





- 2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.
- Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children.

- 4. Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.
- 5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.
- 6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires.

- 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.
- 8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.
- In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.



- 4. Let a staff member know that you are turning in firearms for disposal
- 5. An officer will assist you with removing the

firearms and disposing of them safely.

RECOGNIZING TRC WEEK AND ORANGE SHIRT DAY AT GYPSD SCHOOLS

The Third Annual National Truth and Reconciliation Week occurred in GYPSD schools from September 25th to 29th and was marked by important conversations including the truths of the Indigenous Treaties and the Residential School system.

Students and staff attended Round Dances, heard from Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and Storytellers, and engaged in a wide range of learning activities and experiences to deepen and

extend their understanding of the past and its impact on Indigenous peoples.

Recognized in this week is also National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day (September 30th). Orange Shirt Day recalls the experience of Residential School Survivor Phyllis Webstad, who at age six was stripped of her new orange shirt on her first day attending the St. Joseph Mission Residential School near Williams Lake, BC. The date of September 30 was chosen because it was the time of year when Indigenous children were typically removed from their families and forced to attend Residential Schools.

GYPSD is committed to highlighting the importance of these events, encouraging all staff and students to take the time to learn, reflect, and engage in conversations about truth, reconciliation, and the actions that each of us can take. Each GYPSD school found its own unique way to show support to mark this important date. We continue to show gratitude to our Elders and Knowl-

edge Keepers, our community partners, as well as our Indigenous staff, students, and their families who continuously share their voice and their stories with our staff and students and provide their counsel in relation to our programs and services.

Elder Jackie Whiford visited staff and students at both Parkland and Ecole Pine Grove campuses with Superintendent Lewis, Principal Ripkens and Assistant Principal Basaraba.





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

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ALBERTA JOINS BINATIONAL CLIMATE STUDY TRIP TO GERMANY

Submitted by Government of Alberta

MLAs Shane Getson and Garth Rowswell will travel to Germany to learn about the country's energy transition plans and how Alberta can be a strong partner.

The trip to Germany will take place Oct. 8-14. Rowswell, MLA for Vermilion-Lloydminster-Wainwright, and Getson, MLA for Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland, will join Canadian and U.S. lawmakers, and other members of the Council of State Governments (CSG) Midwestern Legislative Conference to learn about Germany's energy and climate transition.

Like other countries, Germany is struggling with an energy crisis precipitated by the war in Ukraine and a pivot away from nuclear power. While still relying

on fossil fuels, the country is planning a transition to renewables by 2050. The study trip will offer both MLAs the opportunity to gather first-hand information about Germany's energy sector and to meet with government officials and industry representatives who are implementing innovative energy policies and processes. The trip will also provide an opportunity to promote low-emitting western Canadian LNG and Alberta's energy capabilities, including hydrogen, carbon capture, utilization and storage, and technologies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
