

The vehicle involved, was later discovered to have been stolen and had been reported by witnesses as tailgating and driving at excess of speeds of 150 km/hr. During the course of the investigation, the vehicle was abandoned and the driver was observed attempting to flee from officers into a wooded area. Numerous police resources including the K Division Police Dog

Services and the K Division Emergency Response Team were deployed to the scene in the interest of ensuring public safety.

As a result of this incident, RCMP arrested the driver, Shayde Beaverbone, a 24-year-old male resident of Hinton, Alta. Shayde has been charged with:

- Dangerous driving;
- Fail to stop for a police officer;
- Possession of proper-

ty obtained by crime over \$5000;

•Possession of a prohibited weapon & several other firearms related offences.

•Resist arrest /obstruct a Peace Officer.

Shayde was taken before a Justice of the Peace and subsequently remanded with his next court appearances set for Nov. 5, 2024 at the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley.

INCLUSIVE PLAYGROUND AT WILLOW PARK OPENS TO THE PUBLIC

On Tuesday, Oct. 29, the City of Leduc opened its newest inclusive playground allowing children of all abilities the opportunity to play with their friends and classmates.

The playground, located at Willow Park, features a wheelchair accessible glider swing, a ground level wheelchair accessible spinner; first in the region, and four slides that include spiral, straight, open top, and tunnel.

"This playground is not just a space for fun," said Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "It is so much more than that. It is a symbol of Leduc's commitment to inclusion and accessibility. This new playground is a space where children – regardless of ability – can play, explore, and grow together."

In total, the playground cost \$700,000. Of that, \$125,000 was paid for in grant funding from the Government of Alberta (\$125,000) and Canadian Tire Jumpstart Program (\$25,000).

The grant funding, secured for the project by the Kinsmen Club of Leduc, allowed for the addition of three components to be installed: accessible seating, a core-board communication panel for non-verbal users, and a

wheelchair accessible swing. Additional playground features:

- STEM/STEAM free-standing play miracle machine;

first in the region

- Sensory play equipment including smooth, textured, visual, auditory and uneven play components

- A rope climber

- Playhouse for imaginative play

- Symbol-based communication board

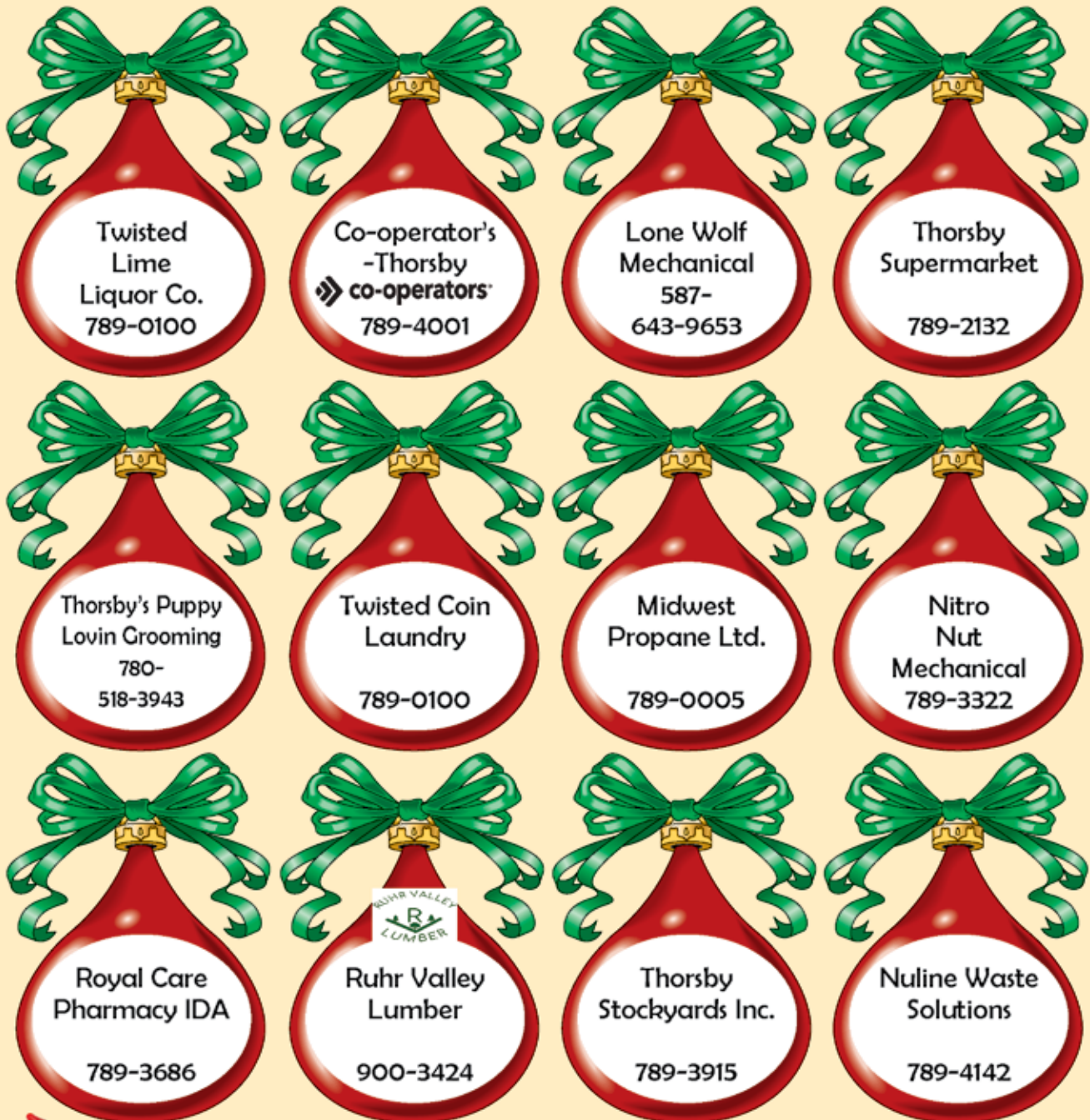

safety of drivers and their passengers.

Why replace bulbs two at a time?

Though replacing both headlight bulbs when only one is dimming may seem unwarranted, maintaining a consistent light output from both headlights makes the road safer for drivers, their passengers and oncoming motorists. When only one bulb is replaced, the result-

ing light output can be both unbalanced and unpredictable, providing inadequate lighting that can compromise driver visibility. In addition, when one bulb burns out or starts dimming, the other bulb will likely follow, forcing drivers to deal with the expense and inconvenience of getting it replaced all over again.

How else can drivers improve visibility?

In addition to prop-

erly maintaining their headlights, drivers can take the following proactive measures to make nighttime driving safer.

- Replace worn out wiper blades each season or in three-month intervals to ensure adequate visibility during rain or snow.

- Clean interior glass and mirrors to remove any film-like buildup that reduces vision and creates hazy reflections from the

sun. This is especially important for smokers who smoke while driving.

- Don't hang accessories on rearview mirrors. This includes fuzzy dice, photos and other items that can be distracting and block your vision.

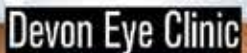

ACCOUNTABILITY FOR OTTAWA'S CARBON TAX DOUBLE STANDARD

Alberta's government has filed an application at the federal court challenging the constitutionality and legality of Canada's heating oil carbon tax exemption.

Alberta's government is standing up against the federal government's carbon tax exemption for heating oil to protect Albertans from the double standard Ottawa has created with the carbon tax, which means Albertans continue to pay carbon taxes to stay warm in winter.

Last fall, after years of insisting that the carbon tax is applied equally across Canada, the federal government exempted the carbon tax for heating oils, which are used predominantly in Atlantic Canada and Quebec. Over the last year, the federal government has refused multiple requests to grant a similar

carve-out on other heating methods from Alberta and others across the country who are also facing rising costs of living.

Alberta's government will now take this fight to the courts. Alberta filed an application seeking judicial review of the exemption with the Federal Court on Oct. 29, asking the court to declare that the exemption is both unconstitutional and unlawful. The application argues that Ottawa's carbon tax exemption for heating oil is unconstitutional and inconsistent with the Government of Canada's stated purpose for enacting the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act.

"Last year, Ottawa decided Canadians in the East deserved a three-year break from paying the carbon tax on their home heating costs. While we're happy for these Canadians, Alberta, Saskatchewan and other provinces who heat their homes with natural gas have been

deliberately excluded from these savings. Albertans simply cannot stand by for another winter while the federal government picks and chooses who their carbon tax applies to. Since they won't play fair, we're going to take the federal government back to court."

While the Supreme Court of Canada previously found the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act was constitutional, it found that Canada's jurisdiction to regulate greenhouse gas emissions was limited to the ability to create minimum national standards for carbon pricing for the purpose of reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Alberta strongly opposes the federal carbon tax exemption on heating oil, as the federal government is no longer creating minimum national standards that apply evenly across the country, and is instead creating a regime that favours one

region and fuel type over others.

"This exemption is not only unfair to the vast majority of Canadians, but it is also unlawful as the federal government does not have the authority to make special exemptions for certain parts of the country under the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act. The federal government isn't even following its own laws now. Someone needs to hold them accountable, and Alberta is stepping up to do just that."

The federal carbon tax adds to the rising cost of living for all Canadians. By 2030, it will cost Canadians \$25 billion every year, in addition to lowering the gross domestic product (GDP) by \$9 billion. In addition, the Bank of Canada has estimated that the federal carbon tax increases inflation by 0.15 per cent year over year.

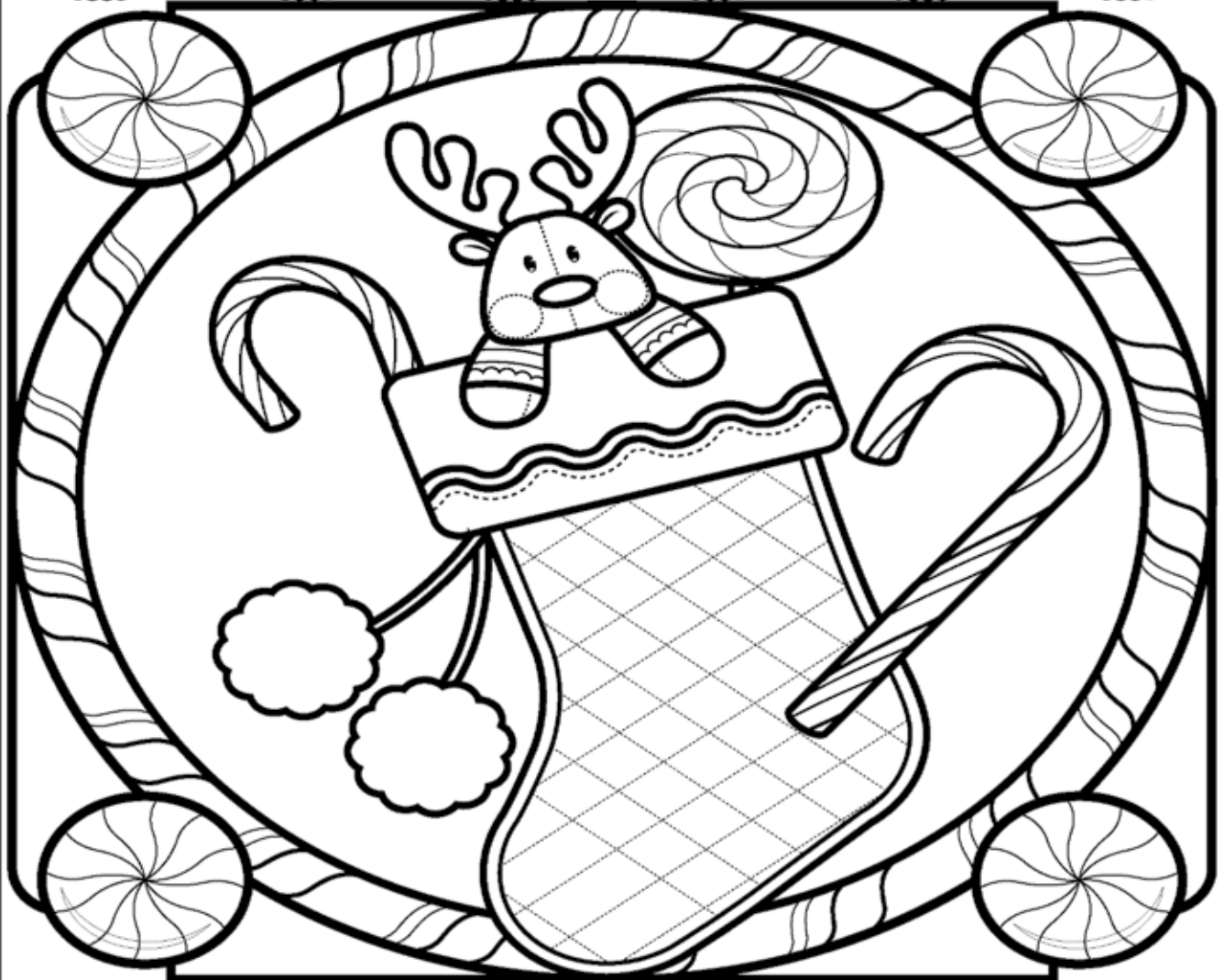
