HOW TO KEEP ANIMALS OUT OF YOUR GARDEN

Many gardeners understand the frustration that stems from seeing a garden destroyed by wildlife. While protecting wildlife is a cause that's near and dear to many gardening enthusiasts, even the most ardent wildlife supporter does not want to see his or her garden trampled, eaten or adversely affected by animals.

Safeguarding gardens from local wildlife can require some trial and error. Animals may find ways to circumvent gardeners' initial efforts to protect their gardens, but the following methods might just do the trick the first time around.

• Erect physical barriers around gardens. Barriers may not be gardeners' first choices, as some people feel barriers such as wire cages or mesh coverings make it more difficult to tend to gardens and rob gardens of some of their aesthetic appeal. But coverings and wire cages can effectively prevent wildlife from trampling or eating plants while still allowing the gardens to get adequate sunlight. Make sure barriers extend to the ground so animals cannot access gardens by entering beneath the barricades.

Fight intruders with odor. Stray cats may mistake gardens for litter boxes and enter them to relieve themselves. Preventing such intrusions can be as simple as placing items around the garden to reduce the likelihood that gardens will be mistaken for litter boxes. Peels from oranges and lemons or coffee grounds can be placed in the garden and can emit odors strong enough to deter cats.

Install motion detecting lights around gardens. Motion detection technology might be enough to deter nocturnal wildlife from trampling or eating gardens. Animals might be spooked and run away when lights suddenly turn on. A similar approach can be taken using noise instead of lights. Gardeners who hope to avoid erecting barriers around their gardens can put up posts instead, attaching aluminum cans or wind chimes to the posts that will make noise when animals come near. Much like light, noise can be enough to deter animals.

Consider raised garden beds. When small critters, such as moles, are the main problem, then raised garden beds with wood or plastic bottoms and sides can be enough to safeguard gardens. Raised garden beds might not be accessible to small critters, though such beds likely won't deter larger animals from getting into gardens that are not barricaded.

• Erect fencing around the yard. Though fencing is expensive, fencing in a backyard or side yard where gardens are located can deter wildlife big and small from trampling or eating gardens.

and June 29 will be able to replace these documents free of charge.

Evacuees must visit a registry agent office in person to replace their documents at no cost.

Registry agents will follow procedures to confirm an applicant's identity and ensure they are from an area under evacuation before ordering replacement documents at no charge.

Replacement cards and certificates will be sent to an address specified by the applicant. Applicants can choose to send replacement identification to an alternate address that is not a post office box, including evacuation centres and registry agents. The replacements will arrive in about five business days.

Replacing a driver's licence or ID card

• Registry agents will validate an applicant's identity by looking up their image and signature to ensure both match what is on file.

• Registry agents will validate an applicant's evacuee status by comparing their address on their motor vehicle file, with a government list of affected areas that is updated daily.

• The agent will ask personal knowledge verification questions that only the applicant can answer.

Replacing a birth certificate

• Birth certificates can be replaced by applying in person at a registry agent office if an applicant has other ID; however, if that too is missing, an applicant will need to bring someone who can vouch for their identity, having known them for more than one year. The registry agent can assist with this process.

Alberta's Emergency Management Cabinet Committee continues to meet regularly to respond to the current wildfire situation across the province. Cabinet continues to have decision-making abilities and will make decisions as needed to deal with this emergency.

Trans Mountain has been operating in Alberta for 70 years. The original pipeline was built in 1953 and has been operating safely ever since. Trans Mountain and Parkland County signed a Community Benefit Agreement in 2020 that made a \$225,000 investment in the Entwistle Community Hub Project, a facility offering various indoor and outdoor amenities, including a new pool and library.

Thank you for hosting our workforce and for your patience during construction.

Two hundred and eighty-five kilometres of pipeline construction is now complete in Yellowhead County from Spruce Grove to Hinton, including the expansion of four pump stations and 16 major trenchless crossings in this region.

While pipeline construction is complete in Alberta, teams will return throughout 2023 to finish right-of-way cleanup and reclamation.

During construction, Trans Mountain and its general construction contractors, Midwest Pipelines and Cord Construction, have aimed to be good neighbours. When planning the Expansion Project, Trans Mountain made a commitment to work with communities to minimize construction impacts, while maximizing local benefits.

Trans Mountain values the relationships it has built with communities along the pipeline corridor over its 70-year history.

During construction of the Expansion Project, we've given back to the region by funding various projects, local education and training opportunities, investing more than \$1.4 million into communities such as Edson, Hinton, Parkland County, Spruce Grove, Stony Plain, Wabamun and Yellowhead County.

Trans Mountain has several offices and pump stations in Alberta, including Sherwood Park, Edson, Hinton and Jasper. With a number of other operating facilities in the region, many of our team members work and live in the community. On top of local benefits, Trans Mountain will pay nearly \$4 million annually in local taxes after the Expansion Project is completed.



Trans Mountain and Yellowhead County signed a Community Benefit Agreement that saw a \$140,000 investment into the Hamlet of Robb pump track.



Trans Mountain and the City of Spruce Grove signed a Community Benefit Agreement for a \$200,000 investment towards the opening of the new Jubilee Park Boardwalk Trail.

While our presence will be smaller with pipeline construction now complete, we look forward to staying good neighbours in the community and maintaining our positive relationship well into the future.

ASSISTANCE TO ALBERTA

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that a Request for Federal Assistance from the Province of Alberta to support their efforts to combat the significant wildfire situation in the province has been approved.

Authorization has been given to the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) to provide:

• personnel and resources to assist and enable fire fighting;

• airlift resources for mobility and logistical tasks, including the evacuation of isolated communities; and

• engineering support, including heavy equipment resources, as capacity allows.

CAF resources will be provided for an initial period of two weeks, with a one-week extension possible following a joint evaluation of the situation to determine if support is still required.

In addition to the CAF deployment, the federal government is also providing the following supports:

• Public Services and Procurement Canada will provide contracting support to the province for supplies or logistics.

• The Royal Canadian Mounted Police will continue to support with response efforts and, as the contracted police of jurisdiction, support matters of law enforcement.

• Employment and Social Development Canada will support impacted Canadians with enhanced Service Canada hours, outreach to evacuees, and deployment of mobile units to evacuation centres to support applications for services, such as employment insurance.

· Indigenous Service Canada's Emergency Management Assistance Program (EMAP) will support the response and recovery efforts for Alberta's on-reserve First Nations communities currently experiencing the effects of the wildland fires. Affected communities require prompt coordination of actions to protect the health, safety or welfare of all, and limit damages to property, infrastructure, and the environment. EMAP supports impacted communities through agency response via the wildland fire and the emergency management service agreements with the Province of Alberta, resource coordination, organizational structure and evacuee supports. Once the response phase is over, the Program will provide recovery support for repairs to on-reserve community infrastructure to restore to preevent conditions, mitigation

measures to infrastructure to
minimize future impacts and
personal losses.
Public Health Agency of

Canada's National Emergency of Strategic Stockpile is engaged and has already shipped requested supplies and is standing by to provide more if required.

• Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada is working with the province of Alberta and telecommunications service providers to keep people connected.

• Parks Canada is sending an 18-member Incident Command Team to support the Province of Alberta. These wildland fire management specialists are trained to manage complex fires and other incidents. This deployment is being coordinated through the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre. GOVERNMENT OF CANADA FURTHER INCREASES INTEREST RELIEF TO HELP PRODUCERS MANAGE FINANCIAL CHALLENGES

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that the interest-free limit of the Advance Payments Program has been increased from \$250,000 to \$350,000 for the 2023 program year, effective May 8, 2023. This is the portion of advances on which the Government of Canada pays the interest on behalf of producers.

Under the Advance Payments Program, producers have easy access to favorable cash advances of up to \$1 million, based on the expected value of their agricultural product. The program can also provide some flexibility by allowing producers to sell their agricultural products based on market conditions rather than the need for cash.

PARKLAND RCMP EXECUTE SEARCH WARRANT RELATED TO DRUG INVESTIGATION

On May 9, 2023, Parkland RCMP Drug Unit executed a search warrant at a residence in Stony Plain following a drug investigation. As a result of the search, a significant quantity of drugs were seized, including methamphetamine and fentanyl, as well as Canadian currency and stolen property.

The items seized include:Approximately 9

ounces of suspected Methamphetamine;

• Approximately 4 grams of suspected Fentan-yl;

• \$1,520.00 in Canadian currency and a vehicle was seized as proceeds of crime.

A 24-year-old female resident of Stony Plain was ar-

rested and charged with:

• Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking

• Possession of Property Obtained by Crime

The accused is scheduled to appear in Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain on July 11, 2023.

"This represents a significant seizure of suspected drugs and proceeds of crime that have been removed from our streets," says Parkland RCMP Detachment Commander Insp. McGillivray. "The Parkland RCMP will continue to target this activity in our efforts at crime reduction to ensure a safer community for the residents of Stony Plain and Parkland County."
