"Mentoring strengthens social skills, builds confidence and helps increase school attendance. Students benefit from becoming mentors themselves while supporting and guiding younger students through Career and Technology Studies mentoring credits and reading buddies. With the support of a mentor, young people are better able to stay focused in school, build promising careers and succeed despite challenging circumstances. Mentoring also fosters long-lasting relationships that will make a positive impact on both children and families for generations to come.

"Alberta's government is proud to invest more than \$1.3 million in mentoring each year, including \$250,000 for the Alberta Mentorship Partnership, which works with school authorities and community organizations like



Bylaw 2023-02 Surface Drainage and Lot Grading

The Bylaw will provide direction to Parkland County Administration in how/what to communicate to the Landowners consistently and effectively and to take care of Parkland County's interests as well as public interests with regards to surface drainage and lot grading activities.

The proposed Bylaw 2023-02 is not intended to control Landowners in how they use their properties, but rather a means to guide and direct lot grading and surface drainage practices during alterations of a parcels surface in a meaningful way that does not create a negative impact to adjacent or downstream Landowners.

Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. Written submissions or presentations may either be submitted in advance to Engineering Services by 4:00 P.M. on January 25, 2024, or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing.

Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation to Council must notify Engineering Services in advance of the public hearing by 4:00 P.M. on January 25, 2024. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.

THE BARE NECESSITIES

Its'been a while since I wrote a what matters to you article, heck, it was last year already! Ok, so there is my 50-year-old Dad humour coming out, but I'm really wanting to keep a positive tone for the first article of 2024. I hope that everyone had a good Christmas and took advantage of the warm weather for New Years.

I was absolutely heartbroken to hear of the accident that took the lives of a young family when they were out on the lake and broke through the ice near the narrows. I was encouraged by the heartfelt outpouring of grief for the friends and family of the folks that lost their lives in this tragic accident. I am also grateful for the folks who are working on putting some warning measures in place to do what they can to warn others of the dangers. I will be following up with the other local leaders to see what we can do as well, to mitigate the risk and do all that we can to keep folks safe.

I did manage to take a few days with my family the first week of January for a road trip Clark Griswold would have been proud of. Knowing how precious time can be with one's family given the circumstances noted earlier, made it a personal priority for me. Make the time.

My wife and I pressed the old suburban back into service, poured all 6 of us into it with snacks, water, and an ever-changing song selection based on my children's age and their musical genera interests driving south to the border. We headed for the black hills, to check out some of the interesting landmarks, and to see some of "The Old West". My staff was amazing and managed all the things back home, while I literally parked my phone for 5 days, it was great. We got to gel again, with everyone's lives heading all directions with their work and school schedules we were quite honestly heading in all opposite directions for most of the hours of the day for the past year.

The time driving not only allowed me to catch up with my family but gave me some time to think. Being down south in the small western towns, also gave me time to get an understanding how folks were feeling in the land of the free. Honestly, they are quite happy down there. There are similar pressures, but folks are getting by, and doing fairly well. We ventured into a couple grocery stores along the trip to replenish supplies and stretch our legs, and my wife and kids all came up with items and were literally gob smacked on how cheap they were. Now to be clear, we never went to a big bulk store, or warehouse grocery store, these were small town, small franchise operations at every turn.

Makeup brushes, \$2.00 for an item that I was made aware costs \$30 to \$40 at home. Pork chops, \$0.20 per pound. Beef steaks \$6.00, apples, not a dollar per apple...way...way south of that for prices. \$50 difference in filling up the fuel tank of the "Burb", compared to Lethbridge. We ate out 3 times in restaurants, everyone ordered what they wanted, no restrictions, a family of 6...not a single restaurant tab exceeded \$130.00. The impacts of the carbon tax, and inflationary pressures could not have been clearer when seeing how my family was reacting and noticing the substantive difference. Carbon tax and brutal fiscal policy driving inflation has a massive impact!

The trip made me realize how many things have changed in my own country over the last 10 years, and heading across the western states made me feel like I had not just been driving down the highway in an old vehicle, but literally back in time to how things used to be here. I can say for sure that in Alberta and Saskatchewan, we are doing what we can to hold onto the things that matter most, and to make sure that folks that call our provinces home will continue to be in the best parts of the country, but boy, it was one heck of a sickening feeling realizing how far things have slipped, from what we used to have.

I spoke to a number of seniors recently about what I had been working on, and what the plan was for the new year, goals and objectives locally, and what I wanted to work on provincially. I was uplifted again by the conversation, the candor, and the words of encouragement. I was very straight forward on what the issues were with our electrical supply, the overall affordability, and warned of the issues if we were to keep on the same trajectory. The energy file, how we needed to promote the good things that we do here, and to continue to grow that sector. The economic corridors, and how they will have a positive impact not only locally, but for Western Canada. What the APP could mean for Albertans, and where we are at in the process, how the feds are now crunching their numbers. I will continue to debunk the boogeyman, and I need their help to keep me in the loop when challenges arise, so I can help out.

Then the cold snap hit, we for the first time in our history as a province needed to put out an emergency alert for folks to reduce power loads so that we didn't face blackouts. The energy superpower of the country didn't have enough power for its own citizens when they needed it the most. This wake-up call, the years of policy driven by an ideology rather than practicality had finally come to roost. I like many were fuming, as we did our part, sitting in the dark, so that the bare necessities were available, and we didn't have any black outs or brown outs in other parts of the province. As I sat there fuming knowing full well that it was politics that changed the policy, not engineering, it crystalized my approach going forward on a number of the areas that must be changed in rapid succession within province.

I won't be sugar coating much this year, we have already compromised and apologized too much for who we are, what we have, how we make things work in our province, and how we have found ourselves in this spot. We will be getting back to making sure the needs are covered, safe, reliable, and affordable. I am about tired of drama teachers and environmental protesters setting the course when it comes to acceptable energy by their standards.

This weekend showed full well that Mother Nature does not give 2 shakes about feelings, and that it's up to us to be resilient, and adaptable to whatever may come our way. I along with my colleagues will be throwing our shoulders full on into making the changes required, and won't be apologizing for doing what is right, and what is needed. This weekend should be remembered as a warning shot, and we have a chance to make it right. For the fairy tale and pixie dust crowd who want to keep pushing down this greener than though path with disregard for the risks, you may want to find a pile of hurt feeling reports to start filling out.

On Jan. 12, 2024, Drayton Valley RCMP received a call of a suspicious truck in the ditch on Hwy 22, near TR 502. The driver of the vehicle fled before police arrival. Officers found that though the vehicle had not been reported stolen, the licence plate and VIN information did not match. A cursory search of the truck revealed a sawed-off shotgun, bear mace and ID related to a person known by police. Considering the suspect had ran into the woods while the temperatures were around -40 degrees Celsius, and the possibility of more weapons, RCMP Police Dog Services were called to expedite the search. The suspect was located just under a kilome-

ter from the road. He was subsequently arrested and treated for hypothermia.

As a result of the investigation, Robert Sherwood (41), a resident of St. Albert, was charged with:

• Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose;

• Possession of a weapon contrary to an order (x2);

Fail to comply with

probation order (x7); and
Possession of a

controlled substance (x3). Sherwood was brought before a justice of the peace and remanded into custody. His next court date is set for Feb. 6, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley.

It's that time of the school year for families to recognize the great work the school is doing!

Each year, Alberta Education asks the parents/ guardians of students in grades 4, 7, and 10 through the Alberta Education Assurance Provincial Survey to provide feedback on important topics, including quality of education, student academic results, learning supports, and opportunities for parent involvement/ engagement at the school. Teachers and students also share their feedback by completing the survey online at school. The survey is quick, confidential, and key to supporting and celebrating the tremendous work carried out by schools.

So what do school divisions do with this information?

Once the Department of Education shares the survey results back to schools, principals and their teachers use the information to determine what is working well, and where new targeted supports or initiatives

are needed. The review of last year's results and the plan to make improvements become each school's SCIP and inform the Division's annual Education Plan.

Why is it important for parents to provide their feedback?

The survey report card means that principals hear back from their families: it confirms what is working well and where program changes are needed to meet the academic goals of the school. It also alerts the school team where better communication as to what the school is doing to support student success might be needed...all in keeping with GYPSD's goal to be the number one choice for excellent education in our communities!

How do families get the survey?

Survey invites will be sent out by the province in the mail over the next few weeks. Families with more than one student in an eligible grade will receive a separate survey invitation package for each child.

Only parents or guardians of students in participating grades will receive a survey invitation package to complete the survey. Parents can complete the survey in hard copy or online.
