

Trudeau-Appointed Senators Vote Against Farmers On Bill C-234

These Senators have gone beyond political posturing to playing games with the livelihoods of our farming community.

"By supporting an amendment proposed by Senator Pierre Dalphond during the clause-by-clause study at the Senate Committee on Agriculture, these Senators aim to gut Bill C-234 of its core purpose. The amendment, if carried through, will remove the carbon tax exemption for the heating or cooling of agricultural buildings. This action is not only in complete disregard of our hardworking farmers but also serves as an

example of how far these Senators are willing to go to jeopardize the well-being of all Canadians.

"The intent behind these amendments is clear: to gut the Bill and send it back to the House of Commons in a form that is unlikely to be passed. This is a calculated move by Trudeau-appointed Senators and is especially troubling when Senate Government Representatives involve themselves in the voting of Private Members Bills, which is highly unusual.

"MP Ben Lobb's Bill C-234 is a Common-Sense Conservative plan to exempt the Canadians that put food on our table from this Liberal carbon tax. It aims to provide necessary financial relief to Canadian farmers and their families who have long struggled under the weight of high taxes. By seeking to dismantle this Bill, Trudeau-appointed Senators are not standing up for Canadian farmers or the larger public.

"We remain steadfast in our commitment to defend common sense principles and will continue to fight for policies that prioritize the needs and livelihoods of everyday Canadians over blatant political maneuvering."

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Submitted by Yellowhead County

Mayor – Councillor Brigitte Lemieux was appointed as Deputy Mayor for the term of October 25, 2023 to October 31, 2024.

Boards & Committees Appointments – Council Members were appointed to Yellowhead County, joint-authority, and external board and committee appointments. All Yellowhead County boards and committees and their appointed members can be found at yellowheadcounty. civicweb.net.

Council appointed Augustine Lapierre and current members Jack Williams, Ken Soukeroff, and Mandy Ford to the Yellowhead County Agricultural Services Appeal Committee for a one-year term from January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024. Debbie Ceelen was re-appointed as a member to the Yellowhead County Library Board for a threeyear term. The Recreation Board position will continue to be advertised until a member of the public is appointed by Council to this board as no applications were received.

Joint Community Partnerships Grant – Yellowhead County will participate in a joint Alberta Community Partnership grant application with the Town of Hinton to determine options to enhance the water system and for potential long-term water services for Yellowhead County.

Trails Master Plan - The

amended 2018 Trails Master Plan was adopted by Council. The amended plan gives a detailed plan for the development and maintenance of current and future municipal trails within the County.

Cemetery Bylaw – Bylaw 04.23 outlines the regulations, fees and guidelines for the use, maintenance, and restrictions for the Evansburg Cemetery. It was given first and second reading by Council. The bylaw will be brought back for a third reading at a future date.

Culvert Rehabilitation – A new culvert to replace one that was damaged from the spring flooding at Range Road 183A and TWP 523A was approved in the amount of \$535,000 from the Restricted Surplus Funds: Infrastructure Reserves-Roads and Bridges to be used for an assessment and construction costs.

Power Source for County Tower – Current power from the Westmoreland Obed Mine will not be available to power the County's Obed tower site due to reclamation of the area. The tower is used for County operations including emergency communications. The cost for a long-run generator for the YH-5 Obed Tower Site is estimated at \$130,000 and was approved by Council.

Colleen would love to see more people from the city come to Farmfair to "meet" the farm animals and see how well treated these animals are. She laughed and said that those show cattle are pretty darn spoiled, and it's great to see a new generation of young people involved in raising beef cattle.

CAR RENTAL TIPS HELP SAVE TIME AND MONEY

Many people resolve to enjoy life to the fullest, and that may involve indulging in new experiences and traveling to different locales. The United States Travel Association says nearly four out of five domestic trips taken are for leisure, and 1.7 billion person-trips, or travel taken by a person away from home overnight to places 50 miles away or more, were logged in 2015.

Ground transportation remains one of the most popular means of getting around. People who choose not to use their own vehicles for travel often find that a rental vehicle suits their purposes and can be quite convenient. Consumers seeking a rental car can ensure their travel plans go smoothly with these tips.

• Travel off-season. Not only might travelers save on airline tickets, hotel accommodations and more when traveling off-season, but they also can save on rental cars. For example, according to the Abrams Travel Data Index, consumers can expect to pay 56 percent less in March for a rental car than they would renting the same vehicle in July.

Know what you want. Before renting, decide which type of vehicle will best fit your needs. If you're traveling with children, you may need a van or a large sedan, rather than a compact car. If travel includes certain hobbies, such as skiing or bicycle riding, look for a rental with a ski or bike rack Ñ or one that can fit such accessories. Those concerned with the environment may want to rent an eco-friendly model.

• Shop around. Major car rental agencies are located all over the world. However, depending on where you travel, locally owned companies may offer comparable service and lower rates. Lower operating costs (think no franchise fees or big advertising budgets) mean

these rentals typically cost 15 to 30 percent less than rentals from mainstream agencies. Research lesser-known rental companies beforehand to compare prices and read any reviews to see if these businesses are up to the standards of larger, better-known chains.

• Avoid renting from an airport. It may be convenient to step off a plane and grab a rental right there. However, rental car agencies operating at airports may pass on airport surcharges to their customers. Try a car rental service away from the airport and take a shuttle or cab to get there.

Understand mileage caps. According to Angie's List, some rental car companies offer unlimited miles for a rental period, while others may employ mileage caps. Read the fine print of the agreement, especially if you'll be using the rental for long-distance driving. • Ask about membership affiliation. Inquire about discounts for any major national organizations, frequent flier programs and credit card programs to which you may belong. If you're employed by a company that frequently rents cars, they may have a negotiated rate for employees.

• Investigate insurance coverage. You may be able to decline extra insurance coverage at the rental desk. Some personal automotive policies will cover collision damage and personal liability for temporary use of a rental car, according to MileCards.com, a travel rewards card comparison website. What is not covered by your insurance may be covered by secondary insurance offered by the credit card used at booking.

Rental cars are a major component of travel. Consumers can save money and make trips even easier by understanding some of the basics of renting.

HOW DRIVERS CAN MAKE CITY DRIVING SAFER

Many drivers will never find themselves behind the wheel of a car or truck within city limits. But when the occasion calls for driving in crowded cities where conditions are more hectic than in the suburbs or rural areas, drivers can take steps to make themselves more comfortable.

Drive a vehicle with an automatic transmission. City driving features lots of stop-and-go traffic, which can make driving cars with manual transmissions more stressful. When possible, drive vehicles with automatic transmissions in crowded cities. Doing so may even help drivers be more aware of their surroundings.

Drive small cars. Small cars are easier to maneuver within city limits than large vehicles. Midsize sedans, trucks and SUVs can be more difficult to parallel park, and even when spaces are available. such vehicles might not fit. City dwellers tend to rely more on public transportation than their own vehicles, so drivers moving to cities might find small cars align better with their new lifestyles than large automobiles.

Use parking assist technology. Drivers who are somewhat rusty with regard to parallel parking may find parking assist technology makes it considerably easier to squeeze into tight city spots. Rear-mounted cameras that project onto the vehicle's dashboard navigation screen can help drivers avoid bumping other cars when backing in, while sensors can notify drivers when they're getting too close to other cars.

• Remember to be watchful for pedestrians. Drivers used to driving in suburban or rural areas may not encounter pedestrians all that often. But pedestrians can be found all over cityscapes and often have the right of way. Even when they don't, pedestrians may not be as attentive as motorists. As a result, drivers should be watchful for pedestrians at all times, even waiting an extra second when lights turn green to avoid pedestrians who might still be in crosswalks. Resolve to drive slowly. Always obey speed limits when driving in a city, even when it seems like no motorists or pedestrians are sharing the roads. Sightlines are often blocked when driving in cities, and pedestrians or children playing can suddenly appear in roadways that seemed empty moments before. Driving slowly within city limits reduces the likelihood that drivers will hit pedestrians with their cars or trucks.
