DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP CONDUCTS ARREST AFTER RECEIVING ERRATIC DRIVING COMPLAINT

On Aug. 1, 2025, the Drayton Valley RCMP received a complaint about an erratic driver on Highway 22. Drayton Valley RCMP members made patrols in the area and were able to locate the suspect vehicle. A traffic

stop was conducted to determine the sobriety of the driver, resulting in members observing illegal goods inside the vehicle. A subsequent search of the vehicle resulted in the seizure of over 200g of Fentanyl, bear spray, a knife and drug paraphernalia. RCMP members also located several items

of Lululemon clothing with security tags still on them, which were later discovered stolen from a Calgary Lululemon on July 31, 2025.

As a result of the investigation, 48-year-old Clairmont, Alta., resident Brent Darling was charged with:



DESIGN PHASE BEGINS FOR HIGHWAY 621 IMPROVEMENTS

Submitted by Brazeau County

Alberta's government is partnering with Brazeau County to make Highway 621 safer and more efficient for vehicles carrying oversize and overweight loads.

A design consultant will be hired to complete planning, engineering and design work for 30 kilometres of grade widening between Highways 22 and 753. The upgrades will improve safety, support Alberta's heavy load corridors, and strengthen the province's economic competitiveness by making it easier for industry to move goods. Brazeau County will lead the hiring of the consultant and deliver the design work.

Highway upgrades accommodate a 7.32-metre-wide (with a permit) passing a 2.6-metre-wide regulated commercial truck. Highway 621 carries approximately 1,300 vehicles per day, with 8.5 per cent truck traffic (about

87 trucks daily).

The design phase is expected to take two to three years, subject to right-of-way acquisition and utility relocations.

Highway 621 is part of Brazeau County's Western Economic Corridor, and is the only route in the region that accommodates over-dimensional traffic to Whitecourt. Grande Prairie and Peace River. This critical link supports resource industries, agriculture, and emerging sectors like hemp and geothermal, connecting them to markets across Alberta and beyond.

"Upgrading Highway 621 is about more than just paving a road - it's about building a more efficient transportation network that connects Alberta's industries to markets while keeping our economy competitive," says Devin Dreeshen, Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors. "This investment will help ensure that heavy loads and critical goods can move

safely and reliably for years to come."

"Highway 621 has been a long-standing concern for residents across the Dravton region " says Minister of Sport and Tourism Andrew Boitchenko. "As MLA. I heard loud and clear from constituents that safety and infrastructure improvements urgently ed. Today, I'm proud to stand with the Government of Alberta and Brazeau County to announce that we're getting it done-delivering on our commitment to make this vital corridor safer, more efficient, and better equipped to support local industries and communities."

"This project has been sought after for quite some time, and we are grateful to Minister Dreeshen and Minister Boitchenko for making this project a go," says Brazeau County Reeve Bart Guyon." This will make the road safer and more accessible for industry. Brazeau County and Alberta move on wheels, so we are grateful to have this project go ahead. 





EARTH-FRIENDLY TIPS FOR AUTUMN

Autumn is upon us, and with the change of seasons comes the fall to-do list that must be completed before the arrival of winter weather. Many outdoor jobs are best completed before temperatures drop, while others can be tackled indoors to help save energy and prepare for increased time spent inside the home.

Outdoor cleanup

Autumn means leaves are falling from trees and littering landscapes. Cleaning up leaves can be a time-consuming task, but it's necessary to promote the health of lawns and other plants. Grass that is completely matted down with leaves can become starved for light and moisture, and lawns may even rot when forced to spend winter beneath fallen leaves.

eco-friendly timesaver is to shred leaves with a mower (a manual mower is preferable) and leave them as topdressing for the lawn. As long as

the grass blades can be seen within the leaves. the lawn should be fine. Shredded leaves will decompose and add necessary nutrients and organic matter to the soil naturally.

Leaves also can be used in annual flower and vegetable gardens to improve the soil. Mulch made from shredded leaves can be placed on the soil around trees shrubs. This helps to reduce weed problems and protects root systems from harsh temperature fluctuations.

Clothing donations

It's time to pack away summer clothing and once again fill closets and drawers with sweaters and jeans. Before packing away your summer wardrobe, conduct an inventory to determine if there are any items you no longer use. Donate these items or use them as rags when cleaning.

can layer them under sweatshirts and sweaters. The heat from layering will be trapped against your body and keep you cozier, reducing your reliance on HVAC systems to stay warm.

Home repairs

Check the roof for any missing shingles. In addition, look for spots where animals or insects may be able to gain entry into your home. Seal these areas and repair any leaks. This will make your

home more efficient later on when winter hits its stride.

Remove window air conditioners for the winter. If they can't be removed, seal them with caulking or tape and cover them with an airtight, insulated jacket. If you have forcedair systems, move furniture away from the vents so that air can flow better around the home and keep it comfortable.

Check weatherstripping around windows and doors and make the necessary adjustments. Installing additional insulation also can help reduce energy consumption.

MAKE LIGHTS SPARKLE

As days get shorter and natural light is less abundant, interior lighting becomes ever more important. Chandeliers, pendant lamps, recessed lighting, and tableside lamps are most effective when they are clean. HGTV experts say dirty lights can give off up to 20 percent less light than clean ones. Dirty fixtures also waste energy.

Lighting fixtures that are within reach are easy to tackle, but what about those fixtures that hang or have multiple crystals, globes or bulbs? These tips can cut down on the time needed to give lights a thorough cleaning.

Stock up on the

right cleaning supplies. Microfiber dusting cloths are smart choices because they can help trap grime and tend to be machine-washable and reusable. Extendable static-charged dusters are another handy item to have around, particularly for fixtures that are hard to reach.

Dust regularly. Dusting regularly can prevent the buildup of grime that's difficult to wash off. Try to dust light fixtures weekly or biweekly. The more frequent the fixtures are dusted, the less time each cleaning session will take. Soft cloths can remove the dust from most bulbs and exterior surfaces. Lamp

shades may need more attention. Use a lamb's-wool duster to attract dirt so it doesn't leave a residue on the lampshade.

Deep-clean at table level. Deep-cleaning at table level is more manageable. Remove any glass accents and set them out on a cushioned surface so they do not break. Soft cloths dampened with a vinegar solution should remove most of the dirt on chandelier crystals and the globes or outer glass coverings of other types of fixtures. Take a photo of the lighting fixture prior to cleaning so you'll know how to replace removed parts correctly once everything is clean

and dry.

If you cannot remove a fixture for cleaning, use a sturdy stool, a spray bottle with your cleaning mixture and a soft cloth to wipe away the dirt. Remember to place something absorbent beneath the light to catch any drips. Do not spray liquids directly onto light bulbs; otherwise, you can damage the bulb and the electrical components.

It's best to exercise caution when cleaning lighting fixtures. Turn off the light itself and shut off the circuit breaker to avoid the risk of shock or burns from hot bulbs.

WAHKOHTOWIN: A COLLABORATIVE MIXED-UNIT HOUSING DEVELOPMENT IN LEDUC

Construction of Wahkohtowin, a new 59-unit housing project located at 5404 47 Street in Leduc, is expected to begin soon. The development is the result of a collaborative partnership between TLA Group of Holding Companies, the City of Leduc, the Leduc Regional Housing Foundation, and Habitat for Humanity Edmonton.

"Wahkohtowin," a Cree word meaning kinship, reflects the vision behind the project: to create an inclusive and sustainable community where people from diverse economic backgrounds can live and thrive together. Once complete, Wahkohtowin will offer a range of one-, two- and three-bedroom units for both rent and ownership, including non-market housing options. Occupancy is anticipated by late 2026.

The 60,000-square-foot building will also include commercial space envisioned for a daycare and medical centre—two amenities identified

as community needs. The site design includes thoughtful landscaping, such as pollinator-friendly plants and a variety of tree species.

"This project represents the kind of innovation and collaboration we need to address housing affordability in our community," says Bob Young, Mayor of the City of Leduc. "Wahkohtowin brings together partners who share a common goal—building a city where everyone can find a place to call home."

The City of Leduc initiated the project through a negotiated request for proposal and redistricted the land to Direct Control before selling it to TLA Group of Holding Companies to move the vision forward. TLA Group of Holding Companies, an Edmonton-based company specializing in attainable housing, is leading the construction and ownership of the property. By capping its profit margin at 15 per cent, the company is maximizing benefit for the community.

"This project demonstrates

what's possible when we come together with a shared purpose—to create attainable, dignified housing for all," said Chris Bradley, Managing Partner at TLA Group of Holding Companies. "Wahkohtowin is more than a housing project; it's a commitment to long-term community building."

The Leduc Regional Housing Foundation will manage and maintain the building on behalf of TLA once construction is complete, ensuring ongoing access to non-market housing for those who need it most in the region.

Habitat for Humanity Edmonton has also contributed to the project by pre-purchasing units for its homeownership program. "This initiative embodies our shared commitment to fostering a community where housing is accessible, secure, and supportive of long-term growth," said Dr. Ann-Marie Reddy, President & CEO of Habitat for Humanity Edmonton. "We're honoured to be part of the project and creating more opportunities

for individuals and couples to achieve stability and self-reliance and thrive in Leduc."

The Government of Canada has committed an investment of \$456,000 toward Habitat Edmonton's four ownership units. Hard working Albertans will partner with Habitat to purchase these homes.

"Housing is more than a roof over your head – it's a place where people find safety, stability and a sense of belonging," says the Honourable Gregor Robertson, Minister of Housing and Infrastructure and Minister responsible for Pacific Economic Development Canada. "Investments in projects like the one in Leduc will make a positive difference in the community for decades to come."

Since 2019, the Government of Canada has supported Habitat for Humanity Canada in reaching a goal of building 804 homes across Canada through a \$65.1 million investment from the Government of Canada's Affordable Housing Fund.


