

The current version families are using WILL NOT automatically update to the new version of the app. Users must go to the App Store or Google Play to download the new app to receive notifications after September 29.





POPULAR GOLF COURSES AROUND THE WORLD

The Masters Tournament is the first of golf's four major championships in the calendar year. Competitors tee off at the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, GA, in April 2020. Americans Tiger Woods and Patrick Reed are the two most recent Masters champions, and fans are already eager to see who earns the fabled green jacket this year.

Televised golf competitions often inspire people to hit the links. People with a passion for golf may want to check out some of the top courses in the world, as ranked by leading golf resources and experts.

- Ballybunion: This Irish course was touted as "nothing less than the finest seaside course" by famed golf writer Herbert Warren Wind. The course hosted the 2000 Irish Open, but lack of other tournaments can be attributed to its remote, albeit beautiful, location
- · Cypress Point: This club sits at the foothills of

the Santa Lucia Mountains at the tip of the Monterey Peninsula in California. Located in coastal dunes and on rocky coastlines, Cypress Point is often noted for its dramatic holes along the Pacific Ocean.

- · Pine Valley: Located in Pine Valley, NJ, this course, which is more than 100 years old, boasts some formidable hazards with sophisticated green expanses.
- St. Andrew's: This historic course in Scotland

has hosted the Open Championship (once known as The British Open) a record 29 times. Historians believe golf originated in Scotland, and people have been playing on this course since the 15th century. Massive greens, cavernous bunkers and a brilliant layout contribute to its distinguished history.

- · Shinnecock Hills: This course in Southampton, NY, is a very old club built in the tradition of Scottish courses. This was likely the inaugural American golf course design, and the Shinnecock Hills Golf Club was one of the five founding members of the United States Golf Association.
- · Augusta National: Home to the Masters, Augusta is considered a golf paradise by many. The sheer beauty of Augusta has made it a staple on many golfers' bucket lists, even if only a few may get to walk its fairways with club in hand.

Golf has a storied history, and that history is on display at various jaw-dropping courses across the globe.



HOW TO PREPARE A HOME FOR ELDERLY RESIDENTS

Upon reaching retirement age, new retirees may face decisions regarding their living arrangements. Some seniors may opt to stay put, while others may want to downsize their homes to save money and relieve themselves of the burdens of maintaining larger homes.

But those are not the only situations seniors find themselves in. Some seniors realize they can no longer care for themselves without assistance. In such instances, seniors may opt for assisted liv-

ing facilities or choose to move in with a relative. such as a grown son or daughter. While assisted living facilities are designed to meet the needs of the elderly, young men and women welcoming seniors into their homes may need to take on some home improvement projects to ensure their homes are as safe as possible for elderly residents.

· Convert a room on the first floor into a bedroom. While this may not apply to all seniors, some men women struggle

with stairs as they age, and that can make it difficult for them to fully participate in a household. Homeowners with an extra room to spare can convert a room on the first floor of their homes into a bedroom so seniors won't have to climb up and down stairs throughout the day. That ease of accessibility to the primary floor of the house encourages seniors to be active participants in a household. If possible, choose an area that is close to a first-floor bathroom.

· Take steps to make

bathrooms safer. The National Institute on Aging says that more than one in three seniors over age 65 fall each year, and 80 percent of those falls take place in the bathroom. Slippery tile floors can make it difficult for seniors to navigate bathrooms safely, and bathtubs and shower stalls present additional challenges. Install grab bars on bathroom walls and next to toilets to provide support. In addition, consider installing a shower chair or bench and removable

shower nozzle in the shower or tub so seniors can sit down while they bathe and rinse without having to stand up on slippery surfaces. Make sure any mats around bathtubs and sinks are nonskid to reduce the risk of falls even further.

· Install an extra phone line or two. While kids and adults between the ages of 18 and 50 may never use the landlines in their homes, many

seniors still rely on tracarry on phone conver-

sations in busy areas of the home, such as the kitchen or living room. Such lines may also reduce feelings of isola-

· Prioritize accessibility when storing items. When storing groceries, books, magazines, or other items seniors are likely to use, choose locations that are accessible to seniors. Avoid storing items on the top shelf of pantries, bookcases or entertainment

as seniors with limited mobility may not be able to reach them.

Many seniors move in with their adult children to make their golden years safer and more enjoyable and manageable. Such a change in living arrangements may necessitate some changes on the part of homeowners so they can ensure their homes are safe for seniors.

Install extra landlines in your home, including in seniors' bedrooms, so they can more readily access the phone should they fall and need to call for emergency help. Phones in seniors' bedrooms may also provide some additional privacy to seniors who don't want to

Association Congress in July, the focus of which was Indigenous Education. In August, Trustees attended the Public School Board Council professional learning event in Medicine Hat, where they participated in the Blanket Exercise and visited the Saamis Tepee.

Superintendent Lewis shared highlights from her summer work, including her and members of GYPSD's Division Leadership Team attendance at the College of Alberta Superintendent's School Summer Learning Con-Superintendent ference. Lewis spoke about her appreciation for the principals across GYPSD for their work in their schools to support student growth and achievement.

All GYPSD staff will be coming together for Kick-Off 2023 on August 30th. The annual professional learning event will begin with a relevant and practical Keynote address from Dr. Shimi Kang, after which staff will spend the rest of the day in specific, targeted learning sessions created/facilitated by their team leaders to address their contextual professional development needs.

Department Heads from central services shared a few of their summer projects, including the final work done in preparation for the roll-out of the Digital Reporting platform being introduced across GYPSD's elementary schools beginning this fall and the launch of GYPSD's First Rider Program - Buddy's Grande Yellow Adventure!

Board Chair Karpluk acknowledged the date for the National Recognition of Treaty Six, pointing out the importance of treaty recognition within Truth and Reconciliation. In September, GYPSD schools will recognize Truth and

Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day to ensure past trauma and the rich histories of Indigenous peoples are taught and understood, and that Indigenous culture, language, and teachings are valued and embedded in education.

The Board Chair also acknowledged the theme for this year's Kick Off Event: We've Got Your Back. The theme reflects the Division's pride for GYPSD employees' commitment to their communities over the past year of wildfires and floods - so many GYPSD staff stepped forward to help within their communities.

GYPSD high schools will be welcoming a new member to their staff this fall - their Wellness Navigator. Wellness navigators will be working alongside administration, Family School Liaison Counselors, and other student support specialists to ensure every high school student is

supported through their academic and social/emotionaljourney.

The initiative is possible through the Mental Health in Schools Grant the Division received last spring and is a welcome addition to the Division's Pyramid of Supports.

Through their advocacy focus, the Board continues to urge the province to address gaps in services and supports for rural students and their families.




