ONOWAY REGIONAL FIRE SERVICES DECISION-MAKING AND COMMUNICATION PROCESS

The Councils of the undersigned member municipalities would like to make the Town of Onoway aware of concerns that have developed regarding decisions that are being made and communications that are being sent out on behalf of Onoway Regional Fire Services and its member municipalities.

As you are aware, the Town holds the Fire Services Agreement with our contracted service provider and the members municipalities have agreements with the Town for the provisions of fire services. Recently, the town been negligent in its duties, as they pertain to its various contracts. Most notably, the Town has been making decisions and issuing communications without prior discussion, direction, or approval from the Fire Services Committee. While this has been an ongoing issues for some time, there are two recent examples of this occurring that we would like to highlight, in order to demonstrate the issue: the December 21, 2023 letter from the Town and Lac Ste Anne County regarding changes to dispatch procedures, and the January 16, 2024 letter from Onoway to Chief Ives regarding medical consumables.

The December 21, 2023 letter outlines changes to dispatch protocols. It is our understanding that these changes occurred in October and were at the direction of Lac Ste Anne County. This letter, signed by the CAO of Onoway, implies that the Twon was both a

party to, and in favour of, this decision. These changes should not have been agreed to by the Town and a letter sent from the Town without first discussing the situation and the appropriate response with the Fire Service Committee. While these changes may appear inconsequential, and in fact they may be, it was not for the Town to decide. Further, it is prudent to remind the Town that the dual dispatch system originated after significant effort by the Town and its partner municipalities, on behalf of Onoway Regional Fire Services, following the deaths of four (4) people on Highway 633 in two separate incidents. We would like to know more about how the decision was made, Onoway's role in it, and how these changes are being implemented through the dispatch center. We would also appreciate written confirmation from the Town of Onoway that you have confirmed that Onoway Regional Fire Services is being called out to all calls where there is a life-safety risk. Public safety must be our number one priority, and this decision may very well put the safety of our residents in question.

The January 16, 2024 letter to Chief Ives also shows an example of decision being made without due process. Neither that Fire Services Committee nor the membership has passed a Fire Administration budget for the 2024 year. Without this budget being passed, we do not yet know what the committee or membership will approve regarding consumables in 2024. We ask that you do not make commitments on our behalf without due process. Further, the 2024 fire administration budget should have been passed in 2023 or early in 2024, yet no meeting have been scheduled for the purposes of passing the budget. We require that a meeting be scheduled with the Fire Services membership for the purpose of passing the 2024 budget.

The Town is also likely aware of a letter that was sent on January 10, 2024 from Lac Ste Anne County Reeve Blakeman regarding mutual aid and dual dispatch. In this letter, Reeve Blakeman states his belief that the Town of Onoway can independently make decisions, including changing service providers for Onoway Regional Fire Service, without the consent of the member municipalities. We are not sure why he believes this, but would like to ensure that the Town does not share in this sentiment. Both the Contract between the Town and Fire Recuse International (previously Northwest Fire and Recuse) and the Contracts between the Town and the member municipalities have a section regarding the Fire Services Committee. For ease of reference this section reads:

The Town will facilitate the creation of a Fire Services Committee comprised of such representatives of the Town and other municipalities with whom the Town has contracted respecting Fire Services as deemed appropriate. The Fire Service Committee shall have such dutirs as the Town, the other municipalities, and the committee deem appropriate. It is expected that these duties will include making recommendations to the Town respecting the use of any reserve fund created in respect of Fire Services. (The Fire Services Committee will initially consist of 3 elected representatives: one from Onoway, one from Alberta Beach, and one from the Summer Village group.)

This verbiage is the same in all agreements, with the exception of the part in brackets which is only included in the agreements between the Town and the member municipalities. Additionally, to refresh your memory, recently, our fire service provider changed its name and status to the non-profit, Fire Recuse International. This was an exercise in frustration as this simple change required the consent of all of Onoway Regional Fire Services member municipalities. We can only imagine the challenge the Town would have changing our fire service provider, even with the consent of the membership. We expect that, in the future, all decision and direction regrading Onoway Regional Fire Services be discussed and decided at the committee level. These are NOT decision for Onoway Council or Administration to make.

Reeve Blakeman's letter also highlights disappointment with the tone and nature of recent public communications. We agree there are recent communications, initiated by Fire Chief Ives, which have been unnecessary and/or inappropriate. It is important to note that the

Town is not faultless here. The comments made by Fire Chief Ives were an understandable and relatable reaction to being left in the dark on the nature and implementation of critical changes that have the potential to significantly impact public safety. Fire Chief Ives attempted to address these concerns with the Town, who should be its administrative advocate, not its gatekeeper, with limited success. The frustrations and communication from the Fire Chief Ives were, in part, the results of your administrative failure, and now we are all apologizing for this oversight - you should consider doing the same.

Further to this, we understand that, at your February 22, 2024 Regular Council meeting, a motion was passed to give one years notice to terminate the Fire Contract. We acknowledge that both the agreement between the Town and Fire Rescue International (Northwest Fire and Rescue) and the Town and the municipalities member have a termination clause, and the Town may terminate these agreements. However, our agreements with the Town specifically refer to the service provider bing Northwest Fire and Recuse (or Fire Recue International); any changes to the service provider for Onoway Regional Fire Service, without the consent of the group, is not contemplated in the agreement. Recall, again, the struggle we have had simply changing the name of our current service provider. We request the exact wording of the motion from February 22, 2024 Regular Council Meeting, so

that we may plan accordingly.

Although we are not surprised by the actions of Onoway Council and Administration, we are disappointed that significant decisions are being made, that impact the entire region without input or discussion from the Town's partners. We hoped that you would have the courage and resolution to at least hold a meeting and inform us of your intentions to withdraw from our agreements, instead of hastily passing an impactful motion that will put the health and safety of all our residents in jeopardy.

Finally, we would like to reiterate that Administration for the Town of Onoway should be managed separately from the Administration of Onoway Regional Fire Services and the Fire Service Contracts. What is in the best interest of the Town may not be in the best interest of Onoway Regional Fire Service, or vice versa. When acting in the capacity of administration for Fire Services it is your responsibility and obligation to work in the best interests of the fire service, as a whole, not the best interests of Onoway.





AGGRESSIVE DRIVING HAS NO PLACE ON THE ROAD

Congested roadways and hectic schedules can anger drivers in a hurry to get from point A to point B. While it's easy to grow frustrated on the road, the growing number of incidents of road rage and driver aggression is a significant concern that should make drivers think twice before venting their frustrations when behind the wheel.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says the number of fatal accidents involv-

ing enraged drivers has increased tenfold since 2004. Between 2010 and 2013, the percentage of drivers in the Washington, D.C. who said they often felt "uncontrollable anger toward another driver on the road" doubled, from 6 percent to 12 percent. Aggression on the part of drivers is routinely cited as a major contributor to many fatal crashes and other accidents.

According to the American Psychological Association, some people may be predisposed to road rage. Risk-takers, individuals who tend to anger more easily and people who identify as being generally aggressive or take-charge types may have a higher propensity to get angry behind the wheel.

The term 'road rage' was coined by a local Los Angeles, Calif., news station after shootings occurred on several freeways in that city. NHT-SA defines road rage as a driver "committing moving traffic offenses so as to endanger other persons or property; an assault with a motor vehicle or other dangerous weapon by the operator or passenger of one motor vehicle on the operator or passengers of another motor vehicle." Road rage and aggressive driving are similar, but in the eyes of the law, road rage may result in a criminal charge while aggression may lead to a traffic citation.

While few drivers can say they have never *Continued on Page 11*

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become heated while driving, routine rage or aggressiveness is a cause for concern. The following are some ways drivers can tame their aggressive driving.

 Allow for ample time to get to your destination. Feeling rushed on the way to an appointment or event may encourage risky road behavior or make you more likely to quickly lose your patience with fellow motorists. Allow for plenty of time to get where you need to go and you may feel calmer and more in control should traffic spring up. Even calling a party at your destination and explaining the traffic situation can alleviate tension.

• Share your commute. Commuters are more likely to experience road rage than non-commuters, simply because they tend to be on the roads each day in the heart of busy traffic. Carpool with another person to break up the driving responsibilities. Sitting in the passenger seat a few times per week may help keep your aggression levels in check.

• Think before reacting. It's tempting to yell or signal to a driver that you are angered by his or her reckless driving. But take a few deep breaths before reacting, and you may feel more relaxed and more willing to let things go.

• Practice safe driving habits. Set an example on the roadways by following the speed limit, driving courteously and yielding to drivers when necessary. It's better to drive defensively at all times than risk getting into an accident by driving aggressively.

Aggressive driving has the potential to be dangerous. Curbing driver anger is one of the keys to keeping the roadways safe.

We have the equipment, training, and facilities to provide an efficient, effective, and quality fire service to our region.

Intermunicipal partnerships between Lac Ste. Anne County and neighbouring municipalities are regular municipal business; and the County strives to work with and support our neighbours. It is common for a municipality to ask Lac Ste. Anne County to provide a myriad of services via Intermunicipal Partnership Agreements – including FCSS, library services, planning, fire services, and more. Many of these are *fees for* services. Collaboration and partnership have long been in place between Lac Ste. Anne County and all our local municipalities including the Town of Onoway.

With that, the County has witnessed chatter around the Town of Onoway Council's recent decision to terminate its Fire Services contract with their current provider, which is their right to do through the democratic process. Every municipality has autonomy to make decisions they believe are beneficial to their municipality, including the engagement and termination of contracts and contractor services.

A decision for an agreement for Lac Ste. Anne County to provide fire services to the Town of Onoway has not been made. The County, at the request of our neighbouring municipalities, has provided an offer to provide, and/or partner in, the provision of those myriad services – including fire services.

As tax season arrives, Canadians are bracing for more than just the usual paperwork. Thanks to the Liberal government, this April 1st marks significant tax increases: a 2% excise tax on alcohol (increasing to an annual 4.7% in 2026) and a 23% increase in the carbon tax. I wish to extend my deepest thanks to the many individuals across Yellowhead who responded to my previous OP-ED by sharing their heating bills. Your contributions have highlighted the outrageous cost of the carbon tax, underscoring the real-life impact of government policies on the cost of living.

These tax increases are part of an escalator tax mechanism, a strategy deployed by the Liberals that ensures annual tax hikes without parliamentary debate or vote. This automatic increase mechanism strips away any semblance of accountability or transparency in how we are taxed, essentially bypassing democratic processes.

The irony of these tax hikes is not lost on me; as Canadians pay more, the quality of government services does not improve-in fact, in many cases, it worsens. Since Trudeau was elected, the government bureaucracy has increased by over 100,000 employees, with spending on public services up by more than \$151 billion in that same period. Yet, Canadians are left asking: where is the value for our hard-earned taxpayer dollars?

Furthermore, ample evidence points to wasteful spending and mismanagement of taxpayer dollars, from the failed safe supply drug experiment that has tragically failed to address addiction, to scandals and corruption like ArriveCAN, which has seen taxpayer money funneled into the pockets of corrupt individuals within the government. These examples are not just fiscal missteps; they are betrayals of the public trust.

As we navigate this tax season, it's crucial to reflect on the broader implications of the NDP-Liberal government's financial policies. It's evident that Canadians deserve better. We deserve a government that respects taxpayer dollars, invests wisely in public services, and ensures accountability for every dollar spent.

The Conservative vision is clear: a Canada where taxes are fair, government is accountable, and public services are efficient. I pledge to continue to fight for these ideals, ensuring that the voices of Yellowhead residents are heard loud and clear, and working towards a future where your hard-earned money is respected and well-utilized.

That's why my KGB instructors specifically made the point: never bother with leftists. Forget about these political prostitutes. Aim higher. [...] They serve a purpose only at the stage of destabilization of a nation. For example, your leftists in the United States: all these professors and all these beautiful civil rights defenders. They are instrumental in the process of the subversion only to destabilize a nation. When their job is completed, they are not needed any more. They know too much. Some of them, when they get disillusioned, when they see that Marxist-Leninists come to power-obviously they get offended-they think that they will come to power. That will never happen, of course. They will be lined up against the wall and shot."

The Nurenburg trials post World War 2 brought the full horror to light of how populations could not only be controlled, but made complacent, to scared, to apathetic to do anything. We would like to say that all these items are in the past, that it could and never would happen again. What most folks fail to realize, is that when these methods are employed, it's a long game, typically, it takes years. It only seems rapid once the stage is set, and the real plan is put into motion, when it's "Too Late" to turn back.




