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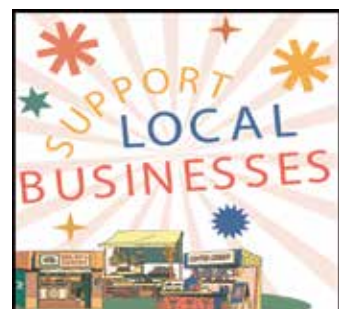

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# Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes Branch Conducts Arrest In Human Trafficking Investigation

Forfeiture Team (MLAFT), FINTRAC, and Service Canada. Furthermore, ACT (Action, Coalition on Human Trafficking) Alberta is assisting with the survivors of this investigation.

The investigation uncovered multiple illegal business practices involving several immigrant workers. These practices included, but were not limited to:

- Forcing employees to work 80 to 90 hour weeks without proper compensation;
- Submitting falsified work schedules;
- Exploitative payment practices;
- Overcharging rent and expenses;
- Improper Labour Market Impact Assessment practices; and
- Harassment.

On June 25, 2025, the Alberta

RCMP, assisted by CBSA, executed search warrants at two Edmonton residences seizing cash, bank records, business records and immigration agreements, amongst other offence-related materials.

As a result of the investigation, two individuals were arrested:

- Yeon Soo Lee, a 55-year-old Edmonton resident, was charged with:
  - o Trafficking in Persons (x4);
  - o Material Benefits from trafficking (x4);
  - o Criminal Harassment.
- Joo Hyup Lee, a 26-year-old Edmonton resident, was charged with:
  - o Trafficking in Persons; and
  - o Material Benefits from trafficking.
- Both individuals

have since been released and are set to appear before the Alberta Court of Justice in Grande Prairie on Aug. 11, 2025.

The investigation is ongoing, with allegations of money laundering still being investigated and authorities actively pursuing all related offences. Investigators are committed to thoroughly uncovering the full scope of the operation and ensuring that all individuals involved are held accountable and that supports are provided for the survivors.

"Human Trafficking is the act of recruiting, transporting, holding individuals by means of force, fraud or coercion for the purpose of sexual or labour exploitation," said Inspector Breanne Brown of the Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes Branch. "In this case, the RCMP determined that the suspects took action to harbour and re-

cruit foreign workers by using threats, abuse of power, fraud and deception, all for the purpose of exploiting the labour of these workers. The Alberta RCMP takes these offences seriously and ask the public to keep an eye out for these individuals who, by the nature of their status and situation, are vulnerable to their oppressors. Those who may have information about Human Trafficking (including sex or labour) are asked to please contact their local police of jurisdiction."

Code” said a message from Employment Standards branch, who often work alongside RCMP in these investigations. “As a result of the investigation, the matter was referred to the RCMP. Employment Standards recovered more than \$160,000 in unpaid earnings for employees and for unauthorized deductions from those earnings. The ministry’s Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) branch also conducted inspections of these businesses related to compliance with OHS laws. The inspections and follow-up inspections resulted in a \$60,000 administrative penalty issued to the involved businesses for repeated non-compliance with OHS requirements. A \$10,000 administrative penalty was issued to Yeon Soo Lee for hindering and interfering with an OHS officer”.

The Alberta RCMP would also like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the creation of the K Division Human Trafficking Unit in 2023 with the establishment of the Provincial Coordinator role along with the two Special Projects Units in 2024.

Temporary foreign workers or persons on visitor visa’s make vulnerable targets for labour trafficking as they are often desperate and looking for opportunities to leave their home country. These persons are often recruited through on-line portals, through immigration companies or word of mouth promising them the opportunity for permanent residency or citizenship in Canada. They are recruited, transported, and harboured by bad employers who hold their identification, control their finances and

movements through means of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of forced labour or domestic servitude. When employees complain or try to express concerns, they are often met with threats of penalties or deportation, which keep them from coming forward to police.

These investigations are often done in coordination with the Alberta Employment Standards Office, who wanted to share this message:

The Employment Standards branch of Alberta Jobs, Economy, Trade and Immigration investigated multiple businesses owned and operated by Yeon Soo Lee and Joo Hyup Lee for allegations of human trafficking, exploitation of vulnerable workers and violations of the Employment Standards Code. As a result of the investigation, the matter was referred to the

RCMP.

Employment Standards recovered more than \$160,000 in unpaid earnings for employees and for unauthorized deductions from those earnings.

The ministry’s Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) branch also conducted inspections of these businesses related to compliance with OHS laws. # EXPERT ADVICE AVAILABLE FOR NEW PARENTS ACROSS ALBERTA

There is now a single phone number for new parents across the province seeking expert advice on newborn care.

Primary Care Alberta's (PCA) New Parent and Newborn Line, which launched last month, is now a provincial service. All new parents across Alberta can call 1-833-805-BABY (2229) any time, any day, to get expert advice from registered nurses specializing in postpartum care.

"There is now a single, easy-to-access phone number for new parents across the province to get expert advice on

newborn care - making it simpler to find the support they need during those critical early days," Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Health.

Nurses are available 24/7 to offer support, information and referrals to new parents and caregivers for the first two months after their baby's birth. Health Link experts receive questions including caring for baby, breastfeeding, mother's health, and baby's health.

"Through the New Parent and Newborn Line, new parents across Alberta have direct access to experts in postpartum care," says Patricia Chambers, Executive

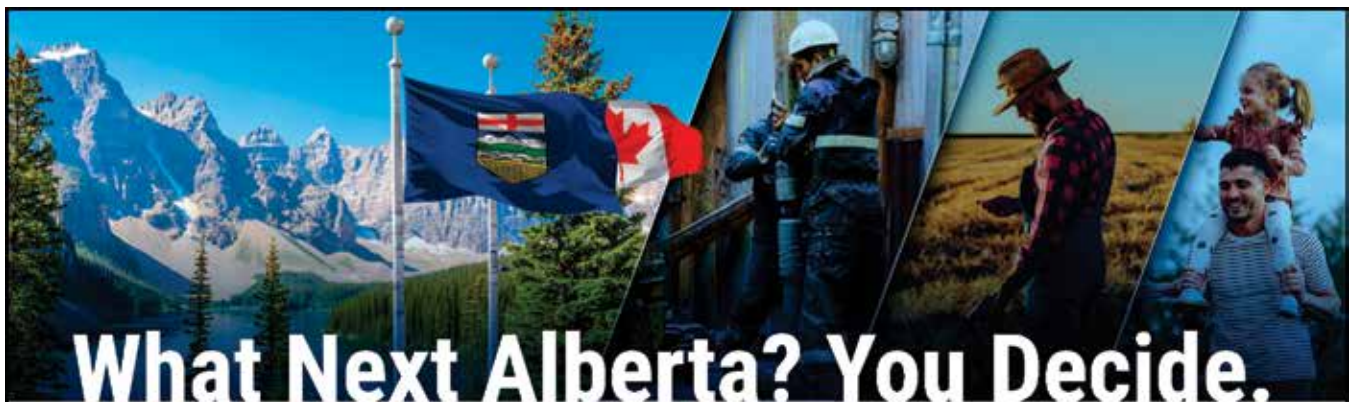
Lead of Patient Navigation and System Integration with PCA. "Health Link 811 nurses offer that advice with compassion, as they know what it's like to have a new baby at home."

The Early Start Parent Information Line previously available in Calgary, and Healthy Beginnings in Edmonton, receive approximately 2,000 calls a month from new parents and caregivers.

"Offering virtual health services empowers Albertans to seek out their own appropriate care options without having to go to the emergency department or their primary care provider,"

says PCA CEO Kimberley Simmonds. "Our goal is to ensure that Albertans have access to the right care, at the right place, at the right time."

## STRONG SUPPORT FOR SCHOOL LIBRARY POLICY

Survey results show strong public support for action to ensure children do not have access to age-inappropriate materials in Alberta school libraries.

Following the discovery of multiple books with explicit sexual content in some school libraries across the province, Alberta's government conducted a public engagement survey to collect feedback on the creation of consistent standards to ensure the age-appropriateness of materials available to students in school libraries.

From May 26 to June 6, Albertans were invited to share their views on age-appropriate materials in school libraries

through an online survey. Almost 80,000 individual respondents completed the survey, showing significant and widespread public interest in the issue.

Alberta's government will be using this input, along with ongoing feedback collected from education partners, to develop provincewide standards. These standards will provide school boards with clear and consistent guidelines for selecting and managing age-appropriate materials in school libraries across the province.

"Parents, educators and Albertans in general want action to ensure children don't have access to age-inappropriate materials in school libraries. We will use this valuable input to guide the creation of a provincewide standard to ensure the policy reflects the priorities and values of Albertans."

Key survey findings

- When asked "At what age should children be able to access materials with sexually explicit content in school libraries," parents said:

- o never (have access): 42 per cent

- o elementary school (age 12 and under): four per cent

- o middle school (age 12 and up): 18 per cent

- o high school (age 15 and up): 22 per cent

- o all ages (should have access): 14 per cent

- 62 per cent believe parents and guardians should

have a role in reporting or challenging sexually explicit content in school libraries.

- When asked who should decide what materials are age appropriate in school libraries, the most popular responses were school librarians, teachers and parents.

- Parents of school-age children were most supportive (42 per cent) of children never being able to access these materials in schools.

# ADDRESSING CLASSROOM AGGRESSION AND COMPLEXITY

Alberta's government is launching an action team to address classroom complexity and aggression to make schools safer for students and staff.

Alberta's classrooms have become increasingly complex, with more incidents of aggression occurring, paired with increased challenges with behaviour and the special learning needs of students. To address these issues head on, Alberta's government is creating an action team composed of teachers and education partners that will provide recommendations to help guide new policy and address complex classrooms.

"We have heard loud and clear from teachers and parents that we need to do something about aggression in classrooms, and that is exactly what we are doing. Every student and staff

member deserves to feel safe, supported and respected at school, and the action team will help reach that goal. Creating this action team is one of several concrete steps we are taking to improve school safety and better support students' diverse needs."

The team, named the Aggression and Complexity in Schools Action Team, will make recommendations to Alberta's government on short- and long-term actions that will support students and educators. The action team will consist of 20 education system leaders including representatives from school boards in Edmonton and Calgary and the Alberta Teachers' Association. To ensure their work is informed by front-line experience, the action team will also work closely with teachers, education support workers, school resource officers and representatives

from student and family advocacy groups. The list of action team members will be published online once finalized.

"Alberta School Boards Association (ASBA) appreciates government's commitment to address classroom complexities. ASBA looks forward to this collaborative effort, including local school board perspectives, to help shape meaningful, long-term solutions that support students and educators."

The action team will deliver a report with advice and recommendations to Alberta Education and Childcare to inform a combination of practical solutions and policy by fall 2025. Some recommendations could begin rolling out as soon as the 2025-26 school year. The action team may also continue to be engaged to provide advice to Alberta Education and Childcare on implementation of pol-

icy or program changes that result from its recommendations.

"The College of Alberta School Superintendents recognizes the growing complexity within today's classrooms and the impact it has on learning, safety and well-being. We welcome the creation of the Aggression and Complexity in Schools Action Team as an important step in addressing these challenges. By working collaboratively with government, educators and community partners, we can help ensure classrooms remain safe, supportive spaces where every student has the opportunity to thrive."

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# ALBERTA RCMP ENCOURAGES FAMILIES TO DISCUSS PERSONAL SAFETY WITH CHILDREN

With the arrival of warmer weather and longer days, kids are spending more time outside—whether walking to a friend's house, heading to the park, or just enjoying the outdoors. Your Alberta RCMP is reminding parents and guardians that this is a good time to check in with children about staying safe and being aware of their environment.

Building confidence in children to recognize unsafe situations and trust their instincts is one of the best ways to help keep them safe. Having open, age-appropriate conversations about boundaries, decision-making, and what to do when something feels wrong can go a long way in preparing kids for real-life scenarios.

To support families in the community with these important conversations, the Alberta RCMP is sharing a list of tips that parents and caregivers can review with their children:

- Remind kids never to go anywhere with someone they don't know. Even if a stranger seems nice or asks for help, they should walk away and seek help from someone they trust.

- Let your child know that no adult should ever ask them to do something that makes them feel uneasy. It's okay to say no and remove themselves from the situation.

- If something doesn't sit right—even if they can't explain why—children should be encouraged to leave and talk to a trusted adult as soon as they can.

- Teach kids to check in with a parent or caregiver before accepting anything or going anywhere, especially if it involves someone unfamiliar.

- Help them identify safe adults they can approach if they feel unsure, like a teacher, neighbour, or family member.

- Consider setting up a family password. If someone other than you

needs to pick up your child unexpectedly, they should know the agreed-upon word.

- Encourage kids to stick with friends or siblings when walking or playing outside—there's always greater safety in numbers.

- Walk or bike common routes with your child and point out safe locations they can go to if they need help.

- If your child has a phone, make use of family location features available on most smartphones, like Apple's Family Sharing or Google Family Link.

- Go over how to

use emergency call functions and make sure they know their full name, address, your contact info, and how to describe their location to 911 if needed.

- Run through some "what would you do if..." situations with your child to help them think through different safety scenarios.

# CONFIRMED CASE OF MEASLES PROMPTS PUBLIC ALERT TO POTENTIAL EXPOSURES

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has been notified of a person with confirmed measles in the Edmonton Zone who has been in a public setting while infectious. Additional locations may be released if necessary.

Individuals who were in the following location/s during the specified dates and times may have been exposed to measles:

Location:

Stollery Children's Hospital Emergency Department

8440 112 Street NW, Edmonton

Exposure time periods:

July 2: Exposure time: Approx. 7:15 a.m. to 4 p.m. (MDT)

Location:

University of Alberta Hospital foyers in between 112th Street and 114th Street Entrances

Anyone who attended these locations at these times, who was born in or after 1970 and has less than two documented doses of measles-containing vaccine, may be at risk for developing measles. They should self-monitor for symptoms of measles and are strongly encouraged to

review their immunization records.

Measles is an extremely contagious disease and the virus spreads easily through the air. Symptoms of measles include:

- Fever of 38.3° C or higher; and
- Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes; and

- A rash that appears 3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see.

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest risk of serious complications.

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complica-

tions. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immunization program. The recommended schedule for measles vaccination is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 for more information if these situations apply to you or your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.

The measles hotline connects you to a professional who can assist with accessing your immunization records or offer general informa-

tion; provide advice for those experiencing measles symptoms and are feeling unwell; and assist with booking measles immunization appointments or locating a public health clinic offering immunization in your area.

You can also text 'Measles' to 88111 to get measles health information texted to your mobile device.
