RCMP is warning the public about a fake jewelry scam, as they have been noticing a significant rise of this fraudulent scheme where a middle-aged man (sometime with a female passenger) is claiming they need money and wanting to exchange jewelry for cash. In each case, the jewelry was found to be fake after the transaction was completed. The Alberta RCMP is also noticing this trend across the province.

These scammers look legitimate and trustworthy which makes it important to be vigilant.

If a stranger is asking for money in exchange of jewelry, or other goods, please be mindful of the current scam and walk away. Jewelry and gold should be purchased from a reputable dealer.

FRAUDULENT BANK DRAFT USED IN WETASKIWIN TO PURCHASE SNOWMOBILES

On Jan. 6, 2025, RCMP are investigating a case of fraud after a fraudulent bank draft was used to purchase 2 Snowmobiles and a trailer, leaving the dealership out of pocket and deeply impacted.

The dealership was approached by the buyer with what appeared to be a legitimate bank draft. After the transaction was complete, the victim discovered that the bank draft was counterfeit, leaving them without their snowmobiles and payment.

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March 19, 2025 Community VOICE Page 3 CITY OF LEDUC ANNOUNCES PLANS TO EXPAND MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY

On Feb. 3, 2025, Leduc City Council approved submission of a Notice of Intent to Annex lands to the south and southeast of the city's existing municipal boundary.

This written notice has been sent to Leduc County, Municipal Affairs, the Land and Property Rights Tribunal (LPRT) and all local authorities allowed to operate or provide services in the City of Leduc.

"Leduc is at a pivotal moment," says Bob Young, Mayor of the City of Leduc. "We have a responsibility to plan to accommodate growth pressures. By making intentional plans based on anticipated growth we can avoid real-world negative impacts on residents - like higher housing prices or more costly infrastructure and service delivery."

Leduc is one of the fastest growing communities in Alberta. Based on an evaluation of land supply, completed in 2023, the City of Leduc may require at least 38 quarter-sections of developable lands currently within the municipal boundary of Leduc County to accommodate Leduc's projected growth through 2076.

This is the start of a lengthy legislated process, which the City expects to stretch into 2027: • In-depth technical studies must be completed

• The City will work collaboratively with the County to develop the annexation application

• Public engagement will be conducted with County landowners and City residents • An application will be submitted to the Land and Property Rights Tribunal

• A LPRT public hearing may be held if needed

• The provincial government will make the final decision

"Working with Leduc County through this pro-

cess is a priority for the City," Young says. "And we look forward to connecting with County residents, City residents, and other stakeholders to share information and hear their feedback and ideas."

Drayton Valley RCMP successfully charged 2 individuals.

Tyler Nicholas Gale (29), a resident of Drayton Valley was charged with a total of 44 offenses including: unauthorized possession of firearms/ammunition x 7, possession of prohibited firearms x 3, unauthorized possession of prohibited weapons x 4, careless use of a firearm x 11, extortion, possession of cocaine, possession of an explosive device x 2, uttering threats, obstruction to police and additional offences relating to weapons offenses.

Gale was brought before a Justice of the Peace, where he was remanded with a court date of Mar. 4, 2025, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley.



Drayton Valley RCMP seized 9 firearms, including 1 prohibited firearm. 1 improvised explosive device, several weapons and a cocaine.

HOW DRIVERS CAN ENHANCE NIGHTTIME VISIBILITY

Many drivers are considerably less comfortable driving at night than during the day. Even though roads tend to be less congested when the sun goes down, reduced visibility at night can compromise the safety of drivers and their passengers.

Statistics indicate that drivers' fears of driving at night are not unwarranted.

According to the National Safety Council®, traffic death rates are three times greater at night than during the day, and the anxiety many drivers feel when behind the wheel at night no doubt contributes to nighttime driving fatalities. But drivers who take steps to enhance their nighttime visibility may feel more comfortable driving at night, making the roads safer for themselves, their passengers and their fellow motorists.

• Turn your headlights on earlier. Daytime running lights can make it easier for drivers to be seen during the day, but they are not designed for nighttime driving. If you find yourself struggling to see as evening transitions into nighttime, turn your headlights on earlier or use your car's automatic switch setting if it has one.

· Prioritize headlight maintenance. Headlight maintenance is often overlooked, but properly maintained headlights can go a long way toward improving driver visibility at night. Check your headlight bulbs. If they are more than three years old or dimming, it would be a good idea to replace them to ensure the best performance. Headlamp clouding is also an issue. Plastic headlamp lenses, which are common on most vehicles.

It takes a village to raise a child – and a community to graduate a rural nurse.

Drayton Valley has embraced this idea, partnering with the University of Calgary (UCalgary) and Alberta Health Services (AHS) to bring the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN) program to town.

In September, the program welcomed its first nine students, combining virtual learning with hands-on labs and clinical training to prepare them for a future as registered nurses.

"We are a community of 6,700 people three hours away from Calgary, 1.5 hours from Edmonton, and we wanted to make sure we provided a service that allowed people to stay

within Drayton Valley if they wanted," says Kundiso Nyambirai, growth services manager for the Town of Drayton Valley.

The town reached out to UCalgary and AHS as a potential location for the newest iteration of the Bachelor of Nursing – Rural Community Route program, which launched with its first set of students in Wainwright in 2021.

As part of the partnership, the town provides free classroom space, Internet access, printer, and people to watch over exams at the Clean Energy Technology Centre, which also houses the Health Care Aide Academy and space for tutors and homeschooled children.

In addition to the physical space, town and industry donors are well-positioned to offer financial help to students through the Zero-Fee Tuition program, which can provide up to \$5,000 per eligible student. Area businesses raised \$40,000 to help support the grants, which are offered to students of the BScN program as well as the other post-secondary programs offered in town.

Nyambirai says subsidizing tuition helps remove educational barriers and allows students to climb the next step in their educational journey.

"It's quite important to us. Whether it's getting academic upgrading so they can level up some of the subjects they didn't do so well in in high school, to where today I'm looking to attract certificate programs, diploma programs and degrees. So, we were looking for the next level for students, right? It's that continuity." The town is trying to further sweeten its offerings to students, as staff work on a student recreation package, which offers a subsidized student rate for pool and recreation centre access, in addition to ongoing conversations to secure prioritized daycare spaces for students with children – all in an effort to retain healthcare workers locally.

In addition to the town's efforts and the support of area businesses, the Drayton Valley Health Foundation is planning its contribution to healthcare education and long-term community wellness as well. The group plans to support the creation of a future eSIM lab. The eSIM (educate, simulate, innovate, motivate) lab uses simulation to recreate clinical events safely.

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In addition to benefiting patients in the region, eSIMs can help with skills development, recruitment and retention of healthcare staff.

"You have young adults born and raised in Drayton Valley who see opportunities elsewhere, and that's tough from an economic development perspective because the 18-25 age group is meant to be a workforce for the community and they're the ones most susceptible to outmigration," says Nyambirai. "For businesses looking to locate here, they can find these amenities in Drayton Valley. And for a young workforce, compared to other communities, it makes us as capable as we can be."

The first year of the BScN program in Drayton Valley is

already underway, but applications are being accepted for the second cohort of students to begin the program next September. Deadline to apply is March 1.

ALBERTA RCMP EMPLOYEES RECEIVE KING CHARLES III'S CORONATION MEDAL

Alberta is introducing a flat monthly parent fee of \$326.25 for full-time licensed child care, or roughly \$15 a day.

As part of the \$3.8-billion Canada-Alberta Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement, Alberta is supporting families to access affordable child care across the province with their choice in provider.

Starting Apr. 1, parents with children zero to kindergarten age attending full-time licensed daycare facilities and family day home programs across the province will be eligible for a flat parent fee of \$326.25 per month, or roughly \$15 a day. Parents requiring parttime care will pay \$230 per month.

To support these changes and high-quality child care, about 85 per cent of licensed daycare providers will receive a funding increase once the new fee structure is in place on Apr. 1.

Every day, parents and families across Alberta rely on licensed child-care providers to support their children's growth and development while going to work or school. Licensed child-care providers and early childhood educators play a crucial role in helping children build the skills they need to support their growth and overall health. As Alberta's population grows, the need for high-quality, affordable and accessible licensed and regulated child care is increasing.

While Alberta already reduced parent fees to an average of \$15 a day in January 2024, many families are still paying much more depending on where they live, the age of their child and the child-care provider they choose, which has led to inconsistency and confusion. Many families find it difficult to estimate their child-care fees if they move or switch providers, and providers have expressed concerns about the fairness and complexity of the current funding framework.

A flat monthly fee will provide transparency and predictability for families in every part of the province while also improving fairness to providers and increasing overall system efficiency. On behalf of families, Alberta's government will cover about 80 per cent of child-care fees through grants to daycare facilities and family day homes.

This means a family using full-time daycare could save, on average, \$11,000 per child per year. A flat monthly parent fee will ensure child care is affordable for everyone and that providers are compensated for the important services they offer.

As opposed to a flat monthly parent fee, Alberta's government will reimburse preschools up to \$100 per month per child on parents' behalf, up from \$75.

"Albertans deserve affordable child-care options, no matter where they are or which type of care works best for them. We are bringing in flat parent fees for families so they can all access high-quality child care for the same affordable, predictable fee."

To make Alberta's childcare system affordable for all families, the flat monthly parent fee is replacing the Child Care Subsidy Program for children zero to kindergarten age attending child care during regular school hours. The subsidy for children attending outof-school care is not changing.

As the province transitions to the new flat parent fee, child-care providers will have flexibility to offer optional services for an additional supplemental parent fee. These optional services must be over and above the services that are provided to all children in individual child-care programs. Clear requirements will be in place for providers to prevent preferential child-care access for families choosing to pay for optional services.

Cutting red tape and supporting child-care providers

By moving to a flat monthly parent fee, Alberta's government is continuing

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the transition to a primarily publicly funded child care system. To support high-quality child care, approximately 85 per cent of licensed daycare providers will receive a funding increase once the new structure is in place on Apr. 1.

The province is enhancing the system to streamline the child-care claims process used to reimburse licensed child-care providers on behalf of Alberta parents. Alberta's government is also putting technological solutions in place to reduce

administrative burden and red tape.

Looking ahead

Over the final year of the federal agreement, Alberta's government is working to support the child-care system while preparing to negotiate the next term of the agreement, reflective of the needs of Albertans and providers. Alberta joins its provincial and territorial partners across the country in calling for a sustainable, adequately funded system that works for parents and providers long term.

IMPROVING ACCESS TO LIFE-SAVING CANCER TREATMENT

Alberta's government is improving access to treatment for advanced prostate cancer by making a new, leading-edge drug available to Albertans.

In Alberta, about 2,500 men are diagnosed with prostate cancer each year, with one in six men in the province being diagnosed during their lifetime.

Albertans living with cancer need the most effective treatments available, which is why Alberta's government is committed to funding innovative new therapies to improve both cancer care and prevention. To support these efforts, Alberta's government has made Pluvicto, a new radiopharmaceutical treatment for advanced prostate cancer, available to Albertans.

"We know that Albertans living with advanced prostate cancer and their health providers have been awaiting access to this new treatment. Bringing Pluvicto to our province has been a priority for the government, and I'm pleased we can now offer this leading therapy to Albertans."

As soon as a national pricing agreement was reached in December 2024, Alberta worked quickly to add Pluvicto to the Schedule of Outpatient Cancer Drugs, becoming the third province to do so, alongside Ontario and Nova Scotia. Alberta Health Services is now finalizing a contract with the manufacturer to ensure this treatment is accessible to patients. The Outpatient Cancer Drug Benefit Program provides access to cancer medications included on

Prior to offering this treatment, the province arranged for the special handling, administration and medical imaging required, as well as to provide training to health providers. It is anticipated that the administration of this intravenous radioligand therapy to Albertans will begin later this month.

The drug will be administered at the Cross Cancer Institute in Edmonton to start and will become available at the Arthur J.E. Child Comprehensive Cancer Centre later this year.

"Cancer Care Alberta is very pleased that Pluvicto is now publicly funded in Alberta, allowing us to bring this new innovation in treatment to Albertans living with advanced prostate cancer."

Pluvicto is an intravenous treatment given in a cancer centre. It contains a radioligand - a substance that combines a targeting molecule with a small amount of

radiation. This radioligand binds to a specific receptor expression on prostate cancer cells, delivering targeted radiation to kill them. Before receiving treatment, patients undergo a PET-CT scan to confirm they have the receptor expression, ensuring the treatment will be effective. It's estimated that about 200 advanced prostate cancer patients in Alberta have the specific receptor needed to benefit from this treatment each year.

In March 2024, Alberta's government provided \$5 million for the provision of prostate specific membrane antigen (PSMA) positron emission tomography/ computed tomography (PET/CT) scans to eligible Albertans to help accurately diagnose advanced prostate cancer and assist with administering the Pluvicto treatment.
