TAX CREDIT SPROUTS MORE LITTLE POTATO PRODUCTS

The Little Potato Company has qualified for Alberta's Agri-Processing Investment Tax Credit program by building a new facility to produce ready-to-cook spuds.

Agriculture is Alberta's oldest industry and continues to be a strong contributor to economic growth and diversification. In 2023, Alberta produced more potatoes than any other prov-

ince in Canada. On an annual basis, potato production contributes more than \$2 billion to Alberta's economy.

To help further grow and diversify the agriculture industry, Alberta's government introduced the Agri-Processing Investment Tax Credit program in spring 2023 and it is already attracting large-scale investment in value-added agricultural manufacturing. The Little Potato Company is building a new \$39.5-million project in

Nisku to double its processing capacity and produce more packaged potatoes with seasonings that can be quickly roasted, microwaved or grilled.

"Our government developed Alberta's Agri-Processing Investment Tax Credit program with corporations like The Little Potato Company in mind. The program is providing the right conditions for food and ag processors to invest in our province, grow their business and create more jobs for Alber-

tans. Through incentives like this tax credit, we're building on Alberta's competitive advantages and continuing to drive economic growth and diversification."

To be considered for the tax credit program, corporations must invest at least \$10 million in a project to build or expand a value-added agri-processing facility in Alberta. The program offers a 12 per cent non-refundable tax credit for eligible capital expenditures. Through this program, Alberta's government has given conditional approval for a tax credit to The Little Potato Company estimated at about \$1.3 million.

"Agri-Processing is an important and growing industry, supporting our economy and creating jobs for hard-working Albertans. The agri-processing tax credit is an excellent tool to help businesses set up and expand here in Alberta."

The Little Potato Company's new facility currently employs 224 Albertans. The 240,000-square-foot facility in Nisku will be able to process about 125 million pounds of potatoes, up from 65 million pounds at the former Edmonton location.

"We are honoured and grateful for this generous tax credit from the Government of Alberta. The investment elevates our efforts to grow, pack and bring more convenient, nourishing and flavourful Little Potatoes to busy families. We share our heartfelt thanks for this funding as we open our new Nisku packaging facility, which allows us to better serve our family farmers, communities, customers, consumers, climate, soil and water – and all of us."

3 WAYS TO CONSERVE FUEL DURING YOUR DAILY COMMUTE

Commuting is a part of daily life for many working professionals. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2011 American Community Survey, the average American spends 25 minutes commuting to work each day. However, Citi's 2015 Thank You Premier Commuter Index says the average commute time in the United States is 45 minutes. The reasons for that disparity are unknown, though if one accepts the latter statistic as more accurate than the years-old Census Bureau data, it's fair to say Americans spend far more time getting to work than their neighbors to the north. But commutes in Canada also can be lengthy, as Canada's National Household Survey found that, in 2011,

commuters in Canada spent an average of roughly 25 minutes traveling to work each day.

While many people enjoy their daily commutes, feeling it's a time to prepare for the day ahead and, if using public transportation, to relax and let someone else do the work, it's fair to say the majority of commuters would like to spend less time getting to and from work. Many would also like to spend less money getting to and from their offices, and finding ways to conserve fuel is an effective way to do just that.


1. Maintain your vehicle.

Poorly maintained vehicles endure undue stress that can be prevented by adhering to routine maintenance sched-

and make efficient use of fuel. 2. Keep tires properly inflated. Properly inflated tires reduce drag on the engine. Engine drag makes the vehicle work hard to move, and that wastes fuel. But the type of tires a vehicle has also can affect how efficiently it uses

fuel. According to the Transportation Research Board, tires that reduce rolling resistance by 10 percent can improve gas mileage by as much as 2 percent. While that figure might seem insignificant, that 2 percent savings can add up to a substantial amount of money for commuters who spend 50 minutes every day getting to and from work.

3. Drive a vehicle with stop/ start technology.

Stop/start systems, in which engines shut off automatically when drivers brake and restart automatically when the driver lifts his or her foot off the brake pedal, can make more efficient use of fuel. Once exclusive to hybrid cars, stop/start technology is now more widely available

and can cut back on fuel consumption and vehicle emissions. That's especially attractive to eco-conscious commuters who live in big cities where stopand-start traffic is unavoidable. What's more, many modern air conditioning compressors operate off electricity and not via a car's engine, meaning vehicles with stop/start technology will stay cool in the summer even when the engine shuts off.

Commuting to and from work may not seem like the most eco-friendly daily ritual. But there are ways to commute and conserve fuel at the same time.

LITERACY AND NUMERACY PRACTICES

Assistant Superintendent Carra Aschenmeier recently shared an information report identifying the specific programs and practices engaged by teachers not only for literacy but numeracy as well at the January Public Board Meeting. In January, kindergarten learners were assessed with the Reading Readiness Screening Tool, and Grade 1 students were screened as per Alberta Education's mandatory literacy and numeracy screens. The student learning data collected through the screening process alerts teachers to students who will need additional support - including small group or individual plans - to catch students early.

Student data is essential information for teachers, informing their instructional design and activities. The data gathered at the beginning of the school year, a semester, a unit, or a topic in a subject area provides teachers with a baseline from which to identify gaps in student understanding or necessary skills. The data they gather after instruction has occurred provides feedback on the effectiveness of instructional choices. The data and action cycle informs each school's improvement plan; annually, all the schools' data is aggregated and analyzed to inform the Division's Education Plan.

The Board also heard from École Mountain View Elementary School Principal Kurt Scobie who explained his school's approach to literacy instruction, highlighting the scientific, research-based practice teachers use to ensure students have the foundational skills they need to successfully read and comprehend the various texts they encounter across subject areas.

The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

-Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.

-Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.

Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.

°Ensure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision. °Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery






