Clark Builders Chosen as Construction Managers for the YCE Multiplex in Edson Edson, Alberta, January 10, 2024 – Yellowhead County and the Town of Edson are moving ahead in 2024 with the construction plans for the Yellowhead County Edson (YCE) Multiplex located in Edson, Alberta.

Following a thorough evaluation process, Clark Builders, a renowned construction management and general contracting company, has been appointed the construction manager for this highly anticipated project, which includes a new pool, arena, and walking loop. The project also includes renovations to the

Centennial Arena, repurposing the Memorial Arena to accommodate curling, and planning of potential space for a gymnasium.

Each year, Alberta's government supports the work agricultural societies through the Agricultural Societies Infrastructure Revitalization Program. Individual projects may receive funding between \$10,000 and \$100,000.

The most common types of facilities applied for under the program were arenas, curling rinks, community halls and grandstands. Some of the approved projects the funding will support include roof repairs, kitchen and bathroom renovations, window and door upgrades, and increasing accessibility.



OVER 400 PARKLAND SCHOOL EMPLOYEES JOIN CUPE

Over 400 educational assistants, clerical staff, therapists and technicians employed by the Parkland School Division have voted overwhelmingly to join the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE). In an Alberta Labour Relations Board vote counted today.

employees voted 97.8% to leave their independent association and join Canada's largest union. There was an 80% turnout.

Parkland school division includes 23 schools west of Edmonton in Stony Plain, Spruce Grove and surrounding areas.

CUPE Alberta President Rory Gill welcomed the new members, saying they chose CUPE for the benefits of being part of a larger organization.

"School board workers have a lot of challenges ahead," said Gill. "Most have not had a wage increase in eight years. The average wage for an Educational Assistant is just \$26,400. Employees at Parkland believe we are all stronger together, and their votes reflect that."

"K-12 support staff are greatly undervalued in Alberta. These are the people who educate our kids – they deserve financial security and CUPE will work hard to make sure that happens."

CUPE represents 11,500 K-12 employees in Alberta.

On Monday, January 1, 2024, Dawson Creek RCMP received a report of a missing person.



I'm writing down my thoughts about climate change that I believe are right but its my right to be wrong also.

Environmental change is real but its not the first time in history that this has happened and I don't agree that it can all be blamed on fossil fuels.

Carbon dioxide is being released into our atmosphere today at a rate much less than if one large volcano erupted. The Yellowstone volcano is over 10 miles in diameter. Just think what an exhaust pipe this size would produce. Carbon dioxide in our atmosphere is dearly needed to maintain life. All growing plant life uses it to live but what happens if the plant life isn't there to use up the carbon. Trees in our forests are being destroyed at a rate that never before happened in history. Sawmills and logging companies are not monitored for what they do and how much they can harvest in one year. The government has turned over to the

companies the right to govern themselves. If a sawmill or pulp mill upgrades or enlarges their mill for greater capacity should they be allowed a larger quota? This is whats happening. Now days its not just the coniferous trees being cut down but also all deciduous trees such as aspen and birch, for pulp and paper or biomass for burning in power production or pellets for export.

The companies are reforesting these logged off areas but for these seedlings to use up the same amount of carbon dioxide they have to grow for at least 80 years. Another thing that's happening is that the reforested blocks are being sprayed with chemical to rid the area of all other competitive vegetation. Yes, all grasses, all deciduous plants, all fruit and berry plants are killed off for a number of years. So much for the plants using up carbon dioxide. Not even the squirrels or moose can survive on these logged off blocks. These logged blocks with no vegetation do not absorb the heat and water. Therefore these areas get hot and dry out and burn. There is too much destruction of our forests that use up the carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Not just the rain forests but also our own forests. The government must change the quota system for a sustainable forest for our future.

The advancement of our cities and towns has got to be slowed down or stopped. The ground with its organic matter and plant life absorbs the heat from our sun. Then when the earth, which grows crops for human consumption, and trees and other vegetation is covered with concrete or asphalt, the heat is not absorbed but released into the atmosphere - thus global warming. We must stop covering our good farmland and forests with city development. When driving down our roads, in the tree shaded spots the temperature will drop several degrees. Cities and towns with new development must slow the rate of expanding outward and start expanding up instead. I farmed a mixed farm for 45 years along with working in the oil patch to pay the bills. I was also a partner in construction and logging equipment and worked for Canfor and Diashawa. I have now retired and am no expert but can reason some things out from experience..

My message for the world is stop destroying and polluting the world that we have been given but do not



WARM HOMES, COLD REALITY: SHARE YOUR CARBON TAX STORY

In Yellowhead, where recent temperatures have plummeted to below -40° C, the reality of the carbon tax hits differently than intended. In our region, where heating homes is a matter of life and death, the carbon tax imposed by the NDP-Liberal coalition becomes a glaring burden, exposing the policy's disconnect from the realities faced by Canadians, including those in our own cities, towns, and rural communities.


Touted as a measure to combat climate change, the carbon tax has spectacularly failed to meet its own environmental

goals. Despite the financial strain it has placed on Canadians, especially in colder regions, it has not led to any significant reduction in emissions. This clearly indicates that the carbon tax is less about environmental stewardship and more about implementing a tax scheme under the guise of climate action. It's a policy that penalizes Canadians, like those in Yellowhead, for whom natural gas is not a choice but a necessity.

The impact of this policy is felt most acutely in our gas bills. It's a common sight now: the carbon tax portion exceeding the actual cost of natural gas. This is not just a flawed policy - it's an unfair economic imposition on our community. We are being punished for the basic act of keeping our homes warm, while the policy itself has yet to show any real contribution to reducing carbon emissions.

This situation calls for more than passive observation. I urge every resident and business owner in Yellowhead, whether in rural areas or our towns, to share your gas bills (with redacted personal information) with large carbon tax costs and your stories to my email: gerald.soroka@parl.gc.ca. We need these real-life accounts as evidence to challenge this ineffective and unfair tax policy. Your voices will be crucial in our fight to expose this tax scheme for what it is and advocate for a more reasonable, effective approach to environmental policy.

The fight against the carbon tax in the House of Commons is a fight for the fair treatment of all Canadians. It's time to stand against policies that do little for the environment while placing undue burdens on communities like ours. In Yellowhead, we understand the importance of environmental responsibility, but it cannot come at the cost of our basic needs. We must demand policies that truly balance environmental goals with the realities of Canadian life.

2023 was like no other for Yellowhead County. Review some of the highlights and challenges faced by Yellowhead County and also some of Council's goals for 2024.

Yellowhead County, AB (January 4, 2024) – With the unprecedented fire and flooding this last year, 2023 was like no other for Yellowhead County. Still, for Yellowhead County Mayor Wade Williams and Council, several highlights showed that the municipality persevered and accomplished many of their goals and plans while still providing essential services to county residents and businesses.

For 2024, Mayor Williams is excited that it will be a productive year for Yellowhead County, focusing on delivering municipal services and new capital projects while rebuilding the damaged infrastructure caused by the devastation from this past

What were the most significant accomplishments that Council achieved over the past year?

- Our strategic plan that guides administration through Council's 4-year vision. Council has an appetite for capturing Yellowhead County's Heritage, including the fires and floods of 2023.
- Continuing to build on the communications tower system to enhance communications and broad-band services throughout the County.
- Several community-focused accomplishments that include completion of the Cadomin Pump Track, the groundbreaking of the Cadomin Community Hall, the celebration of Robb's 100th anniversary, and significant upgrades to several of our community cemeteries.
- The overall disaster response for a year where Alberta had ten times the average amount of forest area burned and over 1.5 times the average burned in Yellowhead County.

- The continued operations, post-disaster, of the municipal operations and rebuilding of County resources that were damaged during the fires and floods
- Continued focus on the County's municipal infrastructure replacement plan.
- Focused review and development plan, with Edson, for the YCE Multiplex Centre.

What were the biggest challenges to overcome in 2023?

- The wildfires and flooding were a significant challenge for our County and residents. We are incredibly proud of being able to react to these disasters as we did, with a focus on the prevention of loss of life and minimizing damage to infrastructure and property.
- Post-flood infrastructure inspections, assessments, and repairs that included nine major culverts and 19 bridge structures
- Concerns from Council that the County wasn't included in a provincial drought support program due to no data being gathered for Yellowhead County, although our ag producers and farmers were significantly impacted.
- Infrastructure capital development was significantly impacted in some cases by the disasters and mother nature.

What can residents expect from Council in 2024?

- Continue progress on our Strategic Plan and capital asset management plan, including a long-term road and bridge development plan.
 - · Continued progress on the

YCE Multiplex Centre.

- A \$500,000 grant commitment to the Yellowhead Ag Society toward the replacement of their indoor riding arena.
- We look forward to more large-scale energy projects that focus on new progressive environmental technologies, such as the Cascade Power Project and other planned projects that include Novus Earth (Fresh Bay) and the Canyon Creek Pumped Hydro Project.
- The recruitment and addition of more YC firefighters. We hope to encourage more residents to be part of our volunteer fire department.
- The completion of the new Niton Fire Station.
- The addition of new towers that are part of the County's program to expand coverage throughout Yellowhead County, increasing options for commercial and industry coverage, and play an important role in the safety of our residents and staff.
- \$70,000,000 in capital projects that are part of our long-term vision for capital programs in our County.
- Develop a resident-focused plan for the level of FCSS services offered in the County as a whole.

What challenges do you expect to encounter in 2024?

- We will continue to work with our community to engage them on our projects.
- We continue to plan for any potential disasters, and we are doing this by keeping communications open with other government agencies such as






