NEW STANDARDS FOR SCHOOL LIBRARIES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government has introduced new standards to ensure school library materials are age-appropriate.

School libraries should be safe and supportive places where students can learn and explore without being exposed to inappropriate sexual content. However, in the absence of a consistent standard for selecting age-appropriate library materials, school boards have taken different approaches, leading to concerns about safeguards in place.

In response to these concerns, and informed by feedback from education partners and the public, Alberta's government has created standards to provide school boards with clear direction on the selection, availability and access to school library materials, such as books.

"Our actions to ensure that materials in school libraries don't expose children to sexual content were never about

ALBERTA RCMP SERIOUS CRIMES BRANCH CONDUCTS ARREST IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING INVESTIGATION

In the summer of 2024, Alberta RCMP and Alberta Employment Standards Office received a report of possible human trafficking at a motel in Fox Creek, Alta., and a gas station in Calmar, Alta. The complaint made its way to the Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes Branch who engaged partner agencies such as: Alberta Employment Standards Office, Occupational Health and Safety, Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), Alberta Occupational Health and Safety, ALERT CFSEU Money Laundering Asset Forfeiture Team (MLAFT), FIN-TRAC, and Service Canada. Furthermore, ACT (Action, Coalition on Human Trafficking) Alberta is assisting with the survivors of this investigation.

The investigation uncovered multiple illegal business practises involving several immigrant workers. These practices included, but were not limited to:

• Forcing employees to work 80 to 90 hour weeks without proper compensation;

• Submitting falsified work schedules;

• Exploitative payment practices;

• Overcharging rent and expenses;

• Improper Labour Market Impact Assessment practices; and

Harassment.

On June 25, 2025, the Alberta RCMP, assisted by CBSA, executed search warrants at two Edmonton residences seizing cash, bank records, business records and immigration agreements, amongst other offence-related materials.

As a result of the investigation, two individuals were arrested:

banning books. These new standards are to ensure that school boards have clear guidance to ensure age-appropriate access to school library materials, while reflecting the values and priorities of Albertans." Demetrios Nicolaides, Minister of Education and Childcare

The new standards set clear expectations for school library materials with regard to sexual content and require school boards to implement policies to support these standards.

Under the new standards, school libraries are not permitted to include library materials containing explicit sexual content. Non-explicit sexual content may be accessible to students in Grade 10 and above, provided it is age-appropriate.

"Protecting kids from explicit content is common sense. LGBTQ youth, like all children, deserve to see themselves in stories that are age-appropriate, supportive and affirming – not in material that sexualizes or confuses them." Blaine Badiuk, education

their school library collections, publish a full list of available materials and ensure that a staff member supervises students' access to school library materials. School boards will have to remove any materials with explicit sexual content from their school libraries by October 1.

School board policies and procedures

All school boards must have publicly available policies that align with the new standards for selecting and managing library materials by January 1, 2026. School boards can either create new policies or update existing ones to meet these requirements.

These policies must outline how school library materials are selected and reviewed, how staff supervise students' access throughout the school day, and how a student, parent, school board emplovee or other member of the school community can request a review or removal of materials in the school library. School boards are also required to clearly communicate these policies to employees, students and parents before January 2026.

We welcome the ministry's initiative to establish consistent standards and appreciate the ongoing consultation to help craft a plan that will serve our families and communities well." dering still being investigated and authorities actively pursuing all related offences. Investigators are committed to thoroughly uncovering the full scope of the operation and ensuring that all individuals involved are held accountable and that supports are provided for the survivors.

"Human Trafficking is the act of recruiting, transporting, holding individuals by means of force, fraud or coercion for the purpose of sexual or labour exploitation." said Inspector Breanne Brown of the Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes Branch. "In this case, the RCMP determined that the suspects took action to harbour and recruit foreign workers by using threats, abuse of power, fraud and deception, all for the purpose of exploiting the labour of these workers. The Alberta RCMP takes these offences seriously and ask the public to keep an eye out for these individuals who, by the nature of their status and situation, are vulnerable to

their oppressors. Those who may have information about Human Trafficking (including sex or labour) are asked to please contact their local police of jurisdiction."

"The Employment Standards branch of Alberta Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration investigated multiple businesses owned and operated by Yeon Soo Lee and Joo Hyup Lee for allegations of human trafficking, exploitation of vulnerable workers and violations of the Employment Standards Code" said a message from Employment Standards branch, who often work alongside RCMP in these investigations. "As a result of the investigation, the matter was referred to the RCMP. Employment Standards recovered more than \$160,000 in unpaid earnings for employees and for unauthorized deductions from those earnings. The ministry's Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) branch also conducted inspections of these

businesses related to compliance with OHS laws. The inspections and follow-up inspections resulted in a \$60,000 administrative penalty issued to the involved businesses for repeated non-compliance with OHS requirements. A \$10,000 administrative penalty was issued to Yeon Soo Lee for hindering and interfering with an OHS officer".

The Alberta RCMP would also like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the creation of the K Division Human Trafficking Unit in 2023 with the establishment of the Provincial Coordinator role along with the two Special Projects Units in 2024.

Temporary foreign workers or persons on visitor visa's make vulnerable targets for labour trafficking as they are often desperate and looking for opportunities to leave their home country. These persons are often recruited through on-line portals, through immigration companies or word of mouth promising them the opportuni-

ty for permanent residency or citizenship in Canada. They are recruited, transported, and harboured by bad employers who hold their identification, control their finances and movements through means of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of forced labour or domestic servitude. When employees complain or try to express concerns, they are often met with threats of penalties or deportation, which keep them from coming forward to police.

These investigations are often done in coordination with the Alberta Employment Standards Office, who wanted to share this message:

The Employment Standards branch of Alberta Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration investigated multiple businesses owned and operated by Yeon Soo Lee and Joo Hyup Lee for allegations of human trafficking, exploitation of vulnerable workers and violations of the Employment Standards Code. As a result of the investigation, the

matter was referred to the RCMP. Employment Standards recovered more than \$160,000 in unpaid earnings for employees and for unauthorized deductions from those earnings.

The ministry's Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) branch also conducted inspections of these businesses related to compliance with OHS laws. The inspections and follow-up inspections resulted in a \$60,000

administrative penalty issued to 682175 Alberta Ltd., operating as Grizzly Motor Hotel, for repeated non-compliance with OHS requirements. A \$10,000 administrative penalty was issued to Yeon Soo Lee for hindering and interfering with an OHS officer.
