

# Alberta RCMP And Law Enforcement Partners Launch Operation Cold Start

preforming a variety of tasks to help keep vehicles safe. They will be checking on unattended, idling vehicles to see if the keys are in them, and whether or not they are properly secured. Officers will also be participating in educational efforts to teach the public ways to keep their property safe.

"Warming up your vehicle briefly before your commute might seem convenient, but this convenience can turn into a serious problem when your vehicle is stolen. Vehicle-related crimes often occur due to opportunistic situations," says Cpl. Mike Fulton of the Alberta RCMP's Community Safety and Well-being Branch. "In 2021, 8.3% of vehicles stolen in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction were left idling. The goal of Operation Cold Start is to reduce crime by educating Albertans on steps they can take to help keep their property safe."

Vehicle theft doesn't only effect vehicle owners; it has an impact on the greater community. Not only do thefts increase the cost of insurance across the province, but stolen vehicles can also be used for further crime, or even be put back on the market and sold to unsuspecting Albertans.

The Alberta RCMP offers the following tips for vehicle safety:

- If you can't park in a garage or driveway, ensure that you're parking in a visible well lit area.
- Visible anti-theft devices like steering wheel locks can help mitigate vehicle thefts and break-ins.
- If possible, look into automatic car starters

as an option to warm your vehicle.

- Never leave your vehicle unattended if the keys are in it.
- Always lock your vehicles doors even if you're parked in a drive way or garage.
- Never leave valuable items like wallets, keys,

purses, or even change visible in an unoccupied vehi-

- Most modern engines do not require a 'warm-up' period. If your vehicle does need to warmup, do not leave it unattended.

# FUEL TAX RELIEF: STATEMENT FROM MINISTER HORNER

President of Treasury Board and Minister of Finance Nate Horner issued the following statement on Alberta's fuel tax relief program:

"As a result, Albertans will continue to save four cents

per litre on gas and diesel in the first three months of 2024, with the fuel tax applied at a reduced rate of nine cents per litre. After that, Albertans will save some or all of the provincial fuel tax when WTI prices average \$80 per barrel or higher in each quarterly review period.

"Alberta's fuel tax is a predictable source of provincial revenue, helping to offset the volatility of other revenue sources. As a stable component of Alberta's revenue mix, the fuel tax helps fund programs and services Albertans rely on while maintaining our significant tax advantage. The

fuel tax relief program ensures we're able to maintain strength in Alberta's finances while continuing to support Albertans and Alberta businesses.

"We will provide another update before the next quarter ends on March 31, 2024"


We wrapped up session

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# GOVERNMENT OF CANADA HELPS MORE SENIORS AGE AT HOME

Every senior deserves to age in health, in safety, and in dignity. Everyone should have the choice to age at home, in their communities. The Government of Canada created the Age Well at Home Initiative to help more seniors do this. This program supports community organizations to pilot new approaches, scale up effective, existing ones, and mobilize volunteers to help seniors age at home. Today, the Minister for Seniors, Seamus O'Regan Jr., announced \$39.6 71 pilot projects across Canada that will mobilize volunteers to support lower-income or otherwise vulnerable seniors in their homes. These projects were selected after an open call for proposals held in summer 2022, under the In-Home Support Pilot Project stream of the Age Well at Home initiative. Work on implementing the Age Well at Home initiative in Quebec is ongoing.

The Minister made the announcement while visiting Connections for Seniors in St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador, which will receive \$798,846 for their

Community Outreach Program. Connections for Seniors will use this funding to expand the availability of its practical in-home support services to up to 2,000 older adults in the St. John's area.

The seniors-serving organizations receiving this funding make a real difference in the everyday lives of Canadian seniors. Through their projects, organizations will help seniors with meal preparation, light housekeeping or transportation, and help them navigate and access other available services in their local area. These projects will also support the unique needs of diverse groups of seniors, including seniors who have a low income, are Black or racialized, Indigenous, members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, seniors who live in rural and remote settings, are members of official language minority communities, newcomers and seniors who speak a language other than English or French.











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# ALBERTA UNWRAPS ADOPTION SUBSIDY APPLICATIONS

Families who have adopted a child through a licensed agency in Alberta can now apply for a one-time \$6,000 subsidy.

Building forever families shouldn't be a financial burden for those yearning to be called mom or dad. To help remove barriers for Albertans who choose to start or grow their families through adoption, Alberta's government is providing additional financial support for eligible families that will reduce adoption costs by as much as 50 per cent.

"As an adoptive parent myself, I know how challenging and expensive the adoption process can be. My heart aches for Albertans who've had to give up on starting or growing their family because adoption was financially out of reach. I'm so pleased this subsidy will help make adoption more affordable so more children can find their forever families."

While Alberta's government covers the costs associated with adopting a child in government care, fees to adopt a child through an agency can range between \$11,000 and \$15,000. This subsidy will be available for families with a household income of less than

\$180,000 a year who completed a licensed private agency adoption in Alberta on or after April 1, 2023.

"In recognizing the profound impact of Alberta government's adoption support initiatives, Adoption Options is grateful for the support provided to adoptive families. These initiatives not only transform the lives of children but also create a foundation for countless families to thrive, embodying the true spirit of community and compassion."

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# ST. ALBERT RCMP EDUCATE CITIZENS REGARDING NEW MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION REPORTING

In wake of the Provincial Government's recent announcement of the collision reporting threshold being raised from \$2000 to \$5000 combined damage, which will take effect on January 1, 2024, St Albert RCMP would like to educate citizens what to do and what their obligations are if they are involved in a motor vehicle collision in the New Year:

- Check yourself, your passengers, as well as the other vehicle occupants to see if medical help is required. If so, call 911 immediately for an ambulance.
- If an ambulance is not required, please take a quick picture of the vehi-

cles, then move them out of the roadway to a safe location if they are driveable. Ensure the other driver knows to meet you there.

- If the vehicles are NOT driveable AND blocking traffic, call the RCMP at 780-458-7700 or 911.
- Once parked in a safe location, take a picture or record the other driver's license, registration and insurance. Ensure the other driver takes a picture of your documents as well. Also, exchange phone numbers. At this point, you are free to leave without police attending.
- Contact your insurance company and advise them you were in a collision. They will give you instructions on how/where

to tow your vehicle and how to obtain damage estimates. Follow the insurance company's directions for repair.

- When you obtain your estimate:
- 1) if under \$5000, call the other driver to determine if combine damage exceeds \$5000
- 2) if over \$5000, call and report to RCMP at 780-458-7700

There is no need to report your motor vehicle collision to the police UNLESS one or more of the following occurs:

- Injury is involved 1.
- 2. Either driver fails to exchange information as outlined above, or drives away before exchanging info (Hit & Run)
- 3. The damage

amount of all vehicles and property combined is over \$5000.



# WHY BREAST CANCER SCREENING MATTERS – AND HOW TO GET SCREENED

We encourage women, transgender, non-binary and gender diverse individuals who are at risk of breast cancer to get screened. Breast cancer screening can find abnormal changes in your breasts before you have symptoms like a lump. Getting screened regularly can save your life.

Breast cancer is the most common type of cancer among women. In fact, one out of every seven women will be diagnosed with breast cancer sometime in their life. Every day, one Albertan will die from the disease.

Finding breast cancer early means treatments may work better, which improves the chances of survival. A screening mammogram takes an x-ray image of your breast to find early signs of cancer that you and your healthcare provider may not be able to feel or see yet.

When should I start having a screening mammogram for breast cancer?

Alberta lowered the recommend-

ed starting age for breast cancer screening to 45. If you are between the ages of 45 and 74, plan to have a screening mammogram once every two years, or as decided by you and your healthcare provider. If you are in this age range, you don't need a healthcare provider's referral. You can book an appointment for a screening mammogram directly with a radiology clinic.

For people who are aged 40 to 44 or 75 and older, it is recommended that you speak with your healthcare provider to talk about if screening is right for you. You will need a referral from your healthcare provider if you decide to screen. Once you have a requisition, you can book an appointment for a screening mammogram at a radiology clinic.

Screening mammograms are available at many clinics in Alberta. Visit screeningforlife.ca or call Health Link at 811 or Screening Programs at 1-866-727-3926.

For those living in rural communities, Screen Test is a service that brings free screening mammography to these communities using two mobile clinics. To find out when the next mobile clinic is in your area, go to screeningforlife.ca or call 1-800-667-0604 (toll free).

What increases my risk for breast cancer?

There are many different factors that impact your risk of breast cancer, some of which you can change and some of which you can't.

Risk factors that can't be changed:

- Family history: Having a family member who has had breast cancer increases your risk. Talk to your health care provider about your family history of cancer and know your risk.
- Age: As you grow older, your risk of breast cancer increases.
- Breast density: Dense breasts (breasts that have a lot of dense tissue instead of fatty tissue) increases your risk of breast cancer. When you get a mammogram, your result letter will tell you how dense your breasts are.

Risk factors that you can change:

• Physical activity: Get regular exercise every day (ideally 30 minutes or more) – even if it's a brisk

walk or some yard work.

- Nutrition: Try to get lots of fruits and vegetables into your diet. See Canada's Food Guide for more information on healthy eating.
- Alcohol: Limit the amount of alcohol you drink. Canada's Guidance on Alcohol and Health recommends not consuming any alcohol.
- Smoking: Don't smoke and avoid second-hand smoke. If you're currently a smoker, talk to your healthcare provider about options for quitting or cutting back.

What can you do?

Finding breast cancer early can make all the difference. Regularly getting a screening mammogram can save your life. Know what your breasts normally look and feel like, so that you will notice any changes that may occur between your regular mammogram screenings. Talk to your healthcare provider about your personal risk of breast cancer and what you can do to minimize it



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

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
