On Oct. 22, 2023, at about 1:15 a.m., Parkland County Fire Department, AHS and Parkland RCMP responded to a report of a single vehicle collision roll-over in the area of Township Road 531 and Range Road 22 in Parkland County.

The male driver had fled just prior to police arriving. Parkland RCMP with the assistance of Edmonton Police Service helicopter Air 1, and RCMP Police Dog Service, were able to locate the driver and take him



into custody. An RCMP collision analysts attended the scene as part of the investigation.

Life saving efforts were provided to the two passengers who had been ejected from the vehicle. A 22-yearold male from Parkland County was pronounced deceased at the scene. A 25-year-old male, also a Parkland County resident

was taken to hospital in critical condition, but later succumbed to his injuries.

dian Agricultural Partnership (Sustainable CAP), with the federal government providing \$99 million and Alberta's government providing \$66 million. Agriculture Financial Services Corporation (AFSC) will administer the program.

Sustainable CAP is a five-year program, beginning this year, and includes a \$3.5 billion investment by federal, provincial and territorial governments to strengthen competitiveness, innovation and resiliency in the agriculture, agri?food and agri?based products sector. This investment includes \$1 billion in federal programs and \$2.5 billion in cost-shared programs funded 60 per cent federally and 40 per cent provincially-territorially.

"Alberta Beef Producers is thankful for the financial support for the

livestock sector. We hope this announcement will provoke collaborative and positive change going into 2024 to ensure all agricultural producers have equitable access to Business Risk Management programs."

Recent weather has cooled lake and reservoir water temperatures to such an extent that cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) is no longer a health concern, including in five bodies of water in the Edmonton Zone, which had previously been placed under cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) advisories.

Bylaw 2023-10 Wabamun Hamlet Area Redevelopment Plan

The Wabamun Hamlet Area Redevelopment Plan (HARP) has been completed for the Hamlet of Wabamun as identified under Parkland County's MDP Policy 6.0.9 which requires the County to complete a HARP for any identified priority growth hamlets. The Wabamun HARP provides direction for the hamlet through policy and implementation strategies to support the County in its efforts in future development for the area. Direction from the Wabamun HARP will be reflected through future regulation such as the Land Use Bylaw and subdivision regulations.

Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. As Alberta's government continues its work to develop a new social studies curriculum, Holocaust education will be a mandatory component.

During the Second World War, Adolf Hitler and his Nazi government and military systematically targeted, arrested, abused and eliminated people they described as subhuman. At the top of their list were Jewish people. Between Jan. 30, 1933, and May 8, 1945, the Nazis killed about six million Jews in Europe. Every January, the world recognizes International Holocaust Remembrance Dav.

and the Jewish community additionally recognizes Holocaust Remembrance Day, or Yom HaShoah, each spring, reiterating the phrase "Never Again."

Alberta's government is ensuring students learn about the Holocaust and its important historical and contemporary significance throughout their education. Alberta Education will work with partners in the education and Jewish communities to explore where and when this content should be covered.

"I firmly believe we must do everything possible to combat rising antisemitism and educate young Albertans about the horrors of the Holocaust. Ensuring all students learn from one of history's darkest chapters will help us confront hate and prevent similar atrocities from occurring."

"Creating an anti-racist society starts at the school-age level and Holocaust education is an important tool in helping our students learn about the underlying ramifications of prejudice, racism and stereotyping. What is happening in our society today is an important warning around the need to teach the universal lessons of the Holocaust, and the consequences of bigotry and hate. ensure that our youth will not only learn from but keep the memory of the Holocaust alive."

"This announcement comes at a time when antisemitism has spiked across Canada and around the world. It is crucial that the next generations learn about how hate surfaces. 


