

LOCATION SKETCH





DUST CONTROL PROGRAM Get your applications in before the April 30 deadline

The County's annual calcium dust suppression program is an opt-in program designed to assist in the reduction of the impact of dust on residential rural properties adjacent to County roadways.

MANDATORY DOG LICENCE PROGRAM IN EFFECT

Free for County dog owners Recently-enacted Bylaw #06-2023 provides greater controls for animals (like dogs) within County boundaries. For dog owners, this means:

- A dog licence is now required for a dog over the age of 6 months
- No more than three dogs are permitted per household unless the owner has an approved kennel facility
- Properties with 30 acres or more are entitled to have up to three additional livestock guardian dogs
- Owners must obtain a dog licence within 15 days of becoming dog owner

ROADSIDE VEGETATION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

No-spray option available

Spot spraying will be conducted between May and September to control noxious/prohibited noxious weeds and brush.

Selective herbicide application on roadsides controls the spread of noxious and prohibited noxious weeds and brush. The Weed Control Act dictates which species of weeds are to be controlled by the municipality and on private property.

Those who wish to assume the responsibility of weed and brush control of the roadsides adjacent to their property can apply for the county's No-Spray Program. Visit LSAC.ca/weeds to learn more about the no-spray option.


COUNTY FIRE ADVISORY

In effect until further notice

A County-wide Fire Advisory is in effect until further notice. The Fire Hazard Rating for the area remains HIGH. Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services will continue to monitor conditions. Should conditions remain poor or worsen, a total and complete fire ban may be issued.

During this Fire Advisory, new fire permits will not be issued. While existing Fire(s) under permit will be allowed, they must be continuously monitored. Extensions will not be granted on existing permits. Burn barrels, cooking or warming fires (Campfires) will be allowed in acceptable fire pits in accordance with regulation.

Any updates to the fire status will be posted to CountyFire.ca.

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STEPS TO A MORE ORGANIZED, FUNCTIONAL GARAGE

Organization can help homeowners transform their homes into less cramped, more spacious oases without forcing them to finance potentially expensive expansion projects.

Homeowners who park in their driveways may find that their garages have become crowded, cluttered spaces in which searching for tools can feel like scouring a haystack in search of a needle. Organizing a garage can create extra room in a home while

garage is to first remove all items from the garage and into the driveway. Because items removed from the garage will be exposed to the elements. homeowners should choose a day that's temperate and sunny to clean their garages. If possible, homeowners should opt to organize their garages in late spring, summer or early fall when there are additional hours of daylight. This protects homeowners from having to work in the dark

should the job take longer than they initially anticipated.

Discard or donate duplicate items. Duplicate items are some of the main culprits behind cluttered garages. As garages gradually become more cluttered, homeowners may buy tools they already have simply because they cannot find their original tools. When organizing the garage, create separate piles for duplicate tools, placing still-useful

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items in a pile that can be donated to neighbors, local charities or organizations and another pile for old tools that are no longer useful.

Host a garage sale. Homeowners who want to organize their garages and make a buck at the same time can host garage sales. Make only those items that are still functional available for purchase, and let neighbors and bargain hunters do the bulk of your organiza-

tion work for you.

Designate areas of the garage for certain items. Once the items that won't be going back into the garage have been sold, donated or discarded, organize the garage by designating areas for certain items, making sure to separate items that can pose safety risks. For example, store kids' bicycles and outdoor toys in a corner of the garage that is opposite the corner where potentially dangerous items such

as power tools and gas cans will be stored. Keep the center of the garage open for vehicles.

Periodically park cars in the garage. Homeowners who are comfortable parking their vehicles in their driveways can improve their chances of maintaining organized garages over the long haul by periodically parking in the garage. Doing so not only prevents the gradual buildup of clutter that can slowly take over a garage, but also protects

homeowners' automotive investments.

Maintaining an organized garage can help homeowners make more practical use of the space in their homes.

THE PROBLEM WITH HARD WATER

Hard water can cause scaling, deposits inside of pipes, reduced cleaning ability, and several other problems.

Home ownership opens people's eyes to many new experiences, even requiring homeowners to familiarize themselves with certain things they never encountered as renters. Homeowners become novice plumbers, electricians, horticulturists, and even chemists as they wade through the projects and repairs involved with owning a home.

Outside of high school chemistry class, you may

never have given thought to water composition and how it changes. However, once you become a homeowner, you may have to pay special attention to the type of water bubbling out of your faucets. Hard water is a common concern, and it can affect appliances and other parts of the home.

What is hard water?

Hard water affects about 85 percent of the United States, according to the Water Quality Association. Although not harmful to human health, hard water can impact one's daily life in other ways.

Hard water is formed

when water moves through soil and rock. It dissolves very small amounts of minerals and holds them in a solution. Calcium and magnesium are the most common minerals to turn water "hard." The more magnesium and calcium water dissolves, the harder it becomes.

From nuisance to damaging

Hard water can not only be a minor headache, but also something more serious. Hard water can interfere with various cleaning tasks and also personal grooming. Clothes

washed in hard water may not be fully clean and may appear dingy. Hard water can cause a film on surfaces, such as bath tiles and tubs. Some people find that their hair and skin can appear dull and sticky due to hard water.

Hard water can have other effects, too. Over time, the water can deposit minerals on the inside of pipes, reducing water flow. If these deposits grow thick, you may have a plumbing issue on your hands. Furthermore, mineral deposits can harm appliances, such as water heaters, washing

machines and dishwashers. Eventually, hard water may render these appliances ineffective, and they will need to be replaced.

Treatment options

Considering hard water is such a common concern, a number of treatment options exist. The main types of water-softening systems use either a packaged water softener or a mechanical water-softening unit.

Packaged water softeners are chemicals that bond with the calcium and magnesium ions in the water so that they cannot interfere with cleaning efficiency. These chemicals fall into

two categories: precipitating and nonprecipitating. Precipitating softeners are borax and washing soda and can affect pH levels of water and make water cloudy. Nonprecipitating softeners use phosphates. Alkalinity won't be increased, and usually there is no cloudiness or buildup. These products are typically added to laundry loads and the like and are not recommended for drinking water.

Mechanical water-softening systems are hooked up directly to the plumbing of the house. They are ion-exchange systems that will add salt to the water. Although it can be safe to drink, softened water may not be recommended for those who are on low-sodium diets.

Hard water is a problem many homeowners have to face. It can affect a home's appliances' performance and cleaning abilities. Water hardness can be managed, and it is best to consult with an expert water-softening system manufacturer about your options.





Likewise, choosing a paint color for walls, trim and moldings that is lighter and cooler in tone (think soft grays or blues) will help to reflect light and give the room a more open feel.

3. Remove non-load-

bearing walls. Homeowners have the opportunity to rethink the layout of their home by removing non-loadbearing walls. Removing structurally unnecessary walls can make your whole home feel larger, improve flow, lighting and the function of your home.

4. Convert your garage into usable living or work space. For many homeowners, the garage becomes an overflow room for storage -- and is often a walk-in headache. Convert your garage (or a portion of it) into another living space, guest bedroom or home office. Install carpet and quality thermal insulation such as Roxul Comfortbatt to block outdoor noise and keep in warmth.

5. Choose furniture and accessories carefully. Adopt a minimalist's eye. Begin looking around your home for furniture or accessories that overwhelm the space. Interior designers recommend choosing low-profile or smallscale furniture for rooms with less square footage. Dual-purpose items, such as ottomans with storage chests inside, are a budget-friendly way to save on space while staying organized.

TYING UP LOOSE ENDS AND LOOKING BACK

When it comes to tying up loose ends and looking back on what has been accomplished thus far, I'm full steam ahead with bringing my major projects to a state where I can let them go on their own in good faith for the next couple of months. The Economic Corridor file is in decent shape, there are department leads and one heck of a Deputy Minister in place to ensure we don't lose any momentum there. We managed to get all three prairie provinces to sign an agreement to develop, as well as designate, Economic Corridors of mutual interest. What this basically means is that we just obtained access to the Hudson Bay, and are making plans to align our rails, roads, right of ways, transmission lines, communications, and pipelines for years to come; the positive ramifications of this are huge. We are aligning our policies and infrastructure as it relates to economic corridors.

I managed to wrap up the Career Education Task Force, and the Minister of Education made the formal announcement this week that she is immediately implementing 5 of the 21 recommendations. This will ensure that our kids can get onto their chosen path much quicker, and that post-secondary institutions and future employers are going to be receiving a motivated and enthusiastic crop of young adults that are going to positively light up the future.

I've instructed my staff to ensure that any critical files that we have in the office that need my attention get wrapped up this next week, and that we ensure if and or when the election is called, that we don't stop working to get people the help they need. I won't be in the office, and may not have the MLA title, but that does not mean my staff will stop. We may be a skeleton crew here, but what matters to you most will be taken care of. I don't want the next MLA to be starting from scratch like I had to four years ago. I'll ensure there is a smooth transition, and that outstanding files won't be left in limbo. One of the least professional things I have ever experienced was having no handoff from the previous MLA. The MLA works for you and, regardless of political stripes or personal feelings, anything less is a huge disservice to the constituents that we serve.

Someone had asked me a while back if I was happy with all that I had accomplished over my last 4 years, and the short answer is yes. There are so many more things that I had hoped to accomplish however...that's just my "Type A" personality raising its head again. To me, the project is not complete, we're still only in Phase 1, and we had a few unforeseen events that knocked us back from our planned schedule for deliverables. I had hoped to have all the western provinces, northern territories, and the adjacent USA states, including Alaska, signed up under an economic corridor agreement. So, if given the chance, I'll be back to ensure we get that completed. I want to make sure we get the healthcare we deserve out in our area, and that will require some meaningful reform. I want to make sure the items brought to light by our career education task force get fully implemented - ensuring our kids can really have all the doors opened to them. I want to ensure that our rural Alberta advantage is fully realized. I want to make sure that we collaborate with our friends, neighbors, and trading partners locally and internationally. I want to make sure Alberta's best interests are always put forward.

Several of my colleagues who have decided to seek office for a second term feel the same way: we have been through a lot and can't fathom losing all the gains we have made if we are not able to go one more round in the ring. For those that have chosen to allow others to take their place I have nothing but admiration and respect for them. Many have already been in office for a few terms, have family or health issues that need more attention, or have accomplished what they set out to do. Many of us (I would hazard to guess 80% of us) didn't run the first time to become career politicians. So, the fact that a handful have decided to go back to their private lives and businesses and trust the rest of us to carry on without them is a testament to how strong of a team we have. After the last few years, we are battle-hardened, and have a renewed vision and belief in what can be done if we all work together to keep our province moving forward. Apparently, others believe in that too, as we haven't seen this volume of net migration into Alberta from across the county since the 1950s.

Over the past few Sundays, I have been spending time out at the senior's homes in the constituency. I want to understand if there are

any outstanding items that I can lend a hand with, if they have heard any troubling items on the news, or if they just have questions that I could address to the best of my ability. The other reason is to seek advice and wisdom. I sure missed being able to get together with the seniors over the last few years, and these past few Sundays have been very precious to me. Some of the initiatives that I'll be looking for help with from the schools, the villages, the counties, and various management associations are:

1.Let's connect seniors with our youth. Mental health and lack of purpose are two major issues that they face. I can't think of too many things that will have better impacts on purpose, community and wellbeing as helping some of our seniors out with the little things, and in return having the seniors pass along that sage advice, wisdom, and knowledge to our youth. I'll hopefully be able to get a few things kicked off that will bear fruit over the next couple of months.

2.A Silver Trail that gets extra TLC from the rest of us, to assist in what the seniors need to be able to get out and about in our communities.


3.Chairs and tables, so our seniors can get outside and enjoy some of the great weather after being inside for the winter.



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
