CONFIRMED HEPATITIS A CASE PROMPTS PUBLIC ALERT IN EDMONTON ZONE

Services Alberta Health (AHS) has confirmed a case of hepatitis A in a food handler working at a McDonald's in Nisku (301 20th St.).

Patrons who consumed food or drink from this location between June 20-23, 2023 from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. and June 24. 2023 from 7 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. may have been exposed to hepatitis A.

"While we believe the risk to the public is low, hepatitis A is a serious infection," says Dr. Christopher Sikora, Medical Officer of Health, AHS - Edmonton Zone.

out of the way of municipalities so that they can build houses. We will tie Federal Infrastructure Funding to the number of homes being built. By doing so, Conservatives will bring down the cost of housing while also creating jobs.

Environmental Public Health inspectors.

Hepatitis A is an infection of the liver caused by a virus. Individuals primarily contract hepatitis A through direct contact with an infected person; however, individuals can also contract the illness indirectly by ingestion of contaminated food or water. If an infected individual does not properly wash his/her hands after using the washroom, the virus can be transmitted through food and beverages prepared by the infected individual.

Illness can occur within 15 to 50 days after exposure to the virus, but usually does so within 28 to 30 days. Individuals can be infectious one to two weeks before symptoms occur until at least one week after the onset of illness.

Symptoms of hepatitis A may include: tiredness; poor appetite; nausea and vomiting; abdominal pain and fever; followed by dark-coloured urine, light-coloured stools, and yellowing of eyes and skin several days later. Some people, especially young children, may get hepatitis A infection without noticing any symptoms; however, they are still infectious to others.

Individuals who develop such symptoms between July 1, 2023 and August 13, 2023 are advised to immediately contact Health Link at 1-866-301-2668.

Individuals who have had hepatitis A infection in the past or who have previously received an appropriate series of hepatitis A vaccine are not at risk of infection.

There is no specific treatment for hepatitis A, but it can be prevented through immunization. For more information visit Hepatitis A (HAV) Vaccine.

Only those who visited Mc-Donald's on the dates and times listed above are considered potentially exposed. Those who meet the criteria can call Health Link at 1-866-301-2668 to book an immunization appointment during the following days & times. In this instance, a prophylaxis vaccine will protect those at risk of infection against this exposure.

CENTRAL ALBERTA DISTRICT RCMP CRIME REDUCTION UNIT ARREST AND CHARGE REPEAT OFFENDER

On June 22, 2023, at approximately 8:30 a.m., officers of the Crime Reduction Unit were conducting proactive checks on prolific property offenders in the area of Buck Lake. Officers observed a pickup truck matching the description of a vehicle reported stolen and previously fleeing from police. After initiating a traffic stop, the driver fled, however, he was later arrested at a property near Winfield.

A search warrant was executed at a related property in Wetaskiwin County where several items, including those reported stolen from Winfield Fire Department, were recovered or seized, including:

• Hydraulic pump system and hydraulic hoses used in a "Jaws of Life" rescue system

• Makita gas-powered cut off saw

Stolen Dodge truck
 Stolen holiday
 trailer

• 3.5 ounces of suspected methamphetamine

• A machete Murlin Scott Becker (40),

a resident of Buck Lake, has been charged with numerous offences, some of which include:

• Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose



After a judicial interim release hearing, Becker was remanded into custody and will be appearing in Alberta Court of Justice in Breton on July 26, 2023.

Winfield Fire Chief Barry Clarkson states, "Not only has this impacted our ability to provide life-saving rescue services since this equipment went missing, the re-certification process for the bit of gear that was recovered will take time. Most of us are volunteers, so the frustration with acts like this, especially when it complicates our ability to conduct rescue operations, is significant."

GOLF COURSES MANAGE PESTS TO PROTECT THEIR TURF

Golf courses are valuable green spaces in many communities, and the sport is enjoyed by Canadians of all ages.

We want our favourite course to be healthy, but this requires a lot of attention. Despite best efforts, sometimes golf courses are affected by pests. These can include turf diseases like dollar spot and snow mould, which affect normal growth of grass and can cause significant turf loss, according to experts. Turf insects feed on the grass and can inflict severe damage. Weeds are also a threat, because they compete with grass for moisture and affect the playability of a course.

To control pests, golf courses practice integrated pest management, using the right tool at the right time to treat an infestation. This includes pesticides, which are regulated by Health Canada to ensure they are safe and effective in controlling the pests they are designed to target. They help maintain healthy vegetation and playing surfaces, and also offer many environmental benefits.

Golf courses are often located in urbanized areas

and can be valuable green spaces that help preserve habitats for wildlife and waterfowl. Data show that healthy turf and trees act as natural air conditioners by producing large amounts of oxygen, while removing carbon dioxide. Did you know that healthy turf grass can sequester almost 900 kilograms of carbon per hectare each year?

HELPING KIDS IMPROVE THEIR MENTAL HEALTH IN SCHOOLS

Alberta's government is expanding mental health supports in schools to support positive mental health outcomes for children and youth.

Children and youth in Alberta deserve to be supported in improving their mental health, building resiliency and living healthy lives. As part of building Alberta's recovery-oriented systems of care, Budget 2023 provides \$4 million to expand the Integrated School Support Program (ISSP) so more young Albertans can build resilience and improve their mental well-being.

Led by the Calgary Police Youth Foundation, the ISSP offers critical supports that range from meal programs and structured physical education to after-school care and access to a mental health professional.

"When it comes to youth mental health, prevention and early intervention are critical. We're proud to partner with the Calgary Police Youth Foundation to expand mental health supports to schools across the province, where they can make a real difference in the lives of young Albertans."

"Every student deserves to go to school and experience positive mental health, which is why our government is committed to continuing to work across ministries to develop critical programming and resources to ensure that all students are supported. Programs such as ISSP, among many other government-funded mental health projects across the province, are all valuable building blocks for a student's success in and out of the classroom."

This funding is in addition to recently announced funding of \$10 million expand CASA Mento tal Health Classrooms, a classroom-based program where students with complex mental health needs individual receive and group therapy. Through this program, students are supported by a team of mental health professionals, including a therapist, psychiatrist and behavioural specialist. In total, through Budget 2023, Alberta Mental Health and Addiction is providing \$14 million to expand mental health supports in schools across the province.

"The services offered through the Integrated School Support Program mean all students have daily access to nutrition, physical education, professional mental health services, after-school care, and access to police officers who are supportive and trusted adults - all without leaving their school. The goal is to improve the social, emotional and physical well-being of students and help them thrive in every area of their lives."

The \$4-million expansion of ISSP will take place in two phases. The first phase will include expanding the program to 10 more schools in communities across the province. ISSP is expected to be available in the following schools later this spring:

•Mother Teresa School in Medicine Hat

•St. Bernadette Catholic Elementary School in Edmonton

•St. Nicholas Catholic Junior High School in Edmonton

•St. Paul School in Lethbridge


•W.A. Day Elementary School in Fort Macleod

•Wheatland Elementary School in Strathmore

While ISSP focuses on prevention and early intervention, children who need additional help will be referred through 211 to other services in their community. Alberta's government recently doubled funding for 211, from \$7.5 million to more than \$15 million over three years, to meet growing demand and introduce specialized navigation supports that provide families with referrals to critical community-based supports, including mental health and addiction services, primary care and social services.

An additional \$2.3 million over three years has been allocated to evaluate the impact of ISSP and other child and youth mental health supports provided through the Child and Youth Health Services Initiative. The evaluation will be led by the University of Calgary's Mathison Centre for Mental Health Research and Education, and findings will inform and improve the delivery of mental health services for children, youth and families across the province.

Budget 2023 secures Alberta's future by transforming the health care system to meet people's needs, supporting Albertans with the high cost of living, keeping our communities safe and driving the economy with more jobs, quality education and continued diversification.
