DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP CONDUCTS ARREST AFTER RECEIVING ERRATIC DRIVING COMPLAINT

On Aug. 1, 2025, the Drayton Valley RCMP received a complaint about an erratic driver on Highway 22. Drayton Valley RCMP members made patrols in the area and were able to locate the suspect vehicle. A traffic stop was conducted to determine the sobriety of the driver, resulting in members observing illegal goods inside the vehicle. A subsequent

search of the vehicle resulted in the seizure of over 200g of Fentanyl, bear spray, a knife and drug paraphernalia. RCMP members also located several items of Luluemon clothing with security tags still on them, which were later discovered stolen from a Calgary Lululemon on July 31, 2025.

As a result of the investigation, 48-year-old Clairmont, Alta., resident Brent Darling was charged with:

·Possession of a controlled sub-

stance for the purpose of trafficking:

•Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose (x2);

Operation of motor vehicle while impaired; and

•Possession of property obtained by crime under \$5000.

Darling was brought before a justice of the peace and released on conditions. He is to appear before the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on Aug. 19, 2025





SCOUTING CANOLA FIELDS IN YELLOWHEAD COUNTY FOR CLUBROOT

Submitted by Yellowhead County

2025 Clubroot Scouting will occur in Yellowhead County from approximately August 25th to September 26th.

Yellowhead County, AB (August 13, 2025) - As fall approaches, it's a good time to remember that clubroot has been detected in Yellowhead County. Clubroot is a soil-borne disease that significantly reduces yields

in cruciferous crops like canola, mustards, and certain vegetables.

Clubroot causes galls or "clubs" to form on the roots of infected plants, which hinders their ability to absorb water and nutrients, ultimately lowering crop yields. Areas with higher infection rates often experience more severe losses. In 2015, new clubroot pathotypes were identified in the Edmonton region that can overcome even clubroot-re-

sistant seed varieties.

Yellowhead County Pest Inspectors will be scouting for clubroot in canola and other Brassicaceae crops throughout the County from approximately August 25th - September 26th. Scouts will follow strict prevention measures to reduce the risk of spreading the disease.

Clubroot spreads primarily through the soil movement from infected to non-infected fields. Soil can

be carried by farm equipment, vehicles, and even wind or water erosion. Proper sanitation of machinery and equipment is crucial to stop the spread of clubroot.

Crop rotation is strongly recommended to reduce the se-

verity of clubroot infections. Growing canola continuously on the same land increases the risk and severity of outbreaks. Although there is no cure for infected plants, there are steps you can take to prevent clubroot from becoming established:

- Check fields regularly for signs of clubroot such as galls or clubs on roots, premature ripening, and wilting plants Before moving to a new field, remove all dirt from wheels and sanitize all equipment and vehicles using a 1% bleach solution (99% water)

DESIGN PHASE BEGINS FOR HIGHWAY 621 IMPROVEMENTS

Submitted by Brazeau County

Alberta's government is partnering with Brazeau County to make Highway 621 safer and more efficient for vehicles carrying oversize and overweight loads.

A design consultant will be hired to complete planning, engineering and design work for 30 kilometres of grade widening between Highways 22 and 753. The upgrades will improve safety, support Alberta's heavy load corridors, and strengthen the province's competitiveness economic by making it easier for industry to move goods. Brazeau County will lead the hiring of the consultant and deliver the design work.

Highway upgrades will accommodate a 7.32-metre-wide load (with a permit) passing a 2.6-metre-wide regulated commercial truck. Highway 621 carries approximately 1,300 vehicles per day, with 8.5 per cent truck traffic (about 87 trucks daily).

The design phase is expected to take two to three years, subject to right-of-way acquisition and utility relocations.

Highway 621 is part of Brazeau County's Western Economic Corridor, and is the only route in the region that accommodates over-dimensional traffic to Whitecourt, Grande Prairie and Peace River. This critical link supports resource industries, agriculture, and emerging sectors like hemp and geothermal, connecting them to markets across Alberta and beyond.

"Upgrading Highway 621 is about more than just paving a road – it's about building a more efficient transportation network that connects Alberta's industries to markets while keeping our economy competitive," says Devin Dreeshen, Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors. "This investment will

help ensure that heavy loads and critical goods can move safely and reliably for years to come."

"Highway 621 has been a long-standing concern for residents across the Drayton Valley-Devon region " says Minister of Sport and Tourism Andrew Boitchenko. "As MLA, I heard loud and clear from constituents that safety and infrastructure improvements were urgently needed. Today, I'm proud to stand with the Government of Alberta and Brazeau County to announce that we're getting it done-delivering on our commitment to make this vital corridor

safer, more efficient, and better equipped to support local industries and communities."

"This project has been sought after for quite some time, and we are grateful to Minister Dreeshen and Minister Boitchenko for making this project a go," says Brazeau County Reeve Bart Guyon." This will make the road safer and more accessible for industry. Brazeau County and Alberta move on wheels, so we are grateful to have this project go ahead. It will be very well-received by our residents, businesses, and industries."







EARTH-FRIENDLY TIPS FOR AUTU

Autumn is upon us, and with the change of seasons comes the fall to-do list that must be completed before the arrival of winter weather. Many outdoor jobs are best completed before temperatures drop, while others can be tackled indoors to help save energy and prepare for increased time spent inside the home.

determine if there are any items you no longer use. Donate these items or use them as rags when cleaning.

Though it's not feasible or healthy to open windows when temperatures outside dip to near or below freezing, there are steps everyone can take to improve the indoor air quality in their homes.




air unhealthy to breathe. Benzene is an irritant that can cause dizziness, headache, nausea, and blurred vision, among other side effects. Formaldehyde, which is often found in homes thanks to its widespread use in a range of products, can cause watery eyes, nausea and wheezing.

· Watch what you are lighting up. Many homeowners know that smoking indoors drastically reduces indoor air quality, putting even nonsmokers at heightened risk of developing various respiratory ailments. Homeowners con-

cerned about the indoor air quality in their homes should ban smoking inside, no matter how low temperatures dip outside. In addition, homeowners with wood-burning stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent maintaining these features, as they can release harmful soot and smoke if they are not taken care of. Some people may also be allergic to incense and scented candles, so keep a watchful eye on residents and guests whenever you light candles or sticks of incense.

If any symptoms of allergies appear, avoid lighting any more candles or incense, waiting until you can open the windows if you want to light any again.


· Purchase an air purifier. Air purifiers are beneficial year-round, helping to remove allergens and particles from a home. High-efficiency particulate air filters, known as HEPA filters, are extremely effective at removing airborne particulates from the air inside your home.

· Pay attention to pets.

Like their owners, pets tend to spend more time indoors during the winter. That means more fur and pet dander, the skin flakes in an animal's fur or hair that can trigger allergic reactions, is likely in your home during the winter than in the summer. To combat this, bathe your pets regularly in the winter, making sure to wash the animal's bedding in hot water on a weekly basis as well.

Open the windows when possible. Winter does not typically provide many opportunities to open the windows, but you might get a few chances to let some fresh air in through the windows during winter. Make the most of these opportunities, and when possible crack the windows when you're cleaning so dust and other particles that kick up have a path outside of your home.

Clean interior air should be a year-round priority, but homeowners may have to go the extra mile to keep their homes' interior air clean when winter arrives.



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

ALBERTA LEADS WITH HEALTH CARE AIDE REGULATION

Alberta will become the first province to regulate health care aides under a health professional regulatory college, ensuring patients get high-quality care from qualified professionals.

Alberta's 40,000 health care aides play a vital role in the health system, providing hands-on support to Albertans who need a high level of care, including seniors and those with chronic or acute illnesses. Starting Feb. 2, 2026, health care aides in Alberta will be regulated under a professional college – just like many other front-line health professionals.

To practise and use the health care aide title, individuals will need to meet approved education requirements, follow standards of practice, commit to ongoing learning and abide by a professional code of ethics.

"This is a major step forward in strengthening Alberta's health care system. It gives Albertans confidence that the care they receive is safe and that health care aides have the proper training and oversight."

The College of Licensed Practical Nurses of Alberta will become the College of Licensed Practical Nurses and Health Care Aides of Alberta and will be responsible for registering health care aides, setting practice and conduct standards, ensuring continued professional development and responding to complaints. This work builds on the college's experience regulating licensed practical nurses in Alberta.

"The College of Licensed

Practical Nurses of Alberta is ready to take on the work of regulating health care aides in a manner that protects the public. We are leveraging our experience as a trusted regulator of licensed practical nurses to prepare health care aides and our partners for this transition. The CLPNA is confident that the interests of Albertans will be served through our oversight of registration, practice, conduct and continuing competence."

Health care aides who meet the requirements are eligible for enrolment in the Alberta Health Care Aide Directory. Those enrolled in the directory immediately before regulation comes into force will be transferred to a health care aide register with the college and issued a practice permit.

As of Feb. 2, 2026, individuals who meet the requirements for registration as a health care aide, who intend to provide health care aide services to the public, and who want to use the health care aide title must apply for registration with the College of Licensed Practical Nurses and Health Care Aides of Alberta. Going forward, only registered health care aides will be allowed to use the health care aide title, and all registered health care aides will be required to renew their practice permits annually.

In the weeks ahead, regulatory changes to support implementation will be finalized. The college will also continue working with health care aides, employers, post-secondary institutions and other partners to support a smooth transition.

SUPPORTING FIRST NATIONS STUDENT MENTAL HEALTH

Alberta's government is awarding \$4.2 million to improve learning and mental health supports for First Nations students.

Supporting mental health is a key priority for Alberta's government. To help ensure that First Nations students have the supports they need, and to help meet the diverse learning and mental health needs of K to 12 students in on-reserve schools, Alberta's government is providing 27 First Nations with up to \$4.6 million for the 2025-26 school year.

"Strong mental health and learning supports are crucial to helping students build resilience and succeed in school. We're proud to work with First Nations education partners and communities to support the success and well-being of First Nations students. This grant will empower communities to deliver the learning and mental health supports that are right for their students."

First Nations with at least one on-reserve school were invited to apply for the Specialized Learning and Mental Health Supports for First Nations Grant in May. Recipients will receive funding for the upcoming school year and will have the flexibility to use the dollars in a way that best supports their students.

"This grant will give students on First Nations another tool in their toolbox to set them up for success. Building mental wellness in youth not only improves academic outcomes but lays a foundation for a lifetime of positive mental health practices."

Additionally, through Budget 2025, Alberta's government is providing public school boards with almost \$94 million in the 2025-26 school year to support self-identified First Nations, Métis and Inuit students.

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
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
