Page 4 Community VOICE February 21, 2024 REGULAR CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING A KEY PREVENTATIVE TOOL

Alberta Health Services (AHS) is recommending cervical cancer screening for those between the ages of 25 and 69 who are or have been sexually active. This screening is with a Pap test and is also frequently referred to as a Pap smear.

A Pap test checks the cervix for any abnormal cells that can lead to cervical cancer. It's important to get screened regularly. You should have a Pap test once every three years unless your healthcare provider tells you otherwise. Regular Pap tests and follow-up care can prevent about 90 per cent of cervical cancer cases. Pap tests can also detect cervical cancer early. Getting screened can save your life. The earlier cancer is found, the easier it is to treat.

Contact your healthcare provider's office or a women's health clinic to book a Pap test. If you do not have a healthcare provider, such as a family doctor or nurse practitioner:

•Visit Alberta Find a Doctor,

or

•Use the screeningforlife.ca locator tool and select "cervical" as the type of test to find screening options near you, or •Call Health Link at 811.

It's important to have regular Pap tests, even if:

•You feel healthy and have no symptoms of cervical cancer.

•You've only had one sexual partner.

•You've had the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine.

•You've been through menopause.

•You're no longer sexually

active.

Almost all cases of cervical cancer are caused by HPV. HPV infections are common, and they usually do not cause symptoms, so most people do not even know they have it.

A Pap test doesn't test for other cancers or sexually transmitted infections, such as syphilis, chlamydia, gonorrhea or human immunodeficiency virus (HIV).

PARKLAND RCMP ARREST 5 PEOPLE IN STOLEN VEHICLE WITH LOADED FIREARMS, WEAPONS AND DRUGS

Parkland County, Alta. -On Jan. 27, 2024, Parkland RCMP with the assistance of Enoch RCMP located a stolen vehicle on Highway 16A just west of Stony Plain. In the interest of public safety, a tire deflation device was covertly deployed. The vehicle traveled another 35 kms before coming to a stop, where five occupants were taken into custody without incident. A search of the vehicle located 118 grams of suspected methamphetamine (estimated value of \$7000), 37 grams of suspected cocaine (estimated value of \$3700), \$590 cash, two loaded shot guns, and several other weapons. As a result of the investigation, there was a combined total of 43 charges laid under The Criminal Code of Canada, The Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, The Gaming and Liquor Act and The Traffic Safety Act.

Rocky Mountain House resident, 35-year-old Dallas Goodrunning, O'Chiese First Nation residents, 30-year-old Chaz Anderson, 19-year-old Leanne Whitford, 21-year-old Lakeisha Strawberry and Sunchild First Nations resident, 38-year-old Courtney Anderson have been jointly charged with:

• Possession of stolen property exceeding \$5000

• Careless use of a firearm

• Possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose (x3)

• Unauthorized possession of a firearm (x2)

• Unauthorized possession of a prohibited/restricted weapon, ammunition and/or device (x2)

• Unauthorized possession in a motor vehicle a weapon, ammunition and/ or device (x3)

• Flight from peace office

• Laundering Proceeds of crime

Possession of a controlled substance for the purposes of trafficking (x2)
 Illegal consumption of alcohol in a motor

vehicle

Goodrunning has been remanded into custody and is scheduled to appear in the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain on Feb. 7, 2024.

Whitford has been charged with seven additional charges under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Discuss options

Certain houses of worship may be strict in regard to what they allow during interfaith ceremonies. Conservative congregations may even frown upon marrying outside of one's religion. That may spark an entirely new conversation about converting so couples can be married in the eyes of the church, temple or mosque. More reformed places may be open to blending certain traditions from both faiths. Couples often lean toward having one officiant from each faith at the ceremony to incorporate key rites into the wedding.

Neutral ground

Interfaith couples may opt to have the ceremony at a neutral location so they do not appear to be paying

favor to one faith over another. Determine if religious officiants can oversee the ceremony outside of a place of worship and still have the marriage recognized by the tenets of that faith.

Secular officiant

In instances when it may seem like there are too many obstacles to having faith-guided ceremonies for interfaith weddings, wedding planners may suggest some creative solutions, including working with a secular officiant. Traditions such as lighting a unity candle or blending two different sands together to signify the blending of two faiths and families can be part of the ceremony, suggests the lifestyle company Sheerluxe.

Give others tasks

Couples may be unfamiliar with each other's religious traditions. Sharing faith-specific wedding planning tasks can help couples and their families become more familiar with these customs.

Interfaith weddings require extra planning and finesse, but millions of couples get married in such ceremonies every year.
