In keeping with our commitment to open communications with our school community, Grande Yellowhead Public School Division (the "Division") was recently advised of allegations of a sensitive nature involving a staff member at Grande Cache Community High School (the "School"). Upon becoming aware of the alle-

gations that caused concern about student safety, the Division confirms that this staff member is no longer at the School, nor employed with the Division as of April 19, 2023. The Division has launched an internal review and investigation, working in collaboration with local authorities. As per the RCMP Media Release dated today, Mr. J.J. Butler is now facing charges.

While the Division is precluded from providing any details regarding the allegations as the

The Division is committed to ensuring that all necessary steps are taken to resolve this matter. In respect of the current investigation, the Division will not be releasing any further information at this time.





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BOARD MEETING BRIEF

Submitted by GYPSD

Board Chair Karpluk acknowledged the Division's focus on literacy and targeted instruction in literacy skills by reminding everyone that National Library Week occurs each April. The Board celebrates both the public and school libraries across GYPSD for the important role libraries play in developing essential reading and comprehension skills while inspiring a lifelong love of reading.

Superintendent Lewis provided an update on the Superintendent's Youth Council Research Work which was recently shared at uLead 2023 - an international conference for leaders in education.

Six students from each of the Division's five high schools have been meeting all year to develop key leadership skills and implement actions to improve their schools.

Secretary-Treasurer Sean Nicholson presented the annual budget principles model to the Board, illustrating the Division's focus on student learning through the allocation of resources, supports, and processes to develop and deepen students' literacy and numeracy skills. Additionally, the Board directs funds to support a fullday kindergarten program - beyond the half-day program funds from the province. This decision to allocate funds for full-day learning ensures GYPSD's

children have a strong foundation from which to grow their success.

The Board Chair provided praise and appreciation for the many administrative professionals within the Division in acknowledgment of National Administrative Professional Day.

Musical Theatre program teacher (and Evergreen Local President) Jessie Smeall brought 43 students from Grades 4-7 from Ecole Mountain View Elementary School in Hinton to perform songs from the musical Matilda.

Ms. Smeall and the musical theatre students give up their lunch breaks to practice and rehearse. Look for their performance times for the musical Matilda opening June 14th!

Recently, members of the Board attended a professional learning session offered by the Public School Boards Association of Alberta (PSBAA). They heard from EPSB educators Clarice Anderson and Sheila Williams who shared the historical and current implications and their lived experiences of the Indian Act in "Things You Didn't Know about the Indian Act". Researcher and professor at the University of Calgary, Dr. Sharon Friesen shared her research findings in "Teacher and Professional Staff Recruitment and Retention for Rural and Northern Alberta." Chair for the Canadian Rockies School Division and former Superintendent, Brian Callaghan provided guidance and insight into the province mandated professional profile standards in "Everything You Wanted to Know About Superintendent Performance Reviews and the SLQS."

Superintendent Lewis shared highlights from her report, which included:

work with central and school leadership staff to review and analyze the implications of the new Funding Manual for 2023/24;

preparation for the development of the Division Departments' 18-month Strategic Plans preparation for the annual principals' planning retreat.

Assistant Superintendent of Learning Services, Carra Aschenmeier shared her appreciation for principals Eric Bouchard and Steven Ripkens for their pilot of the Division's new digital report card, for the support provided by Director of Technology, Lyle Lee and Educational Technology Supervisor Kandis Gilks, and to all of the educators who serve on the Division's assessment committee. A survey will be shared with staff and parents for feedback on how to improve the functionality of the platform prior to a whole-Division rollout planned for

the 2023/24 school year.

Superintendent Lewis and Secretary-Treasurer Sean Nicholson confirmed that GYPSD has received a 1.2 million dollar school wellness grant from Alberta Education. The Division plans to have Wellness Navigators within each of the five high schools starting September 2023.

In the Department's update to the Board, HR shared their on-site PD to inform staff of GYPSD's onboarding program. The program ensures that all new employees are aware of key Board and Division policies, processes, and supports.

Board Chair Karpluk asked that an advocacy item be added to the May

PBM to address recent changes to services announced by the Alberta School Employee Benefit Plan (ASEBP).

Superintendent Lewis shared that the Division principals will be connecting with a Well at Work consultant from Ed Can to explore the development and deepening of their school's health and wellness practices at their annual planning retreat.

Clients physically walk on a treadmill throughout the treatment process where they are immersed into a virtual reality

environment with a therapist by their side.

ANNUAL VEGETATION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Every year, CN is required to clear its right-of-way of any vegetation that may pose a safety hazard. Vegetation on railway right-of-way, if left uncontrolled, can contribute to trackside fires and impair proper inspection of track infrastructure.

For safe railway operations, CN will conduct its annual vegetation control program on its rail lines in the province of Alberta. A certified professional will be applying herbicides on and around the railway tracks (primarily along the 16-24 feet graveled area/ballast). All product requirements for setbacks in the vicinity of dwellings, aquatic environments, and municipal water supplies will be met.



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STEPS TO A MORE ORGANIZED, FUNCTIONAL GARAGE

Organization can help homeowners transform their homes into less cramped, more spacious oases without forcing them to finance potentially expensive expansion projects.

Homeowners who park in their driveways may find that their garages have become crowded, cluttered spaces in which searching for tools can feel like scouring a haystack in search of a needle. Organizing a garage can create extra room in a home while affording homeowners the chance to protect their vehicles from the elements. Homeowners who want to turn their garages into something more than cluttered storage units can employ the following strategies to transform these largely overlooked areas into more valuable spac-

Choose the right day. Garages tend to be separate from the rest of the homes they're a part of, meaning the only way to organize a garage is to first remove all items from the garage and into the driveway. Because items removed from the garage will be exposed to the elements. homeowners should choose a day that's temperate and sunny to clean their garages. If possible, homeowners should opt to organize their garages in late spring, summer or early fall when there are additional hours of daylight. This protects homeowners from having to work in the dark should the job take longer than they initially anticipated.

Discard or do-

nate duplicate items. Duplicate items are some of the main culprits behind cluttered garages.

As garages gradually become more cluttered, homeowners may buy tools they already have simply because they cannot find their original tools. When organizing the garage, create separate piles for duplicate tools, placing still-useful items in a pile that can be donated to neighbors, local charities or organizations and another pile for old tools that are no longer useful.

Host a garage sale. Homeowners who want to organize their garages and make a buck at the same time can host garage sales. Make only those items that are still functional available for purchase, and let neighbors and bargain hunters do the bulk of your organization work for you.

Designate eas of the garage for certain items. Once the items that won't be going back into the garage have been sold, donated or discarded, organize the garage by desig-

nating areas for certain items, making sure to separate items that can pose safety risks. For example, store kids' bicycles and outdoor toys in a corner of the garage that is opposite the corner where potentially dangerous items such as power tools and gas cans will be stored. Keep the center of the garage open for vehicles.

Periodically park cars in the garage. Homeowners who are comfortable parking their vehicles in their

driveways can improve their chances of maintaining organized garages over the long haul by periodically parking in the garage. Doing so not only prevents the gradual buildup of clutter that can slowly take over a garage, but also protects homeowners' automotive investments.

Maintaining an organized garage can help make homeowners more practical use of the space in their homes.









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Hard water can cause scaling, deposits inside of pipes, reduced cleaning ability, and several other problems.

Home ownership opens people's eyes to many new experiences, even reauirina homeowners to familiarize themselves with certain things they never encountered as renters. Homeowners become novice plumbers, electricians, horticulturists, and even chemists as they wade through the projects and repairs involved with owning a home.

Outside of high school chemistry class, you may never have given thought to water composition and how it changes. However, once you become a homeowner, you may have to pay special attention to the type of water bubbling out of your faucets. Hard water is a common concern, and it can affect appliances and other parts of the home.

What is hard water?

Hard water affects about 85 percent of the United States, according to the Water Quality Association. Although not harmful to human health, hard water can impact one's daily life in other ways.

Hard water is formed when water moves through soil and rock. It dissolves very small amounts of minerals and holds them in a solution. Calcium and magnesium are the most common minerals to turn water "hard." The more magnesium and calcium water dissolves, the harder it becomes.

From nuisance to damaging

Hard water can not only be a minor headache, but also something more serious. Hard water can interfere with various cleaning tasks and also personal grooming. Clothes washed in hard water may not be fully clean and may appear dingy. Hard water can cause a film on surfaces, such as bath tiles and tubs. Some people find that their hair and skin can appear dull and sticky due to hard water.

Hard water can have other effects, too. Over time, the water can deposit minerals on the inside of pipes,

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reducing water flow. If these deposits grow thick, you may have a plumbing issue on your hands. Furthermore, mineral deposits can harm appliances, such as water heaters, washing machines and dishwashers. Eventually, hard water may render these appliances ineffective, and they will need to be replaced.

Treatment options

Considering hard water is such a common concern, a number of

treatment options exist. The main types of water-softening systems use either a packaged water softener or a mechanical water-softening unit.

Packaged water softeners are chemicals that bond with the calcium and magnesium ions in the water so that they cannot interfere with cleaning efficiency. These chemicals fall into two categories: precipitating and nonprecipitating. Precipitating softeners are borax and washing soda and can affect pH levels of water and make water cloudy. Nonprecipitating softeners use phosphates. Alkalinity won't be increased, and usually there is no cloudiness or buildup. These products are typically added to laundry loads and the like and are not recommended for drinking water.

Mechanical water-softening systems are hooked up directly to the plumbing of the house. They are ion-exchange systems that will add salt to the water. Although it can be safe to drink, softened water may not be recommended for those who are on low-sodium diets.

Hard water is a problem many homeowners have to face. It can affect a home's appliances' performance and cleaning abilities. Water hardness can be managed, and it is best to consult with an expert water-softening system manufacturer about your options.



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

When it comes to tying up loose ends and looking back on what has been accomplished thus I'm full steam ahead with bringing my major projects to a state where I can let them go on their own in good faith for the next couple of months. Economic Corridor file is in decent shape, there are department leads and one heck of a Deputy Minister in place to ensure we don't lose any momentum there. We managed to get all three prairie provinces to sign an agreement to develop, as well as designate, Economic Corridors of mutual interest. What this basically means is that we just obtained access to the Hudson Bay, and are making plans to align our rails, roads, right of ways, transmission lines, communications, and pipelines for years to come; the positive ramifications of this are huge. We are aligning our policies and infrastructure as it relates to economic corridors.

I won't be in the office, and may not have the MLA title, but that does not mean my staff will stop. We may be a skeleton crew here, but what matters to you most will be taken care of. I don't want the next MLA to be starting from scratch like I had to four years I'll ensure there is a smooth transition, and that outstanding files won't be left in limbo. One of the least professional things I have ever experienced was having no handoff from the previous MLA. The MLA works for you and, regardless of political stripes or personal feelings, anything less is a huge disservice to the constituents that we serve.

Someone had asked me a while back if I was happy with all that I had accomplished over my last 4 years, and the short answer is yes. There are so many more things that I had hoped to accomplish however...that's just my "Type A" personality raising its head again. To me, the project is not complete, we're still only in Phase 1, and we had a few unforeseen events that knocked us back from our planned schedule for deliverables. I had hoped to have all the western provinces,

northern territories, and the adjacent USA states, including Alaska, signed up under an economic corridor agreement. So, if given the chance, I'll be back to ensure we get that completed. I want to make sure the items brought to light by our career education task force get fully implemented - ensuring our kids can really have all the doors opened to them. I want to ensure that our rural Alberta advantage is fully realized. I want to make sure that we collaborate with our friends, neighbors, and trading partners locally and internationally. I want to make sure Alberta's best interests are always put forward.

Several of my colleagues who have decided to seek office for a second term feel the same way: we have been through a lot and can't fathom losing all the gains we have made if we are not able to go one more round in the ring. For those that have chosen to allow others to take their place I have nothing but admiration and respect for them. Many have already been in office for a few terms, have family or health issues that need more attention, or have accomplished what they set out to do. Many of us (I would hazard to guess 80% of us) didn't run the first time to become career So, the fact politicians. that a handful have decided to go back to their private lives and businesses and trust the rest of us to carry on without them is a testament to how strong of a team we have. After the last few years, we are battle-hardened, and have a renewed vision and belief in what can be done if we all work together to keep our province moving forward. Apparently, others believe in that too, as we haven't seen this volume of net migration into Alberta from across the county since the 1950s.

Over the past few Sundays, I have been spending time out at the senior's homes in the constituency. I want to understand if there are any outstanding items that I can lend a hand with, if they have heard any troubling items on the news, or if they just have questions that I could address to the best of my ability. The other reason is to seek advice and wisdom. I sure missed being able to get together with the seniors over the last few years, and these past few Sundays have been very precious to me. Some of the initiatives that I'll be looking for help with from the schools, the villages, the counties, and various management associations are:

1. Let's connect seniors with our youth. Mental health and lack of purpose are two major issues that they face. I can't think of too many things that will have better impacts on purpose, community and wellbeing as helping some of our seniors out


- 2. A Silver Trail that gets extra TLC from the rest of us, to assist in what the seniors need to be able to get out and about in our communities.
