later determined to be another stolen vehicle.

In the early morning of Feb. 26,2025 in the area of Spruce Grove an individual attempted to steal a vehicle parked in a driveway with a youth inside. The parent of the youth confronted this individual, entered the moving vehicle and struggled with the individual until they stopped the vehicle and fled the scene.

Following an extensive investigation by the Parkland RCMP which included the execution of several search warrants in the Parkland and Edmonton area the individuals were identified.

As a result of this investigation Kalob Kochanowsky(25), a resident of Edmonton was charged with the following:

Robbery with a firearm;

Using a firearm in the commission of an offence;

Pointing a firearm;

Possession of a weapon contrary to an order:

Operating a conveyance while prohibited;

Possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000.

Kochanowsky was taken before a Justice of the Peace and remanded into custody, his next court date is scheduled for May 20, 2025 at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain.

As well a youth, a 17-year-old male resident of Parkland County who cannot be named under the Youth Criminal Justice Act, has been charged with the following:

Robbery with a • firearm;

Robbery; •

Abduction;

Possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000.

The youth was taken before a Justice of the Peace and remanded

into custody, his next court date is scheduled for May 21, 2025, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain.

"This investigation was a priority and we will continue to dedicate significant resources to stop violent offenders who jeopardize public safety" said Inspector Kevin Mcgillivray the Detachment Commander of the Parkland RCMP.

Give Life Alberta flag will fly during two awareness weeks every year

Alberta Health Services' organ and tissue donation program Give Life Alberta has raised a new flag at the University of Alberta Hospital, a tribute to the thousands of people in Alberta, both deceased and living, who have given the gift of life to others.

The Give Life Alberta flag will

be raised at the 112 St. entrance for two weeks every year: National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week (April 20-26, 2025) and Living Donation Week (Sept. 7-13, 2025). The flag's icon – a green heart filling the void of a dotted heart

- symbolizes organ and tissue donation. One organ donor can save up to eight lives, and a tissue donor can save or dramatically improve up to 75 lives.

While Alberta marked another record year in 2024 –

with 317 deceased organ and tissue donors - there are more than 500 people waiting for life-saving transplants in the province.

"It's important to remember (donation) is not something to take for granted," says Give Life Alberta Medical Director Dr. Andreas Kramer. "Often we have to have these conversations at a difficult time in patients' lives, or their families' lives, and we're just really grateful that so many Albertans are willing to make that decision."

One of those selfless donors in 2024 was 43-year-old Kathleen McGee of Edmonton. While she was dying of colorectal cancer, the standup comedian asked her husband Adam Lampman to make sure she donated anything she

could.

"She had such a genuine care for people and wanted to be able to provide either life or a positive aspect of life to someone even when she wasn't here anymore," says Lampman.

Shortly after his wife died in the fall of 2024, Lampman completed the consent forms and questionnaire required for her to become a donor. McGee was eligible to donate her eyes and her corneas have restored sight for one person.

donor's Another family helped raise the new Give Life Alberta flag. After 23-year-old Andv Polanski died in a motor vehicle crash in 2013, the Fort Saskatchewan man saved five lives and improved many more with his organ and tissue donations. His family continues to support fellow donor families through fundraising events.

"To be able to pay tribute to

Andy and all the other amazing donors and their families is an honour for us," says Dawn Pinder, Andy's sister. "We understand the rollercoaster of emotions involved in making a loved one's donation wishes come true and our hearts go out to all donor families."

Reaghan Manyluk sees the flag as a symbol of appreciation for her donor hero. She received a life-saving kidney and pancreas transplant at the University of Alberta Hospital in 2014. Eleven years later, the elementary school teacher is healthy, active and grateful for every "bonus" moment of her life.

"I've been able to enjoy some incredible moments that I never thought I'd live to see, such as my grandmother's 97th birthday and the births of my niece and nephew," says Manyluk. "I think about my donor often and thank them for my life."

Albertans are encouraged to register their intent to donate online at GiveLifeAlberta.ca or at a motor vehicle registry office - and to tell their loved ones about their donation decision.

2025 YELLOWHEAD COUNTY ROADSIDE VEGETATION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Yellowhead County, AB (April 22, 2025) - Yellowhead County Agricultural Services Department will be spot spraying roadsides within the county starting in May and shall continue until mid/ late September, depending on weather conditions and length of growing season. Spot herbicide applications and other integrated management practices will be used throughout the County to control regulated weeds and brush species.

Spraying of roadsides is done to control the spread of prohibited noxious and noxious weeds and re-growth of small brush. Most weed species are very prolific seed producers and can produce as many as 300,000 seeds per plant. These seeds can then germinate the following growing season or lay dormant in the soil for a number of years until growing conditions are favorable for germination. Many deep-rooted perennials spread via the root system, therefore a single plant left alone can result in a heavy infestation in a relatively short period of time.

Weed infestations can invade and become the dominant plant species on any given parcel of land causing a number of problems such as:

1. They limit light and moisture availability to cereal and hay crops thus reducing yields and resulting in dockage

2. They pose a serious environmental threat to native vegetation and habitats in sensitive areas because of their competitive nature

3. They are expensive to control for adjacent land owners who are subject to their spread 4. They are responsible for livestock poisoning

5. They can pose serious fire hazards

6. They obstruct visibility along roadsides and intersections

Brush left to grow along roadsides also poses various problems:

1. The obstruction of visibility along roadsides and intersections creating a situation which allows wildlife to jump onto the roadway unseen

2. Roads tend to retain moisture longer requiring more maintenance

3. They can pose a serious fire hazard

4. Creates snow removal and dust trap problems

The herbicides which may be used this upcoming season include; Lontrel 360 – PCP #23545, Escort – PCP #23005, ClearView – PCP #29752, Arsenal Powerline – PCP #30203, Garlon RTU PCP #29334, Garlon XRT – PCP #28945, 2,4-D Amine
600 - PCP#14726, Milestone
PCP #28517, Milestone NXT
PCP #34728, Navius

Flex – PCP #30922, Esplanade – PCP #31333, Roundup Weathermax – PCP #27487, Roundup WeatherPRO – PCP #33653, Killex – PCP #27801, Hasten – PCP #28277, Trillion PCP #27972. These products are best suited for Yellowhead County's Vegetation Management Plan. Some of these herbicides have residual characteristics so ratepayers should not be using roadside soil in their gardens.

EXPERT ADVICE AVAILABLE FOR NEW PARENTS ACROSS ALBERTA

There is now a single phone number for new parents across the province seeking expert advice on newborn care.

Primary Care Alberta's (PCA) New Parent and Newborn Line, which launched last month, is now a provincial service. All new parents across Alberta can call 1-833-805-BABY (2229) any time, any day, to get expert advice from registered nurses specializing in postpartum care.

"There is now a single, easy-to-access phone number for new parents across the province to get expert advice on newborn care making it simpler to find the support they need during those critical early days," Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Health.

Nurses are available 24/7 to offer support, information and referrals to new parents and caregivers for the first two months after their baby's birth. Health Link experts receive questions including caring for baby, breastfeeding, mother's health, and baby's health.

"Through the New Parent and Newborn Line, new parents across Alberta have direct access to experts in postpartum care," says Patricia Chambers, Executive Lead of Patient Navigation and System Integration with PCA. "Health Link 811 nurses offer that advice with compassion, as they know what it's like to have a new baby at home."

The Early Start Parent Information Line previously available in Calgary, and Healthy Beginnings in Edmonton, receive approximately 2,000 calls a month from new parents and caregivers.

"Offering virtual health services empowers Albertans to seek out their own appropriate care options without having to go to the emergency department or their primary care provider," says PCA CEO Kimberley Simmonds. WHAT'S NEXT?

In case you missed it, we have a new Prime Minister in Ottawa-and his first name is not Pierre. Like many of you, I was hoping for more than just a change in leadership; I was looking for a fundamental shift in policy and direction for our country. Clearly, I wasn't alone. The regions that voted blue sent a strong message: they were seeking relief from the "sunny ways" and promises of "self-balancing budgets."

Some speculate that NDP loyalists shifted their support to the Liberals en masse. It's hard to disagree, considering the party once led by Jack Layton lost official party status under Jagmeet Singh. After propping up a minority government for years, the lines between the NDP and Liberals became blurred in the eyes of many voters. To add to the confusion, several NDP figures openly endorsed Liberal candidates.

The Conservatives gained 40 seats-numbers that would have secured a government in the past. But in 2025, that's no longer the case. We're seeing a consolidation of the political spectrum: what used to be center-left and left has merged, while the far left has nearly vanished, holding just seven seats. The center-right and right remain solid, and the Quebec separatist party has also lost ground. Canada appears to be evolving into a de facto two-party system, with divisions increasingly aligned along transfer payment lines.

Regardless of which party formed government, we were always going to arrive at the same question: What's next? What policies must change to allow Alberta-and the West more broadly-to grow? Make no mistake: we've faced significant barriers over the past decade. Our Premier met with both federal leaders before the election, presenting the same nine priorities needed to reset the relationship between Alberta and Ottawa. One party was aligned from the start: the other. not so much. Now that the election is over, these priorities have been restated:

To reset this relationship, Prime Minister Carney must address the following within the first six months of his term:

• Guarantee Alberta full access to unfettered oil and gas corridors to the north, east, and west

• Repeal Bill C-69 (the "no new pipelines" act)

• Lift the tanker ban off the B.C. coast

• Eliminate the oil and gas emissions cap, which is effectively a production cap

• Scrap the Clean Electricity Regulations

• End the prohibition on single-use plastics

 Abandon the net-zero vehicle mandate Return oversight of the industrial carbon tax to the provinces

• Halt federal censorship of energy companies

So what happens if we don't hear back? What if the federal government continues to ignore Alberta's concerns, as it has for the past 10 years? First and foremost, we will not allow the status quo to continue. Albertans are proud Canadians who want a strong, united, and prosperous nation-but we will no longer tolerate having our industries threatened and our resources landlocked.

We've been boxed in, with limited access to markets beyond the U.S., and we've paid the price in time, cost, and uncertainty-much of it caused by federal policy. Even the new west coast pipeline, paid for by taxpayers, came at great cost.

In the weeks and months ahead:

• Albertans will have the opportunity to discuss our province's future, explore options to protect ourselves from future federal overreach, and choose a path forward.

• We want to hear directly from you–what matters to you, and how we can implement mean-ingful strategies.

• Our government will lead this process with the sincere hope of securing a prosperous future for Alberta within a united Canada-one that respects our constitutional rights, enables resource development, and treats us as a valued partner in Confederation.

There was a special caucus meeting on May 2 to discuss these matters further. I've been receiving your calls and emails both before and after the federal election-please keep them coming. Your voices are being heard in the boardrooms where decisions are made.

I strongly believe in nation-building. I believe we must establish corridors from Alberta to Hudson Bay, the Arctic, and the Pacific. This is essential for responsible development and longterm growth. Alberta has a critical role to play in building a resilient Northwest Canada–an integral part of Fortress North America.

We can do this. We must do this. And if the federal government won't help, the least they can do is stop standing in the way. But we must also agree that we will no longer tolerate obstruction. We've seen what the last 10 years have brought, and we won't accept more of the same for another four.

I hope you have a great week. Keep the faith, keep pushing forward, and know that I'll continue doing everything I can to voice what matters to you.

Stay strong. Stay free.

Starting next year, Alberta's T1 tax form will include a check box so Albertans can request information on the importance of organ and tissue donation.

Hundreds of Albertans are waiting for life-saving organ or tissue transplants. By making it easier to learn more about donation, Alberta's government is helping raise awareness and potentially increasing the number of registered donors across the province. Starting with the 2025 tax year, Alberta's T1 tax form will include a check box that allows Albertans to ask for more information about organ and tissue donation. Those who check the box will receive an email from the provincial government with details about how donation works in Alberta and how to register their wishes.

"This simple step can help save lives. The more Albertans who register, the more patients and families can hold on to hope for a second chance. We hope this change encourages more Albertans to start the conversation and register their wishes."

This initiative builds on Bill C-210, introduced by former Alberta MLA and member of Parliament Len Webber. The bill, which received royal assent in June 2021, allows provinces to add a donation information check box to federal tax forms. Alberta is following the lead of British Columbia and Ontario. Ontario has seen a 32 per cent increase in registrations since adding the check box. In addition, organ and tissue donation programming will now fall under Acute Care Alberta, ensuring provincewide coordination and enhancing the efficiency of the donation and transplant system.

Alberta's government is committed to raising awareness about organ and tissue donation. Albertans can learn more about organ and tissue donation, and register their wishes on the Alberta Organ and Tissue Donation Registry at GiveLife-Alberta.ca.
