• Electric or propane meat smokers.

The fire ban will remain in effect until conditions improve.

The operation of Off Highway Vehicles (OHV) within the Town of Whitecourt is prohibited under the Traffic Bylaw 1573 which prohibits OHV use within Town boundaries between April 1 and November 30 annually. Penalties for contravening Bylaw 1573 range from monetary fines to OHV seizure.

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HOW TO ADDRESS CEILING STAINS

Many stains are instantly noticeable. But while a wine stain on a light-colored carpet or a gravy stain on a white shirt tend to jump out right away, other stains sneak past our radars every day. Ceiling stains are one type of stain that tend to go unnoticed for long periods of time. But ceiling stains can be unsightly, and some are even indicative of a larger problem, so it pays for homeowners to address stains on their ceilings as soon as possible.

• Start with the source. Low kitchen ceilings tend to fall victim to oil stains, which are an unfortunate side effect of cooking. But not all stains can be so easily traced to their origins. Some ceiling stains, such as those in bathrooms, may be a byproduct of mold, while others may be indicative of plumbing problems. Identifying the source of a stain is often the first step toward eradicating it.

• Fix the problem. Once you have identified

what's causing the stain, fix the problem as soon as possible. Ceiling stains are often indicative of much larger problems, and the longer those problems are allowed to fester, the bigger they become. Some water stains on ceilings result from cracks or joints that have not been adequately sealed or caulked. Reseal or recaulk any cracks you suspect are leading to ceiling stains. If you have determined a leaky roof is behind your stained ceilings, then

have the roof inspected for damage, and prepare yourself to finance a new roof if the inspector determines that's the best solution.

• Cover nearby furniture. If you find ceiling stains above living areas, then be sure to cover the furniture below such ceilings with a tarp. Even if your stain solution will be made primarily of water, you don't want to risk compounding your ceiling stain problem by staining your


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furniture as well.

· Remove the stains. Different stains require different treatments. A solution made of water and bleach may be effective at removing ceiling stains, but only apply such solutions on days when you can open the windows and air out your home. Larger stains may require the application of a stain blocker, which may need to be applied with a roller and brush. No matter the stain, you need to leave time for the ceiling to dry before you can move on. Opening the windows can prevent your home from being overcome by the smell of bleach and also speed up the time it takes the ceiling to dry.

Cover the ceiling with primer. Once the ceiling has completely dried, you can apply a stain-blocking primer to prevent future stains. Allow the primer ample time to dry.

· Apply a fresh coat of paint. After the primer has dried completely, you can then repaint the ceiling. Some paints may blend in even if you only paint the affected areas of the ceiling, but others will require a complete repainting of the ceiling. The eye test will help you determine how much work you have to do in that regard.

The NASA Clean Air Study, led in association with the Associated Landscape Contractors of America, found that certain common indoor plants naturally remove toxic agents such as benzene, formaldehyde and trichloroethylene from the air. Efficient air cleaning is accomplished with at least one plant per 100 square feet of home or office space.

Proper disposal

I would ask that those that want to cast stones, act like trolls, and if you can't change your nature, direct your attention at me. I have no problem responding and dealing with you directly, and ironically, a number of you already have my cell phone number, and you have never been shy on using it in the past, so please, let my staff do what they need to do in peace, because you are only tearing down good folks that are trying their best to help others.

I was told by a number of folks that I am a bit of a storyteller, and they explained to me that it is a good thing. A powerful thing that helps to bring folks in on a personal level and help articulate an idea or a thought. Perhaps it's my country upbringing, when you visit with folks it's over a coffee and are catching up because it's been a while. It's about sharing real experiences, and spending quality time.

One childhood story I recently told a number of folks that I hadn't thought about for years, but with

federal policy, and listening to the debate from the opposition in the house it all came back.

When I was about 13, it was a late spring, ponds and rivers were still frozen over, snow on the ground, and we were still feeding the cows in the pens, and just wrapping up calving season.

Out checking the cows, I came across a young moose trying to jump into the water trough and trying to stay in amongst the cows for the feed. The young moose looked sick, skinny, acting funny, and had one terrible looking coat, all blotchy. We called Fish and Wildlife; they said there wasn't much we could do and to let nature take its course. The moose was probably trying to get into the water to drown the tics that were feeding from it. They had similar calls, but we were not allowed to treat the animal, we had to let nature take its course.

The moose died a few days later, and to me it was heart breaking, the animal didn't deserve to die that way, killed by parasites. It died in the corrals, and it was up to me to burn it, making sure that the cows didn't come into contact with it. Diesel fuel and a tiger torch...I know cowboys aren't supposed to cry but I wept, sadness, frustration and anger all combined, thinking of how that poor animal had suffered.

That memory came back to me recently in wake of the harmful effects the NDP / Liberals have had both Nationally and Provincially since 2015. I can't rationalize why the Alberta NDP on a whole still support it?

It wasn't one tic that brought that moose down, it was thousands. 

WHITECOURT WELCOMES NEW DIRECTOR OF INFRASTRUCTURE




