Peter Ashby has been charged with:

- Dangerous driving causing death;
- Dangerous driving causing bodily harm;
- Flight from police;
- Assault on police officer with weapon (x2);
- Fail to stop at accident causing death;

- Fail to stop at accident causing bodily harm;
- Theft of car;
- Theft of mail under \$5,000; and
- Operation of a vehicle while prohibited

At the time of his arrest, Ashby was wanted on warrants out of Parkland County for the Dec. 19, 2023 and Dec. 22, 2023, thefts from lockers at the Spruce Grove Tri Leisure Centre.


Ashby was wanted out of Edmonton for a Jan. 25, 2023, Theft/forgery of a credit card, Driving while prohibited, Possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000, Fail to remain at the scene of an accident, and Driving without insurance.

Ashby has been taken before a justice of the peace and remanded into custody on all matters with his next court date set for March 7, 2024, at the Alberta Provincial

Court of Justice in Leduc, Edmonton, and Stony Plain.

Additionally, Ashby is wanted out of Saskatchewan for the April 29, 2023, Break in and theft of computers from a hotel in Wynyard, Sask and the April 29, 2023, Break in and theft from Saskatoon.




Despite this arrest, the investigation is still ongoing. As this investigation evolves the charges are subject to change. Additional updates may be forthcoming.

Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operators and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.

• Failure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.

Risk concerns the expected value of results of a situation or event. The value of those results may be positive or negative. In the farming industry, the measure of risk can be rated as high, medium or low. Once the risk has been assessed, through your regular safety checks, employers can determine whether to take immediate action of a hazard or identify those that can be monitored and fixed at a later time. Regular assessment can help with budgeting time and resources for immediate or future repairs.

Keep an eye for safety

The type of safety eye protection you should wear depends on the hazards in your workplace. If you are working in an area that has particles, flying objects, or dust, you must at least wear safety glasses with side protection (side shields). If you are working with chemicals, you should wear goggles. If you are working near hazardous radiation (welding, lasers, or fibre optics) you must use special-purpose safety glasses, goggles, face shields, or helmets designed for that task.





FARM SAFETY TIPS

- Hire right - hire the right person and pay them fairly rather than hire an unqualified person for less money then pay for their liability and errors.
- Get a check-up - make sure every worker is checked up on at least every two hours
- Know the code - the Code of Practices for Farm Safety (PEI) has set the industry standard for agriculture
- Train for safety

3 WAYS TO CONSERVE FUEL DURING YOUR DAILY COMMUTE

Commuting is a part of daily life for many working professionals. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2011 American Community Survey, the average American spends 25 minutes commuting to work each day. However, Citi's 2015 Thank You Premier Commuter Index says the average commute time in the United States is 45 minutes. The reasons for that disparity are unknown, though if

one accepts the latter statistic as more accurate than the years-old Census Bureau data, it's fair to say Americans spend far more time getting to work than their neighbors to the north. But commutes in Canada also can be lengthy, as Canada's National Household Survey found that, in 2011, commuters in Canada spent an average of roughly 25 minutes traveling to work each day.

While many people enjoy their daily commutes, feeling it's a time to prepare for the day ahead and, if using public transportation, to relax and let someone else do the work, it's fair to say the majority of commuters would like to spend less time getting to and from work. Many would also like to spend less money getting to and from their offices, and finding ways to conserve fuel is an effective way

to do just that.

1. Maintain your vehicle.

Poorly maintained vehicles endure undue stress that can be prevented by adhering to routine maintenance schedules. Peruse your vehicle's owner's manuals to determine the recommended intervals to change the oil and replace the air filter and spark plugs. These simple maintenance tasks

are easy and inexpensive, but they make it easier for engines to run smoothly and make efficient use of fuel.

2. Keep tires properly inflated.

Properly inflated tires reduce drag on the engine. Engine drag makes the vehicle work hard to move, and that wastes fuel. But the type of tires a vehicle has also can affect how efficiently it uses fuel. According to the Transportation Research Board, tires that reduce rolling resistance by 10 percent can improve gas mileage by as much as 2 percent. While that figure might seem insignificant, that 2 percent savings can add up to a substantial amount of money for commuters who spend 50 minutes

every day getting to and from work.

3. Drive a vehicle with stop/start technology.

Stop/start systems, in which engines shut off automatically when drivers brake and restart automatically when the driver lifts his or her foot off the brake pedal, can make more efficient use of fuel. Once exclusive to hybrid cars, stop/start technology is now more widely available and can cut back on fuel consumption and vehicle emissions. That's especially attractive to eco-conscious commuters who live in big cities where stop-and-start traffic is unavoidable. What's more, many modern air conditioning compressors operate off electricity and not via a car's engine, meaning vehicles with stop/start

technology will stay cool in the summer even when the engine shuts off.

Commuting to and from work may not seem like the most eco-friendly daily ritual. But there are ways to commute and conserve fuel at the same time.

Farm Safety Tips

When farming please follow these precautions in order to keep yourself, your family and your workers safe:

- Decrease your risk of being crushed by using lockout procedures before beginning any maintenance or repair work. Lockout means to physically neutralize all energies in a piece of equipment. Machines, devices or power transmission lines can be de-energized by applying blocks to all parts under tension or pressure, bleeding the hydraulic pressure from the lines or by releasing pressure from a coil or spring.
- Provide a safe, fenced play area for all children and supervise closely. The working area of the farm is not a playground any more than a construction site or other industrial area would be a play area. Review the safety rules on your farm with your family often. Fence off all manure, retaining ponds and dugouts, and lock buildings containing hazardous goods.

FIRE PERMITS NEEDED FOR OPEN BURNING

Individuals who plan to conduct open burning in Leduc County must have a fire permit.

A permit is needed for each open burn conducted between

March 1 and Oct. 31. Fire permits are free and are available from your local fire guardian.

Open burning is not allowed in hamlets, localities or subdivisions. You do not need a fire permit for contained fires in

approved firepits or burn barrels.

Individuals conducting open and/or contained burning must follow all fire restrictions and bans issued for Leduc County, which are posted to [albertafire-](http://albertafire-bans.ca)

bans.ca and leduc-county.com.

Business representatives who wish to have an open fire in the Nisku Business Park can apply for a fire permit online.
