Managing and Mitigating Infrastructure Strain

Lac Ste. Anne County is responsible for the preservation and maintenance of all municipal roads, highways and bridges within Lac Ste. Anne County which are under the direction, control and management of the County. A very important part of this responsibility is the protection of roadways during the spring thaw. This time of year can create serious structural damage to roads and bridges if appropriate measures are not taken.

When a road ban occurs, signs indicating the allowed axle percentages are posted on all oiled and paved roadways. Road ban signage is not posted on gravel roads; however, all roads will be monitored and road bans enforced by Lac Ste. Anne County Enforcement Services to ensure compliance.

In conjunction with the road ban, please note that Lac Ste. Anne County, North 43 Lagoon Commission, and Darwell Lagoon Commission are implementing a wastewater hauler rate decrease. The rate will be reduced by 50% from \$75.00 per legal load to \$37.50 per legal load, or from \$5.50 to \$2.75 per meter cubed, until Lac Ste. Anne County spring road bans are lifted.

PARKLAND RCMP ARREST ROBBERY SUSPECTS

On March 22, 2023, at approximately 5:35 p.m., Parkland RCMP responded to a report of a robbery in the Calahoo area of Spruce Grove. The victim, a food delivery person, was robbed at gunpoint by 2 suspects. The victim was not injured.

RCMP attended and located both suspects in the immediate area. A search warrant was executed and the weapon, which was found to be an imitation firearm, was recovered and seized by police.

Two youth suspects have been charged with Robbery with a Firearm and Unauthorized Possession of a Prohibited Weapon.

The names of the suspects will not be released due to their ages.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 692 of the Municipal Government Act, the Council of Lac Ste. Anne County is considering an application for amendment to Land Use Bylaw 14-2009, by amending the following through proposed Bylaw 14-2009-01-23:

1. Removing all references to Lake House:

a. Under Subsection 5.7.1 the (CREC) Commercial Recreation list of permitted uses will not list Lake House.

- 2. Removing the Figure 6: Lake House Floor Plan and Elevation:
- a. Figure 6 will be replaced by a page that reads "This page was left intentionally blank".
- b. Figure 6 will be removed from the list of references.
- c. And any references to Figure 6 will be removed.

3. Amending or removing the following text under Subsection 5.3 Condominium Facilities:

a. The phrase "common facilities include a building referred to as the lake house (A building styled as a community centre) overlooking the lake and the shower house. These two buildings will be the only permanent buildings on the site." will now state, "The common facility of the Shower House will be the only permanent building on the site";

b. The phrase "Figures 6 and 7 illustrate the floor plans and elevations of both the Lake House and the Shower House respectively. The proposed development plan indicates the proposed locations of these two common amenity buildings." will now state, "Figure 7 illustrates the floor plan and elevation of the Shower House. The proposed development plan indicates the proposed location of this common amenity building.";

c. The phrase "The lake house will be 167.2 sq. m (1800 ft2) of open space with no services other than power." will be removed;

d. And the phrase "The Lake House is located on common property overlooking the north shore of Lake Arnault." will be removed.

4. Amending the text under Subsection 5.4 Visitor Parking:

a. The phrase "Visitor parking will be located adjacent to both the Lake House and Shower House. There will be a minimum of ten parking stalls at each building." will now state, "Visitor parking will be located adjacent to the shower house. There will be a minimum of ten parking stalls at this building."

Amending the text under Section 5.6 Common Property since the Lake House is considered a common property:

a. The phrase "The common property will include the two common property buildings with a minimum of ten parking stalls at each" will now state, "The common property includes the Shower House and its existing parking stalls".

Figures 5 and 9 depict the originally proposed Lake House location within their plans. The depiction of the Lake House on these figures shall be disregarded. LOCATION SKETCH

FIGHTING RURAL CRIME

Submitted by Government new positions in several of Alberta areas, including courthouse

Budget 2023 will increase public safety throughout the province with \$27 million to hire more Alberta Sheriffs and by providing new tools to fight rural crime.

The Alberta government is investing \$27.3 million in new funding for the Alberta Sheriffs. Of that, \$10.2 million will go toward adding new positions in several areas, including courthouse security, prisoner transport and traffic enforcement on provincial highways.

An additional \$4.3 million will create new rural crime initiatives for the Alberta Sheriffs, including two plainclothes teams that will assist RCMP detachments throughout the province with surveillance on criminal targets.

"It is important that Al-

bertans are able to feel safe in their communities. This strategic investment will not only ensure the Alberta Sheriffs can continue the vital work they do every day to keep our communities safe, it builds on strong cooperation with their law enforcement partners to create new and innovative ways of working together to protect Albertans."

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The new plainclothes teams will enhance the sheriffs' existing surveillance capacity by extending support to rural RCMP detachments for local investigations. The sheriffs' existing surveillance unit is part of Alberta Law Enforcement Response Teams and focused mainly on serious and organized crime investigations.

The Alberta Sheriffs are also receiving funding to add 20 investigators to the Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) unit, which uses civil enforcement to target problem properties where illegal activities are taking place.

Several new positions will be based in regional hubs, which will give the SCAN unit a greater ability to investigate complaints coming from rural communities and provide police in smaller centres with more options for dealing with criminal activity.

"Alberta Crime Stoppers is pleased to see the Alberta Sheriffs working on these rural crime initiatives and strategies that will make our communities safer."

The government is also bolstering efforts to combat rural crime and support rural policing by expanding the RAPID Response initiative.

Budget 2023 provides funding for the Sheriff Highway Patrol to train and equip its members to assist the RCMP with emergencies and high-priority calls as well.

This initiative builds on the success of a prior move that authorized members of the Sheriff Highway Patrol to investigate

impaired driving and other criminal offences. The Sheriff Highway Patrol has removed more than 2,500 impaired drivers from Alberta's roads since being given those added powers in July 2021.

"These additional resources for the Alberta Sheriffs will improve our combined ability to suppress criminal activity in rural Alberta. Albertans deserve to feel safe in their communities, and these resources will help us continue to protect the safety and well-being of Albertans."

6 EASY SPRING CLEANING PROJECTS

Warmer days are here and what better way to spend them than É cleaning? Although enjoying the great outdoors is probably high on many a to-do list come spring, by the end of winter, homes can probably do with a much-needed overhaul. Owners and renters can rely on temperate days to throw open the windows and engage in some easy spring-cleaning projects. The earlier one begins spring cleaning, the more quickly he or she will be able to head outside and bask in the warm spring sun. Spring cleaning tasks can be stretched out across several days to make the jobs more manageable. While certain spring cleaning tasks can be time-consuming, many projects can be started and completed in 30 minutes or less.

1. Look up

Start by looking up at ceilings, molding and

ceiling fans. Chances are strong that some cobwebs and dust have formed in these areas. Always begin cleaning by working from the top downward so you don't have to clean any tables countertops or floors twice. Static-charged dusting cloths work well to catch and contain dust. Use a pillowcase on ceiling fan blades to clear the dust and keep it from cascading to the floor.

Heavy window treatments can be removed and replaced with more gauzy fabrics. This lets in more light and warmth from the sun. Many curtains can be freshened up right in the laundry, but blinds may require a bit more effort. If the blinds can be snapped out of the brackets. place them in a tub full of vinegar, dish soap and water. Allow them to soak and then rinse with the shower nozzle. Continued on Page 10

Stationary blinds can be cleaned with using an old sock over your hand dipped in a vinegar-and-water solution. 3. Change linens

Remove and launder bed linens. While the linens are in the wash, thoroughly dust all furniture and vacuum the carpets. Move furniture so you can reach areas where dust gathers, such as under the bed or dresser.

4. Grout cleaner

lessons can be put to use as you look to remove stubborn dirt. Combining baking soda and vinegar produces a reaction that causes the formation of gassy bubbles. These bubbles can help to break up dirt that clings to crevices, such as grout between tiles. Some light scrubbing and then subsequent rinsing can rid surfaces of hard-to-remove dirt.

Grade school science

5. Vacuum vent intakes Many houses are heated by forced-air systems. The air intake vents can become clogged with dust and other debris. Vacuum these vents so that air flow is not impeded. Let the heat run for a few minutes to catch any small particles that become dislodged, and then change the furnace filter.

6. Clean out the refrigerator

Now is a great time to remove any of those mystery containers growing fuzzy experiments in the back of the refrigerator. Take the food out of the refrigerator and use a foodsafe cleaner to scour the shelves and inside of crisper drawers

Spring cleaning is a necessary task, but it doesn't have to be a headache. Break up the work into manageable chunks of time, and projects won't feel like such a hassle.





SAFEGUARD YOUR HOME FROM INSECT INFESTATIONS

The dawn of spring marks the return of many things, including long hours of sunlight and warm temperatures in which to enjoy that sunshine. But homeowners know spring also marks the return of insects, unwelcome guests that can be difficult or expensive to control once they have entered a home.

As problematic as insect infestations can be, preventing such problems can be simple, especially when homeowners are proactive. The following are a handful of ways to keep insects out this spring and summer.

Consider potential food supplies and cut those supplies off. Insects often enter a home in search of food, so cutting off potential food supplies is a great way to prevent insects from coming inside. Give dining areas a thorough cleaning after meals, vacuuming or sweeping the floors beneath dining tables each night before going to bed. (Parents of young children may want to sweep floors after each meal.) In addition, clean pets' bowls each night to be sure there are no food scraps left that may entice insects, and make sure pet food containers are tightly sealed after each serving. Sinks are another potential food source, so empty food traps after using the sink and run the garbage disposal as well to remove any food that might be lingering.

· Address potential shelters. Insects also seek shelter inside homes, and there are many areas in a home that can provide adequate shelter. Cracks around windows and doors and in the foundation provide both entry points and potential shelters for insects. Seal such cracks with caulk, testing the areas by feeling for any incoming air. If you still feel air coming in, there is still some sealing to do. Cracks in cabinets or counters also may provide shelter to insects, so address these areas as well.

· Reconsider exterior light-

ing. Exterior lighting may be inviting insects into your home. Insects tend to congregate around lights at nighttime, so avoid placing



lights right outside entryways. Once doors are opened, insects can then fly right into your home. Keep exterior lights as far away from entryways as possible. If you need lights right outside your doors, install motion-sensing lights that only turn on when you come within a few feet of the door. This reduces the volume of insects that congregate outside your entryways, and lowers the risk that insects will follow you in when you arrive home at night.

· React quickly upon seeing insects. Insect infesta-

tions happen gradually, so homeowners should react quickly when seeing a single insect or a handful of insects inside their homes. The slower your response, the more likely one or two intruders is likely to turn into a large infestation. Immediately clean any areas where you see insects, and take more substantial measures if your initial efforts were not enough to prevent more insects from coming in.

The presence of insects inside a home can be a nuisance, but there are many ways to prevent such infestations and keep unwel-











CREATE KID-FRIENDLY SPACES AT HOME

Maintaining a home that is welcoming and kid-friendly can be challenging. Kids are full of energy and oftentimes put fun ahead of tidiness. But no matter how energetic their youngsters are, parents can still employ several strategies to ensure their homes are both sophisticated and child-friendly.

•Consider an open floor plan. Rooms that flow into one another make it easier to keep tabs on children. Such rooms also allow residents and guests to mingle in separate rooms but not be too far away from one another.

•Choose washable fabrics. Upholstery will need to stand up to the abuse kids can dish out. Sofas and chairs with slipcovers can be advantageous because many slipcovers can be easily removed and laundered. Patterned fabrics will hide some stains, while treated fabrics may resist liquid spills for easier cleanup.

•Create a catch-all spot. Special bins or other organizational tools in the entryway can help to cull clutter when children come in the house from school or play. Be sure the keep cubbies, containers and coat hooks at a child-friendly height.

·Look for high-traffic rugs. Rugs designed for high-traffic areas will be more forgiving when children march across them several times per day. There are no rules that say you can't bring an outdoor rug inside, and these rugs tend to be easier to clean.

•Ensure there is plenty of seating. Sectionals give children ample room to spread out. And ample seating ensures there is enough room for kids to invite their friends over to hang out.

•Think outside pink and blue. For children's rooms, make sure they're colorful, but consider other hues to give the rooms some personality. Focus on a hobby or activity and borrow the color scheme from the accessories used for decorating.

Hang whimsical artwork. Employ framing and lighting to make kids' artwork look like professional pieces. Routinely change the pictures when a new look is desired.

•Designate a place for play. Devote an entire room or a nook in a house for imaginative play. Store toys here so these items will not create clutter in individual bedrooms.

Creating child-friendly spaces while ensuring a home maintains a sophisticated feel is easier than parents might think.

I'll have to ask your indulgence on this one, as I'm a little more than reflective today, as it could very well be the last time I am going to be speaking in the house as the MLA for Lac Ste Anne Parkland. The last 3.8 years have flown past. I was warned they would, but in the thick of things, you never realize how far you've gone, or how the time has flown until you are near the end of the road.

Truth be told, I kind of dragged out the time before I stood up in the house to deliver my Maiden Speech, I wanted to take the time to do my research on the other MLA's who had represented the same area, and to say I was humbled by the pedigree is an understatement. Some major portfolio ministers, some very solid MLA's, and the longest sitting speaker of the house. Talk about tough acts to follow.

Reading through their maiden speeches, and several others they gave over the years about the characteristics, the people in our area, made me feel a little lest overwhelmed. The same themes were pervasive into present day. It gave me some solace to think of it as not starting at the bottom, but rather continuing in the race, passing of the torch as it were. Where we came from, some of the water features we have, the roads, bridges, industries, but most importantly the people I met over the years, and on the "campaign trail". I've done my best when I'm in there to keep that top of mind, its not my voice, its yours. I am still very humbled that folks gave me this job, and their trust when needed to make the decisions not only that would affect them, but their kids, and grandkids. I have never held back on promoting our area, and our people, more times than not, calling it God's country. I've jokingly said because I said it so many times that the Pope came here to see for himself and blessed our lake to make it official.

Although giving speeches, leading task forces may get some social media play, or even a few seconds on the evening news, the real rewarding work has been often when no one heard at all. I am fortunate to have a solid staff, and not only me, but the folks in our area are so very fortunate to have them. Kristen and Bobby have and will continue to be champions for the folks in our area when they need some help or guidance. Here are just a few of the things we have as a team been able to help with over the last few years.

• Created Bill 31 in short order, that mitigated a potential shortage of supply of clay, gravel, sand, marl by defining them not as mineral, and how they would and could be mined.

• Repealed the provincial Carbon Tax in Bill 1 by proving in a court of law how flawed it really is.

• Engaged Albertans with the Firearms Task Force, addressing concerns related to federal overreach, property rights, ability to own and use firearms, and proper representation for law abiding Albertans.

• And personally, I got to lead the Economic Corridors Task Force, in which I am also the Parliamentary Secretary. Plus, I led the Career Education Task Force, where I helped develop solid recommendations for career education deliveries.

• I even supported the return of the international airshow in Villeneuve, and further pitched the idea of an accredited aviation course to be taken by local students – in which it is in its second year of operation.

The whole process of politics seems backwards to me in a number of areas, and I'd like to share that with you as well, and now that I've been here for a while, explain to you why it is done. So really, if we were not so darned apathetic in our democratic freedom to vote, we would not be getting so many random door knocks, or phone calls.

The fundraising, most of the cost goes to advertising and signage. The other large cost centers go for hiring "Professional Door Knocker and Phone Callers", because it is physically impossible to get in touch with folks in such a short timeline as a small team when we are so spread out. If you want to avoid being bothered at home, you could get in touch with the local Constituency Association of the party of your choice (I'm partial to blue myself) and let them know you are on board and will show up to vote. I'll also be out and around...lots, as we are going to be out of session, and obviously heading into an election season very soon. Come on over, tell me what matters to you, and give us your information so we can ID you and not bother you on your door and at home. The biggest thing you can do however, is to come out, and vote. Get everyone you know to vote, get the numbers up so we don't have to call you and remind you, because honestly, we wouldn't have to if we had the majority of the folks in our areas picking their candidates, rather than the historical low numbers. If you want me to be the MLA, and if you think I've done a good job, all the better reason to ensure that I can still be your voice, because I can assure you, all of those that don't want me, will be there in force at the poles an

2016 a typical business would save \$11,000 per telecommuter per year, while workers who telecommute can save between \$2,000 and \$7,000 per year. Telecommuters consume considerably less fuel than workers who drive or take mass transportation to work, and over time that can greatly reduce transportation-related greenhouse gas emissions.

The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control notes that something as simple as replacing a clogged air filter, a task that can be completed in a matter of minutes, can improve gas mileage by as much as 10 percent. Such steps also improve vehicle performance and reduce wear and tear on a vehicle's engine, protecting motorists' automotive investments.

• Avoid idling. Conventional automotive wisdom once suggested that idling a vehicle for several minutes can effectively warm up its engine. But the EPA notes that idling is both ineffective and harmful to the environment. Idling for more than 30 seconds can increase air pollution unnecessarily, waste fuel and money and cause excessive wear and damage to engine components. Auto manufacturers now recommend that vehicles idle for no more than 30 seconds before they begin driving, as modern engines take less time to warm up than the engines of yesteryear.

• Drive less. Perhaps the simplest way to reduce vehicle emissions is to drive less. While walking or cycling can be a great and healthy alternative to driving, driving less does not necessarily mean motorists should abandon their vehicles entirely. Instead, drivers can organize weekend shopping and errand trips so they accomplish everything in a single trip. This can free up time and greatly reduce fuel consumption and vehicle emissions.

Reducing vehicle emissions is a great way to help the planet, and such a goal is more attainable than many people may think.




