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### FRANCHISE FEE INCREASE NOTICE

Please be advised that the Town of Onoway is proposing to increase the local access fee, which is charged to FortisAlberta Inc. (FortisAlberta) for use of municipal lands for its power lines effective January 1, 2024. The fee is recovered by FortisAlberta from its customers as the local municipal access fee on electric billings of all customers that receive electric service in the Town. This local access fee will be increased from \$7.12 (10.00%) to \$7.97 (10.50%) of the delivery charge of FortisAlberta, excluding energy related riders. This calculation is based on 640 kWh consumption in 30 days. Questions or concerns should be directed to Gino Damo, Director of Corporate and Community Services at (780) 967-5338.

### HOW DO YOU KNOW?

I was fortunate to work for some great critical thinkers in my career, many of them remain mentors of mine today. There were a couple management techniques that they had imparted on me for obtaining a level of comfort with the information being provided or presented. One gent by the name of Keith Hanson said he used the "Columbo" technique referring to an old television series that was based around a police detective, asking what seemed to be unassuming questions, that really led down the path to an "Ah Ha!" moment where the mystery was solved. The other gent was Tom Raptis who has a very simple line of questioning that gave the same result, that would allow you to dive into the information as far as you needed until you received a satisfactory answer that substantiate the information being provided. "How do you know?", that was the question, and it could be asked again and again after each answer was provided.

I continue to use that simple line of questioning today, and to ensure when I'm presenting information myself, that I can answer someone's questions if they were to ask me, "How do you Know?". What strikes me as odd and makes me highly suspicious is when I use this same method in the "Political World" that many of the people presenting their ideas when asked, how do you know, refer to "Specialists". When you ask them to name them, or if they considered other "Specialists" opinions that are counter to the opinion they believe they cannot rationally answer. Their defense is emotional, and they pivot to the "Non-Believer" tag, or suggest there is no option other than the one they are presenting. Warning alarms are going off inside my head nonstop when I hear and see this.

It pains me to observe as well that so many people have been fed so much misinformation over the years that does not pass the "How do you know?" test that they either don't believe anything, or they get comfortable and apathetic towards asking any questions. When presented with an option for an alternative, to break free of convention, and to regain their freedoms in many cases, they think that it is better to stay in the proverbial cage, because that's what they have been conditioned to do. It's known, even though the door is open, all they have to do is walk out of it, they are unable to take that step. We as Albertans, and as of

all Canadian's quite recently have had a major victory when it comes to our constitutional rights. Bill C69, was found to be unconstitutional as it has been applied by the federal government at the provincial level. In short, they have been mucking about in our provincial jurisdiction where they have had no right to do so, and I believe they knew it all along. With the recent decision, they are licking their wounds, and rather than accept they were wrong, and work with us, their environment minister

### 8 FACTORS THAT CAN AFFECT AUTO IN-SURANCE PREMIUMS

Auto insurance is a necessity for drivers in many localities. But while local laws may mandate drivers have insurance, no such laws mandate how much drivers must pay to insure their vehicles. Certain factors can influence just how much drivers will pay for their auto insurance policies.

1. Complacency: Doing nothing at all may find you spending too much on auto insurance. Many drivers fail to routinely shop around for coverage, and that can be cost-

ing them money. In its 2013 Insurance Shopping Study, the research firm J.D. Power found that only 23 percent of auto insurance customers shopped their policies in the past 12 months. Shopping around for a better rate can save drivers considerable amounts of money, and the Internet has made comparison shopping easier than ever before.

2. Coverage and deductibles: The type of coverage you choose, as well as the amount of your deductible, will affect the cost of your policy. Choosing a higher deductible (the amount you pay out of pocket before insurance will start to pay) usually leads to a lower monthly payment. Full coverage may not be necessary if you own your car or the car is old and not worth that much.

3. Location: Where you live can affect the cost of your insurance premiums. Since most traffic accidents occur close to home, the area where you live factors heavily in the cost of your policy. Densely populated neighborhoods with more cars mean you could be at a higher risk of accident, theft and injury. Plus, costs for repairs may be higher in these areas. Moving to a less populated area can reduce insurance costs.

4. Age/gender: A person cannot change his or her age, but it's wise to realize that age and gender can affect costs. Young men typically incur higher rates than

young women. Understanding your potential insurance costs can help you when choosing a vehicle.

5. Vehicle type: According to State Farm, some insurance companies increase premiums for cars deemed more likely to be damaged or stolen. A vehicle that scores high in independent safety ratings may be cheaper to insure than vehicles that scored low on safety tests.

6. Credit score: Raise

your credit score and you may be able to lower your car insurance costs. According to the research firm Conning & Co., roughly 92 percent of insurers use your credit information as a factor to determine rates. Studies show that people with bad credit tend to file more and higher claims.

7. Marital status: Statistics show that people who have tied the knot are involved in fewer accidents and given fewer tickets than people who are single. Getting married can reduce insurance premiums, as can combining or bundling policies with your spouse.

8. Driving history: A driving history full of accidents and tickets can affect your insurance rates. However, many tickets and accidents that do not involve injuries stop affecting insurance rates after three years. Driving safely and biding your time until your tickets and accidents no longer influence your rates can save you money.

Drivers have control

over how much they spend on auto insurance. Safe driving habits, the right choice of vehicle and where drivers choose to live can influence the cost of their auto insurance policies.

the event of a withdrawal were all agreed upon by the participating provinces. It's a contract, with clearly defined rules, so that the participants all know what the "rules are" and that they all are comfortable with the deal that was made. Most recently, we have released a report produced by an independent third party consultant, based on the most recent data from the fund, and applying the "Contract Formula" from the pension plan itself that Alberta's share of the entire fund accounts for a whopping 53% of the total value. This is realistically the conservative number of the value, middle of the road as it were. What jumped off the page for me, is that if you look at the percentage of the contributing population that we have in the fund, we as Albertans only account for 15% of the total number of people paying into it. That is staggering when you think of it, and no wonder

why fancy socks and all of his supporters are shaking in their well-polished shoes. The golden goose may just decide to move on, cash out, and then they will have to pull up their own socks and dig in.

As recent as yesterday, I had a conversation with a lady who asked simply what is in it for her if Albertans choose to leave the CPP? She asserted we would be stuck in court, the PM would never "allow" us to change, that we wouldn't be able to manage the 223 billion dollars that belongs to Albertans. When I advised her of the report, of the rules and framework of the fund has a provision of giving notice, not seeking permission she was taken aback. When I advised that we have the option of just using the same management firm, but they would report to Alberta rather than Ottawa, and save Albertans 5 billion a year in management fees etc., she was taken aback. When I advised from those savings we could

have a higher payout of benefits, and a lower contribution rate, she was taken aback. When she asked why wasn't this in the news, I advised it was, but we have to pay for the advertising, we made the report available, and I asked if she had read it? The answer was no, and that we needed to simplify the messaging, and get the word out to people in a better way.

I have taken that to heart, and we will be having hybrid town halls to talk about this, and any other emerging items. Through my weekly article I will continue to provide the links to the information so that you can find out for yourself what the real deal is on this. The challenge that I give to you is that you need to read it for yourself, and ask people who are giving you the splashy 30 second sound bites "How do you know?" I want you to ask the same thing from me as well, I'd like you to take the time and participate in a town hall. To me this is one of

the biggest decisions that Albertans have the ability to make, it literally will give us an opportunity to set our own course, and make sure that we take care of the folks who have contributed not only to our province, but to our country as a whole. A way to give them more than what they would be getting under the CPP, and to offset some of the darned inflationary pressures. We are opening the cage door; I sure hope that enough folks still have that Strong and Free spirit left in them to walk out of it.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has confirmed a case of hepatitis A in a food handler working at two Edmonton Zone restaurants inside the Edmonton International Airport: Belgian Beer Café (1000 Airport Rd) and Boston Pizza (1000 Airport Rd).

Individuals in Alberta who consumed food or drink purchased from the above locations between the below dates and times may have been exposed to hepatitis A and should:

• Call Health Link at 1-888-851-1919 immediately. Health Link staff will assess your exposure risk and help book you in for a preventive hepatitis A vaccine if you are eligible. A vaccine, given after exposure, can prevent development of hepatitis A illness.

• Monitor for symptoms for 50 days after potential exposure.

If you live outside of Alberta and were potentially exposed, please contact your local public health office for assistance.

Preventive immunization:

Individuals who call Health Link at 1-888-851-1919 will be advised of eligibility for immunization. Immunization can only be provided within 14 days after an exposure and can prevent illness from occurring. Individuals who have already been infected with hepatitis A or received their hepatitis A vaccine series are not at risk from this exposure.

Monitor for Symptoms:

Anyone who believes they may have been exposed is also advised to monitor for symptoms of hepatitis A for up to 50 days after they last ate at either restaurant, as illness can occur from 15 to 50 days after exposure. Hepatitis A is an infection of the liver caused by a virus.

Symptoms include tiredness, poor appetite, nausea and vomiting, abdominal pain, fever, dark-coloured urine, light-coloured stools, and yellowing of eyes and skin. Some people, espeatitis A infection without noticing any symptoms; however, they are still infectious to others.

Exposed individuals who develop symptoms during the above timeframe are advised to immediately contact Health Link at 811 for assessment and to prevent further spread of disease.

"There is no specific treatment for hepatitis A, but it can be prevented through immunization. For more information visit Hepatitis A (HAV) Vaccine. We also always encourage proper hand hygiene practices to help prevent the spread of communicable illness," says Dr. Michael Zakhary, Edmonton Zone Medical Officer of Health.

"There is no ongoing risk of infection associated with either restaurant and this case is not a risk to the greater general public. Public Health inspectors have visited and spoken with the operators of the restaurants to review food safety practices and the locations are safe to operate," adds Dr. Zakhary.
