

"We know that the closure of Peavey Mart stores left a gap for many customers," said Doug Anderson. "Our investors and ownership group recognizes the importance of Peavey Mart in the Canadian retail landscape, and we're grateful for the opportunity to relaunch the brand in these communities."

With the historical success of many locations in prairie markets, the ownership group is confident in a successful relaunch of the initial four Peavey Mart stores. As the second tranche of investors are onboarded, the ownership group will target openings in other previously held markets, including Saskatchewan.

Kurt Schultz, Lead Merchant and a member the operations leadership team, echoed Anderson's comments. "We're bringing back the Peavey Mart that people know and love, a Peavey Mart focused on the needs of the farmer, rancher, acreage owner, homeowner and homesteader with a strong emphasis on providing value for dollars spent in our stores."

# FROM FOSTER CARE TO PUBLISHED POET—A STORY OF RESILIENCE FOR SUICIDE AWARENESS MONTH

I'm reaching out because I believe my story of resilience is timely and will resonate with readers. I'm using my art and platform to spread my message of hope and resilience. I'm a former community librarian in Parkland County turned author, with a passion for community building and mental health advocacy.

Almost Loved, a raw and vulnerable poetry collection, gives voice to the complicated realities of growing up as an adoptee in a dysfunctional home where women weren't valued. An environment that almost ended my life. But I decided to live and become my own source of love and joy. What

started as a dream last November to get Almost Loved into bookstores became a reality this past June with my book launching into 6 bookstores in Edmonton and area. With my launch into bookstores and several bookish events lined up this September, I'm using this opportunity to help spread my message of love and resilience. At my events, I'm handing out free love notes from the universe to readers to let them know they matter. I'm wearing a temporary semicolon tattoo, a symbol adopted by suicide prevention advocates to symbolize the decision to continue living and not ending one's story.

I'll be at the Tales and Trinkets Book Fair in Spruce Grove this coming Saturday, September 13, to let the community know they matter.

About the Author

Rena Joy is an adoptee and mental health advocate with lived experience. Her work blends personal experience with themes of resilience and healing. She writes to challenge stigmas surrounding foster care, adoption, and mental health. Almost Loved is her debut book.



## KICKSTARTING CAREERS FOR YOUNG ALBERTANS

A new youth hiring incentive is launching to help young Albertans get experience, build confidence and gain skills to launch rewarding careers.

Alberta's government is providing \$8 million for the new Alberta Youth Employment Incentive, which will provide grants to employers to offset costs associated with hiring, training and employing youth from age 15-24. The initiative is expected to support around 1,000 businesses to hire 2,500 young Albertans.

Entering the workforce is a vital first step toward building a strong, lifelong career. Youth unemployment is a challenge across Canada, and with a youth unemployment rate of 17 per cent, Alberta especially feels the impact as the result of rapid population growth through international immigration and the highest interprovincial migration of any other province. Young Albertans deserve access to jobs that help them learn, grow and contribute.

"Young Albertans deserve to be first in line for the kinds of jobs that open doors and build confidence. The Alberta Youth Employment Incentive gives employers a reason to take a chance on youth and help them gain the experience that leads to lifelong careers. This is how we prepare the next generation to succeed in every sector and build a stronger Alberta for tomorrow."

The Alberta Youth Employment Incentive will not only open opportunities for youth, but also support fresh, young talent entering the province's business and professional marketplace. Our goal is to ensure all Albertans, including youth, have the training, skills and support they need to thrive and be active contributors in Alberta's workforce."

Beginning in October 2025, employers will be eligible for one of two incentive amounts. Those who hire 1-2 young workers for a combined total of at least 400 hours, will be eligible to receive \$4,000. Employers who hire 3-5 young workers

with a combined total of at least 750 hours, will be eligible to receive \$7,500. Through this initiative, Alberta's government is helping pay \$10 of the hourly wage for young workers.

The Alberta Youth Employment Incentive will be managed by CAREERS – a long-standing not-for-profit organization that helps young people connect with employment. CAREERS will be responsible for delivering grants, determining eligibility and ensuring employers have the information they need if questions arise regarding the initiative. Once the incentive is available, applications by employers will be made through the CAREERS website.

"For over 27 years, CAREERS has seen the power of connecting youth with employers to spark meaningful careers. This new incentive is a game-changer – it makes it easier for businesses to hire young people, helps reduce unemployment and builds the skilled workforce Alberta needs for the future."

In addition to the grant funding, Alberta's government is

helping employers build confidence in young workers by developing a digital badge for youth who have worked a minimum of 200 hours and pass a skills-verified employer assessment. This badge can be highlighted on resumes, helping businesses know they are hiring a young person who has demonstrated and developed meaningful skills in a workplace.

"Helping youth and young adults enter the workforce is an important first step in their careers. With this new hiring incentive, we are excited that more young Albertans, including many of our students, will start gaining the experience they need for a successful future."

## RECOVERY COMMUNITY TAKING SHAPE ON ENOCH NATION

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Construction of the Maskêkosihk Recovery Community on Enoch Cree Nation is now about halfway complete, with addiction treatment expected to begin in 2026.

The Maskêkosihk Recovery Community is being built in partnership with Enoch Cree Nation and is now well into the construction phase. With a provincial capital investment of \$35 million, the 75-bed facility is located at the Enoch Cree Nation, on the western city limits of Edmonton, and is expected to begin accepting clients in 2026. Once operational, the recovery community will have the capacity to provide holistic addiction treatment for up to 300 people every year.

"Alberta's government and Enoch Cree Nation are working together to increase access to care that is close to home and connected to culture and community. These recovery communities will support healthier and more resilient community.

Alberta's government is committed to providing anyone suffering from the disease of addiction the opportunity to pursue recovery. As part of the Alberta Recovery Model, Alberta's government is building 11 recovery communities throughout the province. Five of these are in direct partnership with Indigenous communities.

"The Maskėkosihk Recovery Community is a powerful step forward in supporting people living in Alberta on their healing journeys. By integrating Indigenous cultures and traditions into care, this centre will offer a safe, welcoming space where individuals can rebuild their lives, reconnect with community and reclaim wellness—at no cost to them or their families."

Indigenous Peoples are disproportionately impacted by the addiction crisis, and partnerships between Alberta's government and Indigenous communities are vital to providing access to comprehensive, culturally appropriate services and strengthening recovery-oriented systems of care. The Maskêkosihk Recovery Community will provide comprehensive services that embody the Nation's cultures, ceremony, identity, family and community connections.

"Maskêkosihk means 'People of the land of medicine,' and this recovery community will be a place of true healing for our people and all Albertans. By grounding recovery in culture, ceremony and community, we are building a future where families can be made whole again and our spirits are restored."

In addition to Enoch Cree Nation, Alberta's government is building Indigenous-led recovery communities in partnership with Siksika Nation, Blood Tribe, Tsuut'ina Nation and the Métis Nation of Alberta. The total investment to develop these Indigenous-led recovery communities is about \$180 million.

"The Maskêkosihk Recovery Community will have a lasting impact on Enoch Cree Nation and the surrounding areas. This facility is a step forward in building healthier, safer communities for Albertans."

# STRENGTHENING TRADE CORRIDORS WITH THE U.S.

## PARKLAND AND ENOCH RCMP ARREST MALE AND RECOVER OVER \$150,000 IN STOLEN PROPERTY
