

President's Message

Well, I was planning on telling you a bit about our Friday Night Supper on January 12, 2024, but the dinner had to cancelled due to the dangerously cold conditions. Not to worry, however. The Greek meal will be reallocated further down the calendar.

This year the Onoway Legion marks its 90th anniversary. Let me tell you about some of its early history. Its beginnings in 1934 were modest. The Branch (originally a branch of the "Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League") was granted its Charter on December 10, 1034. There were 13 original members, including Edwin Coates, a First World War veteran. Descendants of many of our Charter members, including Edwin Coates, are members of our Branch today.

Five years later, the first Legion Hall opened. It was a 22' X 22' building known as "the Hut". There was a wood stove for heat, and a lantern for light. With the coming of power, the members used a long extension cord from the home of Frank Roberts next door which was plugged in on meeting nights. The Hut was replaced 50 years ago (in 1974) by the current structure, formerly the west wing of the Elementary School in Onoway. More on that, and other Branch history, in the months to come.

Stay tuned to this space for more information on how we plan to commemorate this important anniversary.

On Dec. 9, 2023, at approximately midnight, Parkland Crime Reduction Unit along with members from Alberta Law Enforcement Response Team were conducting proactive patrols when they located a suspicious Ford F350 enter the Town of Stony Plain. The licence plate did not match vehicle and it was discovered that the Ford F350 was stolen from Hinton, alt. the week previous. A traffic stop was attempted but the vehicle fled from police at a high rate of speed. A pursuit was not initiated, however, with the assistance of EPS Air1, the vehicle was tracked and a tire deflation device was successfully deployed in the city of Edmonton where a lone occupant was taken into custody without incident. The suspect is known to police.



OK, so what all this fancy language means is that County owned lands have been identified and removed from municipal reserve designation and as a continuation in process now require redistricting to residential parcels in preparation for sale to the public.

In order to amend the Land Use Bylaw for redistricting, a bylaw must be drafted and a public hearing held first under the provisions of Part 17 of the *Municipal Government Act* (Sections 216.4, 606, 632, 640 and 692).

The above is to let folks know about when and where the Public Hearing will take place.

THE BARE NECESSITIES

Its' been a while since I wrote a what matters to you article, heck, it was last year already! Ok, so there is my 50-year-old Dad humour coming out, but I'm really wanting to keep a positive tone for the first article of 2024. I hope that everyone had a good Christmas and took advantage of the warm weather for New Years.

I was absolutely heartbroken to hear of the accident that took the lives of a young family when they were out on the lake and broke through the ice near the narrows. I was encouraged by the heartfelt outpouring of grief for the friends and family of the folks that lost their lives in this tragic accident. I am also grateful for the folks who are working on putting some warning measures in place to do what they can to warn others of the dangers. I will be following up with the other local leaders to see what we can do as well, to mitigate the risk and do all that we can to keep folks safe.

I did manage to take a few days with my family the first week of January for a road trip Clark Griswold would have been proud of. Knowing how precious time can be with one's family given the circumstances noted earlier, made it a personal priority for me. Make the time.

My wife and I pressed the old suburban back into service, poured all 6 of us into it with snacks, water, and an ever-changing song selection based on my children's age and their musical genera interests driving south to the border. We headed for the black hills, to check out some of the interesting landmarks, and to see some of "The Old West". My staff was amazing and managed all the things back home, while I literally parked my phone for 5 days, it was great. We got to gel again, with everyone's lives heading all directions with their work and school schedules we were quite honestly heading in all opposite directions for most of the hours of the day for the past year.

The time driving not only allowed me to catch up with my family but gave me some time to think. Being down south in the small western towns, also gave me time to get an understanding how folks were feeling in the land of the free. Honestly, they are quite happy down there. There are similar pressures, but folks are getting by, and doing fairly well. We ventured into a couple grocery stores along the trip to replenish supplies and stretch our legs, and my wife and kids all came up with items and were literally gob smacked on how cheap they were. Now to be clear, we never went to a big bulk store, or warehouse grocery store, these were small town, small franchise operations at every turn.

Makeup brushes, \$2.00 for an item that I was made aware costs \$30 to \$40 at home. Pork chops, \$0.20 per pound. Beef steaks \$6.00, apples, not a dollar per apple...way...way south of that for prices. \$50 difference in filling up the fuel tank of the "Burb", compared to Lethbridge. We ate out 3 times in restaurants, everyone ordered what they wanted, no restrictions, a family of 6...not a single restaurant tab exceeded \$130.00. The impacts of the carbon tax, and inflationary pressures could not have been clearer when seeing how my family was reacting and noticing the substantive difference. Carbon tax and brutal fiscal policy driving inflation has a massive impact!

The trip made me realize how many things have changed in my own country over the last 10 years, and heading across the western states made me

feel like I had not just been driving down the highway in an old vehicle, but literally back in time to how things used to be here. I can say for sure that in Alberta and Saskatchewan, we are doing what we can to hold onto the things that matter most, and to make sure that folks that call our provinces home will continue to be in the best parts of the country, but boy, it was one heck of a sickening feeling realizing how far things have slipped, from what we used to have.

I spoke to a number of seniors recently about what I had been working on, and what the plan was for the new year, goals and objectives locally, and what I wanted to work on provincially. I was uplifted again by the conversation, the candor, and the words of encouragement. I was very straight forward on what the issues were with our electrical supply, the overall affordability, and warned of the issues if we were to keep on the same trajectory. The energy file, how we needed to promote the good things that we do here, and to continue to grow that sector. The economic corridors, and how they will have a positive impact not only locally, but for Western Canada. What the APP could mean for Albertans, and where we are at in the process, how the feds are now crunching their numbers. I will continue to debunk the boogeyman, and I need their help to keep me in the loop when challenges arise, so I can help out.

Then the cold snap hit, we for the first time in our history as a province needed to put out an emergency alert for folks to reduce power loads so that we didn't face blackouts. The energy superpower of the country didn't have enough power for its own citizens when they needed it the most. This wake-up call, the years of policy driven by an ideology rather than practicality had finally come to roost. I like many were fuming, as we did our part, sitting in the dark, so that the bare necessities were available, and we didn't have any black outs or brown outs in other parts of the province. As I sat there fuming knowing full well that it was politics that changed the policy, not engineering, it crystalized my approach going forward on a number of the areas that must be changed in rapid succession within province.

I won't be sugar coating much this year, we have already compromised and apologized too much for who we are, what we have, how we make things work in our province, and how we have found ourselves in this spot. We will be getting back to making sure the needs are covered, safe, reliable, and affordable.
