### ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE HOMICIDE IN PARKLAND COUNTY UPDATE

One year later and the Alberta RCMP continue the investigation into the found remains of 19-year-old Eric Moonias who was located in a treed area South of Spruce Grove in Parkland

County on May 15, 2024.

The body of Eric Moonias was located in a container and RCMP believe he was transported there from a different location.

"The Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit continue our investigation into the homicide of Eric Moonias" says Constable Peter Crockford of the Alberta RCMP Major Crime Unit, "Anyone with information about his death and his activities in the weeks leading up to his death are asked to call police."

# LEDUC CITY COUNCIL APPROVES DECREASE TO 2025 RESIDENTIAL TAX RATE

Leduc City Council continues to keep property tax impacts among the lowest in the region, approving a 4% decrease from 2024 to the residential tax rate at the April 28 Council meeting. The tax rate means residential property owners will pay \$723 in property taxes on every \$100,000 of assessed property value.

This decrease is the result of careful financial planning, growth across the city and City Council's commitment to minimizing tax impacts for residents.

"We know affordability matters to Leduc families" says Bob Young, Mayor of the City of Leduc. "Council has worked to strike a balance between supporting the programs and services our growing city needs – roads, emergency services, and community spaces that make Leduc a great place to live – while minimizing the tax impact for homeowners."

Individual tax notices will vary depending on the as-

sessed value of a property. Use the City's online property tax calculator to estimate your 2025 property taxes.

Understanding Your Tax Notice

Seventy-three cents of each dollar paid in property taxes helps fund community services, including:

- Emergency services (fire, ambulance)
- Police and bylaw enforcement
- Roads, snow removal, and public transit

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
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# Leduc City Council Approves Decrease To 2025 Residential Tax Rate

The Province of Alberta legislates the City to collect education tax on their behalf. This year, the provincial Education Property Tax requisition increased by 17%, meaning approximately 26% of the total tax revenue collected by the City in 2025 will be sent to the

Province of Alberta – an additional \$3.3 million contributed by Leduc property owners this year for education in Alberta.

Around 1% of the total tax revenue collected by the City is for Leduc Regional Housing Foundation. The Foundation is a non-profit established by the Province of Alberta to provide a variety of affordable housing options, including supported living and apartments for se-

niors

### KEEPING SENIORS MOVING IN RURAL ALBERTA

Alberta's government is investing \$3.5 million to partner with Healthy Aging Alberta to expand transportation and mobility services for seniors in rural com-

munities.

Whether for connecting with neighbours and the community, going grocery shopping or a visit to the doctor, seniors living in rural Alberta often rely on accessible transportation services to maintain their independence. According to Statistics Canada, transportation challenges are a key barrier to participation in social activities for seniors. Rural communities are vital to the province's identity and success, and Alberta's government is

supporting their growth and prosperity by helping seniors age with dignity and respect in their own homes and communities.

"This investment will provide a lifeline for seniors and those with mobility issues by empowering them with the freedom to access essential services and social outings. Our government is making sure seniors can remain active and independent by investing in this program, helping seniors age in the rural communities they call home."

As part of a three-year partnership, Alberta's government is investing \$3.5 million so Healthy Aging Alberta can provide accessible and affordable transportation services for seniors and Albertans with mobility issues across 19 rural communities. This project helps more seniors

and Albertans with mobility issues access services that are vital to their health and well-being.

"It is important to ensure all Albertans have access to safe and affordable transportation especially in rural areas where accessing transportation can be challenging. This program will help make it easier to run errands, connect with friends and family, and carry out appointments in our rural communities."

The Healthy Aging Alberta provincial transportation project started with five communities in 2023. From October 2023 to November 2024, nearly 7,200 rides were provided to seniors and persons with mobility challenges in rural communities through this program. The project is now being expanded to a total of 19 communities, with Phase 2 adding 14 additional communities throughout the province. Communities with a high per-

centage of low-income seniors were prioritized and successful communities were chosen based on need and their readiness to implement or expand assisted transportation services.

"Transportation is a lifeline for older adults, enabling older Albertans not only to access essential services, but also to remain actively engaged as volunteers and caregivers — roles that form the foundation of vibrant, interconnected communities. Healthy Aging Alberta and the United Way of Calgary celebrate the Government of Alberta's continued leadership and investment in this critical social infrastructure."


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# EXPANDING URGENT CARE ACROSS ALBERTA

If passed, Budget 2025 includes \$17 million in planning funds to support the development of urgent care facilities across the province.

As Alberta's population grows, so does the demand for health care. In response, the government is making significant investments to ensure every Albertan has access to high-quality care close to home. Currently, more than 35 per cent of emergency department visits are for non-life-threatening conditions that could be treated at urgent care centres. By expanding these centres, Alberta's government is enhancing the health care system and improving access to timely care.

If passed, Budget 2025 includes \$15 million to support plans for eight new urgent care centres and an additional \$2 million in planning funds for an integrated primary and urgent care facility in Airdrie. These investments will help redirect up to 200,000 lower-acuity emergency department visits

annually, freeing up capacity for life-threatening cases, reducing wait times and improving access to care for Albertans.

"More people are choosing to call Alberta home, which is why we are taking action to build capacity across the health care system. Urgent care centres help bridge the gap between primary care and emergency departments, providing timely care for non-life-threatening conditions."

The locations for the eight new urgent care centres were selected based on current and projected increases in demand for lower-acuity care at emergency departments. The new facilities will be in west Edmonton, south Edmonton, Westview (Stony Plain/Spruce Grove), east Calgary, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Cold Lake and Fort McMurray.

"Too many Albertans, especially those living in rural communities, are travelling significant distances to receive care. Advancing plans for new urgent care centres will build capacity across the health care system."

The remaining \$2 million will support planning for One Health Airdrie's integrated primary and urgent

care facility. The operating model, approved last fall, will see One Health Airdrie as the primary care operator, while urgent care services will be publicly funded and operated by a provider selected through a competitive process.

"Our new Airdrie facility, offering integrated primary and urgent care, will provide same-day access to approximately 30,000 primary care patients and increase urgent care capacity by around 200 per cent, benefiting the entire community and surrounding areas. We are very excited."

# FUELING INNOVATION, STRENGTHENING ALBERTA'S GRID

Proposed legislative changes will pave the way for emerging hydrogen technologies, and modernize Alberta's utility system by prioritizing reliability and long-term affordability.

As Alberta's population and economy continue to grow, so does the demand for reliable utilities. From heating and cooling homes to powering communities and businesses, Albertans need to know they have access to affordable utilities they can depend on, when and where they need them.

Bill 52, the Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025, proposes changes to meet growing demand, prioritizing reliability and affordability in the modernization of the utility system. If passed, the Energy and Utilities Stat-

utes Amendment Act will enable hydrogen use in Alberta's natural gas system. It will also support critical updates to power market rules and transmission policies to strengthen the power grid, lower and stabilize utility bills, and encourage investment in the province.

"Albertans need to know they have reliable and affordable utilities to provide for their families and chase their dreams. From responsibly introducing hydrogen blending in our natural gas system to strengthening our power grid, the changes we're making will drive new investment and fuel Albertans to pursue a bright, successful future."

Driving innovation in hydrogen

The world is looking to hydrogen as an energy solution for hard-to-abate industries. As the largest hydrogen producer in Canada, Alberta has the resources, expertise and investment-ready environment necessary to be a destination of choice for investors and innovators. Through the Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025, proposed amendments would allow hydrogen blending in the natural gas distribution system for residential and commercial heating and support new technologies while ensuring the safety and reliability of the natural gas system.

Changes will protect ratepayers from rising costs by ensuring only those who receive hydrogen-blended natural gas in their homes and businesses will pay for any additional system costs. Utility providers will also be required to ensure community support on hydrogen blending projects.

Strengthening the grid, protecting ratepayers

Albertans increasingly rely on electricity to power their homes, businesses and lives. The Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025, if passed, will put Albertans first by advancing the modernization of the electricity market to ensure it can meet their growing

needs, at a price they can afford.

Proposed amendments support the move to a day-ahead reliability market, ensure there is enough power available and reduce the risk of grid alerts in the future. Much-needed updates will also be made to Alberta's transmission policies to protect ratepayers from rising transmission costs on their utility bills. This includes encouraging more efficient use of existing infrastructure by maximizing the use of existing lines and ensuring new power projects are built in optimal locations. Changes will also see costs assigned on a cost-causation basis, ensuring that Albertans are not burdened with the full cost of any new transmission lines that need to be built.

Additional legislative changes

The Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025 also includes an amendment to the Petroleum Marketing Act to increase the number of directors on the Alberta Petroleum Marketing Commission board from seven to 13 to increase the range of expertise and allow for more robust governance. This will also increase support for new initiatives such as the bitumen royalty inkind and a proposed gas royalty in-kind, ensuring Albertans receive the maximum value for our resourc-









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# ALBERTA RCMP MARKS NATIONAL PUBLIC SAFETY TELECOMMUNICATORS WEEK AND LAUNCHES PROVINCE-WIDE NON-EMERGENCY LINE

Your Alberta RCMP is recognizing the hard work of its Operational Communications Centres (OCC) and their operators during National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, running April 13-19. OCC operators are the first point of contact for the public when seeking assistance from the police, in both emergencies and non-emergencies. They work day and night, 365 days a year, and are essential for ensuring public safety.

As a part of National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, the Alberta RCMP is happy to announce that individuals in Alberta will now

be able make non-emergency police reports by calling 310-RCMP, or 310-7267. The new function is designed to streamline the reporting process, optimize early stages of investigations, and reduce unnecessary calls to 911.

"310-RCMP was created to help eliminate confusion about which detachment someone should call if they experience a non-emergency that doesn't require police attendance," says Chris Spence, director of the Operational Communications Centre in Alberta. "We encourage people to report non-emergencies as this helps us focus frontline efforts on high-priority calls and deploy resources in areas that need it

most."

RCMP Police Dispatchers determine when a non-emergency call should be dispatched to a detachment directly or to the Alberta RCMP's Call Back Unit (CBU). The CBU is a unit made up of police officers whose primary duty is to respond to and investigate files that do not require scene attendance by police officers. CBU officers will contact complainants and investigate the occurrence. If, during the investigation, there is need for further investigation they will contact detachments or specialized units.

Long-distance charges do not apply, and no area code prefix required. The number is accessible to all Albertans within the province with a phone line or an active mobile phone with a cellular signal.

Non-emergencies:

•Do not pose an immediate or potential threat to life or public safety.

•Include crimes that have already taken place prior to being discovered.

•Often do not require police attendance, but do require police response.

Examples include but are not limited to:

•Minor motor vehicle collisions.

•Break and enters that already took place.

•Scams in which money or personal information

### CHECK THE BOX, SAVE A LIFE

Starting next year, Alberta's T1 tax form will include a check box so Albertans can request information on the importance of organ and tissue donation.

Hundreds of Albertans are waiting for life-saving organ or tissue transplants. By making it easier to learn more about donation, Alberta's government is helping raise awareness and potentially increasing the number of registered donors across the province.

Starting with the 2025 tax year, Alberta's T1 tax form will include a check box that allows Albertans to ask for more information about organ and tissue donation. Those who check the box will receive an email from the provincial government with details about how donation works in Alberta and how to register their wishes.

"This simple step can help save lives. The more Albertans who register, the more patients and families can hold on to hope for a second chance. We hope this change encourages more Albertans to start the conversation and register their wishes."

This initiative builds on Bill C-210, introduced by former Alberta MLA and member of Parliament Len Webber. The bill, which received royal assent in June 2021, allows provinces to add a donation information check box to federal tax forms. Alberta is following the lead of British Columbia and Ontario. Ontario has seen a 32 per cent increase in registrations since

adding the check box.

In addition, organ and tissue donation programming will now fall under Acute Care Alberta, ensuring provincewide coordination and enhancing the efficiency of the donation and transplant system.

Alberta's government is committed to raising awareness about organ and tissue donation. Albertans can learn more about organ and tissue donation, and register their wishes on the Alberta Organ and Tissue Donation Registry at GiveLifeAlberta.ca.

"Data from the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services shows that almost 1.8 million Albertans have experienced some form of sexual violence in their lifetime. That's why we are working to provide supports that help survivors heal and prevent sexual violence before it can begin.

"If you or someone you know is experiencing sexual violence, you are not alone. You can call or text the Alberta One Line for Sexual Violence at 1-866-403-8000 daily from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. or visit your local sexual assault centre for support. You can also visit alberta.ca/sexual-violence-prevention for downloadable resources and tips to help recognize, report and prevent sexual violence.

"Alberta's government continues to support survivors by providing more than \$88 million through Budget 2025 to prevent family and sexual violence – including an additional \$1.5 million to sexual assault centres across the province and the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services.

"To make sure that children and youth across Alberta are supported on their healing journey, the government also invests almost \$3.4 million every year in child and youth advocacy centres. This helps more survivors access key services across the province including crisis intervention supports, counselling, police and court support, outreach

and advocacy.

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
