### SCOUTING CANOLA FIELDS IN YELLOWHEAD COUNTY FOR CLUBROOT

Submitted by Yellowhead County

2023 Clubroot Scouting will occur in Yellowhead County from approximately August 28th - September 30th.

Yellowhead County, AB (August 9, 2023) - With fall approaching it is time once again to remember that clubroot has been detected in

Yellowhead County. Clubroot is a soil-borne disease that reduces yields of cruciferous crops such as canola, mustards, and some vegetables.

The disease causes galls or clubs to form on the root systems of infected plants which then restricts the nutrient and water uptake of the plants reducing the yields of crops. The higher

rate of the infection of clubroot in the soil, the more severe the yield loss in the crop will be. In 2015, new clubroot pathotypes were confirmed in the Edmonton region that are able to overcome resistant varieties of seed



this disease in canola and other Brassicaceae fields throughout Yellowhead County from approximately August 28th - September 30th. Scouts will be taking all possible preventative measures to limit the spread of the disease.

The primary way this disease spreads is by soil movement from infected fields to non-infected fields. This may be done by soil falling off of farm machinery, vehicles, and off-highway vehicles. It may also be spread

by wind and water erosion. Equipment sanitation is essential to preventing establishment of clubroot.

Rotation of crops is highly recommended to prevent the severity of clubroot in ones fields. Continuous cropping of canola may increase the likelihood and severity of infection. There are no treatments currently available for clubroot infected fields/plants so prevention practices are highly recommended. Some things you can do to prevent establishment of clubroot as:

· Check fields regularly and

look for abnormalities such as galls and/or clubs on roots, premature ripening, and/or wilting plants

- · Sanitize machinery, vehicles, and equipment before moving in to a new area with a solution of 1% bleach and 99% water

### CIB Lends \$15 Million Towards Infrastructure Upgrades At Enoch Cree Nation Reserve

is providing a \$15 million loan to support the Enoch Cree Nation Arena Road Rebuild Project in partnership with Enoch Cree Nation, Yekau Lake Settlement Trust, and River Cree Development Corporation. Through the financing partnership, the main transportation artery within the Enoch Cree Nation reserve will be paved and upgraded to include pedestrian crossings and a new multi-use pedestrian trail.

The enhanced seven kilometres of the road will connect the village core area to the economic hub of the community and future on-reserve developments. Once completed, the upgraded access road, street lighting and pedestrian

safety features will support community well-being, enable economic development and offer safer commuting for all users.

Throughout construction, community members will benefit from valuable training and employment opportunities, which will create capacity within the community. The project expands Enoch Cree Nation's in-house civil construction and maintenance capabilities, allowing the First Nation and its band-owned contracting company to perform and deliver on future larger civil projects. A crew of over 30 Indigenous employees - from Enoch administration and finance, to the road construction and development crew are advancing the project.

Enoch Arena Road is being financed through the CIB's Indigenous Community Infrastructure Initiative, which lends to projects that deliver a direct benefit to Indigenous communities.

By tapping into CIB financing, Enoch Cree Nation, supported by its trust, the Yekau Lake Trust, will access affordable capital to accelerate and future-proof its community's infrastructure needs. This partnership will address the current infrastructure gap while ensuring the community can continue to invest in its many other economic and social priorities.

The project is expected to reach substantial completion by the end of 2023.



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## **HOW TO IMPROVE INDOOR AIR QUA** TY IN WINTER

Plants can improve indoor air quality by helping to remove harmful irritants from the air.

Homes tend to be stuffier in autumn and winter. As temperatures outside dip, windows are closed and air quality inside homes can suffer.

Poor indoor air quality can not only be uncomfortable, causing residents to experience headaches, dry eyes and nasal congestion, but also can be unhealthy. According to the American Lung Association, poor indoor air quality can cause or

contribute to the development of infections. luna cancer and chronic lung diseases, such as asthma.

Though it's not feasible or healthy to open windows when temperatures outside dip to near or below freezing, there are steps everyone can take to improve the indoor air quality in their homes.

· Add to your décor with plants. Plants provide both aesthetic and practical appeal to a home's interior. Houseplants can clean and purify the air in a home, helping to remove formaldehyde,



· Watch what you are lighting up. Many homeowners know that smoking indoors drastically reduces indoor air quality, putting even nonsmokers at heightened risk of developing various respiratory ailments. Homeowners concerned about the indoor air quality in their homes should ban smoking inside, no matter how low temperatures dip outside. In addition, homeowners with wood-burning stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent maintaining these features, as they can release harmful soot and smoke if they are not taken care of. candles, so keep a watchful eye on residents and guests whenever you light candles or sticks of incense. If any symptoms of allergies appear, avoid lighting any more candles or incense, waiting until you can open the windows if you want to light any again.

· Purchase an air purifier. Air purifiers are beneficial year-round, helping to remove allergens and particles from a home. High-efficiency particulate air filters, known as HEPA filters, are extreme-

ly effective at removing airborne particulates from the air inside your home.

· Pay attention to pets. Like their owners, pets tend to spend more time indoors during the winter. That means more fur and pet dander, the skin flakes in an animal's fur or hair that can trigger allergic reactions, is likely in your home during the winter than in the summer. To combat this, bathe your pets regularly in the winter, making sure to wash the animal's bedding in hot water on a weekly basis as well.

 Open the windows when possible. Winter does not typically provide many opportunities to open the windows, but you might get a few chances to let some fresh air in through the windows during winter. Make the most of these opportunities, and when possible crack the windows when you're cleaning so dust and other particles that kick up have a path outside of your home.

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### WHAT IS A SMART HOME?

Those interested in dabbling in some smart home technology and testing the waters may want to start with the following household items.



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## CALLERS GET DETAILED HELP TO ACCESS THE RIGHT SERVICE ON FIRST TRY

More than 600 calls have been fielded by the Indigenous Support Line since its launch in North Zone in June 2022.

Alberta Health Services' toll-free support line first rolled out in a phased approach, beginning in the northwestern part of the zone, with additional areas brought online in the weeks afterward.

"Indigenous clients are accessing the right service on the first try and are not left to navigate the system alone," says Donna Matier, Director, Indigenous Health, North Zone.

The toll-free Indigenous Support Line can be reached by calling 1-844-944-4744. It's staffed by Indigenous Health Link

staff, who answer callers' questions and help them to access culturally appropriate care and navigate the healthcare system.

"The Indigenous Support Line is creating a brave space where our people can speak their truth, a place where they can feel supported asking for guidance and help navigating a complex healthcare system," says Casey Eagle Speaker, co-chair of the AHS Wisdom Council.

Early numbers reveal that from its launch until the end of March this year, the line received 596 calls from the North, with nearly all calls being answered within 10 minutes. Callers received:

Referrals to AHS services and supports

Referrals to community resources, such as the Al-

berta Indigenous Virtual Care Clinic and 211 Alberta

Cultural supports and resources

Answers to their medical questions and concerns

In a follow-up survey with clients, all respondents said they felt respected and supported by the person who assisted them, and more than 97 per cent said they would use the line again – and would recommend the line to friends and family.

"The information shared with me wouldn't have been available on the Internet. It would have taken more steps. I feel like I would have been more frustrated," one survey client shared.

The line is available weekdays from noon to 8 p.m. Clients can call at any point in their healthcare journey with questions or concerns. The Indigenous Support Line more recently expanded into the South Zone on May 1, and into the Central Zone on Aug. 9.

"The support line connects individuals with someone who listens with patience, spirituality, acceptance, caring and empathy," says Cheryl Sheldon, co-chair of the Wisdom Council, which provides guidance and recommendations to ensure AHS develops and implements culturally appropriate and innovative health service delivery for Indigenous Peoples.

"Those phone conversations build a deeper understanding of the difficulties Indigenous clients face and it makes a difference, it matters to them, and they feel like they matter to AHS."

### **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

West Central Airshed Society - Councillor Lemieux was appointed to represent Council as a board member of the West Central Airshed Society. The society is one of ten provincial notfor-profit airshed societies comprised of independent, multi-stakeholder members responsible for monitoring regional air quality.

**Operations** Review Council will have a half-day planning session on September 26, 2023 for a municipal operations review to discuss Yellowhead County Council's priorities prior to the 2024 budget deliberations.

Letter of Support - A letter from Council will be sent in support of the Pembina Valley Golf Club's provincial Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) grant application in the amount of \$21,199.50. The provincial funding, which the golf club will be required to match funds, is

for several infrastructure repairs and upgrades at their facility.

Land Management and Sales - Council adopted the Land Management Policy (6100.02) and Procedure (6100.02A) and the Land Sale Policy (6100.06) and Procedure (6100.06) documents. These policies and procedures help provide fair and consistent controls and procedures when selling or leasing county-owned property.

Intermunicipal Plan Negates ASP - Bylaw 5.23, which will repeal the Hinton West Urban Fringe Area Structure Plan (ASP), was given first reading by Council. In 2019, Yellowhead County and the Town of Hinton adopted an Intermunicipal Development Plan, which supersedes the ASP, making the Area Structure Plan obsolete. A Public Hearing is scheduled for September 26, 2023.

Rezoned to Protected Area - Final reading was given to Bylaw 02.23 for the Land Use Bylaw amendment to

rezone Plan 7622234 Block 4 Lot 1 from Country Residential District to Protection District. The rezoning will reduce the development options for the Lobstick Resort property to help keep it as a park.

Evansburg Community Bulletin Board - Yellowhead County will enter into a License of Occupation with the Evansburg and Entwistle Chamber of Commerce to replace the existing community bulletin board and planter on the County's road right-of-way.

Grazing Lease - Council approved a five-year lease to Jody and Donna Karlzen for grazing purposes for the 9.07 acres of land for \$326.52 yearly. The lease opportunity was advertised in the local media.

County Waives Taxes on Residential Portion of Homes Lost in Fires - Council approved the waiver of Municipal Property Tax on the residential portion of homes for the 36 properties destroyed in the 2023 Spring Fire.

The next regular Council Meeting are September 12 & 26, 2023 at 9:30 AM. The next Governance and Priorities meeting is September 19, 2023 at 9:30 AM.



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


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
