### ALBERTA TRANSPORTATION EXPERIENCES DELAYS IN **REPAIRS TO HIGHWAY 777** BRIDGE

Earlier this year Alberta 2024 SEASONAL CAMPSITES Transportation began repair work on Bridge BF 07484 over the

Sturgeon River on Highway 777 north of Onoway. While completing the planned repairs they found damage to the girders that was not repairable.

Unfortunately, due to a backlog in replacement girders fabrication, the project has experienced delays. The girders have been fabricated and are currently under curing process before being shipped. Preparation work to pull the girder on the closed lane will commence shortly. The

On Sept. 13, 2023, at approximately 7:30 a.m., Evansburg RCMP received a complaint of two male suspects, seen breaking and entering into a lease site in Yellowhead County and stealing several batteries.

Police made immediate

patrols in the area and were able to locate two adult males who were in possession of the stolen batteries. The adult males were arrested without incident. Upon further investigation, police located several machete type weapons, along with tools commonly used during break and enters.

As a result of the investi-

gation, Dean Brendel (33), a resident of Evansburg, and Jason Pelletier (45), a resident of Onoway, have been charged with:

break and enter instruments; and

• Possession of weapons dangerous to the public.

Brendel and Pelletier are well known to police, with a history of similar types of property offences. The accused were brought before a Justice of the Peace and were remanded into custody, with a next court date of Sept. 18, 2023, at the Alberta Court of Justice in St. Albert.

# ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATES HOMICIDE IN MASKWACIS

Maskwacis RCMP received a report of a stabbing at a residence on Louis Bull First Nation. Upon arrival, RCMP and EMS located a deceased male who has been identified as 34-yearold Maskwacis resident, Daniel Adrian Johnson. RCMP arrested an occupant of the home and the Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit was deployed and took carriage of the investigation.

As a result of the investi-

gation, RCMP have charged 31-year old Maskwacis resident, Amie Lindsay Twins with, Second-Degree-Murder.

Twins was taken before a justice of the peace and remanded in custody with her next court appearance set for August 1, 2023, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Wetaskiwin.

As this matter is now before the courts further no further information will be released.

# THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA ANNOUNCES PROGRESS ON THE CANADIAN DENTAL CARE PLAN

Every Canadian deserves quality dental care, yet onethird of Canadians are unable to visit an oral health professional because they do not have dental insurance.

As such, the Government of Canada has been working extensively to improve access to dental care services for Canadians, and has reached a key step in the procurement process to administer the Canadian Dental Care Plan.

Today, the Honourable Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Public Services and Procurement, and the Honourable Mark Holland, Minister of Health, announced that an Early Work Agreement worth up to \$15 million has been awarded to Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada (Sun Life). This interim measure will enable Sun Life to undertake necessary pre-contractual work to ensure the timely launch and successful operation of the Canadian Dental Care Plan while details of the main contract are finalized. This includes work such as recruitment, information technology-related activities and business planning. The main contract is expected to be awarded in fall 2023, pending Government of Canada approval.

Once fully implemented, the Canadian Dental Care


Plan will support up to 9 million uninsured Canadians who have an annual family net income of less than \$90,000 in getting the oral health care they need, with no co-pays for those with family incomes under \$70,000. Further information on the plan, which is expected to begin rolling out by the end of 2023, will be communicated by Health Canada in the coming weeks. # HOW TO PREPARE A HOME FO ELDERLY RESIDENTS

Upon reaching retirement age, new retirees may face decisions regarding their living arrangements. Some seniors may opt to stay put, while others may want to downsize their homes to save money and relieve themselves of the burdens of maintaining larger homes.

Homeowners with an extra room to spare can convert a room on the first floor of their homes into a bedroom so seniors won't have to climb up and down stairs throughout the day. That ease of accessibility to the primary floor of the house encourages seniors to be active participants in a household. If

possible, choose an area that is close to a first-floor bathroom.

• Take steps to make bathrooms safer. The National Institute on Aging says that more than one in three seniors over age 65 fall each year, and 80 percent of those falls take place in the bathroom. Slippery tile floors can make it difficult for seniors to navigate bathrooms safely, and bathtubs and shower stalls present additional challenges. Install grab

bars on bathroom walls and next to toilets to provide support. In addition, consider installing a shower chair or bench and removable shower nozzle in the shower or tub so seniors can sit down while they bathe and rinse without having to stand up on slippery surfaces. Make sure any mats around bathtubs and sinks are nonskid to reduce the risk of falls even further.

 $\cdot$  Install an extra phone line or two. While kids

and adults between the ages of 18 and 50 may never use the landlines in their homes, many seniors still rely on traditional telephones as their primary means of communicating with the outside world. Install extra landlines in your home, including in seniors' bedrooms, so they can more readily access the phone should they fall and need to call for emergency help. Phones in seniors' bedrooms may also provide some additional privacy to seniors who don't

want to carry on phone conversations in busy areas of the home, such as the kitchen or living room. Such lines may also reduce feelings of isolation.

 Prioritize accessibility when storing items.
 When storing groceries, books, magazines, or other items seniors are likely to use, choose locations that are accessible to seniors. Avoid storing items on the top shelf of pantries, bookcases or entertainment centers, as seniors with limited mobility may not be able to reach them.

Many seniors move in with their adult children to make their golden years safer and more enjoyable and manageable. Such a change in living arrangements may necessitate some changes on the part of homeowners so they can ensure their homes are safe for seniors.

When the former Finance Minister recently introduced me to an audience as a "man who doesn't spook easy," he went on to talk about how I engaged, took on the tough jobs, and wasn't afraid to stand my ground or to stand up for others. I appreciated the introduction, and those who have known me for a while said he was on point with the intro. So, when I tell you I'm seeing a few things out there that are making me more than a little nervous, it's not because I'm the "Chicken Little" type.

The Liberal/NDP policies that have been coming into effect over the last eight years, and most recently their clean energy standards, are downright worrisome. I've gone from thinking that they are simply out of touch, to that they are hell bent on implementing an ideology that does not reconcile with reality. Arrogance and ignorance are downright scary when there is power behind it, with apparent collaborators to support it. When I hear shadows of "re-education" requirements, because the rest of us can't see their vision, warning alarms go off. Work arounds to the Constitution, not to mention the habitual constitutional overreach to bend the rest of the "non-believers" to their will, is downright spooky.

We also know what a prairie winter looks like, what it takes to keep warm, and what we have at our disposal to be used to ensure our energy supply is reliable. -35C or colder for several weeks isn't a far-off story. The Canadian Constitution clearly states that the legislation and control of resources and power generation clearly fall within the control of the provinces. So, when the current Federal Environmental minister of CN-Tower-climbing-protest-fame wants to ram through a production cap and rush us into a zero-carbon output scenario for 2035, regardless of the cost or the technical ability to comply without having energy failures, exorbitant prices, or collapsing an economy, we must ensure we do more than just speak up. We need to stand up with provincial partners and do a full stop to this lunacy. We are not going along with this dangerous policy, we can work out solutions to the technical challenges by 2050, and we can do it by using the resources we have at our disposal.


The irony is not lost on us when that same minister who is so very cozy with the Communist Party of China, who sits as number 2 on their own environmental board, for a country many consider the largest polluter on the planet, gives them a pass on anything remotely similar until 2070. The same party and country that our current PM openly admires because they can simply implement policy without all that democracy stuff getting in the way. When the former environmental minister from the Liberal party pontificates how the rest of us need to be "re-educated" because we are not drinking their Kool Aid: is it déjà vu, or simply hearing the words of the past echo in the present, when many other communist and socialist based groups garnered control of countries, and simply rammed through

their policies with beliefs that the next two generations will love them for their ideological utopia. History has yet to reveal that utopia. In every country it has failed miserably, and the death toll proves it.

The Liberal/NDP alliance, knowing full well that they at present can't coerce the provinces into giving up their constitutional authority, are doing an end around as it were. They are going to bring in a law under the criminal code, under the "Clean Energy Standards," that exclude any fossil fuels from being clean. So long natural gas, so long petroleum, so long coal. The standards would also fail to recognize any technology used to capture and store the exhaust stream or scrub the exhaust stream. So, everything goes electric.... but the major concern for us is where do we get it from if we have had our major resources taken from us? Solar and wind? It's simply unreliable. Nuclear is pricy, and for the small modular reactors, we are still decades away from having the ability for them to come online. We will pay to the tune of hundreds of billions of dollars as consumers and taxpayers to meet the ideological eutopia of our very socialist federal government and their coalition partner. As it sits in Alberta, the federal government literally would be going after private citizens and corporations directly, charging them, and putting them in jail potentially for producing reasonable and conventional electricity. You think your power bill is high now? That is considered "almost free" for what they have in mind for us, and no one reasonably would go to jail over this as a private citizen.

The other provinces have crown corporations that produce their power, paraphrasing the words of the Saskatchewan Premier, simply put he said: the feds can take him to jail if they want, they are not going along with this ill-conceived plan. So where does that put us in the Strong and Free province? What will we have to do to protect Albertans from this latest attack from "our own" federal government? Well, we may have to swing that Sovereignty within a United Canada Act, and we will of course continue at the bargaining table in good faith, but we sure as heck won't have the environmental-activist-turned-minister have us freeze in the dark while his Communist Party of China buddies get a pass for an additional 35 years. Standing up so far has been speaking up, and when we work together in collaboration with the other provinces, it seems to have worked for most of our history as a country... until now. This latest attempt to break the west, namely pointed right at us, well, it's not going to fly. This is Alberta after all, and we tend to push back hard when cornered.

Here are some of the steps taken by previous administrations in other countries to take control of a population, and to minimize their ability to stand up to the "progress" of the new order. Tank the economy, drive up inflation, cause food and energy security issues. Hinder or limit the ability for people to communicate, control the media, vilify a segment of the population, turn the general population on each other by fracturing them into segmented groups, and limit people's ability to travel. Remove the ability for the general population to have access to means to defend themselves, and ensure those that speak out are penalized or jailed. They also need to cause social disorder to help accelerate the process where the population willingly "gives control" over to the government to make everything safe again.

# **POPULAR GOLF COURSES AROUND THE WORLD**

The Masters Tournament is the first of golf's four major championships in the calendar year. Competitors tee off at the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, GA, in April 2020. Americans Tiger Woods and Patrick Reed are the two most recent Masters champions, and fans are already eager to see who earns the fabled green jacket this year.

Televised golf competitions often inspire people to hit the links. People with a passion for golf may want to check out some of the top courses in the world, as ranked by leading golf resources and experts.

Ballybunion: This Irish course was touted as "nothing less than the finest seaside course" by famed golf writer Herbert Warren Wind. The course hosted the 2000 Irish Open, but lack of other tournaments can be attributed to its remote, albeit beautiful, location

• Cypress Point: This club sits at the foothills of

the Santa Lucia Mountains at the tip of the Monterey Peninsula in California. Located in coastal dunes and on rocky coastlines, Cypress Point is often noted for its dramatic holes along the Pacific Ocean.

• Pine Valley: Located in Pine Valley, NJ, this course, which is more than 100 years old, boasts some formidable hazards with sophisticated green expanses.

• St. Andrew's: This historic course in Scotland



has hosted the Open Championship (once known as The British Open) a record 29 times. Historians believe golf originated in Scotland, and people have been playing on this course since the 15th century. Massive greens, cavernous bunkers and a brilliant layout contribute to its distinguished history.

• Shinnecock Hills: This course in Southampton, NY, is a very old club built in the tradition of Scottish courses. This was likely the inaugural American golf course design, and the Shinnecock Hills Golf Club was one of the five founding members of the United States Golf Association.

Augusta National: Home to the Masters, Augusta is considered a golf paradise by many. The sheer beauty of Augusta has made it a staple on many golfers' bucket lists, even if only a few may get to walk its fairways with club in hand.

Golf has a storied history, and that history is on display at various jaw-dropping courses across the globe.
