Hay you! Are you a producer of weed free forage in your county? Better yet, would you like to be?!

Yellowhead County, AB (May 28, 2025) - Invasive species such as terrestrial invasive plants are detrimental to Alberta's environment and can cost an estimated \$2 billion each year. Contaminated hay is one means by which invasive plants are spread.

To address this, the North American Invasive Weed Management Association has set industry guidelines and maintains minimum standards for Certified Weed Free products in Alberta, which are recognized across North America. As a participating county, we intend to promote this program to potential buyers and help producers certify and sell their Certified Weed Free Forage!

Anyone who attended this location at these times, who was born in or after 1970 and has less than two documented doses of measles-containing vaccine, may be at risk for developing measles. They should self-monitor for symptoms of measles and are strongly encouraged to review their immunization records.

Measles is an extremely contagious disease and the virus spreads easily through the air. Symptoms of measles include:

• Fever of 38.3° C or higher; and

• Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes; and

Here are some guidelines for forage producers that are interested in inspections to certify their forage as weed free: • Be grain-ful there's certified inspectors to help! Inspections must be conducted by a Certified Weed Free Forage Inspector with authority under the Weed Control Act (e.g., Weed Inspectors) within 10 days maximum prior to cutting. If the crop is not cut within that timeline, a new inspection must be conducted.

• Inspectors may certify all or a portion of a field as weed free so it's not too mulch to handle. • It's not the last straw if invasive species are present, a field can be certified as weed free if there are no propagative plant parts present.

• Now you can rest and hit the hay, the Alberta Invasive Species Council (AISC) will take care of the rest! They maintain a publicly available list of contact information for producers with inventory of Certified Weed Free Forage. This list is updated frequently and can be found on their website, abinvasives.ca. Please let us know if you would like to be added to that list.

Let's get this bale rolling and protect Alberta from the harmful impacts of invasive species by letting others know about Alberta's Weed Free Forage program! ## Confirmed Case Of Measles Prompts Public Alert To Potential Exposures

3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see.

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest risk.

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immunization program. The recommended schedule for measles vaccination is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 for more information if these situations apply to you or your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.

The measles hotline connects you to a professional who can assist with accessing your immunization records or offer general information; provide advice for those experiencing measles symptoms and are feeling unwell; and assist with booking measles immunization appointments or locating a public health clinic offering immunization in your area.

### Notice of Public Hearing – Bylaw 05-2025 Summer Village of Seba Beach Land Use Bylaw

Pursuant to Sections 216.1(1), 606(1), and 692(1) of the *Municipal Government Act*, R.S.A. 2000, c. M-26, as amended, the Council of the Summer Village of Jarvis Bay hereby gives notice of its intention to consider Bylaw No. 05-2025, a bylaw to repeal and replace the Summer Village's current Land Use Bylaw (Bylaw 2-2008, as amended).

The purpose of this Bylaw is to update and modernize regulations in the Summer Village's Land Use Bylaw to be consistent with:

- · Provincial legislation (specifically with respect to development and subdivision processes and appeals); and
  - Approved statutory plans (including the Summer Village's Intermunicipal Development Plan and Municipal Development Plan).

Many differences exist between the current and draft Land Use Bylaw, which may affect some individuals. These include (but are not limited to):

- Updated information about the development permit application and notification processes;
- Updated information about the subdivision process;
- Updated regulations for development and subdivision appeals;
- Updated regulations describing the enforcement process;
- The inclusion of additional and revised definitions to address common terms and land uses;
- Updated regulations affecting major site grading/landscaping;
- Updates regulations affecting development within hazardous or environmentally sensitive areas;
- Updated regulations affecting specific land uses in the Summer Village.

A copy of the proposed bylaw is available on the Summer Village's website and may be viewed by contacting the Summer Village of Seba Beach using the information provided at the bottom of this notice.

Section 692(1) of the Municipal Government Act, RSA 2000, c M-26, requires that a public hearing on a proposed bylaw must be held before the second reading of the bylaw. First reading of Bylaw 05-2025 occurred on May 5, 2025.

# CROWSNEST PASS RCMP ARREST MALE FOR POSSESSION OF STOLEN VEHICLE AND OTHER OFFENCES

On May 24, 2025, at approximately 6:15 p.m., RCMP responded to a rural property on Highway 22 in regard to a suspicious vehicle that was suspected to have been stolen out of Blairmore earlier in the same day. The vehicle was seen leaving the area of Highway 22 and was later recovered in the Hamlet of Lundbreck. A male was seen leaving the vehicle on foot.

Later that night, on May 25, at approximately 12:30 a.m., a member of Citizens On Patrol reported a suspicious person who matched the description of the driver of the stolen truck. Additional resources were called in to assist from Piikani RCMP, Pincher Creek RCMP and Police Dog Services; a Remotely Piloted Aircraft System (drone) was utilized to maintain a visual of the male and a K9 unit was deployed to apprehend the suspect who had been

concealed in a stack of hay bales.

Keep your yard neat by mowing grass regularly, managing weeds, and keeping compost stored neatly. Support your naturalized yard by planting a variety of species, inspecting for noxious weeds, and managing overgrown vegetation.

Reduce unwanted odours by securely storing excess waste and garbage and keeping empty bottles in sealed containers indoors.

The Board of Trustees thoroughly enjoyed the annual presentations from the Superintendent Youth Council at this month's Public Board Meeting. Twenty-seven students from each of the five high schools - Grand Trunk in Evansburg; Parkland Composite in Edson; Harry Collinge in Hinton; Grande Cache Community, and Jasper Junior/Senior High shared their thoughts with the Board on an unique project or initiative they envisioned for their school.

Projects ranged from a more robust breakfast program, student exchanges across the Division, facility modernization, and feedback on the current restrictions on personal mobile devices at school. Assistant Superintendent Scobie also applauded the students' thoughtful and detailed presentations, and provided some insight on each project's goals to help them move them forward.

Trustees approved Year Two (2) of three (3) of the Division's Education Plan which continues to support:

Goal 1: Every GYPSD student will graduate with the knowledge and skills to pursue their goals beyond high school.

Goal 2: First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students are successful.

Goal 3: Increase parental satisfaction in Education Quality and Engaged Student Learning in GYPSD by improving parental engagement.

Specific strategies and desired outcomes are articulated in the Education Plan which informs stakeholders on a multi-year view as to how GYPSD will meet the needs of students and improve results in specific areas. Families, staff, and high school students are also surveyed annually to collect insight on how these strategies are moving the division forward in meeting these goals.

593 respondents, up four (4) percent from last year, provided feedback which was also shared with trustees.

Meghan Auriat, Assistant Superintendent, provided the annual Human Resources (HR) Planning and Recruitment Report which included an update on the current staffing activities in preparation for end of year and the upcoming school year. Each year staffing changes reflect retirements, resignations, secondments, requests for transfers to another school, requests for leaves of absence, and job-sharing requests.

In addition, the HR team actively recruits all year including attendance at career fairs through local venues, universities and Apply to Education. A new policy, Policy 22 - School Attendance Areas, was adopted to align with the current procedures in AP 305 -School Attendance Areas. As per section 10(1) of the Education Act, the Board establishes school attendance areas and designates resident students of the Board to a particular school. School attendance areas manage space and resources across the division in order to provide quality learning opportunities for all students. School attendance areas are determined by the Board and are designed to ensure a fair and equitable distribution of students across schools, while also allowing for some flexibility in attendance choices. While students are generally expected to attend the designated school within their attendance area, parents may request their child attend a different school within the division, subject to space availability and school-specific criteria.

The Board was also pleased to approve a letter of support for the redevelopment efforts of the Jasper community in seeking funding grants for their elementary school's playground congratulatory letters to their local MPs elected in the recent federal election the purchase of four (4) school buses as part of the evergreening of their fleet plan, and two (2) advocacy letters to be forwarded to the Minister of Education and Childcare requesting provincial funding to support compensation for the recently ratified agreement with CUPE Local #1357 as a follow-up letter to the new Federal Minister of Environment and Climate Change requesting compensation for the \$500,000 insurance deductible in relation to the 2024 Jasper wildfires.

Part of a healthy system includes sound financial management.

Assistant Superintendent Scobie outlined the highlights and assumptions for the 2025/26 Budget Submission Report which will be forwarded to Alberta Education in June. The Board's new Finance Committee also shared some recommended changes for upcoming policy discussions.

A new 2025 Candidate Election Handbook was introduced to the Board. It has been added to the Division's website along with other resources to assist potential candidates in learning about the important role of a public-school trustee.

The current board also created a video on their roles and responsibilities which has also been shared on the site.
