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


elderly customers, taking advantage of their generosity and made thousands of dollars from the scam.

Road and utility work is again underway at the south end of Festival Park. In order to construct the new roads and parking lot, the current park access will be closed starting June 15, with detours in place to provide continued access.

Pedestrian access to the park is on a temporary gravel pathway, on the west side of 51 Street (blue dots on attached sketch), while vehicle access is on 52 Street, and through the Cadet building parking lot (shown in black). Parking for large vehicles (RVs and buses) has been added to the west side of the existing parking lot, to the east of the cadet building.

The detours will be in place until the end of Sep-

tember. Please use caution, pay attention to signs, and reduce your speed in this area.


The new Legion Street access to the park will connect the park with the downtown business core, provide additional parking areas to reduce congestion, and ensure park users can continue with safe and enjoyable recreational experiences.



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DO WE REALLY WANT BILL 1?

Premier Smith has promised that no tax rate – neither personal nor corporate – would be raised under the UCP. Bill 1 of a new UCP government would enshrine that promise in law by prohibiting any tax hike without public approval in a referendum.

At first thought that would seem to be a taxpayer's dream, but a second and a third thought show it would be disastrous. Such an act would cripple new measures and new directions. Most likely it would make reaction to an emergency almost impossible. It would even cripple what we have now.

The elected government has the responsibility to pay

its way. The government, not the electorate who chose them to do so, has to balance what goes out with what comes in. The tax effects of 'bracket creep' are too low to help much, and imposition of greater royalties or fees does not seem to be considered, either. How can the provincial government continue to balance the books?

Referenda are often used by governments to 'pass the buck' onto the populace when they do not wish to face uncomfortable obligations. After all, it is impossible to share all the multitude of possible effects of the referendum prior to the vote on it; the average person has no access to the necessary information available to the MLA's. A public vote on such an issue could only be invalid.

One obvious question is: who would vote to raise taxes? Could Alberta ever again expect corporate or personal taxes to match other provinces? What is the intention here, and what would result after such a referendum?

A frozen tax base would leave a government unable to adjust programs even when needed. It would curtail improvements. It would prevent compensation for population growth or inflation or

downturn in oil revenues. It would hobble government services such as health, education, social services and infrastructure. It would prevent our government from offering incentives for sustainable energy programs and the like. It would be a tourniquet on the arteries of Alberta. In other words, it would stifle our economy.

On the other hand, it would ensure that Albertans would have to turn more and more to private services, since the government could not meet its obligations. Perhaps that is the intention.

And when the problems become dire, who is to blame? Not the government, surely! The government response: "We gave them the choice and the citizens chose for themselves"...

ALBERTA WILDFIRE SITUATION

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Albertans who have been evacuated should continue to follow updates from their local authorities.

Current situation

•Those evacuated due to wildfires should register at local reception centres or at emergencyregistration. alberta.ca.

•An evacuation order remains in effect for the area around the town of Edson, from approximately Obed Lake to Chip Lake.

•The remainder of Yellowhead County is on evacuation alert.

•A reception centre has been set up at the Edmonton Expo Centre.

•An evacuation order remains in effect for the Sweathouse area of the M.D. of Greenview. A reception centre has been set up at the Horizon Inn in Valleyview.

•An evacuation order remains in effect for the hamlet of Fort Chipewyan, Mikisew Cree First Nation (Allison Bay, Dog Head and Devils Gate), Fort Chipewyan Metis Nation and Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation. Parts of Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation remain under evacuation order. •View the full list of evacuation orders.

•An evacuation alert remains in effect for Woodlands County as of 6:51 p.m. on June 9: north of Township Road 561, west of Range Road 120 south of Groat Creek Road, Township Road 584 west of the McLeod River to Range Road 144 east of the Mc-Leod River to Range Road 123 at Whitecourt Mountain.

•An evacuation alert remains in effect for Grande Prairie County for everyone located north of Township Road 732, west of Range Road 131 and south of Township Road 742.

•An evacuation alert has been issued for Brazeau County west of Range Road 95 to the entire Brazeau County border from north to south.

•Support continues to be available to Albertans 24-7. Visit alberta.ca/emergency or call 310-4455.

•There are multiple road closures and advisories for north-central Alberta.

•Visit 511.alberta.ca for up-to-date information on road closures and travel advisories.

•Current wildfire information is available on the Alberta Wildfire Status Dashboard.

•Alberta currently has approximately 2,700 personnel working on wildfires. This includes support from partner agencies across Canada, the United States, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, as well as the Canadian Armed Forces. Support for evacuees

•Since the announcement of one-time emergency financial assistance for evacuees, more than 17,700 applications have been processed.

•More than \$21.4 million in e-transfers has been sent to evacuees.

LSAC COMMUNITY WELLNESS -HEALTH, INFRASTRUCTURE AND TAXES

In April 2019 a new industrial activity began in the County of Lac Ste. Anne that has an impact on the residents beyond the 2 km boundary from the activity that requires notice to residents. In fact this industrial activity may have contributed to some of the foundation issues of county and provincial infrastructure. Yet we don't really know for sure because no one knows the impact the industry has on our residents' health, infrastructure and taxes.

Thank you to those who did respond to questions posed August 17, 2022 to Lac Ste. Anne County leadership. After many referrals, a representative from the Department of Environment and Protected Areas (EPA) who is representing the Minister of Environment and Protected Areas responded. In the spirit of sharing knowledge with Lac Ste. Anne County residents so they may be aware of factors related to the wellness of their families, below are summaries of the answers to questions posed:

Question:

What are the continuous low frequency noise/vibration wellness effects on babies and children who live in the surrounding areas of the Wayfinder Quarry?

Response:

"If local residents have any concerns about noise impacts and their health, they are encouraged to speak with their physician to receive the appropriate assessment."

"...effects of continuous low frequency noise/vibration on babies and children, health agencies, such as Health Canada and the World Health Organization have recognized that noise levels may contribute to the level of annoyance, stress, and anxiety..."

"...Alberta Health is not aware that a noise impact assessment has been completed or submitted..." Question:

What are the quantity and quality effects on the ground water supplies for families who live in the sand resource extraction areas of the Wayfinder Quarry?

Response:

Wayfinder was issued two water permits that have been amended twice. 6 nearby water wells are being monitored including the two production wells. For more details, submit a FOIP request with an initial fee of \$25.00.

Question:

What are the effects on the residential, commercial, and utility infrastructures/foundations from a continuous vibration of the underlying rock formations affected by the mining of the sand underneath?

Response:

Ask your municipality and/ or the Safety Codes Council of Alberta

Question:

How are the threatened water birds and other wildlife responding to the noise and vibration carried through the lake waters?

Response:

Ask Glenn Mack, Provincial Wildlife Habitat Specialist at glenn.mack@gov.ab.ca

Question:

As taxpayers, where would we see information related to a cost benefit analysis that spans the life of the positive and negative impacts of the Wayfinder Mine?

Response:

Ask your municipality.

Question:

How did the county respond after their review of the outcome of the decision of Alexis v Alberta (Environment and Parks), 2020 ABCA 188 ("Alexis") where the Court ordered the Alberta Environment Director to notify Wayfinder that it was required to submit an EIA report?

Response:

"I recommend you contact the County of Lac Ste. Anne, 780-785-3411, directly in order to receive the most accurate information, as the EPA does not have oversight on this item."

Question:

What are the sand extraction boundary areas underground that go beyond the open pit areas of the Wayfinder Mine?

Response:

"From the regulatory perspective Wayfinder has the authorizations they needed under the Water Act and the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act to operate but we cannot confirm on ground situation."

Question:

Do County of Lac Ste. Anne residents have access to that Wayfinder EIA report?

Response:

"For the Big Molly Pit, a egistration 00412591-00-Registration 00 was issued to Wayfinder Corp. under the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act as of September 07, 2018 and does not expire. As mentioned above, that as a result, of the amendment to the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act, Big Molly project was no longer a mandatory activity for requiring Environmental Impact Assessment. Therefore, an EIA for the Big Molly project was no required."

Details on legal amendments to the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act: Order of Events:

2016 - "Wayfinder began working on the development of the "Big Molly" regional frac sand facility in 2016."

2017 - "Wayfinder Corp. contacted the Director regarding the proposed Big Molly silica sand project (the Project). Wayfinder Corp. requested a ruling on whether the development, which included a sand pit producing 500,000 tonnes of silica sand per year and associated processing elements, would require an EIA under section 44 of the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act (EPEA). Without any further reasons provided, the Director concluded that the activity was not on the mandatory activities list and that an EIA would not be required."

January 2018 - Armin Alexis requests an Environmental Impact Assessment and brings the issue to the courts. Alexis v Alberta (Environment and Parks), 2020 ABCA 188 April 2019 - Sand Extraction begins without Environmental Impact Assessment

November 2019 - Appeal heard

May 2020 - Court order Wayfinder to complete Environmental Impact Assessment

July 2020 - Private members bill results in exempting Wayfinder Corp. from completing an Environmental Impact Assessment.

According to January 11, 2021 St. Albert Gazette: "In July, Jason Nixon, minister of environment and parks, along with Getson, got Bill 31 passed with "lightning speed."

"Essentially, it was his bill, but he gave it to me as a private member to carry through because the actions took place out in our area ... that was the first time in 25 years that a private member's carried through a government bill," Getson explained.

The bill was made in response to a decision by the Alberta Court of Appeal to classify silica sand, or gravel, as a mineral. This classification had the potential to halt the construction industry. Bill 31 amended the Public Lands Act by removing silica sand from the Act."

This Alberta Court of Appeal was related to the ruled "Alberta Court of Appeal decision of Alexis v Alberta (Environment and Parks).[1] In this case, Armin Alexis, a member of the Alexis Sioux First Nation, sought judicial review of the decision of the Director of Environmental

Assessments (Alberta Environment and Parks), who exercised discretion not to require an EIA of the Wayfinder Regional silica sand facility known as "Big Molly" located near Glenevis, Alberta. The primary issue in the judicial review proceedings and subsequent appeal was the interpretation of the statutory definitions of "mineral", "quarry", and "mandatory activity" in the EPEA. The EPEA provides that a "mandatory activity" is subject to an EIA. If silica sand is classified as a "mineral", the project would constitute a "quarry" and an EIA would be necessary. If, however, the silica sand is not classified as a "mineral", then instead the project would constitute a "pit" and the requirement for an EIA would be at the discretion of the Director. The judicial review application was dismissed by the Chambers Judge with a ruling that it was reasonable for the Director to conclude that silica sand is not a mineral. However, on appeal, the Court found the Director's decision was "irrational and illogical and must be set aside", with the majority concluding that silica sand is in fact a "mineral", meaning therefore that the project was a "quarry" requiring a mandatory EIA.'

According to the St. Albert Gazette Getson is quoted saying, "We managed to put through a piece of legislation in the spring that essentially mitigated an iceberg that would have tanked all gravel and sand production in the province for two years," Getson said." In receiving the above responses two additional questions surfaced and posed to Alberta Department of Environment and Protected Areas (EPA):

New Questions:

Was a science backed study and/or an academic literature review required prior to presenting this bill to the legislature to ensure this law protects the wellness of the people and the environments they depend upon for sustenance?

Would an Environmental Impact Assessment answer all these questions before allowing development of a private industry activity with no expiry date?

Weeks after asking these questions a response was received promising answers by April 28th. Still waiting. Although no county representative has responded to my questions via email, there has been an agenda item setup for the July 18, 2023 council meeting to respond in person. If anyone has further information on any of the questions posed or additional questions please come to the July 18th County of Lac Ste. Anne Council Meeting

at 10:15 am where our county representatives will have either answers or require assistance in answering some of the many questions related to Community Wellness.

The hope is that by sharing this information and the unknown we can work together to ensure our political and administrative decisions have positive impacts on today's children and their grandchildrens' grandchildren.


