Barrhead RCMP Execute Search Warrant And Recover Stolen Property

driver or search the vehicle.

Later that day, the same vehicle was reported at a property in the County of Barrhead. Barrhead RCMP located the vehicle and determined that the two occupants had committed another break and enter and noted property in the vehicle that had not been present when the vehicle was stopped previously. Coincidentally, Barrhead RCMP received a tip regarding that same vehicle and the occupants unloading property at a home in Barrhead. Based on that sequence of events, as well as previous intelligence, Barrhead RCMP was able to obtain

a search warrant under the Criminal Code for the house and garage in Barrhead, as well as the PT Cruiser. The search resulted in the seizure of stolen property, and to date that property has been linked to nine break and enters reported since the beginning of March.

Four Barrhead residents have been charged with numerous offences, including break and enter and possession of property obtained by crime. All four were released from custody on conditions for Alberta Court of Justice in Barrhead on May 23, 2023. One male has since breached his conditions and efforts are being made to locate and arrest him

again.

Barrhead Detachment is asking that anyone who has been the victim of a break and enter since Jan. 1, 2023, in the Town or County of Barrhead, Westlock County and Woodlands County, please contact the Barrhead RCMP with a description of stolen property. RCMP hope to return any stolen property to it's rightful owner and charge the culprits accordingly. Barrhead RCMP can be contacted at 780-674-2696 Monday through Friday during business hours.

These crimes were solved because of timely tips from the public and the RCMP would like to thank the public for their diligence and for calling immediately when they saw suspicious activity.

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MAYOR'S STATEMENT: CRIME IN ALBERTA BEACH

Alberta Beach Council and Staff share the communities' concerns regarding increasing crime. We are working with the RCMP to address these concerns; however, it is important to note that crime is increasing across Alberta. Deputy Mayor Elwood and I recently met with Inspector Kevin McGillvrary, Officer in-Charge of the Parkland RCMP Detachment, and Corporal Gaulton who is assigned to the village, to discuss various areas of in-

Policing in Albert Beach is provided by the Provincial Police Service via the Parkland RCMP Detachment in Spruce Grove, Provincial

Police Service Resources are allocated based on need, with the goal of having 35% proactive policing time in every detachment. means that the more we report crime in Alberta Beach, the more resources we receive. If we are not reporting, no one knows we have a problem. REPORT, RE-PORT, REPORT, to ger the resources. I will also note

that our Community Peace Officer cannot respond to, nor investigate, criminal matters: his purview is bylaws, traffic, animal control. and liquor and cannabis.

We have heard residents claim that Alberta Beach has the worst crime statistics in Alberta. This is not true and appears to be stemming from information on the Lightcatch App. The statistics provided on this App are Not accurate. Accurate information regarding recent crimes can be found on the Alberta Crime Map at crimestoppers.ab.ca/crimemap/ or on the RCMP Mobile App. Suspicious Activity or crime reported on the Loghtcatch App do not to the RCMP and do not lead to arrests or more resources in our village. It is vitally important that all crime, no matter how small, is reported to the RCMP. If the crime is not in progress, it can be reported quickly and easily via the Alberta RCMP App or online at ocre-sielc.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/alberta/en.

Parkland RCMP are actively working to increase their presence and patrols in the area. They are improving communication by hosting townhalls, meeting with Councils, and are working on increasing their social media presence. Parkland also has a Crime Reduction Team solely dedicated to reducing crime. They do this by targeting prolific offenders, doing warrant roundups, monitoring trouble properties, etc. We are fortunate to have this Team in the area as the top 100 prolific offenders in Alberta are responsible for 58% of all crime in the province. 

are also utilizing inter-detachment resources to track prolific offenders across detachment boundaries. There is also a new Community Safety and Well-Being Branch that is operating province-wide to help focus on root causes of crime.

Finally, I would like to address the armed bank robbery that occurred on Marh 3. This was terrible to see happen in our community and our hearts go out to those who were impacted; we are grateful that no one was injured during this crime and are thankful that RCMP responded

quickly and appropriately. All necessary safety assessments, including a school lock-down assessment, were done by the RCMP and it was determined quickly that there was no ongoing danger that warranted a broader public response or immediate communications. However, both the

RCMP and the Village acknowledge that we should have done a better job of informing the public and we will work with the RCMP to get timely, appropriate information out to the community for any future significant incidents in the village.

Darts and Pool


Each Tuesday evening is drop-in darts at the legion, with no membership needed. Doors open at 6:30 and play begins at 7:30.

UNDERUSED HOUSING TAX PENALTIES AND INTEREST WAIVED

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that the application of penalties and interest under the UHTA for the 2022 calendar year will be waived for any latefiled underused housing tax (UHT) return and for any late-paid UHT payable, provided the return is filed or the UHT is paid by October 31, 2023.

This transitional relief means that although the

deadline for filing the UHT return and paying the UHT payable is still April 30, 2023, no penalties or interest will be applied for UHT returns and payments that the CRA receives before November 1, 2023.

HOW TO PREPARE A HOME FOR ELDERLY RESIDENTS

Upon reaching retirement age, new retirees may face decisions regarding their living arrangements. Some seniors may opt to stay put, while others may want to downsize their homes to save money and relieve themselves of the burdens of maintaining larger homes.

But those are not the only situations seniors find themselves in. Some seniors realize they can no longer care for themselves without assistance. In such in-

stances, seniors may opt for assisted living facilities or choose to move in with a relative, such as a grown son or daughter. While assisted living facilities are designed to meet the needs of the elderly, young men and women welcoming seniors into their homes may need to take on some home improvement projects to ensure their homes are as safe as possible for elderly residents.

· Convert a room on the first floor into a bedroom. While this may not apply to all seniors, some men and women struggle with stairs as they age, and that can make it difficult for them to fully participate in a household. Homeowners with an extra room to spare can convert a room on the first floor of their homes into a bedroom so seniors won't have to climb up and down stairs throughout the day. That ease of accessibility to the primary floor of the house encourages seniors to be active

participants in a household. If possible, choose an area that is close to a first-floor bathroom.

· Take steps to make bathrooms safer. The National Institute on Aging says that more than one in three seniors over age 65 fall each year, and 80 percent of those falls take place in the bathroom. Slippery tile floors can make it difficult for seniors to navigate bathrooms safely, and bathtubs and shower stalls present

additional challenges. Install grab bars on bathroom walls and next to toilets to provide support. In addition, consider installing a shower chair or bench and removable shower nozzle in the shower or tub so seniors can sit down while they bathe and rinse without having to stand up on slippery surfaces. Make sure any mats around bathtubs and sinks are nonskid to reduce the risk of falls even further.

· Install an extra phone line or two. While kids and adults between the ages of 18 and 50 may never use the landlines in their homes, many seniors still rely on traditional telephones as their primary means of communicating with the outside world. Install extra landlines in your home, including in seniors' bedrooms, so they can more readily access the phone should they fall and need to call emergency help. Phones in seniors' bedrooms may also provide some additional privacy to seniors who don't want to carry on phone conversations in busy areas of the home, such as the kitchen or living room. Such lines may isolation.

sible to seniors. Avoid storing items on the top shelf of pantries, bookcases or entertainment centers, as seniors with limited mobility may not be able to reach them.

Many seniors move in with their adult children to make their golden years safer and more enjoyable and manageable. Such a change in living arrangements may necessitate some changes on the part of homeowners so they can ensure their homes are safe for seniors.


more than just traditional backyard barbecue fare. A standalone charcoal grill in the backyard might get the job done, but a builtin gas grill complete with burners and surrounding

PREPARE COOLING SYSTEMS FOR WARM WEATHER

One springtime task on homeowners' to-do lists is checking cooling systems to ensure they are ready for summer. Proper maintenance of cooling systems is essential to saving energy and keeping utility costs down. Fortunately, homeowners need not be certified HVAC technicians to maintain their cooling units.

· Clean filters. Whether a home is kept cool by a whole-house central air conditioning system or window units, clean filters are necessary to keep the units working efficiently. Routinely replacing or cleaning filters is one of the most important maintenance tasks to improve airflow and increase efficiency. The U.S. Office of Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy says replacing a dirty, clogged filter with a clean one can lower an air conditioner's energy consumption by anywhere from 5 to 15 percent.

· Know the square footage. When replacing a

cooling system, have an understanding of the size of your home (or room if installing an window unit). Determine the area of the home so you buy a unit that suits your needs. Air conditioners use BTUs (British Thermal Units) to define cooling power. The more BTUs, the larger the space that can be cooled. However, homeowners do not want to exceed the necessary cooling power. This leads to energy waste. EnergyStar.gov can help

homeowners find the right cooling system for their needs.

· Inspect system coils. The evaporator and condenser coils on air conditioners can collect dirt, even when filters are maintained. Dirty coils are less efficient at absorbing heat, so periodically remove the dirt. Outdoor coils can be kept cleaner by cutting back foliage from the unit to allow better air flow

· Inspect condensate drains. Energy.gov also suggests making sure condensate drains, which take moisture pulled from the air away, are functioning properly. If they're clogged, they may not be effective at reducing humidity in a home, and they may even leak.

· Clear debris. Remove fallen leaves or other plant material from condenser units and fan blades. Obstructed components can cause the system to retain heat, compromising its ability to work effectively. Some homeowners prefer to cover their condensers at the end of the cooling season to keep leaves and dirt out of the unit.

- · Check window unit seals. When installing window units, make sure all seals around the air conditioner are in place to prevent cool-air loss.
- · Hire a technician. Air conditioner technicians can be very helpful and will know how to prepare a system for hot weath-

er. Technicians typically conduct multipoint inspections and measure such things as refrigerant levels and duct leakage. Airflow through the evaporator coil also may be checked. If a homeowner suspects the thermostat is not working properly, a technician can verify if that is true and even install a new one if necessary.

As summer approaches, homeowners should prepare their air conditioning units for the busy months ahead.

HOW ABOUT THAT? THE SIGNING OF A HISTORICAL MOU

For many years, as it turns out, I have shared a common dream with many of my fellow Albertans along with all of those hardworking folks that call the west part of our country home. That dream was to be able to join our provinces and territories through common links utilizing linear infrastructure to facilitate economic growth. These links would enable the movement of viable, rich resources from one region into another that could further refine those resources or turn them into finished products to fill a need not only in our country, but for our trading partners as well. In short, these links would make self-sufficient, Canada and ensure that we are resilient no matter what the markets throw at us.

The most notable extension of this idea was the Canadian Pacific Railway, which our founding fathers of Confederation used to join our nation together. Then came the Trans-Canada highway, the Yellowhead highway, and of course all the other major rail lines that tied northern provincial routes together. It seems, however, that many of us have lost our way over the years and have become "Can't Nadians"; we have made it difficult to be able to build our nation, especially in the northwestern parts our of country.

I'm very happy to say, as of earlier this week, that

has all changed.

After putting in three and a half years of effort as a private member, Alberta now has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed between the prairie provinces for the recognition, enhancement, and development of Economic Corridors, inclusive of collaboration and coordination of linear infrastructure or the corridors in which they reside.

The irony was not lost on those in attendance at the signing that the federally funded national broadcasting corporation didn't have any questions regarding the nation building significance of the MOU. Thank goodness the non-taxpayer funded media outlets took it for what it was: the prairie provinces taking huge steps forward to mitigate the economic impacts of being land locked, and to grow the Hudson Bay shipping capacity, while utilizing the infrastructure and geographical attributes to move goods and services internationally. It was asked when BC would be signing onto the MOU, and the answer was a certainly a practical one: soon. Those conversations, along with buy-in from our territorial neighbors, will certainly allow this to gain momentum, but having an accelerated work plan for the three provinces that have the most to gain was more important to solidify in a timely manner.

I can tell you full well that the proof is in the pudding with an agreement going

from a concept to an actual signed MOU; the real-world benefits will be felt immediately. We had the Grand Chief of Treaty 6 along with many industry leaders attend a post signing meeting to discuss the corridor concept, how it could and would benefit expansions and diversification in a multitude of sectors. The MOU will go a very long way in mitigating risks that have been experienced over the last few decades. The charge will be led at the Indigenous, Municipal, and Provincial levels to build the northwest, and to set us up for economic prosperity for generations to come. I can't disclose what specifically was said at the meeting, but I can tell you that the significance sank in and had full support of all that were present. It sure made me happy and proud to hear statements like "game changer", "Seabout business rious again", "True reconciliation with real action", "Nation Building", and "Prairie Pride". It gives me considerable amounts of hope that we will take our rightful place again not only in our country, but on the world stage.

When it comes to proof, the ripple effects were huge. Those that are in the know regarding major capital programs and investment in huge infrastructure projects took notice and reached out in a very expeditious manner. I can't tell you who I have been speaking with over the last few weeks leading up to the an-

nouncement this week, or who I spoke with just this morning regarding a corridor to gain access to the Hudson Bay, but let's just say that when Wall Street sits up and takes notice, we are well on our way to putting rubber to the road. They are not just interested in loans, they are looking to acquire assets that are in the order of tens of billions of dollars, and the windfall for our area is going to be massive.

I look forward to sharing these announcements with you in the coming weeks and giving some insight to the real projects and jobs it is going to bring in for several generations. To say that I am overjoyed seeing the rapid developments once we unlocked the tumblers would be a massive understatement. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to be your MLA so I could make the changes needed to unlock our economic potential, and to have the conversations with other leaders across the prairies to pull together and make this happen. It's amazing what we can accomplish when we work together.
