



residents continue to be moved to other facilities across the province. While this has been an extremely challenging situation, the evacuations have gone well thanks to the cooperation of those having to move and the hard work of our staff, physicians, and supporting agencies. All zones are actively working around the clock to ensure patients and residents are safely cared for in temporary locations.

Evacuated patients and continuing care residents are being relocated in safe and appropriate settings. All zones are opening care spaces to accommodate those in need. These re-

locations are happening through EMS, chartered buses and flights as required. Patients and residents are being accompanied and supported by staff.

AHS is contacting families of loved ones to share patient/resident location information.

AHS has been working to identify additional staffing supports across all zones to ensure patients, residents and our care teams continue to be appropriately supported.

AHS sites safely evacuated and closed to date are:

- Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre
- Edson Healthcare Centre
- Fox Creek Health-

care Centre

• High Prairie Health Complex

If you have an emergency, please call 911. EMS resources remain in evacuated areas to provide support to those who need.

All appointments with laboratory services, mental health and public health in evacuated communities are postponed at this time. Clients will be contacted directly by AHS to be rescheduled as soon as possible. Home care clients impacted by evacuations are being contacted to arrange for alternative home visits and support from nursing teams.

Our teams are working with municipal leaders in

these communities to establish plans for re-entry when it is deemed safe to do so.

We are extremely grateful for our frontline staff, leaders and physicians who have come together to support the response across AHS, and especially to those who have been evacuated along with their families. We are also grateful for our partner organizations, including several continuing care organizations that continue to support these efforts.

We are also appreciative of our community partners and volunteers who continue to answer when called upon for their support.

determine how voters can be supported to cast their ballot. At this time, no returning offices or voting places have been impacted and in-person voting will continue to be offered at all locations, where possible.

Starting today, the Chief Electoral Officer has authorized an additional reason

to vote by Special Ballot, so that those individuals that have been displaced by an emergency or disaster can take advantage of this voting option.

Elections Alberta will continue to monitor the situation and post information on the website and on social media, should a returning office need to close due

# ALBERTA DECLARES PROVINCIAL STATE OF EMERGENCY

In response to the threat of multiple wildfires burning throughout the province, Alberta has declared a provincial state of emergency to ensure the safety, health and welfare of Albertans. Emergency responders are working around the clock to keep people safe and reduce the threat to homes and infrastructure.

Under the Emergency Management Act, declaring a state of emergency is a legal mechanism that provides the provincial government with a higher level of intergovernmental coordination, around the clock monitoring of the situation, access to emergency discretionary funds, the ability to mobilize additional supports and continue working with municipalities, organizations and businesses

to support evacuated residents.

The Emergency Management Cabinet Committee continues to meet regularly to respond to the current wildfire situation across the province. Cabinet continues to have

# LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY BATTLES WILDFIRE EVENTS WITH MUNICIPAL PARTNERS

# County adds its voice to rural Alberta leaders requesting an increase in provincial firefighting resources.

Sangudo, Alberta, Saturday, May 6, 2023 – Lac Ste. Anne County today provided a status update regarding recent wildfire events, including the County's request to the Province to declare a State of Provincial Emergency.

At approximately 2:00 pm on Friday, May 5, 2023, a fire broke out in the community of Lessard Lake Estates (referred to as the 553 Lessard Lake Fire). Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services responded to this fire, working in tandem with fire crews from Alberta Wildfire and adjacent municipalities to preserve the 134 residential and recreational properties in the affected area. Regrettably, the County was unable to save 21 properties from the fire; four of which were total losses.

At the time of this media release, a total of four recreational vehicles, five structures, and 12 outbuildings have been destroyed. The County is working on a full assessment of damages to these properties.

Because this fire is still active, access to the Lessard Lake Estates subdivision is restricted to responders. Public safety is paramount as is the safety of the first responders on scene. Road blocks are in place to ensure that unnecessary traffic is not allowed into the scene.

# Stay away from the active fire areas. If you are within the mandatory evacuation areas, please leave immediately.

Presently, 553 Lessard Lake Fire is not contained. An additional 500-hectare-fire that affected Rge Rd 60 to Rge Rd 63, from Twp Rd 554A to Twp Rd 560 is listed as contained, and is being monitored as there is still flare-ups occurring. All information related to the wildfires, including information for displaced residents, will continue to be posted to the County website at LSAC.ca.

"This is the hottest, driest season we've had in years," shared Lac Ste. Anne County Reeve Joe Blakeman. "I commend our Fire Services personnel for giving their all to deal with the recent wildfire events. I also extend my gratitude to responders from Barrhead and Woodlands counties, Busby, St. Albert, Ponoka, and elsewhere for helping us deal with these critical events. Everyone is working together to the extent possible, which is increasingly difficult given the wildfire events in other parts of the province."

"It goes without saying that I am saddened by the property losses; but at the same time I am relieved to hear that there have been no casualties, nor any loss of livestock."

### County Seeks Provincial Resources

On May 5, 2023, Reeve Blakeman sent a letter to Premier Danielle Smith requesting that she declare a Provincial State of Emergency and deploy the required resources to the County and similarly-affected regions on an expedited basis. In his letter, Reeve Blakeman expressed an immediate need for additional personnel, equipment, food, and shelter. "Much of rural Alberta is reeling from one of the most dangerous wildfire seasons in recent memory, and we've just started the season," shared Reeve Blakeman. "Granted, the Province has stepped in to provide periodic assistance, but it's simply too sporadic. Our crews held the 553 Lessard Lake Fire for hours, but with little air support from the Province due to the redeployment of their resources to Edson and Drayton Valley, the fire jumped the break and 21 structures were lost."

"Following a conference call with Parkland County Mayor Allan Gamble, Yellowhead Mayor Wade Williams, Brazeau County Mayor Bart Guyon, and with the guidance of the Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland Constituency Office, we've reached out to the Premier to declare a State of Provincial Emergency. We've also asked Rural Municipalities of Alberta President Paul McLauchlin to help us drive the message home to the Province that we need their help; we need the declaration, now."


The County has not yet received a response from the Province regarding Reeve Blakeman's May 5 request for a Provincial State of Emergency declaration.

Reeve Blakeman further shared that, once the wildfires have been contained, the County will work with displaced residents on a re-entry plan to return to their homes in a timely organized manner. "We certainly understand the sense of urgency, but we also have to prioritize safety. We still have crews actively battling the blaze. Once we overcome the crisis at hand, we will work with affected residents to return to a state of normalcy. To be clear, however: this is not the time to have these discussions."

Displaced residents are being engaged by County personnel. Any affected resident with questions or requiring assistance is encouraged to contact the County Administration Office at 780.785,3411 (toll-free 1.866.880.5722) or LSAC@LSAC.ca.

All updates and directives related to the wildfires will continue to be posted to the County website at LSAC.ca, and the County's Facebook page at facebook.com/Isacounty. Residents who visit CountyConnect.ca and opt in to the County's emergency notification system can also receive wildfire status updates via text, email or voice message.

# RURAL CRIME AWARENESS

Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.

"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed.

Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800.

Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area. Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own.

decision-making abilities, and will make decisions as needed to deal with this emergency situation.

The ministries involved in the Emergency Management Cabinet Committee include Alberta Public Safety and Emergency Services, Alberta Skilled Trades and Professions, Alberta Infrastructure, Alberta Treasury Board and Finance, Alberta Municipal Affairs, Alberta Health, Alberta Forestry, Parks and Tourism, Alberta Social Services, Alberta Indigenous Relations, Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors, Alberta Agriculture and Irrigation and Alberta Energy.

Department officials will

continue providing daily technical briefings to the media and the public as this situation continues to evolve. A daily situation report will also be issued via news release.

The most up-to-date evacuation information is available at alberta.ca/emergency, Alberta Emergency Alert or by downloading the Alberta Emergency Alert mo-

bile app, which immediately pushes all alerts out to subscribers. Albertans seeking information or supports can call 310-4455.

Anyone who has been evacuated due to wildfires is asked to register at local reception centres or at emergencyregistration.alberta.ca.

# INSURANCE EXPERTS AVAILABLE TO HELP ALBERTANS AFFECTED BY WILDFIRE

With more than 100 active wildfires in Alberta, including a number that are currently listed as out of control, Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) has deployed its Virtual Community Assistance Mobile Pavilion (V-CAMP) to provide insurance information to affected residents.

IBC is in close contact with provincial government and emergency management officials, as well as with municipal officials in the affected communities. This situation is changing extremely rapidly. Click here for the latest updates from the Government of Alberta.

"Unfortunately, the wildfires across Alberta over the past week have resulted in the loss of multiple properties. Our hearts go out to the individuals and families whose lives have been disrupted and whose property has been damaged," said Rob de Pruis, National Director of Consumer and Industry Relations, IBC. "Special thanks to all the first responders who have been working so diligently to protect lives and property. While recovery efforts continue, rest assured that anyone whose property or vehicle was damaged can contact their insurance representative when they are ready to start the claims process. Those with general insurance questions are encouraged to contact IBC's Consumer Information Centre at 1-844-2ask-IBC."

Insurers serve as "second responders" in the recovery period after catastrophe strikes. IBC's Virtual CAMP is staffed with trained insurance industry personnel who are on hand at IBC's Consumer Information Centre at 1-844-2ask-IBC (1-844-227-5422) to help address consumers' general questions about their home, business or vehicle insurance policies. Albertans can also visit IBC's Wildfires webpage to learn more about their insurance coverage and the various stages of the claims process.

When the Smoke Clears . . . What's Covered?

• Virtually every home insurance policy covers damage caused by fire, even if the fire began on a neighbouring property, as long as the fire was not started intentionally by the policy holder or a member of their household.

- Damage to vehicles from fire is usually covered if comprehensive or all perils coverage car insurance was purchased. As this coverage is not mandatory, talk to your insurance representative to ensure that you have appropriate insurance coverage.
- In certain circumstances, homeowners who are evacuated or unable to return home as a result of insurable damage are entitled to additional living expenses.

Tips for Starting the Claims Process

- Call your insurance representative. Most insurers have a 24-hour claims service. Be as detailed as possible when providing information.
- List all damaged or destroyed items. If possible, assemble proofs of purchase, photos, receipts and warranties. Take photos of damage incurred and keep damaged items, unless they pose a health hazard.
- Keep all receipts related to cleanup and liv-

ing expenses if you've been displaced. Ask your insurance representative about what coverage for expenses you may be entitled to and for what period of time.

### Tips to Protect your Real Estate Investment Dollars

- \* Consult public real estate websites to review property listings in the community where the property is located. Compare features, size & locations to establish if the asking price seems reasonable.
- \* Get independent representation for your purchase. If the seller objects, consider it a red flag.
- \* Check to make sure your representative is a licensed real estate agent. Contact your local Real Estate Board or the Real Estate Council of Alberta. Using a licensed real estate agent does not cost anything from a purchaser's standpoint. Usually all commissions are paid by the seller.
- \*Beware of a real estate agent or mortgage broker who has a financial interest in the transaction.
- \* Ask your independent representative to provide you with a comparative market analysis of the property.



## Red Flags to Watch for Mortgage Fraud

- \* Someone offers you a fee to use your name and credit information to obtain a mortgage
- \*You are encouraged to include false information to a loan application
- \* You are asked to leave signature lines or other important areas on a loan application blank
- \* The loan amount on the mortgage is significantly higher than the value of the property

# BULLYING Tips for Dealing With Bullying

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.

2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

 Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.

7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone

# **HOW TO HELP KIDS GET INTO GOLF**

Golf is a game of skill that can take years, if not decades, to master. Many golfers find their time on the golf course both rewarding and relaxing, even on those days when the fairways seem impossible to find.

Though many players never swing a golf club until they reach adulthood, it's never too early to hit the links. Some of the world's most accomplished golfers, including fourtime Masters champion Tiger Woods, began playing as toddlers, and many feel that getting an early start can lead to a more successful game down the road.

Getting kids into golf is a great way for parents to bond with their children while enjoying the great outdoors. Golf can also be used to teach kids humility, sportsmanship and the importance of hard work. Thanks to the often frustrating nature of golf, parents may find it somewhat challenging to instill a love of the game in their youngsters. But there are ways to introduce kids to this wonderful game that kids might just play for the rest of their lives.

·Focus on having fun. Few, if any, golfers at your local golf course on a given weekend could say with certainty that golf has never frustrated them. The challenge of golf may be its most appealing characteristic to older players, but young kids can be easily overwhelmed by the challenges golf presents. By focusing on

having fun instead of perfecting techniques, parents can get kids to look forward to their time on the links. The more fun kids have, the more likely they will be to embrace the game and its many challenges. Don't put pressure on youngsters as they develop their games, but encourage them through their struggles and reassure them that you faced the same obstacles when you started playing.

·Hire an instructor with experience teaching children. Instructors with experience teaching children will understand the basics of the game and how learning those basics provides a great foundation for future enjoyment and suc-

cess on the course. Instructors who have taught kids in the past also know that teaching youngsters the finer points of golf requires patience and encouragement. Ask a fellow parent or an employee at the club where you play to recommend an instructor for your child. And take advantage of any kids' courses your club offers.

•Purchase the correct equipment. Even the best golfers are bound to struggle when using the wrong equipment. While it might be unwise to invest in especially expensive equipment for youngsters likely to grow out of it in a few months' time, deals can be found on used kids' equipment. Used

kids' equipment is typically subjected to less wear and tear than used equipment for adults, as kids tend to play less often and fewer holes than adults when they do play. But make sure to find correctly sized equipment that kids feel comfortable using.

•Play some holes. Instructors may teach kids the differences between the types of clubs and how to swing and putt. But golf is most fun when players are out on the links going from hole to hole. Instruction is important, but don't forget to play a few holes with your child each week as well.

Fire bans and other restrictions

- Unusually warm, dry weather and strong winds mean it is easier for a wildfire to start and spread.
- As a result of these conditions, the entire province is under a fire ban. No open burning is allowed, including backyard fire pits inside the Forest Protection Area. Alberta Parks and many municipalities and communities have ordered their own bans and restrictions. For more information, visit Albertafirebans.
- A provincial off-highway vehicle restriction is also in place, which means the recreational use of off-highway vehicles on public land, including on designated OHV trails, is prohibited.

Wildfire activity updates

- There are currently 110 active wildfires in the Forest Protection Area, 37 of which are classified as out of control.




