





Raising of the Métis & Treaty 6 & 8 Flag

A flag raising ceremony for the Métis, Treaty 6, and Treaty 8 flags to be raised at the Administration Building will be held on September 20, 2025. Representatives from Treaty 6, Treaty 8 and the Otipemisiwak Métis Government have been invited to attend as dignitaries as part of the ceremony.

Procedure Bylaw 05.25

Council gave all three readings to Bylaw 05.25, a procedure bylaw for the regulation of meetings, boards, committees, and other bodies established by Council. The bylaw required amendments to reflect recent legislative changes, as well as provide clarity and

consistency

Rise Together Project Update An update on the Rise Together Project was presented to Council. While two components of the project have not progressed due to limited community engagement, the Community Murals, Artist Engagement, and Mural Celebration components have seen strong participation and will serve as lasting tributes to the County's resilience.

Pembina Agricultural & Recreation Society Letter of Support

Council approved sending a letter of support for the Pembina Agricultural & Recreation Society (PARS) in their application for a provincial Community Facility Enhancement Program grant of \$123,400 that will be equally matched by PARS. Funds would be used to replace their ice-resurfacer, arena boards, and to upgrade their security camera system.

Transfer Station Operation Services

The Waste Transfer Stations Operation Services contract was awarded to GFL Environmental Inc. The three-year term totals \$6,586,764.00. There were no other proposals received for these services.

Amendment to Lease Request

Council directed the preparation of a 10-year lease agreement with the Mary Reimer Regional Park Society for the use of approximately 1.9 ha (4.7 ac) of land located in Plan 0325324 Block 1 Lot 3 at a rate of \$1.00 per year for the period of August 2025 to August 2035.

Whistle Cessation Policy

The Train Whistle Cessation (Policy 3200.25) was adopted by Council. The policy will allow for all crossings within Yellowhead County to be reviewed internally and then presented to Council for ranking to determine the best can-

didates for whistle cessation.

Utility Bylaw Fee Schedule Update

Council gave all three readings to Bylaw 06.25, the Utility Amendment Bylaw. Based on the bylaw, utility rates for water, sewer, and solid waste will see a 3% increase for 2026.

Vicious Dog Order Appeal

Council upheld a Vicious Dog designation, as set out in the Animal Control Bylaw 19.19. An appeal for the designation had been received and subsequently discussed at the August 19, 2025 Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting.

Human Resource Policy

Council rescinded previous Human Resource Policy 1200.08 and associated policies 1200.08.01-1200.08.29. In place of these, Council adopted Human Resource Policy 1300.00.

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3 WAYS TO MAKE HOMES SAFER

Injuries that occur around the home contribute to millions of medical visits and tens of thousands of fatalities each year. Falls account for the largest percentage of home accidents, with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reporting that around 30,000 fall-related fatalities occur each year in the United States. Many home accidents are entirely preventable when proper caution is exercised.

As homeowners prepare for home-improvement projects, improving safety inside and outside the home should be a priority.

1. Improve lighting

One of the easiest ways to reduce the risk of falls is to improve lighting around the home. The National Institutes of Health state that adequate lighting is important at entrances to the home, stairways, hallways, and other frequently traversed areas. Make sure lighting fixtures are

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using the highest wattage light bulb allowed. Artificial lighting sources become even more vital in fall and autumn, when natural light is less abundant in a home. In addition, install lighting outdoors by the front door, over the garage and where garbage pails are stored to facilitate safe passage.

2. Eliminate slick surfaces

Improving traction around the house also can minimize falls. Throw rugs and runners can be made more secure with nonslip rubber backings. Bath rugs can reduce slipping on wet surfaces in the bathroom. Also, nonslip mats can be used inside of showers and bathtubs.

Use shoe trays to reduce puddling from melting snow or rain runoff in entryways. Mop up spills quickly, and consider the use of matte- or textured-finished flooring to improve stability underfoot.

Promptly remove snow and

ice from driveways and walkways. For those who live in cold climates, heated concrete can help melt precipitation before it accumulates.

3. Make needed repairs

Repair loose floorboards and pull carpet taut if it has started to stretch out. Address cracks outdoors and ensure that patio stones, bricks and pavers are secure and level to reduce tripping hazards. Fix areas of the landscape where water may pool and freeze, creating potential hazards

INCREASING ACCESS TO LOW-COST LOANS FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Alberta's government is increasing the lending limit on the Feeder Associations Loan Guarantee Program to grow and strengthen the rural economy.

Alberta is world-renowned for its top-quality beef production, a reputation owed in part to the hard work and dedication of feeder associations, who help livestock producers get financing to buy animals and grow their herds. As demand for Alberta beef continues to grow internationally, leading to higher prices, locally owned feeder associations are turning to the Feeder Associations Loan Guarantee Program (FALGP) for low-interest financing backed by a government guarantee.

The program has been so successful at helping live-stock producers grow their businesses it has reached its previous limit of \$150 million. To ensure it's able to continue supporting producers, Alberta's government is increasing the program's overall limit to \$225 million.
