future. This will save Albertans an estimated \$260 million in this fiscal year and \$551 million in 2023-24.

By transforming health-care to meet people's needs, keeping Alberta communities safe, and growing the economy with more jobs, quality education, and continued diversification, Budget 2023 is securing Alberta's future.
