



We want singers interested in joining the Lac Ste. Anne Community Choir!

If you love to sing (whether or not you've ever been part of a choir) you're welcome! Even if you haven't sung for many years, your voice hasn't forgotten how. Both men and women are needed to round out this popular choir.

The choir has been performing since 2011, and most pieces are four-part harmonies. Well-known and popular selections are balanced by newer, and lesser-known, songs. Our members travel from Mayerthorpe, Edmonton, Onoway, Wabamun, Sangudo, Alberta Beach, and rural areas in between to sing

with us. Some have musical training and background, but most do not. Many don't even read music.

If you don't have that musical training, mini-lessons at rehearsals help clarify musical terms used. Director Debbie Rosen regularly chooses music that challenges choir members' abilities. The weekly rehearsals are supplemented by practise at home, with each member receiving a CD containing his/her own part, making it easy to practise alone.

Joining a choir is more than just musical fun; it also provides mental and physical benefits. Studies show joining a choir can improve symptoms of Parkinson's, depression and lung disease. Other studies indicate it triggers the release of "happy" hormones such as oxytocin, thought to help lower stress levels and blood pressure. One choir member agrees. "Singing is a wonderful way to improve fitness from the inside out. It stimulates the brain."

The next season of the Lac Ste. Anne Community Choir begins Wednesday, September 6. Registration begins at 6:15 p.m. at the Heritage Centre in Alberta Beach (5012 – 49 Avenue). At 7 p.m., the first practice begins. All rehearsals are Wednesdays from 7 – 9 p.m., preparing for Christmas-season concerts. If you're a bit hesitant, try the choir for two consecutive weeks with no obligation.

Membership is just \$75 per session (September to December; January to May), with a discount for multiple family members. To keep fees low, we ask that members also help on periodic fundraising projects.

CUTTING RED TAPE FOR EMPLOYERS

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise the launch of the Recognized Employer Pilot (REP) under the Temporary Foreign Worker (TFW) Program. REP is a three-year initiative that will help to address labour shortages and reduce the administrative burden for repeat employers participating in the program who demonstrate a history of complying with program requirements.

Under REP, eligible employers will gain access to Labour Market Impact Assessments (LMIAs) that are valid for up to 36 months, while also benefitting from a simplified LMIA application, should they need to hire additional workers from the same occupation during the Pilot.

This will help employers better plan for their staffing needs and reduce the number of different LMIAs they need to submit over three years. Recognized employers will also benefit from a Job Bank designation that shows their recognized status to prospective workers.

To participate in REP, employers must have a minimum of three positive LMIAs for the same occupation over the past five years from a list of occupations that have been designated as in-shortage based on Canadian Occupational Projection System data. These employers will be subject to a more rigorous upfront assessment process based on their history and track record with the program, ensuring that REP targets employers with the best recruitment practices.

REP will be rolled out in two phases: first, primary agriculture employers will be able to apply starting in September 2023, while all other employers will be eligible to apply in January 2024. Employer applications for REP will close in September 2024.

REP is one measure being launched alongside a series of other initiatives aimed at improving the TFW Program.



QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

Q. When are schools open in August to register my children?

A. Families can register online for school on the website at any time. As of Monday, August 21st, school staff are also ready to assist.



Q. How do I register my child for the bus?

A. It is now mandatory that all new and returning students requiring transportation must register each year but we made it easy for you! Just go to our website at www.gypsd.ca and click on the school bus icon on the top right corner. Then click on the green box 'school bus registration'. Please note that students will not be assigned a seat on the bus in September unless all current and past fees are paid in full. There is also a change in eligible ridership distance for September - check it out!

Q. What special services are provided by GYPSD?

A. GYPSD's inclusive education system builds upon students' strengths to achieve their fullest potential using targeted and specialized supports to meet their individual needs. Families should contact their school principal to learn more.

Q. Does GYPSD offer Alternative Programming?

Q. Do we need to still self-screen for health symptoms every day?



45 YEARS YOUNG: IS IT A SINKING SHIP?

I would like to thank everyone in the Summer Village of Seba Beach and the surrounding Parkland County area that welcomed me into the community, into the library, and into your lives.

I have 25 years experience working in libraries of all types, including Concordia University and several public libraries, and was excited by the collaborations that have already taken place since January, and that there was great hope for more.

This community and its library world are unique in its geography, surrounded on most sides by Parkland County and its residents. The ability to offer services to its year-long and summer residents who have their main residence elsewhere, provides the village and the library a wonderful opportunity to serve, engage, and offer programs options, including the Summer Reading Program.

Public libraries are gov-

erned by volunteer library board members, which includes a member of the municipality's council. The library board is accountable to municipal council. and to all citizens of the municipality and provincial government. In accordance with the Libraries Act of Alberta, library board meetings are open to the public. Any member of the public may attend a board meeting to get to know the local representatives that are responsible for the administration, operations, and budgets of their library.

Seba Beach library would like to remain autonomous, rather than become one of the Parkland County libraries, which has provided funding to the library for many years. Serving both Summer Village and Parkland County patrons, funding cuts have been taking place to the Seba Beach Library, and services may be further diminished if more funding is not received. As the funding is unpredictable, so too, is job security for staff that works at the library. Perhaps it is time for the Village of Seba Beach to partner with Parkland County Libraries to ensure its continued operations.


Seba Beach Public Library has the capacity to be a much better library than it is now. This library board, with members that have been part of the board much longer than they should be, and with an obvious dislike of certain aspects of the community, should re-evaluate their participation and take a step back to field interest from other, more community-minded members.

After careful thought and consideration, I have submitted my resignation as the Library Manager to the Summer Village of Seba Beach Administration and its Library Board. I find this board very disjointed in their leadership and communication methods, lacking fully engaged conversations in interactions that have not been based on trust or respect of my library experience.

I encourage you, as members of this community that you so passionately work

and advocate for, to communicate with your library board members in the spirit of understanding and support of the services you deserve from your community library.

Warm regards to all of you that make this community truly unique. You hold a special place in my heart.





EARTH-FRIENDLY TIPS FOR AUTUMN

Autumn is upon us, and with the change of seasons comes the fall to-do list that must be completed before the arrival of winter weather. Many outdoor jobs are best completed before temperatures drop, while others can be tackled indoors to help save energy and prepare for increased time spent inside the home.

Outdoor cleanup

Autumn means leaves are falling from trees and littering landscapes. Cleaning up leaves can be a time-consuming task, but it's necessary to promote the health of lawns and other plants. Grass that is completely matted down with leaves can become starved for light and moisture, and lawns may even rot when forced to spend winter beneath fallen leaves.

One eco-friendly timesaver is to shred leaves with a mower (a manual mower is preferable) and leave them as topdressing for the lawn. As long as the grass blades can be seen within the leaves, the lawn should be fine. Shredded leaves will decompose and add necessary nutrients and organic matter to the soil naturally.


Leaves also can be used in annual flower and vegetable gardens to improve the soil. Mulch made from shredded leaves can be placed on the soil around trees and shrubs. This helps to reduce weed problems and protects root systems from harsh temperature fluctuations.


Clothing donations

It's time to pack away summer clothing and once again fill closets and drawers with sweaters and jeans. Before packing away your summer wardrobe, conduct an inventory to determine if there are any items you no longer use. Donate these items or use them as rags when cleaning.

Keep some shortsleeved shirts accessible so you can layer them under sweatshirts

and sweaters. The heat from layering will be trapped against your body and keep you cozier, reducing your reliance on HVAC systems to stay warm.

Home repairs

Check the roof for any missing shingles. In addition, look for spots where animals or insects may be able to gain entry into your home. Seal these areas and repair any leaks. This will make your home more efficient later on when win-

ter hits its stride.

Remove window air conditioners for the winter. If they can't be removed, seal them with caulking or tape and cover them with an airtight, insulated jacket. If you have forced-air systems, move furniture away from the vents so that air can flow better around the home and keep it comfortable.

Check weatherstripping around windows and doors and make the necessary adjustments. Installing additional in-

sulation also can help reduce energy consumption.

Do not use metal scourers or coarse abrasives on the stainless steel because such products may scratch the steel. Steel wool pads can leave behind a residue of small metal particles that may eventually rust.

· Baking soda mixed with a little dish soap can be used to remove some tough dirt and stains. Rinse well and towel dry to avoid streaking.

· Clean and wipe the steel in the direction of the "grain." Usually this means working from the top of the appliance and moving down toward the floor.

Consult with the owner's manual before undertaking any maintenance or cleaning. The appliance may have a special coating over the stainless steel to help protect it, and it's best to know what you're dealing with before getting your hands dirty.

· If you will be trying a cleaning product or scouring method, always test it first in an inconspicuous spot to see if it is effective or harmful.

· Julien, a leader in commercial kitchen equipment, recommends applying cleansers with a soft cloth or sponge. Then wipe dry with a soft, clean cloth or allow to air dry.

Stainless steel remains a popular material in kitchens for sinks and appliances. With care, stainless steel can look like new for years to come.



In fact, golf can be quite demanding, and beginners would be wise to heed a few tips before hitting the course.

* Don't commit to an expensive set of clubs right off the bat. Golf clubs can be very expensive, so beginners should buy an affordable secondhand set of clubs so they can get the hang of what they like before spending a lot of money. Visit a pro shop and explain that you are just a beginner. The shop will likely make some valuable suggestions and might even let you try out a pair of clubs. In addition, many driving ranges allow customers to rent clubs, and this can be a great and inexpensive way to find the right clubs for you.

* Take lessons. Even the very best at self-teaching might find it extremely difficult to become a self-taught golfer. When first trying your hand at golf, take some lessons and don't expect to be playing 18 holes any time soon. Before hitting the course, where you might be discouraged and you might frustrate those golfing behind you, learn the fundamentals by taking a few lessons at the driving range. Learn from a professional, who won't offer you any hidden secrets to golfing glory (there aren't any) but will offer sound advice on the game's fundamentals.

* Take the game home with you. Beginners can even take advantage of golf's vast popularity by taking the game home with them. This doesn't mean building a putting green in your backyard. Rather, purchase some instructional DVDs to learn the game during your down time throughout the week. Many golfers don't have time to hit the links during the week, but they do have time to watch some DVDs when they get home from work. Such instructional DVDs can help you master your grip and stance, which you can then take with you to the course over the weekend.

* Have fun. Golf is a fun game; it just takes time to hone your

skills. But even if you aren't ready for the professional tour after your first few rounds, you can still have fun. Don't let some beginner's frustration, which every golfer experiences, ruin the fun of the game. Take note of your surroundings when you hit the links, and appreciate the time you're spending with your group. If the game becomes more a source of frustration than fun, then take a break and put in some more work away from the course, be it at the driving range or studying at home.
