CYANOBACTERIA (BLUE-GREEN ALGAE) ADVISORY ISSUED FOR MATCHAYAW (DEVIL'S) LAKE

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Cyanobacteria (bluegreen algae) has been identified in the waters of Matchayaw (Devil's) Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

•Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms. If

contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

•Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

•Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

•Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Matchayaw (Devil's) Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the

toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz, or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water

Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Matchayaw (Devil's) Lake, until further notice.

Submitted by Government of Alberta

As of August 1, Albertans can represent themselves more effectively in civil claims court matters and save time and money on legal costs.

To make the civil claims process simpler and more cost effective, Albertans can now file civil claims of up to \$100,000 in the Alberta Court of Justice. This change is an increase from the previous limit of \$50,000 and the first time in nine years that Alberta's government has increased the civil claims limit. Albertans will continue to have the option to pursue their civil claim at the Court of King's Bench of Alberta.

This will make the civil claims process easier for Albertans to navigate compared to the Court of King's Bench of Alberta. The Alberta Court of Justice currently handles about 10,000 civil claims annually. It is highly accessible to Albertans, with 72 locations across the province.

"This increase to the civil claims limit will make the justice system more affordable and accessible for Albertans. Our government is committed to a more effective justice system in Alberta and this is another positive step in that direction."

The higher civil claims limit will free up time in the Court of King's Bench of Alberta, as it means more matters can be heard in the Alberta Court of Justice.

"The Alberta Court of Justice has grown and evolved to meet the changing needs of Albertans. This increase reflects that evolution and our increased capacity as a forum for resolving civil disputes. This change empowers the court to handle a broader range of civil cases, easing the burden on higher courts and reducing delays in the judicial process."



and stop most of the mines in production, let alone approve any new ones. Farming was not a desired industry as well on any sizable scale, depending on the regions, because land should be used in better ways, like putting up more windmills and solar panels to plug in electric vehicles.

It was an educational conference; I can assure you. I cannot tell you who I spoke with or what was said in a number of the executive meeting rooms, but let's just say your outspoken MLA had a few things to share with his new colleagues at the table about how and why he got into politics. The harsh realities that would be encountered with the proposition that was laid out before us if we didn't face some real word truths. I can share with you that a number of those that hail from the left coast regions were somewhat gob smacked, and the others from similar regions and backgrounds as ours were shaking my hand and thanking me for speaking up. We have reached a point where we need to stand up and say

the emperor has no clothes, and that chicken little is indeed overacting to the sky is falling.

I'm not suggesting that we need to stay static, but we need to really step up and play our part, be assertive, be respectful, and when the others are running around in circles, sidestep them and get on with addressing the real problems. Digging in and coming up with the solutions, and then executing the plan.

At the start of the conference, only a handful knew about our economic corridor model. When we left, there was a spot designated for me to present at the winter conference, and a panel that is going to be dedicated to the subject at the next annual conference. Included in the discussion will be the evolution of the fast tracking of projects within the corridors that meet the national and North American interest. Time to get back to the period where common sense and the common interest thrives.

So, what does this mean on the home front? Well simply put, it means leading by example. Looking at our own back yards and seeing what has become so cumbersome that it just does not make sense any longer. It means making a safe place again where folks can have good conversations and debates without being so darned hyper partisan or political polarized. We need to park the local politics, get back to getting things done for the good of others, and with that, the windfall for ourselves. It means identifying the elements which are dividing us, and parking them, so that we can work on the problems that are real. As one expert put it, rather than trying to change the weather, imagine how much more effective you would be if you simply planned for the weather.

On the home front we are going to be having some town halls to talk about where we are at regarding the fore season we just went through. We need to openly talk about what worked, what didn't, and how we can address some of the items that we need to. Not finger pointing, but problem solving. I honestly believe there are a number of process and procedural items that need to be addressed so that we are all in better shape the next time something like this happens.

Our office will be selling some "Made in Alberta, Strong and Free" flags as well as some artwork prints to help a number of folks who were impacted by the fires and had challenges with insurance. We also want to explore some options that may be out there through Habitat for Humanity, or any other such organizations so that we can help folks get back up on their feet sooner than later. It is community coming together to help one another that makes the most meaningful impact.



Submitted by Government of Alberta

With the country experiencing an unprecedented wildfire season, the Government of Canada is urgently mobilizing to help support communities and the people who live in them. This includes help for Canadians and for people who are crucial to the rebuilding effort.

Today, the Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, announced special measures for people who have been impacted and need to replace vital documents or to extend or restore their status in Canada.

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) will issue free replacement documents for Canadians, permanent residents and temporary residents directly affected by the wildfires. These include permanent resident cards, Canadian citizenship certificates, Canadian passports and other travel documents that are lost, damaged, destroyed or inaccessible due to wildfires.

International students, temporary foreign workers and other visitors who have been directly affected by the wildfires and whose status will expire by September 30, 2023, will also be eligible to apply, restore or extend their status in Canada free of charge. This means that temporary workers who are unable to work because their workplace is closed due to the fires don't need to worry - they'll be able to extend their status and stay until their workplace reopens. In addition, international students can extend their study permits if their classes are delayed or cancelled and finish their studies without penalty.

These special measures will be in effect until September 30, 2023. They give Canadians, permanent residents and temporary residents time to sort out documents or temporary status issues, so they can focus on what matters most right now: their families, their homes and their communities.



9 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR GOLF GAME

Warmer weather sends scores of golfers to their favorite courses each and every day. Golf is a challenging pastime, but a few pointers can help golfers hone their short games, long games and everything in between.

Choose the right clubs. There is more to selecting clubs than pulling any old iron out of your golf bag and whacking away. Wind, hazards and obstructions in landing areas should influence your decision of which club to use. Novice golfers may want to rely on their caddies to make club recommendations, and as they become more confident in their abilities they can start to make their own choices.

• Anchor your feet. Anchor your foot behind the ball to drive the ball further. Right-handed players will keep the right foot anchored, and lefties will do the opposite. Do not lift your foot prematurely; otherwise, you can lose power and distance.

Identify your weak-

nesses. As with any hobby, identifying those areas that need the most work can help you become a better golfer. Keep track of each shot you take, and then look at the results to see which areas of your game need the most work.

• Fix your alignment. Align your shots by assessing the target from behind the ball. Then set the clubface behind the golf ball and align it with the target before you enter your stance.

power. The torso is essential to a solid swing. Practice rotating from your core to control your backswing and then maintain the same spine angle and posture on the downswing.

Use the wind. Not every golf game will be played in perfect weather. A good player knows how to make adjustments for the wind depending on the shot. Use the wind to your advantage when you can, and adjust your swing when hitting into the wind.

Become a better chipper. Many players put so much emphasis on their backswings and putt shots that they fail to devote any practice to chips. All shots are important for golfers trying to shed strokes off of their scores.
