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MÉTIS CITIZENS ELECT NEW PRESIDENT IN FIRST ELECTION FOR NEW OTIPEMISIWAK MÉTIS GOVERNMENT

Submitted by Métis Nation of Alberta (MNA)

Citizens of the Métis Nation of Alberta (MNA) have concluded voting in their first election for the Otipemisiwak Métis Government. This election marks the formal transition of MNA to the Otipemisiwak Métis Government.

In a province-wide election held from September 13-19, 2023, which included mail-in, online, and in-person voting, a total of 8,167 ballots were cast and accepted. This figure does not include ballots that were spoiled or rejected. These results are preliminary, with official results awaiting a single district recount. *Continued on Page 4*

ALBERTA RCMP EXPANDS NEW VIDEO CAMERA REGISTRY ACROSS THE PROVINCE

The Alberta RCMP are excited to announce our voluntary surveillance camera registry program, called CAPTURE (Community Assisted Policing Through the Use of Recorded Evidence) is now province wide.

Residents and businesses who have video surveillance, and are willing to share video camera footage when requested, can sign up. This initiative won't replace officers from knocking on doors, but it will help officers track down video evidence in ongoing criminal investigations in RCMP jurisdictions.

The program aims to re-

duce the time an officer needs to search for and gather video evidence when conducting an investigation. The CAPTURE program allows a person or business to upload a portion of the video requested. This allows the officer to evaluate the video footage before deciding to ask for a copy.

To get started, visit www. ruralalbertacapture.ca and create an account. From there you can enter your contact information and video cameras on the secure site. Your information is not available to the public. If an officer needs to contact you, they will do so by the information provided.

Things to know about the

program:

• This is completely voluntary and consent can be withdrawn at any time;

• Registering a camera and contact information allows the RCMP to see a list of security cameras so they can contact the owners during an investigation;


• The video footage on your camera remains your property;

• The RCMP will not have live access to your camera feed. We will only ask for videos already recorded;

• You can share your video footage through the website for an officer to view before they decide if the video will help in their investigation; and

• An officer can provide you with a USB thumb drive to copy your video. An officer can not download the video; they can only view it.

This strategy is another way the Alberta RCMP are working with our communities to help solve crime faster, together. By providing video footage to police during an investigation, communities increase the chance of a successful prosecution.

September 27, 2023 PARTNERING WITH **FIRST NATIONS TO BOOST SURGERIES**

Construction is beginning on a new chartered surgical facility on Enoch Cree Nation that will increase publicly funded surgeries and reduce wait times.

Some Albertans are waiting too long for surgeries. That's why Alberta's government launched the Health Care Action Plan to improve key areas of health care, including lowering surgery wait times. As part of the plan, the number of surgeries happening every year at hospitals and chartered surgical facilities such as the new facility at Enoch Cree Nation will be increased. The new facility is expected to open by June 2025 and will offer about 3,000 more publicly funded orthopedic surgeries per year, reducing wait times for Albertans.

"The surgical facility at Enoch Cree Nation is an innovative partnership that will reduce wait times and reflects the government's commitment to ensure Albertans have access to the care they need when they need it. We will continue the work to bring down wait times even further and deliver surgeries within the clinincally recommended time." Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Health

The facility will be one of the first built on First Nation land in Canada, and will be operated by

Enoch Cree Nation. The partnership between Enoch Cree Nation and Alberta Health Services (AHS) will support a culturally safe facility that will provide high-quality surgical care for Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.

"Today's groundbreaking marks a significant step in making this surgical facility, the first of its kind in Alberta, a reality. This is the first surgical facility to be run by a First Nation and built on their land and is an example of our government's commitment to working with Indigenous people as equal partners and an important step forward towards reconciliation in Alberta." Rick Wilson, Minister of Indigenous Relations

"This partnership is an example of reconciliation in action. Maskêkosihk is supporting the Alberta Surgical Initiative to bring additional capacity to Treaty 6 territory, address surgical wait lists for all Albertans, and ensure that the medical care we deliver together is done so in a way that respects all cultures, including First Nations people who have made this land their home for thousands of years." Chief Cody Thomas, Enoch Cree Nation

When a surgeon decides a patient needs surgery, AHS then schedules the surgery and determines whether the patient will have the publicly funded surgery at a hospital or a chartered surgical facility based on several factors, including the type of surgery.

Moving more orthopedic surgeries to chartered surgical facilities frees up operating room space in hospitals to provide more complex surgeries, which reduces wait times for these types of surgeries that require hospital care.

As a result of actions to boost the number of publicly funded surgeries happening at both hospitals and chartered surgical facilities, wait times for hip and knee replacements have significantly improved. As of June 2023, about 56 per cent of hip replacement surgeries were completed within target, compared with 41 per cent in June 2022. For knee replacement surgeries, about 49 per cent were completed within clinically

recommended time, compared with 25.5 per cent the previous year.

"Patients are at the centre of all we do and every decision we make at AHS, and we know that Albertans want more access to the surgeries they need. The new surgical facility on the Enoch Cree Nation will help us deliver more orthopedic surgeries to patients in the Edmonton region, improving access to the procedures they need and reducing their wait times." 

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

Energy bills with a smile - Concrete walls vastly reduce air infiltration as compared to wood walls, and that is the key to lower energy consumption. This saving is even more pro-

nounced, says Rector, if builders use the most advanced ICFs available. The Nudura design, for instance, combines two panels of thick (EPS) foam with the structural strength and thermal mass of concrete. The resulting envelope produces an energy efficiency rating as high as R-50 (compared to an average R-20 in wood structures) saving you up to 50 percent on your utility bills.

Temperature consistency - The outside cold air easily travels through wood-framed walls, causing thermal bridging that produces drafts and chilly spots inside your home. Walls with a solid concrete core prevent thermal bridging so even temperatures result throughout the house.

Home renovation projects can be both exciting and tricky. Do-ityourselfers are inspired by designs showcased in magazines, websites and their own communities. When DIY enthusiasts see a design they like, it's understandable that they may want to emulate these looks at home.

Remodeling is one of the larger DIY undertakings, and it goes beyond simple carpentry. Considering dem-

pry up wood slats, remove nails or remove old deckina.

Tool pouch: A tool and fastener pouch gives DIYers a place other than their pockets to store fasteners and hand tools. Pouches can be attached to tool belts for added storage capacity.

Stud finder: Invest in a more foolproof method of locating studs behind drywall then knocking on the wall. Stud finders can provide a picture of studs, pipes and other hidden items inside an entire length of wall. This is essential to driving nails where they belong and can also prevent sending

fasteners into wires or nearby plumbing.

EDMONTON, AB, Aug. 24. 2023 /CNW/ - The Canada Infrastructure Bank (CIB) is providing a \$15 million loan to support the Enoch Cree Nation Arena Road Rebuild Project in partnership with Enoch Cree Nation, Yekau Lake Settlement Trust, and River Cree Development Corporation. Through the partnership, financing the main transportation artery within the Enoch Cree Nation reserve will be paved and upgraded to include pedestrian crossings and a new multi-use pedestrian trail.

The enhanced seven kilometres of the road will connect the village core area to the economic hub of the community and future on-reserve developments. Once completed, the upgraded access road, street lighting and pedestrian safety features will support community well-being, enable economic development and offer safer commuting for all users.

Throughout construction, community members will benefit from valuable training and employment opportunities, which will create capacity within the community. The project expands Enoch Cree Nation's in-house civil construction and maintenance capabilities, allowing the First Nation and its band-owned contracting company to perform and deliver on future larger civil projects. A crew of over 30 Indigenous employees - from Enoch administration and finance. to the road construction and development crew are advancing the project.

Enoch Arena Road is being financed through the CIB's Indigenous Community Infrastructure Initiative, which lends to projects that deliver a direct benefit to Indigenous communities.

By tapping into CIB financing, Enoch Cree Nation. supported by its trust, the Yekau Lake Trust, will access affordable capital to accelerate and future-proof its community's infrastructure needs. This partnership will address the current infrastructure gap while ensuring the community can continue to invest in

its many other economic and social priorities.

The project is expected to reach substantial completion by the end of 2023. Endorsements

CALLERS GET DETAILED HELP TO ACCESS THE RIGHT SERVICE ON FIRST TRY

More than 600 calls have been fielded by the Indigenous Support Line since its launch in North Zone in June 2022.

Alberta Health Services' toll-free support line first rolled out in a phased approach, beginning in the northwestern part of the zone, with additional areas brought online in the weeks afterward.

"Indigenous clients are accessing the right service on the first try and are not left to navigate the system alone," says Donna Matier, Director, Indigenous Health, North Zone.

The toll-free Indigenous Support Line can be reached by calling 1-844-944-4744. It's staffed by Indigenous Health Link staff, who answer callers' questions and help them to access culturally appropriate care and navigate the healthcare system.

"The Indigenous Support Line is creating a brave space where our people can speak their truth, a place where they can feel supported asking for guidance and help navigating a complex healthcare system," says Casey Eagle Speaker, co-chair of the AHS Wisdom Council.

Early numbers reveal that from its launch until the end of March this year, the line received 596 calls from the North, with nearly all calls being answered within 10 minutes. Callers received:

Referrals to AHS services and supports

Referrals to community resources, such as the Alberta Indigenous Virtual Care Clinic and 211 Alberta Cultural supports and

resources

Answers to their medical questions and concerns

In a follow-up survey with clients, all respondents said they felt respected and supported by the person who assisted them, and more than 97 per cent said they would use the line again – and would recommend the line to friends and family.

"The information shared with me wouldn't have been available on the Internet. It would have taken more steps. I feel like I would have been more frustrated," one survey client shared.

The line is available weekdays from noon to 8 p.m. Clients can call at any point in their healthcare journey with questions or concerns. The Indigenous Support Line more recently expanded into the South Zone on May 1, and into the Central Zone on Aug. 9.

"The support line connects individuals with someone who listens with patience, spirituality, acceptance, caring and empathy," says Cheryl Sheldon, co-chair of the Wisdom Council, which provides guidance and recommendations to ensure AHS develops and implements culturally appropriate and innovative health service delivery for Indigenous Peoples.


"Those phone conversations build a deeper understanding of the difficulties Indigenous clients face and it makes a difference, it matters to them, and they feel like they matter to AHS."

Alberta producers can

sign up for AgriStability until September 29. The Government of Alberta and Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada have reopened the program recognizing that wildfires and extremely dry conditions have affected many farmers and ranchers since the April enrolment 30. 2023, deadline. This gives affected producers more

time to review and manage the business risks associated with these challenging situations.

In Alberta, producers sign up for AgriStability and access benefits through Agriculture Financial Services Corporation. Factors such as reduced income, increased expenses or reduced inventory are used to determine a potential

benefit.
