Parkland RCMP arrested and charged a 29-year-old male. Resources have been provided to support the family and the victim.

Edmonton resident, Kendrik Bozman (29) has been charged with:

- Sexual Interference;
- Sexual Assault;
- Luring a Child.

Bozman was brought before a Justice of the Peace and he was released on a release order with conditions on April 25, 2024. His next court appearance is on May 8, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain.

Police are investigating the possibility that there could be additional victims in Alberta. In this case the victim and suspect were not known to each other and that

Snapchat was utilized to lure the youth. Bozman utilizes the Snapchat profile name "Dagshelgr" and police advise that it is not uncommon for perpetrators to utilize alternative social media platforms and different user names. Police encourage parents to talk to their children about this incident and immediately report to the police if there has been any contact with Bozman.

Police also encourage parents to talk to their children about internet safety. Parkland RCMP encourages the public, including parents, families and youth to visit the Canadian Centre for Child Protection website for additional resources.

To protect the identity of the youth, there is a publication ban, and the victim cannot be named.

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# CENTRAL ALBERTA DISTRICT CRIME REDUCTION UNIT (CAD CRU) MAKE SIGNIFICANT SEIZURE AND LAY CHARGES

On April 11, 2024, CAD CRU were asked to assist Thorsby/ Breton RCMP with a break and enter investigation. RCMP received information that a civilian was following a suspect vehicle believed to be involved in a break and enter when it slowed and then shot at the civilian

As a result of the investigation, CAD CRU identified a suspect and requested assistance from Edmonton Police Service in conducting surveillance. As a result of their assistance, RCMP were able to obtain two search warrants, one for a property in Breton Detachment area and one for a residence in Parkland Detachment area

On the morning of April 12, 2024, a break and enter was

reported in Rimbey Detachment area, where numerous items including a truck and trailer were reported stolen. This truck and trailer, along with another truck, were observed returning to the Breton residence, at which time RCMP Emergency Response Team executed the search warrant. During this, one of the suspects used the vehicle he was driving and rammed police vehicles in an attempt to escape. This vehicle was later was determined to be a stolen vehicle which had been re-vinned Both drivers were arrested, which a search incidental to arrest resulted in the seizure of the following:

- a loaded 9mm Beretta
- 682 grams of suspected methamphetamine
- 70 grams of suspected cocaine.

Also inside the vehicle were

numerous items that had been stolen from the Rimbey break and enter. It is believed that all items taken from this break and enter were recovered, including a truck and trailer, a gun safe containing 8 hunting rifles/shotguns, jewellery, passports, and food.

The search of the Breton property identified numerous stolen items, including the following:

- Vehicles
- Side by sides
- Snowmobiles
- Tools
- Flat deck trailers
  - A hot tub

The approximate value of the recovered items at this scene is \$120,000.

The Parkland residence search warrant was also executed on the same day. As a result of this search warrant, the following was seized:

- Vehicles
- Holiday trailers
- A side by side
- Enclosed trailers
- Flat deck trailersA boat
- 2 firearms

The approximate value of the recovered items at this scene is \$320,000.

As a result of this investigation, Justin Handbury (38), a resident of Alder Flats, has been charged with 64 offences, some of which include:

- Break and Enter (x2)
- Possession of stolen property over \$5000 (x15)
- Possession of stolen property under \$5000 (x7)
- Possession of a restricted / prohibited firearm
- Possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking (x2)

- Possession of stolen property under \$5000 (x7)


Monds was released for court in Alberta Court of Justice on April 24 in Breton.

The completion of TMX is monumental for Alberta, since this will significantly increase our province's output. It will triple the capacity of the original pipeline to now carry 890,000 barrels per day of crude oil

from Alberta's oil sands to British Columbia's Pacific Coast.

"We are excited that Canada's biggest and newest oil pipeline in more than a decade can now bring oil from Edmonton to tidewater in B.C. This will allow us to get our energy resources to Pacific markets, including Washington State and California, and Asian markets

like Japan, South Korea, China and India. Alberta now has new energy customers, and tankers with Alberta oil will be unloading in China and India in the next few months.

TMX will also result in billions of dollars of economic prosperity for Albertans, Indigenous communities and Canadians, and create well-paying jobs throughout Canada.

"Our province wants to congratulate the Trans Mountain Corporation for its tenacity to have completed this long awaited and much-needed energy infrastructure, and to thank the more than 30,000 dedicated, skilled workers whose efforts made this extraordinary project a reality. The province also wants to thank the federal government for seeing this project through. This is a great example of an area where the provincial and federal government can cooperate and work together for the benefit of Albertans and all Canadians."

# ALBERTA RCMP SERIOUS CRIMES BRANCH CONCLUDE LENGTHY CHILD ABUSE INVESTIGATION

Albert RCMP continue their investigation into child abuse allegations involving several individuals. Following the initial arrest of Sherina Maria Handsor (43), the RCMP Serious Crimes Branch arrested Nicole Kathleen Barrett (45), a resident of Whitecourt, Alta. This is in connection to the same investigation involving Handsor.

On April 24, 2024, RCMP arrested and charged Nicole Barrett with;

- Failure to Provide Necessities of Life (x3);
- Assault.

Barrett was taken before a Justice of the Peace and released on bail including conditions that restrict contact with the victims. Barrett's next court appearance is set for May 28, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Whitecourt.

Five new victims have come forward to the RCMP reporting historical child abuse offences while in Handsor's care in White-court and Quesnel, BC. RCMP identified two additional victims, totalling seven new victims of child abuse. As a result, on April 29, 2024, RCMP charged Sherina Maria Handsor with 13 additional charges related to historical child abuse including;

- Failure to Provide Necessities of life (x7);
- Assault with a weapon;
- Assault causing bodily harm;
- Assault (x3);
- Administrating noxious substance (x2).

Handsor was taken before

Alberta a Justice of the Peace and remanded into custody. Her next court appearance is set continon into the Court of Justice in Stony Plain, Alta.

Information received during the course of the investigation suggests that there may be other victims

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# 7 THINGS TO CONSIDER WHEN BUYING A SHED

Backyard sheds can be useful assets. Sheds can create storage space in the garage, basement or other areas of the house that have become gathering spots for gear typically used outdoors. Sheds are ideal for housing mowers, tools and even pool-care equipment. But they can be put to other uses as well, such as being key spots to engage in hobbies or even as a child's clubhouse.

Various factors should be considered before building or buying a shed. A storage shed can be a significant investment. Once placed, sheds may remain in their dedicated spots for years to come. That means careful thought should go into the planning process.

1. Check your local building codes first. Before you accumulate building materials or order a shed, be sure to know the ins and outs of shed codes. The codes may impact the shed's placement, construction, the materials used, size, and numerous other factors. It's much easier to amend plans beforehand than to face the hassle and expense after learning you did things incorrectly.

2. Choose placement wisely. Spend several days assessing the yard and thinking about the uses for the shed. If there is a soggy patch of land that can turn swampy under the shed's foundation, that is a poor location choice. 3. Consider the design. Just because a shed is for storage doesn't mean aesthetics should overlooked. Choose a shed style that complements your home. You may also want to match certain architectural features, like arched doorways or dormers. Design also may relate to practicality. For instance, storing a riding mower inside may necessitate dual doors that open widely.

4. Invest in quality materials. Spending a little more and using quality materials can ensure it lasts long enough to be cost-effective. The right materials will be resistant to splitting, cracking, decay, and insect damage.

5. Prepare the site well. A proper foundation for the shed is almost as important as the shed itself. You cannot just drop the shed on the lawn and leave it, as the shed can

sink or structural issues may arise if it is placed on a weak base.

6. Blend into the environment. Surround the shed with shrubs or plants so that it blends into the yard and complements the space.

7. Deck out the interior. Use every storage tool at your disposal to maximize floor, wall and even rafter space for storage. Plan where items will be kept and customize the storage options around

those locations.

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

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# DROUGHT AND FLOOD PROTECTION PROGRAM NOW OPEN

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's new Drought and Flood Protection Program is now accepting applications for projects to help protect homes, businesses and lives.

Many parts of Alberta have experienced flooding in recent years, while others have seen water shortages and may face severe drought this year. Many communities need assistance in developing the expensive local infrastructure needed to protect residents from extreme weather events.

To help, Alberta's government is launching the new \$125-million Drought and Flood Protection Program. Municipalities and Indige-

nous communities across the province can now apply for funding to improve their drought and flood resilience and adapt to severe weather.

"We are helping communities build the infrastructure they need to help protect people's homes and keep businesses going during droughts or floods. These emergencies can devastate public infrastructure and private property, damage the environment, disrupt our economy and put lives at risk. That's why I encourage any and all communities to apply."

Rebecca Schulz, Minister of Environment and Protected Areas

The Drought and Flood Protection Program builds on the work of the Alberta Community Resilience Program. This year, \$25 million is being made available for projects to benefit communities across the province that are facing drought and flood. Another \$100 million will be available for funding over the next four years, with applications accepted each year.

The Drought and Flood Protection Program will help communities design and construct projects that protect critical infrastructure from drought and flooding and help ensure public safety is protected. This could include important drought-related projects to improve water storage, upgrading open-ditch irrigation canals to reduce water loss through evaporation, or relocating water

intakes to help communities access water during dry periods. It could also include flood-related projects, such as berms, flood walls and other infrastructure.

Applications for shovel-ready projects are strongly encouraged, but all projects that meet the eligibility criteria will be considered for funding. All municipalities, Improvement Districts, Special Areas, Metis Settlements and First Nations are eligible to apply by June 6, 2024.

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.


2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.
