MASKWACIS RCMP CONTINUE TO COMBAT GUN CRIME

Maskwacis RCMP continue our efforts combating gun crime in the community. During 2024, Maskwacis RCMP seized 84 illegal firearms, an increase of 62% over the previous year. Maskwacis has one of the highest crime severity indexes in the province and firearm violence represents a large portion of these statistics.

During the first two weeks of June 2025, the Maskwacis RCMP has seized several illegal firearms from various calls for service. Examples of these seizures include.

• On June 11, 2025, an officer making patrols ob-

served an intoxicated male carrying sawed off shot gun. The officer quickly arrested the suspect. A male resident of Maskwacis has charges pending for 4 weapons offences. The suspect was released from custody with his next court date set for Aug. 14, 2025, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Wetaskiwin.

• On June 11, 2025, an officer making patrols conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle with a suspended driver. During an interaction with the occupants, the investigator observed a loaded shot gun in the vehicle. After a short foot pursuit, the accused was arrested. Anthony Kelsey Omeasoo (32) a resident of Maskwacis has been

charged with 4 weapons offenses, resident arrest and 3 counts of possession of a firearms contrary to a prohibition order. Omeasoo was taken before a Justice of the Peace and released with his next court date set for June 26, 2025, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Maskwacis.





ALBERTA'S TOURISM SOARS PAST NATIONAL AVERAGE

Alberta's tourism strategy delivered 12 per cent growth in 2024, outpacing other provinces at four times the national average.

In 2024, Alberta's government launched Higher Ground: A Tourism Sector Strategy. The strategy will unleash Alberta's visitor economy potential by charting the path towards a bold and ambitious goal of growing Alberta's visitor economy from \$10 billion a year to \$25 billion annually by 2035 while creating jobs and economic opportunity for all regions of the province.

This push by the province to prioritize the visitor

economy is already seeing results, with tourism continuing to be Alberta's number one service export sector, bringing jobs, dollars and prosperity into the province's economy. Last year alone, the tourism industry supported more than 85,000 jobs in Alberta.

NEW STANDARDS FOR SCHOOL LIBRARIES

Alberta's government has introduced new standards to ensure school library materials are age-appropriate.

School libraries should be safe and supportive places where students can learn and explore without being exposed to inappropriate sexual content. However, in the absence of a consistent standard for selecting age-appropriate library materials, school boards have taken different approaches, leading to concerns about safeguards in place.

In response to these concerns, and informed by feedback from education partners and the public, Alberta's government has created standards to provide school boards with clear direction on the selection, availability and access to school library materials, such as books.

"Our actions to ensure that materials in school libraries don't expose children to sexual content were never about banning books. These new standards are to ensure that school boards have clear guidance to ensure age-appropriate access to school library materials, while reflecting the values and priorities of Albertans."

The new standards set clear expectations for school library materials with regard to sexual content and require school boards to implement policies to support these standards.

Standards for school library materials

Under the new standards, school libraries are not permitted to include library materials containing explicit sexual content. Non-explicit sexual content may be accessible to students in Grade 10 and above, provided it is age-appropriate.

"Protecting kids from explicit content is common sense. LGBTQ youth, like all children, deserve to see themselves in stories that are age-appropriate, supportive and affirming – not in material that sexualizes or con-

fuses them.

School boards must also regularly review their school library collections, publish a full list of available materials and ensure that a staff member supervises students' access to school library materials. School boards will have to remove any materials with explicit sexual content from their school libraries by October

School board policies and procedures

All school boards must have publicly available policies that align with the new standards for selecting and managing library materials by January 1, 2026. School boards can either create new policies or update existing ones to meet these requirements.

These policies must outline how school library materials are selected and reviewed, how staff supervise students' access throughout the school day, and how a student, parent, school board employee or other member of the school community can request a review or removal of materials in the school library. School boards are also required to clearly communicate these policies to employees, students and parents before January 2026.

"A robust, grade- and age-appropriate library catalogue is vital for student success. We welcome the ministry's initiative to establish consistent standards and appreciate the ongoing consultation to help craft a plan that will serve our families and communities well"

ALBERTA LEADS WITH HEALTH CARE AIDE REGULATION

Alberta will become the first province to regulate health care aides under a health professional regulatory college, ensuring patients get high-quality care from qualified professionals.

Alberta's 40,000 health care aides play a vital role in the health system, providing hands-on support to Albertans who need a high level of care, including seniors and those with chronic or acute illnesses. Starting Feb. 2, 2026, health care aides in Alberta will be regulated under a professional college – just like many other front-line health professionals.

To practise and use the health care aide title, individuals will need to meet approved education requirements, follow standards of practice, commit to ongoing learning and abide by a professional code of ethics

"This is a major step forward in strengthening Alberta's health care system. It gives Albertans confidence that the care they receive is safe and that health care aides have the proper training and oversight."

The College of Licensed Practical Nurses of Alberta will become the College of Licensed Practical Nurses and Health Care Aides of Alberta and will be responsible for registering health care aides, setting practice and conduct standards, ensuring continued professional development and responding to complaints. This work builds on the college's experience regulating licensed practical nurses in Alberta.

"The College of Licensed

Practical Nurses of Alberta is ready to take on the work of regulating health care aides in a manner that protects the public. We are leveraging our experience as a trusted regulator of licensed practical nurses to prepare health care aides and our partners for this transition. The CLPNA is confident that the interests of Albertans will be served through our oversight of registration, practice, conduct and continuing competence."

Health care aides who meet the requirements are eligible for enrolment in the Alberta Health Care Aide Directory. Those enrolled in the directory immediately before regulation comes into force will be transferred to a health care aide register with the college and issued a practice permit.

As of Feb. 2, 2026, individuals who meet the requirements for registration as a health care aide, who intend to provide health care aide services to the public, and who want to use the health care aide title must apply for registration with the College of Licensed Practical Nurses and Health Care Aides of Alberta. Going forward, only registered health care aides will be allowed to use the health care aide title, and all registered health care aides will be required to renew their practice permits annually.

In the weeks ahead, regulatory changes to support implementation will be finalized. The college will also continue working with health care aides, employers, post-secondary institutions and other partners to support a smooth transition.



The Alberta Government is launching a province-wide consultation to chart our path, defend our economy, and assert our sovereignty within a united Canada.

MORE PRIMARY CARE ON THE WAY FOR RURAL ALBERTA

Rural Albertans will soon have better access to doctors and care teams as 74 medical residents begin providing care and dozens of clinics expand their staff.

Alberta's government is committed to ensuring Albertans receive the care they need when and where they need it. To strengthen rural health care, grants under two programs have been awarded. These grants support medical resident physicians training in rural and remote communities and help primary care clinics across rural Alberta grow their teams.

initiatives The include \$16-million pilot bursary program that supports 74 family medicine residents expected to begin practising in rural Alberta between now and July 2027. At the same time, the Rural Team Recruitment Grant will provide \$6 million over two years to help clinics hire additional health professionals - such as nurses, pharmacists and physiotherapists expand care teams and improve access.

"This is a great example of how we're delivering real improvements in primary health care. Our bursary program will help bring more family doctors to rural communities, and the team-based care grants mean Albertans will have better access to health professionals who can support their needs. Physicians are choosing to practise in Alberta in record numbers, especially family doctors, and we're working to make sure they increase access for patients in rural Alberta as well as in the cities.'

The Rural Team Recruitment Grant helps clinics and community organizations increase their capacity by hiring non-physician health professionals. These multidisciplinary teams significantly improve access to primary care by ensuring a range of health services are available locally.

In the first round of funding, 29 clinics across the province will receive support. This includes clinics in Consort, Drumheller, Stettler, Crowsnest Pass, Cold Lake, Grande Cache, Peace River, Delburne, Drayton Valley, Barrhead and Bashaw. Approximately 52 new full-time health professionals are expected to be hired, with a second intake for the grant program opening soon.

"The Rural Team Recruitment Grant is a meaningful step forward for health care in rural Alberta. When clinics can hire more team members, people get access to the care they need faster and closer to home.

The Rural and Remote Family Medicine Resident Physician Bursary Pilot Program is helping attract and retain doctors in Alberta's rural and remote communities. It provides bursaries of \$125,000 for rural placements and \$200,000 for remote placements to residents who commit to working in eligible communities after completing their train-

Bursaries are available to medical students from any Canadian university who have matched to a family medicine residency program at the University of Alberta or the University of Calgary. Residents can apply at any point during their training. Applications are being accepted until early 2026 or until all funding is committed.

Resident physicians are more likely to stay and practise in the communities where they complete their residency, making this program a key step toward building sustainable, long-term access to primary care in rural and remote areas.

keep family doctors."

MORE CLASSROOM SPACES ON THE WAY

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government continues to invest in more school spaces now with the 2025-26 school year on the horizon.

To support schools in managing the growing number of students, Alberta's government is investing \$50 million to add 62 premade classrooms this fall. Through previous Budget 2025 commitments, a total \$100 million will deliver 109 new modular classrooms, creating space for 2,725 students and relocating 575 more.

"Alberta's government is moving quickly to build new schools and create more classroom spaces, so our students continue to have room to grow and thrive. This additional funding for modular classrooms will help us get much-needed spaces to some of our busiest schools, while we work as quickly as possible to open the doors to more

than 130 school projects underway in the province."

Alberta's government is also providing \$1 million in planning funding to advance four new charter school projects. The funds are being provided to New Horizons Charter Academy, New Humble Community School, Suzuki Charter School and Thrive Charter School to finalize planning details such as programming needs and the size and type of classrooms needed in each school. When completed, these new charter schools will contribute more than 2,400 new or updated student spaces.

"The Thrive Charter School Society is excited about this opportunity to advance efforts in addressing opportunity gaps for students in Edmonton. This investment paves the way to serve more students and their families with the programming and supports necessary to truly thrive."

Alberta's government is looking to the future by providing \$610,000 in pre-planning funding for 13 potential future school

projects. Pre-planning funding helps school boards begin planning for school projects they believe will become priorities within the next three to five years. Examples of pre-planning activities include project scoping and community engagement and outreach. Although it is an important first step, pre-planning funding does not guarantee a school project will be built.

These investments modulars and school planning are all part of the province's Schools Now program, which includes a generational investment of \$8.6 billion to build and update more than 100 schools across the province and create more classroom spaces now. Over seven years, Schools Now will create more than 200,000 student spaces, helping school boards manage class sizes and bringing learning closer to home for more Alberta students and families.

BRINGING FAMILY JUSTICE SERVICES TO MORE ALBERTANS

Expanding the Family Justice Strategy will help more Albertans settle family disputes outside the courtroom.

Through Budget 2025, Alberta's government is investing an additional \$3.2 million for a total of \$11.2 million for the Family Justice Strategy to give more Albertans a streamlined and consistent process to access family justice services.

The Family Justice Strategy helps families resolve matters outside the courts to reduce the stress on children and parents during an already difficult time.

"We're making it easier for Albertans to resolve family matters by expanding access to pre-court services. This investment means more communities will benefit from simpler, faster supports that put families first."

This additional funding will support an expansion of the strategy to Grande Prairie, Stony Plain, St. Albert, Sherwood Park, Leduc and Fort Saskatchewan. The Family Justice Strategy directs Albertans to pre-court services that help people either avoid making a court appearance or better understand the process if they do go to court.

This includes:

• Forms of dispute resolution such as medi-

ation, where people meet with a neutral mediator to discuss issues including parenting, child support and spousal support.

- An online Parenting After Separation course for all parents with minor children.
- A meeting with a family court counsellor for anyone representing themselves.

These services are meant to help Albertans resolve their family law issues

MAKING EVERY DROP OF WATER COUNT

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is exploring opportunities to make more water available by updating the Water Act – and wants to hear from Albertans.

Demand for water is rising and Alberta is looking at ways to make more water available for farmers, ranchers, businesses and growing communities. The Water Act has not been updated in 25 years and with more families, agri-businesses, food processing plants and many others coming to Alberta, it is important that the system makes every drop count.

While most of the Water Act is working well, government recently heard from over a thousand Albertans who suggested improvements that could potentially help make the system stronger. Alberta's government is now seeking public feedback on some of the targeted changes put forward by Albertans to maximize the water supply and make more

water available to those who need it.

"We need to ensure we have the water we need for people, our environment and our major industries for today, tomorrow and for generations to come. Albertans have given us clear feedback on the Water Act, that it can and should be reviewed, and suggested specific updates for further discussion. We know there are many different views and perspectives, and we're grateful for the participation and engagement to help us get this right."

Critical areas are not up for discussion

The foundation of Alberta's water management system is already working successfully. For example, Alberta's priority system will continue to be based on principles of first-in-time, first-in-right – a system that has worked well for more than 100 years. There will be no changes considered that re-

duce anyone's current water allocations, nor add any new royalties, bulk or volumetric pricing for water.

Alberta's Water for Life strategy will keep guiding the province's water system, ensuring healthy, secure and sustainable water supply for communities, economy and aquatic ecosystems. Alberta will also continue to support water allocation transfers in basins with approved water management plans and will continue to require a special act of the legislature for any high-risk inter-basin transfers.

Targeted improvements proposed by Albertans

Having heard from Albertans directly, government is seeking feedback on some of the most commonly raised, or practical, changes that were proposed. The updates could:

- Streamline regulatory decisions on licence amendments and transfers.
- Enhance water use information to support licence and transfer decisions.

- Enable lower risk inter-basin transfers where it is safe and appropriate to do so
- Enable management of alternative water sources, such as rainwater, stormwater and wastewater reuse.

Albertans can provide feedback on the specific proposals until June 30.

There will also be targeted in-person sessions across the province with Indigenous communities and water using sectors in May. No decisions have been made, and government will review all the feedback before determining what changes, if any, move forward.

This engagement builds off the first phase undertaken in fall 2024 and winter 2025, but there is more work to do. Engagement on other ideas for regulatory, policy and program changes put forward by Albertans to improve water availability may also take place in the future as government works to strengthen the water management system.






