# CYANOBACTERIA (BLUE-GREEN ALGAE) ADVISORY ISSUED FOR NAKAMUN LAKE

Submitted by Alberta Health Service

Cyanobacteria (bluegreen algae) has been identified in the waters of Nakamun Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from

this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake). As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Nakamun Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will

# Cyanobacteria (Blue-Green Algae) Advisory Issued For Nakamun Lake

not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria.

An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz, or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/ or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.


People who come in contact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water containing cyano-

bacteria may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Nakamun Lake, until further notice.

Please note that waters of Nakamun Lake in which the cyanobacterial bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Health Advisory is in place.





# BEEFING UP ACCESS TO CAPITAL FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is ensuring the province's cattle sector can continue to grow and remain competitive.

Beef is Alberta's biggest agri-food export and raising loan limits will ensure the province's cattle producers are able to continue producing the world's best beef.

Amendments to the Feeder Associations Guarantee Regulation give feeder association members more options to purchase and market livestock and to generate better cash flow for their operations.

The changes raise individual and joint membership loan limits, excluding advances, to \$3 million from \$2 million.

"Feeder associations are an essential part of Alberta's livestock industry and are a proven way to support new entrants in primary agriculture. These amendments ensure thousands of producers across the province have access to the capital they need to keep producing Alberta's world-renowned beef."

Cattle prices have increased 25 per cent since the start of the year and are expected to keep rising. Alberta's livestock producers are in greater need of easily accessible, low-interest capital backed by a government guarantee.

Made up of local livestock producers, feeder associations take in cattle and sheep and feed them to get them to market weight before shipping them for processing. Alberta's Feeder Associations Loan Guarantee Program helps local, producer-run cooperatives get competitive financing to ensure they can continue being a player in the global market.

"These changes will help to ensure continued sustainable growth in Alberta's livestock feeding sector, providing much-needed support to our existing feeder members while making this capital-intensive business more viable and accessible to new entrants and young farmers in the current market environment."

tions Guarantee Program's overall loan guarantee limit increase to \$150 million.



The popularity of the sport began to spread throughout the world from Great Britain. The first permanent golf club in North America was founded in 1873 and was named Canada's Royal Montreal Club. The first 18hole course in the United States was The Chicago Golf Club.

I want to thank you for taking the time to read this little article, truth be told it's because that you have, that I am back in the saddle again as the MLA of Lac Ste Anne - Parkland, and that we have a conservative government in office. This little paper gives me a chance for us to connect as the reader and the writer on personal terms. Unfiltered, a little rough around the edges sometimes, but with honesty, and with mutual respect and trust. I was taken aback by how many folks I've ran into over the last year, and especially during the campaign that told me they got to know who I was as a person through this article, not what the mainstream outlets may have said. Further to that, because they knew me, they were far less concerned about what the onslaught of adds were saying about the leader of our party.

I was also very impressed to know that the readership of this paper wasn't restricted to the "Grey Hairs" (of which I am a member of, and every grey hair has been earned by the way) it also included believe it or not, teenagers. I was surprised when a mom approached me on the sidewalk as her son wanted to meet me after my speech at Onoway's 100th Anniversary, the young man of 13 years old reads the articles all the time and wanted to shake my hand. That to me, speaks volumes of what kind of a constituency we have, and the great youngsters that will be growing into amazing young men and women, who in turn

are going to make some amazing parents. It gave me hope. It also reaffirmed how important the local media, and traditional mediums are. No censorship or filtering here, just you and I, batting things back and forth, like it should be.

Being sworn back in the second time was no less special than the first, it meant more to me in several ways, because it meant that I kept my word to you, and that you trusted me to be your voice. You trusted me to represent your best understanding interests, sometimes that also meant having me let you know that I disagreed with you on what you may have asked for, but that there may be another way to get you what you need. It meant that my style was also well suited to make things happen in the Legislature on behalf of the folks in our area, and often, for a large number of Albertans. Your voice matters, what matters to you ultimately can help others, because it's often-impacting others the same way, however they may not speak up, and if I don't know about it, I can't help fix it. Let's keep the dialogue going.

We are going to be having some town halls in the next couple of weeks to discuss the wildfires, and some of the not so wild fires that could have or should have been prevented. I want to make sure that we have a constructive meeting, try to park the emotions outside so that we can get the good, the bad, and the ugly on the table and we can make some real changes. A post incident lessons learned. You have my commitment that the folks we bring to the table are of the

same mindset, and we will fix what didn't work. I ask that folks understand that we may not have all the answers as we are still working through a number of details, but we will get back to you in a timely manner.

Prior to the election, I had met with a number of seniors in our various lodges, homes, and even at the coffee shops. There were a number of items that were brought up that are not directly in my wheelhouse, but I met with the folks that it was. It will take some coordinating, but we can make some real hands on changes to make sure we address items you brought to my attention. One will be a "Silver Trail" that allows for better access to the amenities, and services in the town. Another will be to spool up a program that takes on successes of a course that has been running for years out in Wildwood and replicating in several other schools. The course will include grade 6 class students and seniors together working on projects. Think of it as a bridge between the generations and hands on learning, only someone who has been there and done that can simplify. Unfortunately, not every kid has a grandparent that is close at hand, and it goes the same for our seniors not having grandkids close. I'd like to see that the "Silver Trail" maintenance, improvements, and even some of the nice spots along the way include students' assistance. More to follow on that as we work out the details with the school board, principals, teachers, students, the town officials, and the seniors, but I'm rather excited about

the program. Stay tuned.

On the work front, I was given a few more things to manage by the Premier. I am now the Government Whip, which is basically like a Construction Manager or Project Manager dependent on your background. I was also added as the Alberta Lead for the Pacific Northwest Economic Region Foundation and allocated to the National Representative for the Council of State Governments, as well as the Midwest. Basically, it means I'll be meeting with a bunch of the elected representatives in the USA, and their trading partners to ensure that we take Alberta's story on the road, and directly to them. I'm very happy to have this ability, as Alberta, and our area has one heck of a good story to tell. I want to make sure we keep our area growing, and that folks in the south know how much of a role we have to play in the wellbeing for both of our countries.

# July 18, 2023 ALBERTA SHERIFFS SHUT PARKLAND **DRUG HOUSE**

Submitted by Government of Alberta

The Alberta Sheriffs have shut down a property in Parkland County that attracted criminal and drug activity to the area.

The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) unit of the Alberta Sheriffs obtained a court order against the owner of Lot 117 at 52318 Range Road 25 that gives investigators the authority to close the property for 90 days, starting at noon on June 22.

The community safety order, obtained in Court of King's Bench, bars people from the property until the closure period ends on Sept. 20. Crews are installing a fence around the lot and boarding up the house to prevent unauthorized access during the 90 days.

"Our government was elected with a mandate to make communities safer throughout Alberta. With support provided by the province's SCAN team, even rural areas are seeing positive changes that will have a lasting impact on the safety of their communities. We still have more work to do to improve public safety across the province, but this is a positive step forward. We value the dedication that our law enforcement shows to protecting Albertans."

The Alberta Sheriffs work with other law enforcement agencies to shut down properties being used for illegal activities. The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act gives sheriffs the authority to target problem properties through

civil enforcement.

Since its inception in 2008, Alberta's SCAN unit has investigated more than 8,000 problem properties and issued approximately 100 community safety orders. Most complaints are resolved by working with property owners to keep criminal activity out of Alberta communities.
