Surrey RCMP is relieved to update the public that the two children who were subjects of an AMBER Alert issued on July 19, 2023 have been located.

On July 29, 2023, at approximately 7:20 p.m., Surrey RCMP Serious Crime Unit identified a rural property in Edson, Alta. were the children were believed to be. The Alberta RCMP Emergency Response Team was engaged to assist and entered the property where they located the two children and three adults.

As a result of the investigation, Verity Bolton (45), a recent resident of Yellowhead County, was charged with two counts of Abduction in contravention of a custody order. Abraxas

Scherbing-Glazov (53), a recent resident of Yellowhead County, was charged with two counts of Abduction of a person under the age of 14.

On July 20, 2023, Parkland RCMP issued a missing person release looking for 37-year-old Michelle Rabbit. On July 27, 2023, Parkland RCMP responded to a repot of found human remains South of Paul Band First Nation at an abandoned lease site. The remains were taken to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner and have been positively identified as belonging to Michelle Rabbit. The manner of death has been deemed as a homicide.

The Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit currently has carriage of the continued investigation.

Additional details are not available at this time.

Michelle's family have asked for privacy during this difficult time.



Public Hearing – A Public Hearing was held for proposed Bylaw 02.23 to rezone Plan 7622234 Block 4 Lot 1 from CRD (Country Residential District) to PD (Protection District). The purpose of the rezoning is to reduce the development options for the property and to keep it as a park. The proposed Bylaw will be brought back to an upcoming Council meeting.

Cadomin Ultra Race – Council approved a Letter of Support to the Cadomin Ultramarathon, expressing support for a \$20,000 grant from Teck Resources for their event in July 2024.

McLeod Valley Flood Repair – Council approved an unbudgeted expenditure of \$80,000 to complete repairs at the McLeod Valley Recreation Area caused by the recent flooding in Yellowhead County. These expenditures will be submitted to the provincial Disaster Recovery Program (DRP) for reimbursement. If the provincial funding is not approved, these repair costs will be funded through the Community Services Reserve Fund.

Hinton Jasper Air Lease – -Council directed Administration to process a renewed two (2) year lease with Jasper Hinton Air for a 12'x 12' office space with non-exclusive use of terminal facilities at the Hinton-Jasper Airport with a yearly value of \$12,660.00 for rent.

Bridge Tender – Council awarded the 2023 bridge rehabilitation and maintenance contract to Bridgemen Services Ltd in the amount of \$910,245.00. The tender includes one capital bridge project and maintenance on five other bridges. ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER

Those Golfers rejoice! dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.

With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjustable driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have

an entirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. Engineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into the air. Adjustable drivers can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory.

According to data from

golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put adjustments into their own hands, it is still advisable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.

Government has no greater duty than keeping people safe – especially children and youth.

When it comes to protecting Albertans from harm, ending human trafficking is a critical priority for our United Conservative government.

Human trafficking is a serious crime that exploits people of all ages and genders. It destroys lives and causes generational trauma. But fighting human trafficking can be challenging, as victims are often forced into silence and secrecy.

In order to effectively fight human trafficking in our province, our United Conservative government created the Human Trafficking Task Force. Chaired by Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame artist and internationally recognized humanitarian Paul Brandt, the Human Trafficking Task Force consisted of passionate Albertans who are dedicated to fighting human trafficking and supporting survivors. The Human Trafficking Task Force presented our government with a series of recommendations, designed to prevent and combat human trafficking and support human trafficking survivors in our province. We have accepted and are moving to implement those recommendations.

The first recommendation we are moving on is to invest \$4 million over two years to establish the Alberta Office to Combat Trafficking in Persons. This office will facilitate the implementation of the remaining Human Trafficking Task Force recommendations. Organizations such as #NotInMyCity, Native Counselling Services of Alberta, and REACH Edmonton Council for Safer Communities will help setup and operate this office as community partners. Their support will be invaluable in connecting survivors and victims of human trafficking to important supports and services that will help them heal and recover from their experiences.

The Alberta Office to Combat Trafficking in Persons will also work to enhance public awareness and establish a more effective data collection process. This data will monitor the effectiveness of service delivery and help close the gaps in tracking cross-jurisdictional human trafficking incidents.

In response to this investment, Mr. Brandt recently said, "This milestone wouldn't be possible without the countless organizations and individuals who shared their experiences and expertise in our journey with Alberta's Human Trafficking Task Force. Combating human trafficking requires collective action, and we applaud the province for taking a collaborative approach with the community."

Our United Conservative government remains committed to fighting human trafficking in every corner of the province. Human trafficking is a serious crime that violates the freedoms and rights of individuals, including children and youth, and attempts to destroy all personal identity and relationships. No community in Alberta is immune to the scourge of human trafficking, and we must all work together to prevent and combat this heinous crime.

As Premier Danielle Smith recently said, "We can't afford to close our eyes to the problem of human trafficking. And we can't afford to ignore those who are at risk of being trafficked or those who have been trafficked. CANADIAN GRAIN COMMISSION REPEALS GRADING CHANGES

• Canada Western Red Spring (CWRS)

• Canada Western Hard White Spring (CWHWS) • Canada Western Extra Strong (CWES)

• Canada Western Soft White Spring (CWSWS)

• Canada Northern Hard Red (CNHR)

The alignment of total foreign material tolerances for Canada Western Amber Durum (CWAD) is also being repealed.

Changes to the tolerances announced in the Canada Gazette, Part II on July 19, 2023, will be repealed as soon as possible.
